	The Licensing Officer introduced the application for a new premises licence for 614 High Road, Tottenham, London, N17 and drew the Committee's attention to page 22 of the agenda pack, recommending that the steps listed on Page 22 are included any conditions appended to the licence. It was noted that the Police and Child Protection representations had been agreed and the appropriate information submitted to the Fire Authority by the Applicant.	
	The Committee accepted the additional documentation; photographs presented by the interested groups and pages 1 and 2 of the petition presented by the Applicant; pages 3-onwards of the petition were not accepted as they did not contain a

petition heading.

The Committee received the statement of the Enforcement Officer for Noise, Derek Pearce, including objections to the Application being granted in full due to the potential for noise (particularly for the residents of the flats sharing a parting wall) and public nuisance and recommending the conditions on page 44 of the agenda pack.

Further to questions of the noise officer the Committee noted that the Applicant wanted to be able to play acoustic, soft music but the Application included recorded music as part of regulated entertainment.

The Committee noted the statements of the 6 objectors including:

- A 5am closing time was too excessive for a premises surrounded by residential blocks.
- There was the potential for anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance from patrons entering and leaving the premises and walking to their cars parked in the surrounding residential streets. A 5am closing would make this worse and could affect the sleep patterns of residents.
- Drunk patrons were not considerate and residents had been sworn at in the past and left to clear up mess such as broken glass and urine left by patrons.
- There were already problems with street drinkers, substance misuse and anti-social behaviour on Tottenham High Road.
- The Application was not clear about how it would meet the four licensing objectives and should be rejected.

In response to questioning by Committee Members all of the interested parties stated that they did not object to a café/bar opening on the site within reasonable hours.

The Committee noted the statement of the Applicant, including:

 That he did not intend to run the venue as a nightclub with loud music but with a laptop and speakers and acoustic music that did not

require electrical instruments.

• The Applicant had been trading in Tottenham since 1990 without any incidents concerning the Police, Environmental Health and Noise agencies.

Further to questions from the Committee the Applicant stated that:

- The venue held up to 200 people but would not be used to this capacity. There would be 4 members of staff serving at the bar and a head of security managing 4 security staff who would also patrol the outside of the premises to ensure patrons were not causing disturbances.
- CCTV was in operation and any drug users would be reported to the Police.
- Patrons would be recommended to use the Aldi car park near the venue.
- The Café would operate early in the morning and food would be served in the café, bar and restaurant for the rest of the day and night.

Further to questions from Objectors it was noted that:

- Between 05:00-07:00 hours the venue would be closed to allow for tidying and re-stocking before reopening again at 07:00 hours. The Objectors expressed concern that this would therefore be a 24 hour operation and that additional noise disturbances would be created by waste and recycling being brought outside.
 - The Applicant recognised that the late opening hours would attract patrons from nearby closing pubs and assured the Committee that anyone considered to be drunk would not be admitted to the premises.
- The Applicant stated that the number of toilets available in the venue would be sufficient.
- The premises included a dedicated smoking area with fixed ashtrays to reduce litter.

It was agreed by all parties to waiver the opportunity to make summarising statements and the Committee retired to deliberate.

The Committee fully considered the application including the

representations of the applicant, the objectors and those of the responsible authorities. The Committee also gave regard to the borough's Statement of Licensing Policy and to the Section 182 Guidance.

RESOLVED

That the application be granted but only on a more restrictive basis and subject to a number of conditions in order to promote the licensing objectives.

Friday and Saturday 07:00 to 02:00 the

following day

Sunday 07:00 - 00:00

Supply of Alcohol from 11am until half an hour before closing time

Provision of late night refreshments is granted as requested but must cease at closing times.

Live instrumental, non-amplified music may be played during the hours that alcohol is served but no other regulated entertainment is permitted. Non-amplified background music may be played.

All the conditions proposed in the operating schedule are to be imposed.

All of the conditions proposed by the noise team are to be imposed with the exception of the operating hours and the terrace area and conservatory which may be used during the hours that alcohol supply is permitted and restricted to 5 persons at any one time. Where these contradict the applicant's proposals, the noise team's conditions take precedence.

The conditions proposed by the police to prevent underage sales and relating to "match days" are imposed as is the Child Protection Agency Nominee's proposal to keep a refusals log book.

The premises licence shall only take effect once the Applicant has received written confirmation by the Licensing Authority that the aforementioned conditions have been met to its satisfaction.

CCTV is to be made available at the request of the police and other authorities and recordings must be kept for 30 days.

Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, New Years Day, all Bank holidays plus the day preceding a bank holiday, Easter Saturday, Easter |Sunday 11:00 to 03:00. New Years Eve from the start of permitted hours on 31 December until the start of permitted hours on 1 January. On the morning on which summer time begins, where the terminal hour is later than 01:00am, the terminal hour shall be extended by one hour. For all above licensable activities.

General-all four licensing objectives

Strong management controls and effective training so that all staff are aware of the licensing objectives and in particular ensure—no underage drinking, drunkenness in public, use of drugs, violent and anti-social behaviour, and to protect children from harm.

5.3 Crime and Disorder

Manager will train and supervise all staff. Premises will adopt best practice guide, e.g. adhering to the BBPA, Portman Group on Drinks Strategy, the national Alcohol Harm Reduction Strategy Tool Kit, and other voluntary codes of practice. Premises will be a member of the Pubwatch scheme; CCTV will be installed and maintained on the premises. Toughened glass will be used at all times. There will be provision of a secure deposit box for confiscated items, provision of litter bins and other security measures e.g. lighting outside the premises. On Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, two SIA registered door staff will control the entry and exit of customers.

5.4 Public Safety

Risk Management assessment will be carried out weekly. There is to be provision of general staff levels to secure safety of the premises and customers. There is to be regular testing and certification of all procedures, appliances and systems pertinent to safety. The total number of persons accommodated at any one time within the Ground Floor of the Nelson Public House shall not exceed 200. The doors and gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied/in use under the Licence and Notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded: 'THIS DOOR TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED/IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE' (Main entrance from the High Road). The fire alarm change-over switch shall be in the 'FIRE ALARM LIGHTS AND BUZZERS' position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the licence. The fire alarm shall be under

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the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The results of the test shall be recorded in a log book which shall be readily available for inspection by Officers of the Council or LFEPA. All certificates required by the Council to be submitted promptly when they become due. Risk Register kept on site.

5.5 Public Nuisance

Premises to manage people including staff and traffic arriving and leaving the premises. Premises to liaise with public and private transport providers. External lighting and security lighting to be installed and maintained on the premises. Premises will make provision for collection and management of litter and effective ventilation systems to prevent nuisance from odour. A Due Diligence Log is to be completed every time regulated entertainment takes place to include external noise checks. Signage displayed asking customers to respect the neighbours and to leave the premises quietly.

5.6 Child Protection

Children will only be allowed on the premises between 1100 and 1900. No children will be allowed in bars during entertainment. Children must be accompanied by an adult at all times. Alcohol may only be sold to individuals over the age of 18 with valid proof of identification e.g. valid passport, a photo driving licence issued in a European Union Country, a proof of age standard card system, a citizen card supported by the Home Office. A refusals register is kept on site.





If the sub-committee were to grant this application then we would recommend the following alterations/conditions to the operating schedule:

Prevention of nuisance from noise / vibration

The inner entrance door will be fitted with a self-closing device and staff required to ensure that it is not propped open. A member of staff shall be made responsible to ensure the door is opened for as brief a period as possible. Where necessary adequate and suitable mechanical ventilation should be provided to public areas

Entry to the premises will be restricted to the main front door onto the high road whilst the premises is being used for regulated entertainment licensed activity ie the rear door to the external smoking area to be kept closed.

The regulated entertainment licensable activity shall conclude 30 minutes before the premises is due to close to prevent excessive noise breakout as the premises empties

Structure borne noise

All speakers are mounted on anti-vibration mountings to prevent vibration transmission of sound energy to adjoining properties

Sound limits

The licensee shall ensure that no music played in the licensed premises is audible at or within the site boundary of any residential property

All regulated entertainment amplified activity will utilise the in-house amplification system, the maximum output of which is controlled by the duty manager

Outside Areas

No music will be played in, or for the benefit of patrons in external areas of the premises

No form of loudspeaker or sound amplification equipment is to be sited on or near the exterior premises or in or near any foyer, doorway, window or opening to the premises

Signs shall be displayed in the external areas/on the frontage requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours

The number of persons permitted to utilise the external area/frontage will be restricted to 8 people at any one time.

Deliveries and collections.

Empty bottles and non-degradable refuse will remain in the premises at the end of trading hours and taken out to the refuse point at the start of the working day rather than at the end of trading when neighbours might be unduly disturbed

Plant and machinery

All plant and machinery is correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from noise

Dealing with complaints

A complaints book will be held on the premises to record details of any complaints received from neighbours. The information is to include, where disclosed, the complainant's name, location, date time and subsequent remedial action undertaken. This record must be made available at all times for inspection by council officers

Patrons entering/exiting premises.

Signs should be displayed requesting patrons to respect the neighbours and behave in a courteous manner

Door supervisors

When the premises turn out a licensed door supervisor shall supervise patrons and ensure the leave in a prompt and courteous manner, respecting the neighbours

A licensed door supervisor will be positioned on the exit door to ensure, as far as reasonably practical, that patrons do not leave drinks

A licensed door supervisor will patrol the cartilage of the premises to prevent patrons urinating in public areas in the vicinity of the premises

Prevention of nuisance from litter

Adequate receptacles for use by patrons will be provided in the local vicinity. The positioning of the receptacles will be agreed with the licensing officer. Smoking waste (eg cigarette butts) to be cleared from the main entrance area and rear external smoking area on a daily basis, preferably at the beginning of business.

Prevention of Nuisance from Odour and Noise

All ventilation and extraction systems shall be correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from odour or noise

Prevention of nuisance from light

Illuminated external signage shall be switched off when the premises is closed

Security lights will be positioned to minimise light intrusion to nearby residential premises

Dear Daliah Barrett,

We are the owner occupiers of number 54 St. Albans Crescent, Wood Green, London N22 5NB, and we would like to re-register our objections to the application for extended licensing hours by The Lord Nelson Pub situated on the corner of Cranbrook Park N22 and Wood Green High Road.

You may recall our previous e-mail to you from the 19th November 2009, and our objections to the proposed extended opening hours remain essentially the same.

We still feel very strongly that it would be detrimental to our local environment for the following reasons:

The Lord Nelson Pub is directly next to a residential area and as such it's impact is widely felt. Despite the fact that over the past year there has been some attempt by The Lord Nelson to improve the clearing up of associated debris that accumulates on the pavement such as broken glass, cigarette stubs and pools of vomit, yet the late night drinkers who generate these undesirable elements do not observe boundary lines and so often there is broken glass and vomit further down Cranbrook Park where The Lord Nelson is under no obligation to clean.

So while The Lord Nelson may have made some effort to reduce its impact on the public highway directly outside it's own premises, we still feel that extending it's licensing hours until 3.00 am would only continue and increase the associated problems beyond it's own area of responsibility.

With regard to the noise issue, as we said before, we ourselves are not directly affected *at the moment* since we live further away. However, by extending the opening hours even later, this would only increase the traffic of late night revelers within the local residential vicinity and we do not wish to see this happen.

May we point out that the bench in the small green directly in front of our house was removed by the council after objections by local residents because of the disturbance caused by drinkers using it as a meeting point. We are concerned that by extending the opening hours - this would only make matter matters worse especially during the summer months. We would also like to point out that at the last neighborhood watch meeting a resident did complain about noisy revelers in the early hours of the morning. It's not known for sure if the noisy revelers on this occasion had come from The Lord Nelson. But what is certain is that an awful lot of people, both pedestrians and drivers, use Cranbrook Park and St. Albans Crescent as a short cut to Lordship Lane (even since the one way system was introduced at the end of Cranbrook Park), and so we justifiably fear that any extension of licensing hours would undoubtedly increase if not prolong this traffic into the early hours of the morning.

As we said in our last letter / e-mail a year ago, we were genuinely shocked to discover that even then The Lord Nelson had already been granted extended licensing hours until 2.00 am when it is located so close to a well-populated residential area and we still feel very strongly that this is more than sufficient. We see absolutely no justification whatsoever for the quality of our environment that we strive to keep decent to risk being further jeopardized, eroded or compromised for the sake of a businesses that ultimately has absolutely no vested interest whatsoever in our local environment or our concerns.

Why should local residents be made to suffer further loud music and loud revelers every single night of the week? It is simply not fair, and would be very detrimental to our lives.

We feel very strongly that more than enough consideration has already been extended to the business interests of The Nord Nelson, and that it would be completely against the interests of local residents for them to be granted extended opening hours. If they were (and we sincerely hope that they are not), what would

follow next? 24 hour licensing? Enough is enough.

We would like to reiterate that we feel any extension to their already generous licensing hours, would be excessive, inappropriate and unnecessary especially when they are located so close to what is a densely populated residential area.

There is still the danger, we feel, about the precedence the granting of any further licensing hours would set. There are still at least four other pubs within stones-throwing distance from The Lord Nelson, and we have good reason to fear that if The Lord Nelson were to be granted extended opening hours, then the others pubs would also want to follow suit.

Is is some indication is it not, that, despite these supposedly recession-hit times, all these five pubs all within a stones-throw of each other continue to operate as successful business. And whether times are hard or not, competition or no, there are limitations to what can reasonably be allowed at our expense.

Our final point was about the further danger we believe any extension of licensing hours would attract an influx of transient revelers from outside the local area who would have even less regard for our local environment than those who already live here. We do not believe it is in our interests to have these proposed opening hours extended to The Lord Nelson, or any other pub for that matter in the local vicinity.

Thank You once again for taking into account our views and we hope that you will keep us informed of any developments in this matter.

Dear Ms Barrett,

I am writing to strongly object to the application by the Lord Nelson public house, 232 High Road, Wood Green to vary their existing licence. I object on the following grounds:

1. The establishment already has a licence which allows them to stay open until 2am and play music until 1am on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. However, I am aware that they were found to be in breach of their licence on two occasions in October when licensing enforcement officers visited and the licence holders were subsequently cautioned (ref: LBH76781, and your email to Councillor Pat Egan on 12 October 2010). As a resident of Cranbrook Park, I know that they regularly breach their licence - at a guess, I would say this happens every weekend! Therefore, I have absolutely no faith that, if granted a further extension to their licence, they will keep to the new hours. Given their past breaches, I cannot believe that the council would even consider allowing them to extend their licence!

2. Although the establishment's postal address is the High Road, the majority of the establishment's premises are on Cranbrook Park. This is an almost solely residential street. It is a totally unsuitable location for a pub with a late licence. I am amazed that they were granted a late licence at all, given the nature of the street and would urge you not only to reject this application, but in fact to give consideration to whether they should be able to stay open beyond 11pm at all.

3. Although I live almost half way down Cranbrook Park, I am regularly disturbed in my own home by the music being played at the pub. On their karaoke nights I am able to identify the song being sung from my bedroom. I now sleep in earplugs at the weekend. it is bad enough with the late licence they already have - but now they want to be able to play loud music until at least midnight/the small hours seven nights a week? I do not believe the building is currently well enough soundproofed to act as a venue for live music or discos.

4. currently, the noise pollution I endure is not only from the pub itself, but also from its patrons, leaving in the small hours of the morning. The disturbance ranges from car doors slamming and engines being started, to drunken fights and singing, etc. This can only get worse if the Nelson is granted an extended licence. Must the residents of this street endure yet more anti-social behaviour even later than we already do?

I would be very grateful if you could keep me informed of the progress of this application.
