If the sub-committee were to grant this application then we would recommend the following following alterations/conditions to the operating schedule:

Sound limits

The noise from the premises will be at a level not to cause noise pollution.

All regulated entertainment amplified activity will utilise the in-house amplification system, the maximum output of which is controlled by a noise limiter that will be set with the local authority.

Outside Areas

No music will be played in, or for the benefit of patrons in external areas of the premises

No form of loudspeaker or sound amplification equipment is to be sited on or near the exterior premises or in or near any foyer, or within 10 feet of a doorway, window or opening opening to the premises

No gathering or drinking will be permitted outside on the pavement.

There will be a smoking area at the back of the premises which will be supervised by staff throughout the evening.

No drinks will be allowed to be taken outside in the smoking area.

The premises will have a car park for members/customer use.

At the close of business members of staff will ensure that there clientele leave the car park in a quiet manner so as not to disturb residents.

There will be signs in the car park asking patrons not to rev there cars or play loud music.

Patrons entering/exiting premises.

Operating hours are to be until 2a.m. during the week and until 3a.m. on Friday and Saturday for all music and special events.

Alcohol will not to be sold at least half an hour before closing time and music to be reduced reduced to background level at this time.

When special or dance event are on, a minimum of 2 door supervisors will be required from from the time of opening.

Searching and wandong of all patrons will be required on entering the premises.

Notices shall be prominently displayed at each exit from the premises, asking patrons to be be considerate to neighbours when leaving.

When the premises turn out, a licensed door supervisor shall supervise patrons and ensure they leave in a prompt and courteous manner, respecting the neighbours.

A licensed door supervisor will be positioned on the exit door to ensure, that patrons do not leave with drinks.

Door supervisors will ensure that on the closing of the premises patrons do not loiter at the front or rear of the premises.

Door supervisors to remain at premises until premises and immediate outside areas have cleared of patrons.

Prevention of nuisance from light

Bright lights will not be used in such a way as to cause concern to residents.

All external lighting will be turned off after the premises are closed to the public

Noise generated by ventilation equipment.

All ventilation and cooling equipment will be serviced annually so that it is in a working order and does not cause a noise nuisance at any time.

Where the licence is not for hours beyond 0300 Planning Enforcement have no objection to this application. However Planning Enforcement note that on Friday and Saturday nights that the proposal for hours until 0400 or 0600 would be a breach of the above condition planning permission.

I am writing to register an objection to the application concerning The Edge, 117
BRUCE GROVE, N17 6UR

My flat is diagonally opposite to 117 Bruce Grove. My concerns about the application are that it will increase noise to unbearable levels. We already suffer from very high noise levels, even for London standards. We had to improve double-glazing in our property, as the levels of noise make our live very difficult. Furthermore, there are already several similar premises in the area (for example, the Regency at 113 Bruce Grove).

The application shows that the venue will be used as a club and the opening hours (6am, 7 days a week) would undoubtedly have an impact on our lives due to noise of people smoking outside the premises, parking until 6am, etc. This is certainly not what our neighbourhood needs.

In recent months, there have been firearms incidents in the Edge and I have noticed a strong police presence in more than one occasion: extending the Edge licence is the last thing our troubled neighbourhood needs.

I am extremely worried that granting of the proposed licence would lead to increased stress to local residents and a deterioration of our living standards. Similar licensing arrangements have been denied in the past by your team, and I hope you will follow the same precedent in this occasion.

Dear Sir/Madam

I am writing to express my concerns with regard to a licensing application concerning **The Edge 117 BRUCE GROVE, N17 6UR:**

These premises are diagonally opposite my flat.

My concerns are:

1. Noise emanating from the club (we were kept awake when The Edge Snooker Club transformed itself into a music/dance venue some years ago; the noise nuisance service was called many times and a member of this service testified to the problem at a planning meeting I attended at the Civic Centre. I have already contacted the noise nuisance service about the 'new' The Edge twice in the last 6 months.
2. Noise caused by people congregating outside the club on leaving, entering and taking breaks to smoke on the pavement.
3. Noise caused by people accessing their cars in the car park and leaving the car park throughout the night up until 6.00a.m.
4. As the car park described in the is frequently full, visitors to the Regency Banqueting Suite (110-116 Bruce Grove) already park in the street, which is already congested with cars belonging to patrons of the Juba Café (108 Bruce Grove). I have had to call the Police because I have been unable to enter my own property due to cars parked in front of the entrance.
5. Noise caused by people parking and accessing their cars in the street outside my flat.

In conclusion, I am extremely worried that granting the proposed licence would lead to increased stress to local residents, especially those of us who live so close to the premises. Champa Close is directly opposite the premises, as is 8 Bruce Grove, where a Housing Association development is nearing completion. As I know from having visited residents in Champa Close, many people are already affected by problems emanating from The Edge but feel vulnerable culturally and linguistically, and are reluctant to complain.

I should be grateful if you could confirm receipt of this letter. Please inform me if I need to send a paper copy.

Letter of Objection: The Edge, 117 Bruce Grove, N17 6UR

I would like to object to the multi-faceted licensing application for the above premises. I have received a number of representations from worried constituents in Bruce Grove who live within the vicinity of the premises about the late night operation of the premises which I understand has also been operating on an unlicensed basis. In short, prior to this new application, the applicant premises has been operating as a bar, club and associated premises, as per regular advertisements outside the premises for late night music functions, including with the sale of alcohol. There have been ongoing reports of anti-social behaviour and noise, much of which has been brought to the attention of the police and council enforcement officers.

The prevention of crime and disorder

Late night functions, including with music and the sale of alcohol, involving large numbers of people coming in and out of the entrance on Bruce Grove. Much of this activity has taken place without a proper licence and in contravention of the Licensing Act 2003.

There have been a number of reports of aggressive and/or violent behaviour, often late at night, outside the premises.

The prevention of public nuisance

Again, late night functions, including with music and the sale of alcohol, involving large numbers of people coming in and out of the entrance on Bruce Grove. Much of this activity has taken place without a proper licence and in contravention of the Licensing Act 2003.

As above, there have been a number of reports of aggressive and/or violent behaviour, often late at night, outside the premises. The noise and anti-social behaviour is of great concern to residents living nearby on Bruce Grove, Forest Gardens, Champa Close and Moorefield Road, as well as other nearby streets.

Overall, my biggest concern is that of the unreasonably wide-ranging hours of operation sought within the application. As per the timings listed on the attached sheet, I have underlined those aspects that I consider represent hours that are particularly excessive. I would contend that a maximum time of 12am Sunday to Thursday and 1am on Friday and Saturday be considered, were an application to be granted. This is in line with other nearby premises and represents a growing consensus amongst residents and councillors in Tottenham that premises open later than 1am are invariably more likely to cause public nuisance and be a magnet for crime and anti-social behaviour, as was seen so viciously at Rudolph's recently.

As a local ward councillor I do not see any later opening nearby premises as setting any meaningful precedent, what with the sheer volume of reports of anti-social behaviour from many of these premises when they have been given very late licenses. It is my clear intention and policy as a local ward councillor to also monitor any existing applications so as to ensure that, where the rules have not been followed, residents are provided with the right to have the application in question reviewed at a public meeting of the Licensing Committee and shorter hours demanded.

I am in favour of businesses providing services, including night time entertainment. I am not in favour of excessive licensing hours that outweigh any beneficial contribution to the local night time economy.

I would also like to confirm my intention to attend the Licensing Committee hearing for this application and speak against it.
