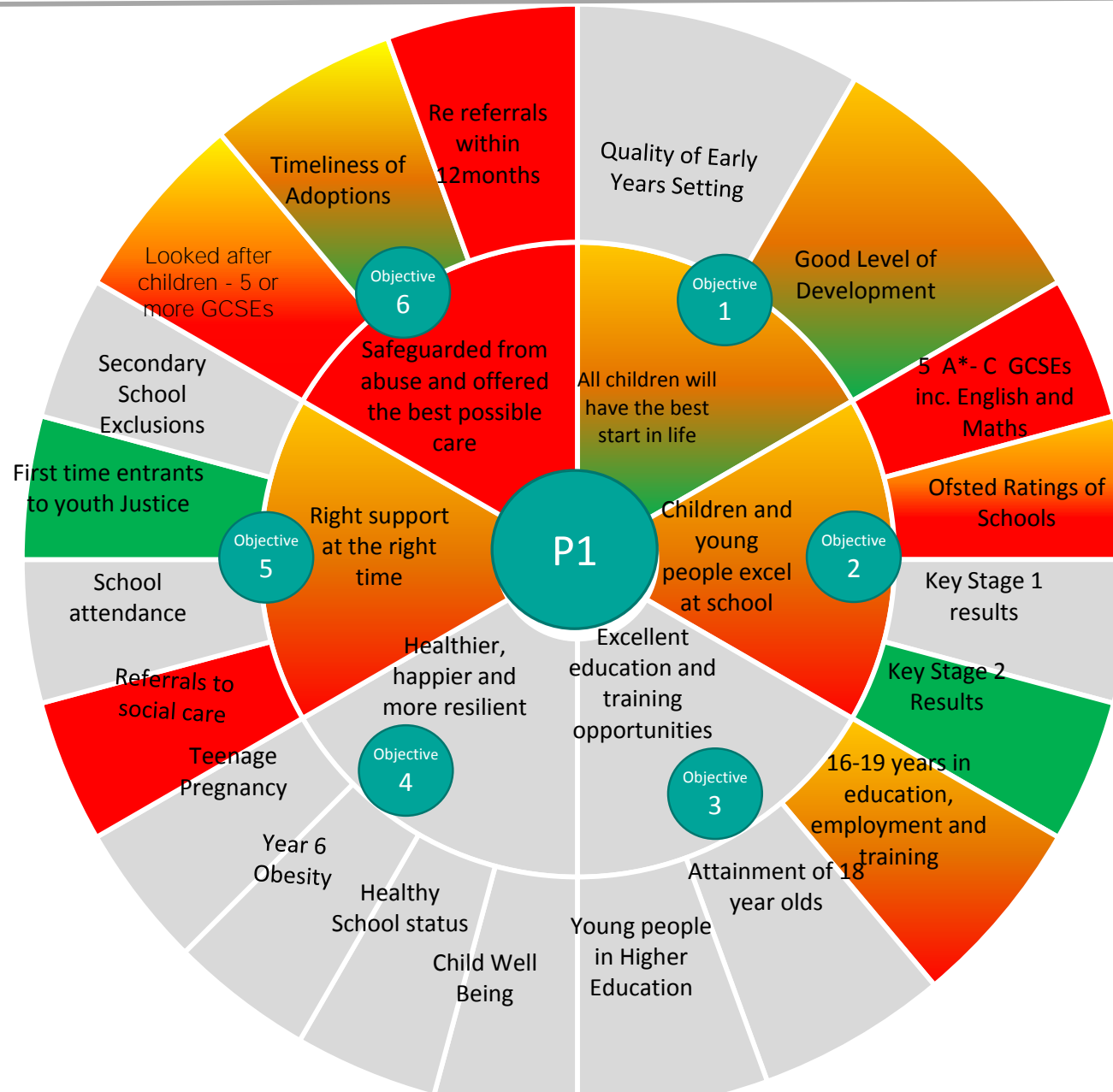


Priority 1: Best Start in Life Dashboard



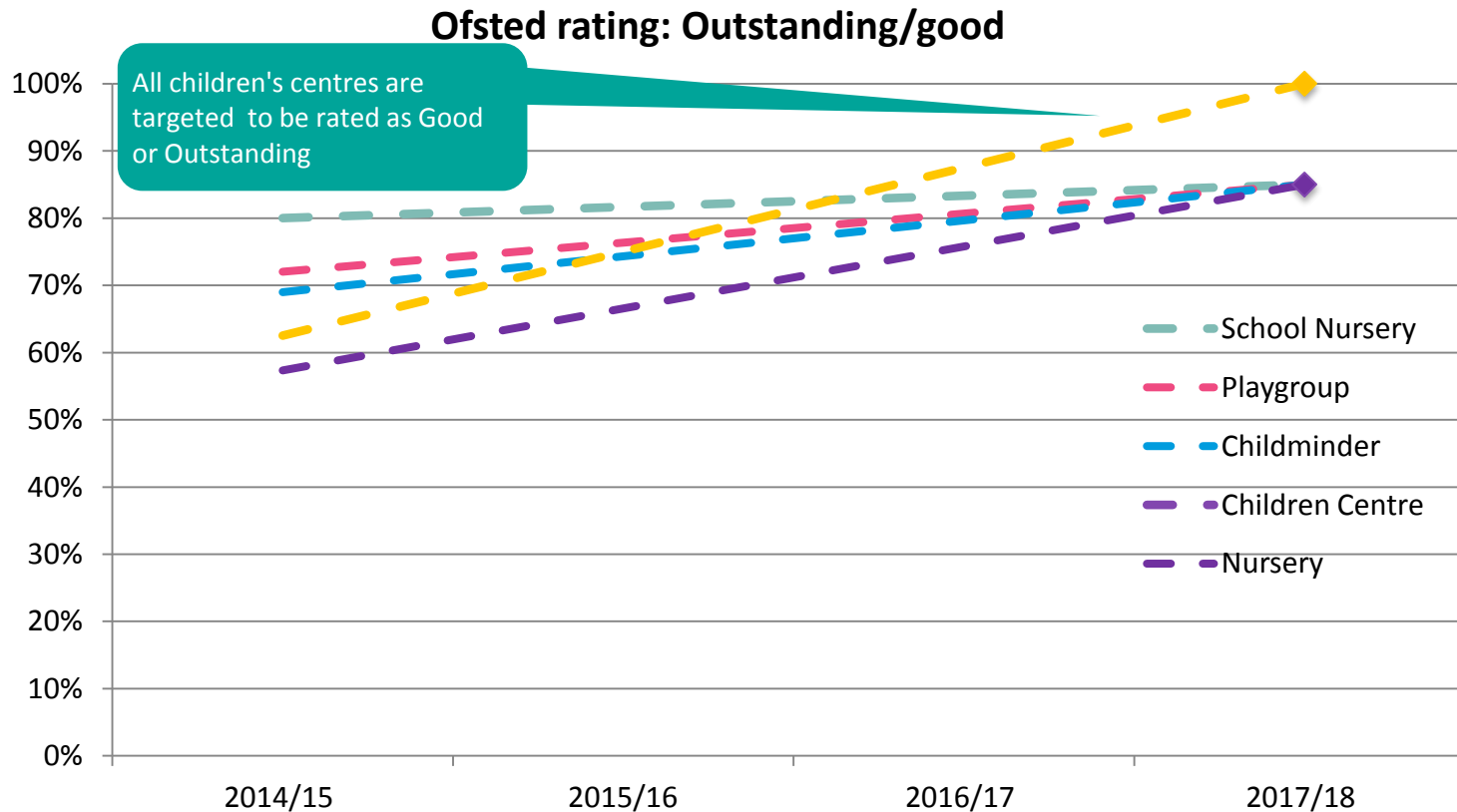
Objective 1:
All children will have the best start in life supported by strong relationships and be ready for school



Outcome indicator: Ofsted ratings for Children's Centres, childminders and Private Voluntary Independent (PVI) settings



Target: All Children's Centres and at least 85% of childminders and PVIs to be rated good or outstanding by 2018



What does the data say ?

56 (30.9%) of our childminders, 29 (42.6%) of our Nurseries and 7 (28%) of our playgroups are currently either Requires improvement or Inadequate

NB: Ratings can only change if there is a inspection

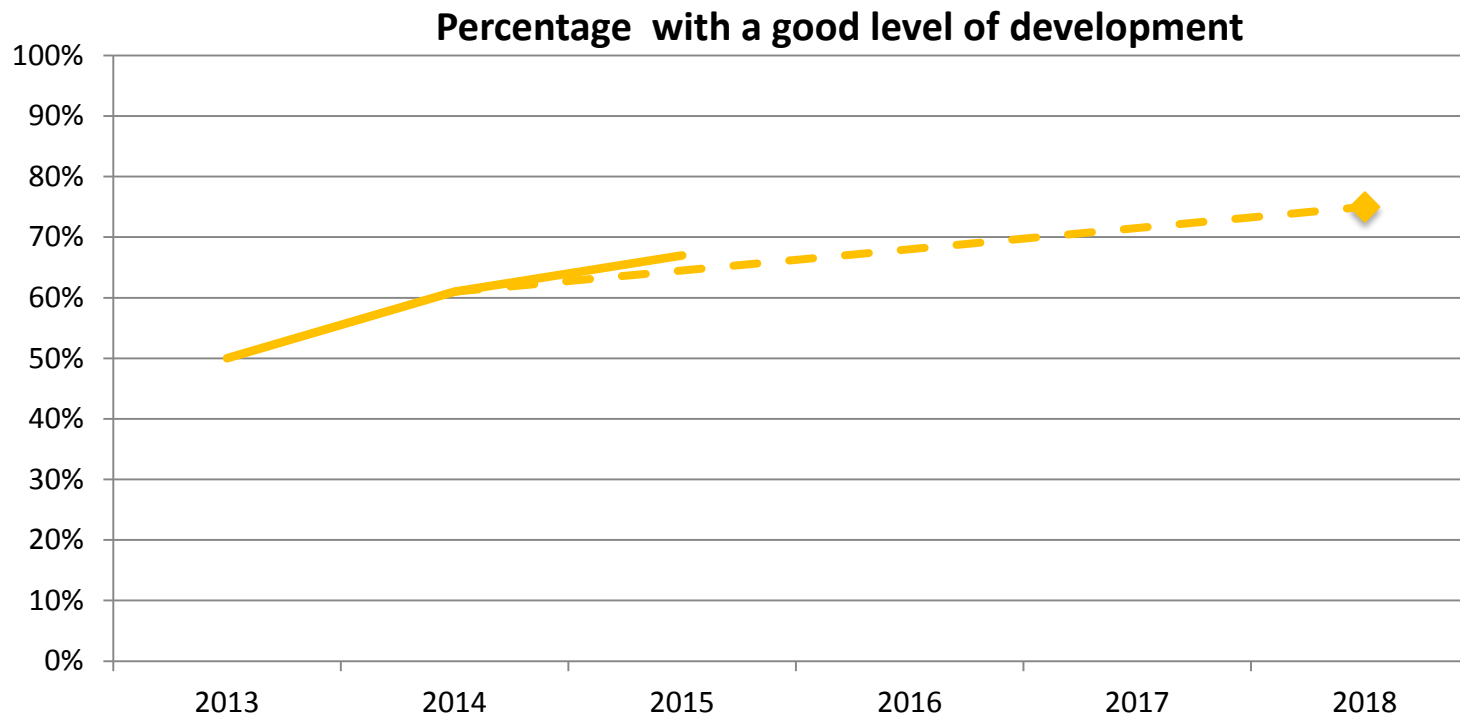
Indicator:

Good Level of Development (GLD) at the Early Years Foundation Stage



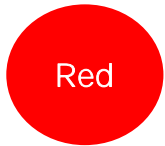
Target:

75% of children achieve a good level of development at early years foundation stage by 2018



What does the data say ?

Latest data gives us 67% against a 65% target for 2015

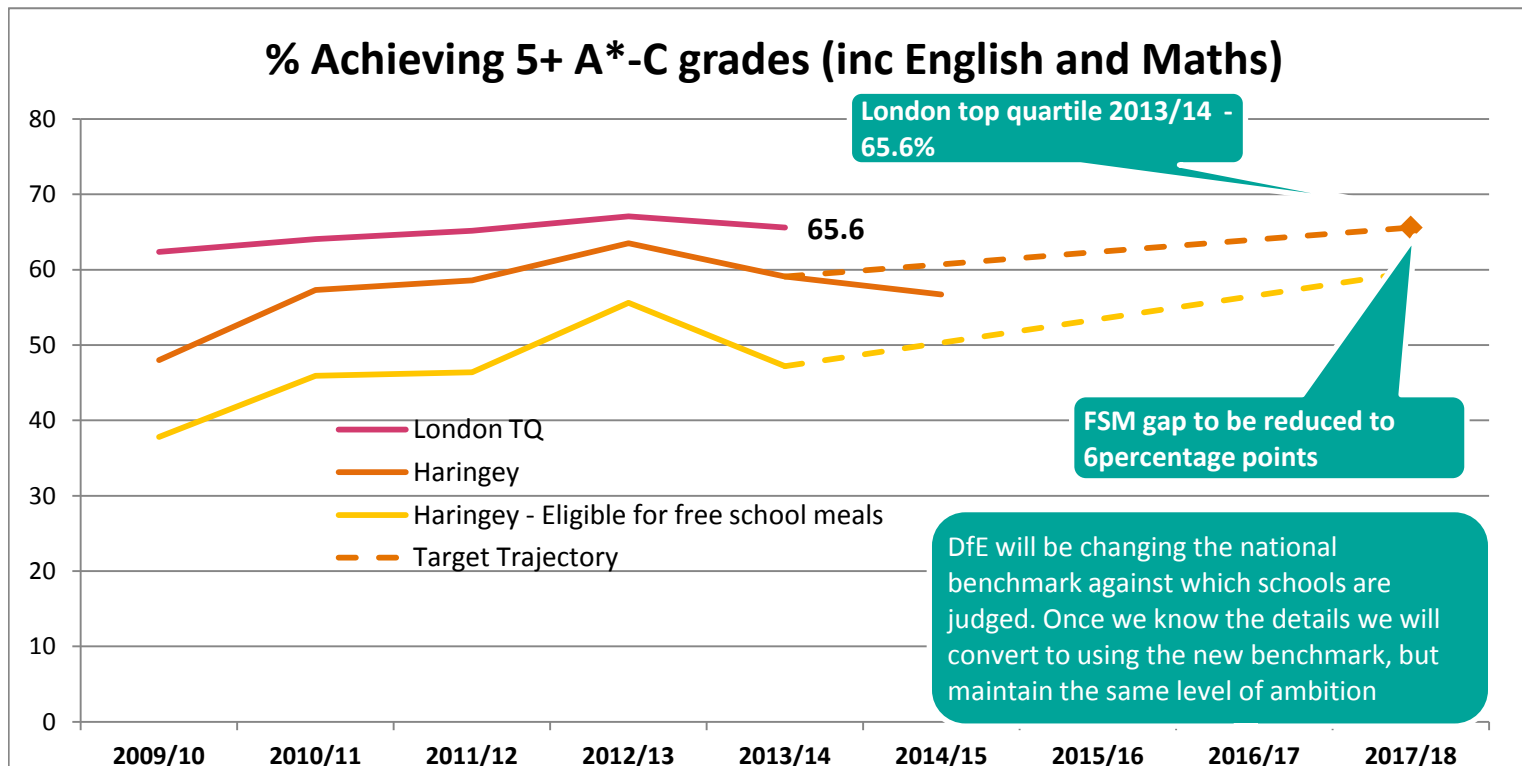

Outcome indicator:
Achievement of 5 or more A* C grades at GCSE including English and Maths



Target:
London top quartile by 2017 and reduce by half the gap between FSM



What does the data say ?

Provisional results for 2015 are 67.9% for Haringey, a decrease of 2.4 percentage points from last year.

Free school meals results will be published soon.

The results for the 2017 cohort will be available in January 2018

Indicator :

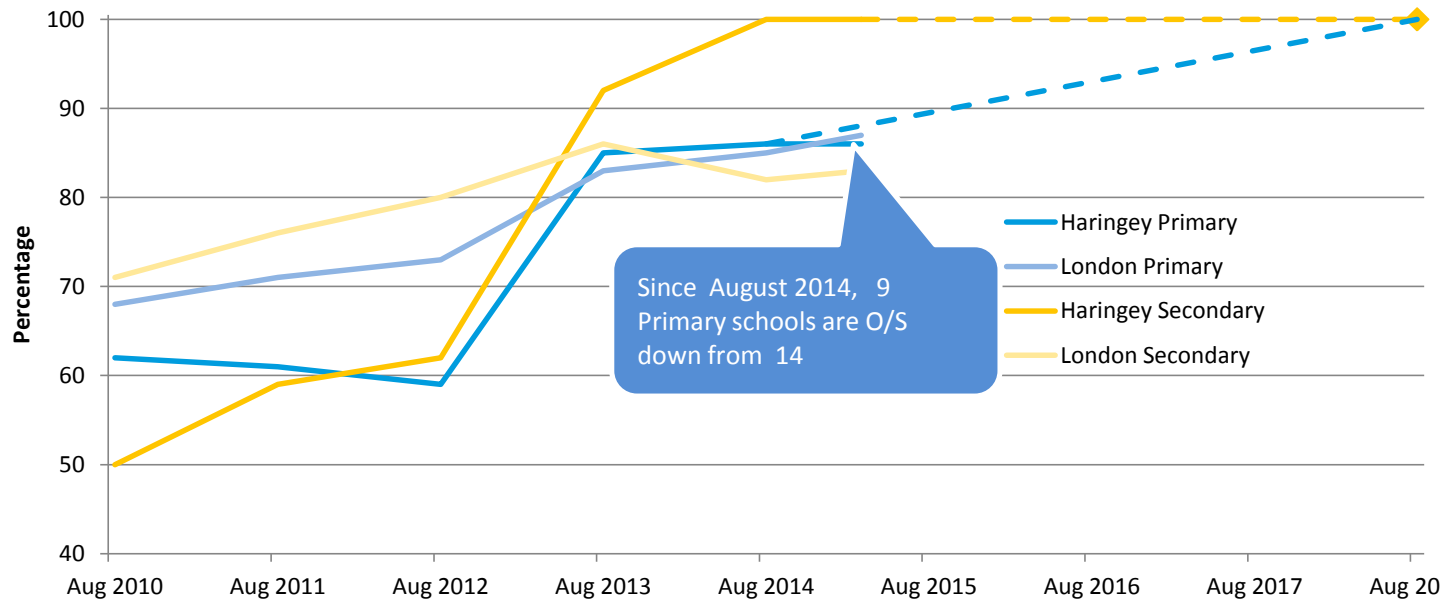
Primary and secondary school Ofsted ratings



Target:

All primary and secondary schools to be good or outstanding by 2016

Ofsted- Schools rated Good or Outstanding



Since August 2014, 9 Primary schools are O/S down from 14

What does the data say ?

All Secondary schools are currently rated Good or Outstanding (March 2015)
Primary: 9 outstanding, 45 good, 9 Satisfactory/RI and none are inadequate (down from 2 in Dec 2014)

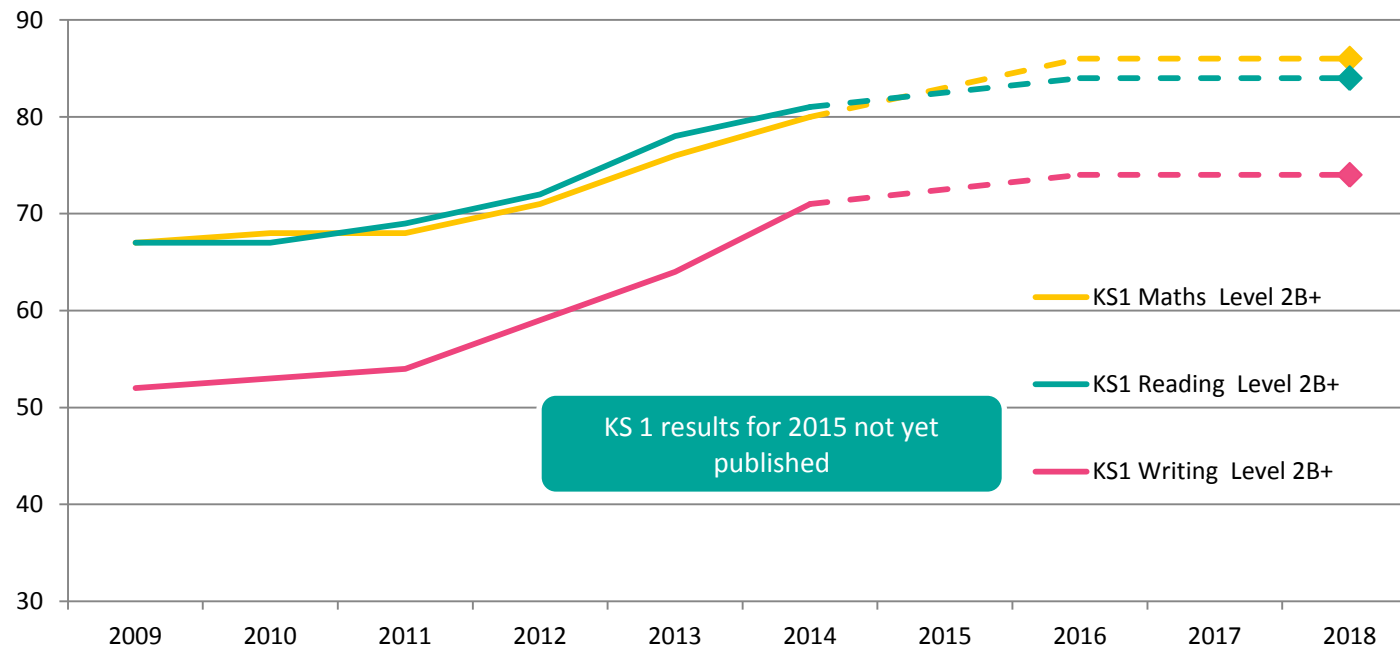


Indicator :
Key Stage 1 (KS1) -age 7 results are among the best in the country



Target:
Reading, Writing and maths level 2B+ to reach the London Top Quartile by 2016 and remain there

Key Stage 1: percentage of pupils achieving Level 2B+



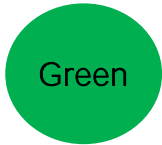
What does the data say ?

Reading: 84 %
Writing: 74%
Maths: 83%

Haringey 2014:

Reading: 81%
Writing: 71%
Maths: 80%

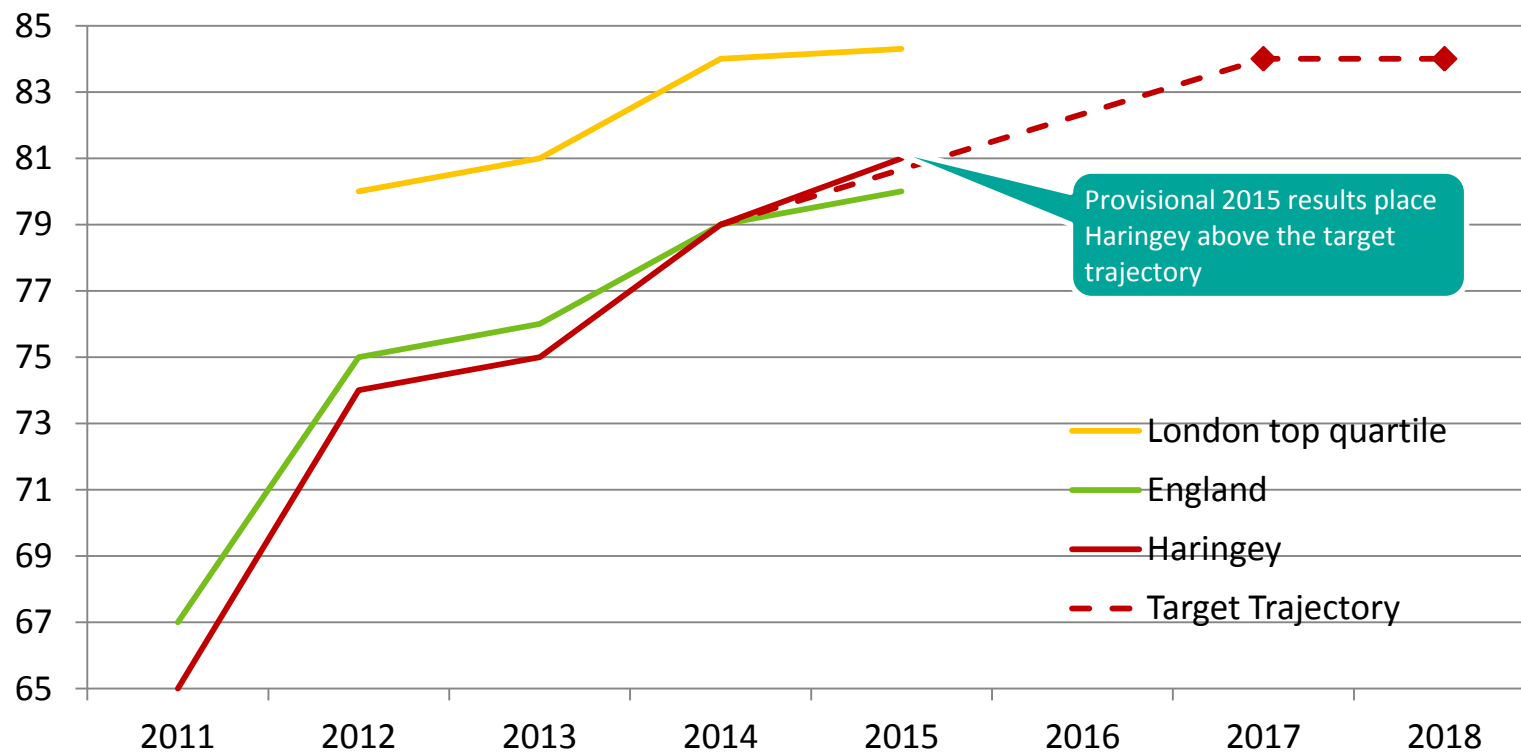


Objective 2:

➔ **Target:**
KS2 combined reading, writing and maths Level 4+ to reach London Top Quartile by 2017 and remain there

Provisional 2015 results place Haringey above the target trajectory

What does the data say ?

Final data will be available later in the year

Latest results(81%) are above the England average and Target trajectory.

Outcome Indicator:

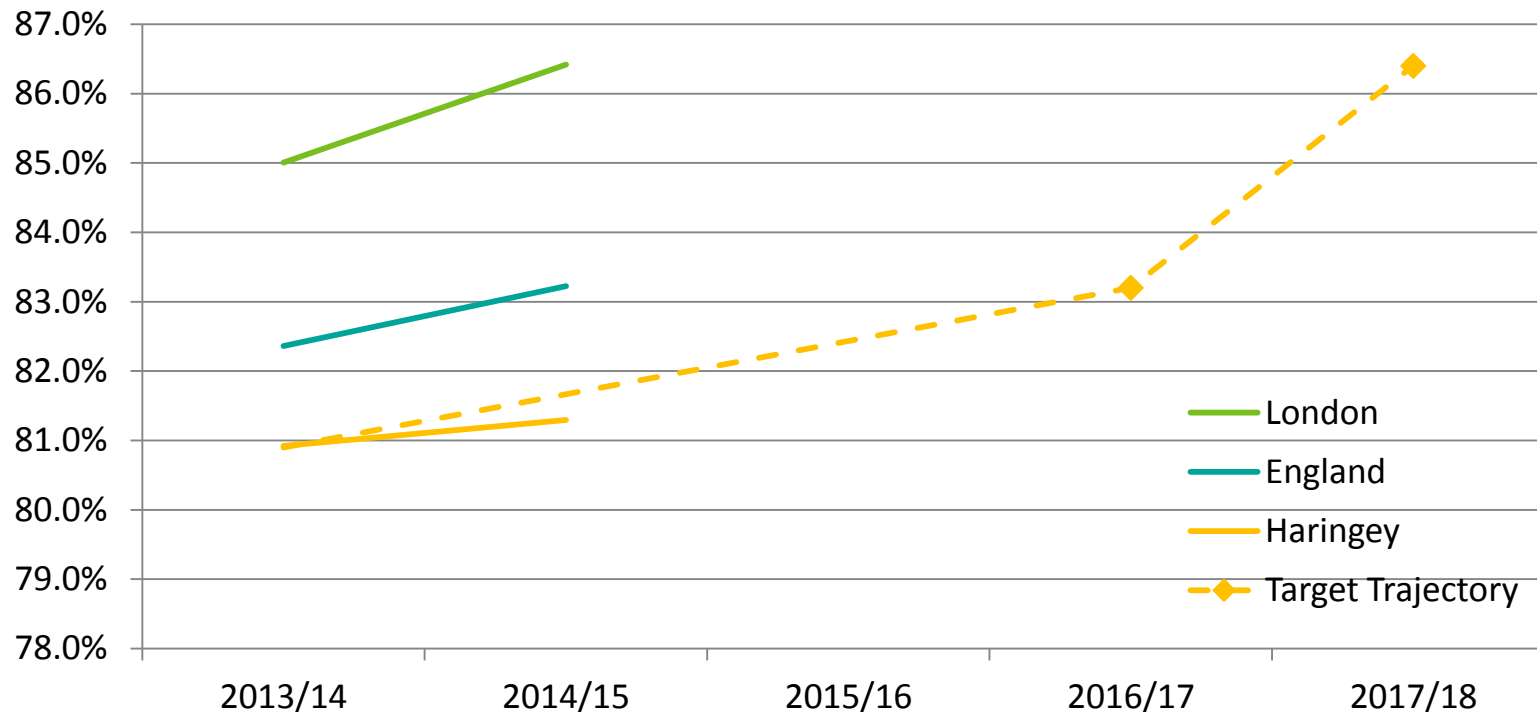
The proportion of 16-19 years in education, employment and training (EET) is among the best nationally and in London



Target:

To overtake the England average by 2017 and London average by 2018

What does the data say ?

Haringey's 2014/15 rate of 81.3% was the 3rd lowest in London. and below the target trajectory

Indicator:

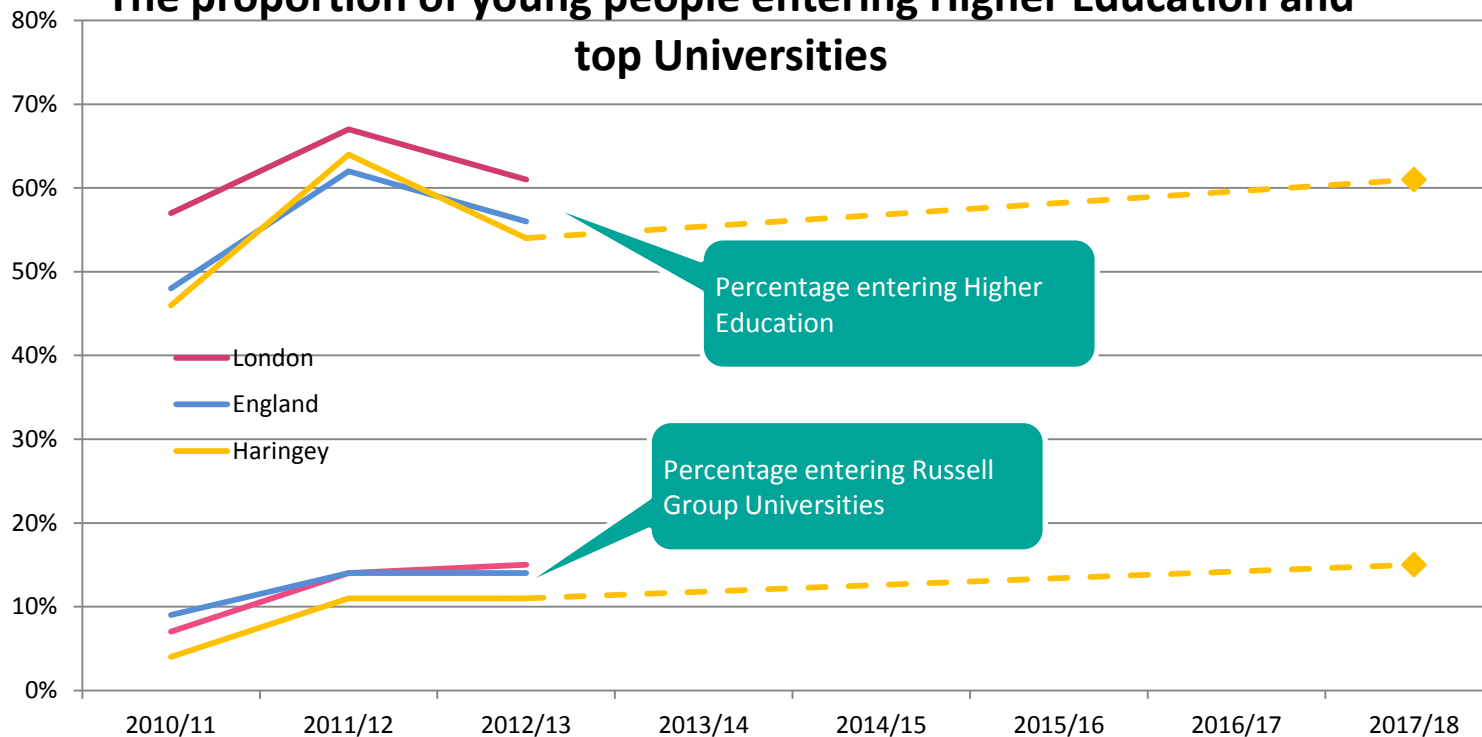
The proportion of young people entering Higher Education and top Universities



Target:

To be above the national and London average on both measures by 2018

The proportion of young people entering Higher Education and top Universities



What does the data say ?

Haringey 54% is close to the all England percentage (56%) of entrants to Higher education but further below London (61%) and Russell group comparisons (11% compared to 15%)

Objective 3:

Indicator:

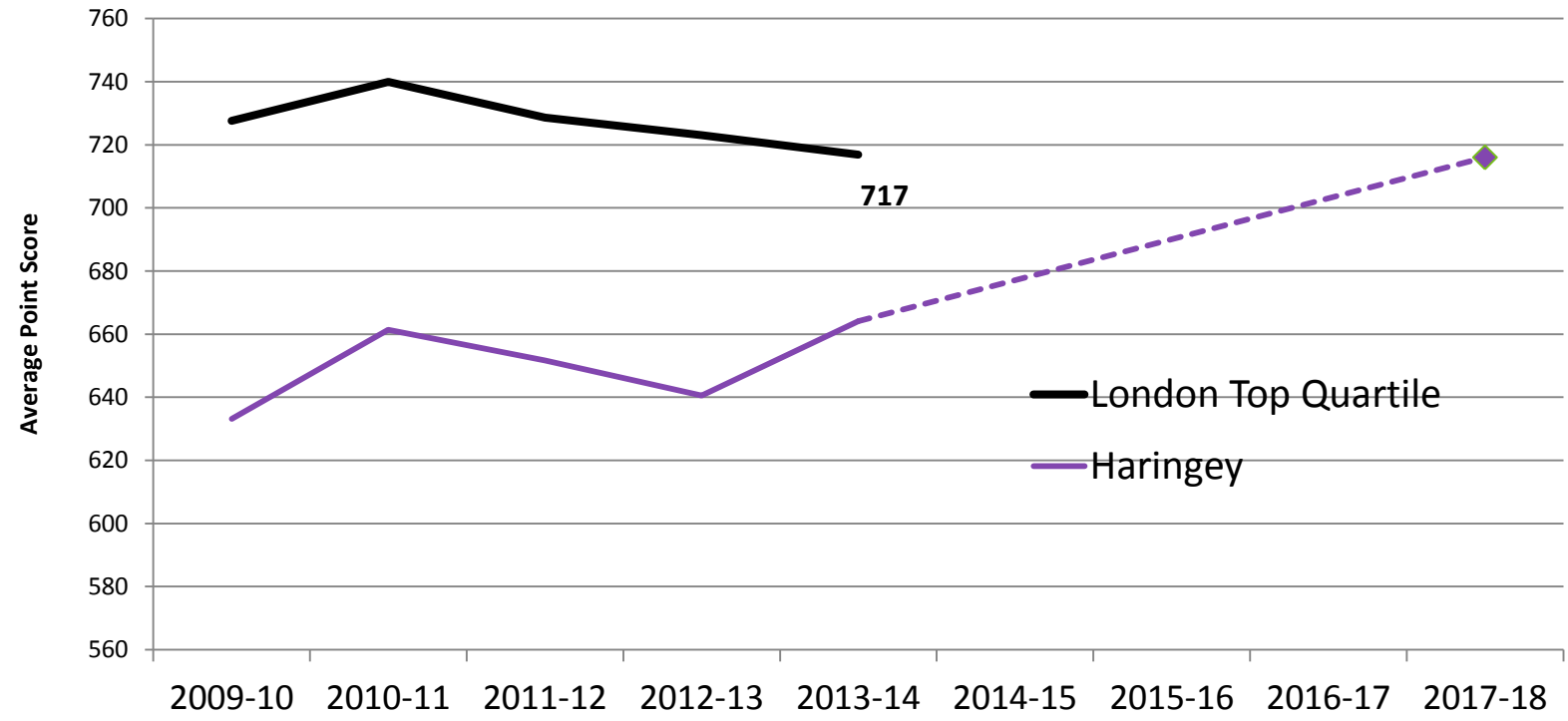
Attainment of 18 year olds - Average point score for A level and equivalent qualifications



Target:

Average point score for 18 year olds is in the London Top Quartile by 2018

Average Point Score per students - A level and level 3 results of state-funded students



What does the data say ?

The 2015 data is due to published in late October.

2013/14 Haringey was 664 compared to 717 London top quartile

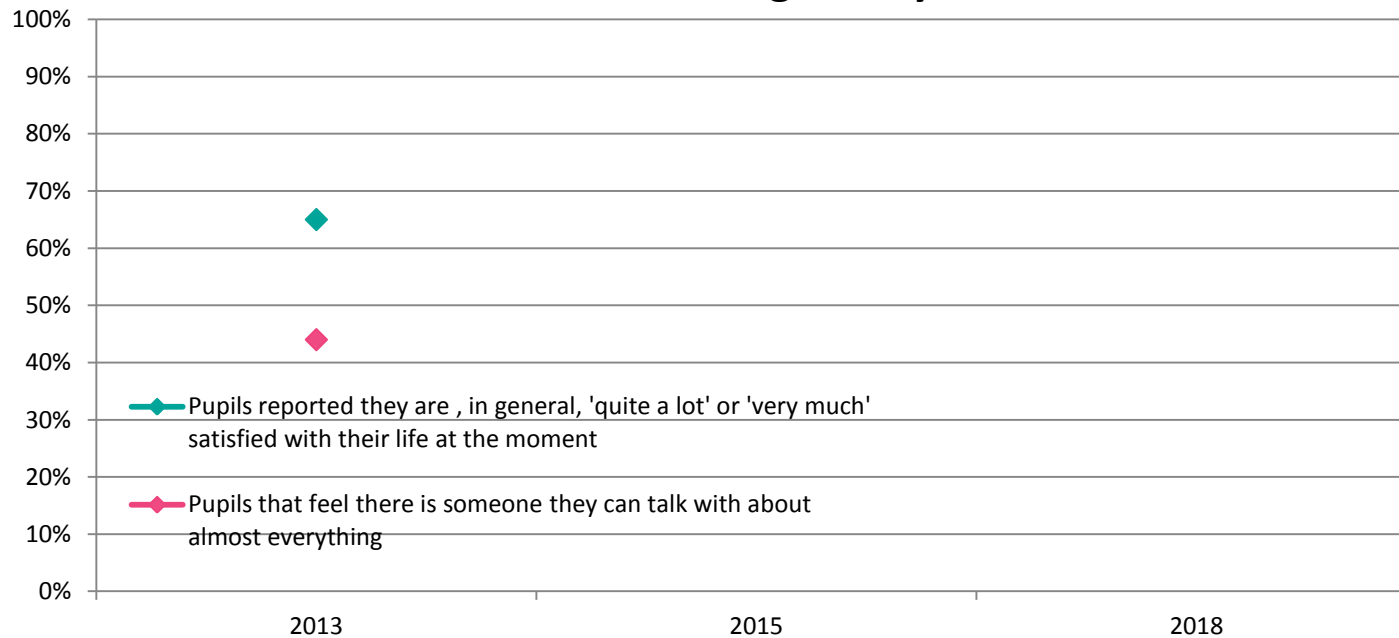


Outcome Indicator:

Outcome Indicator:

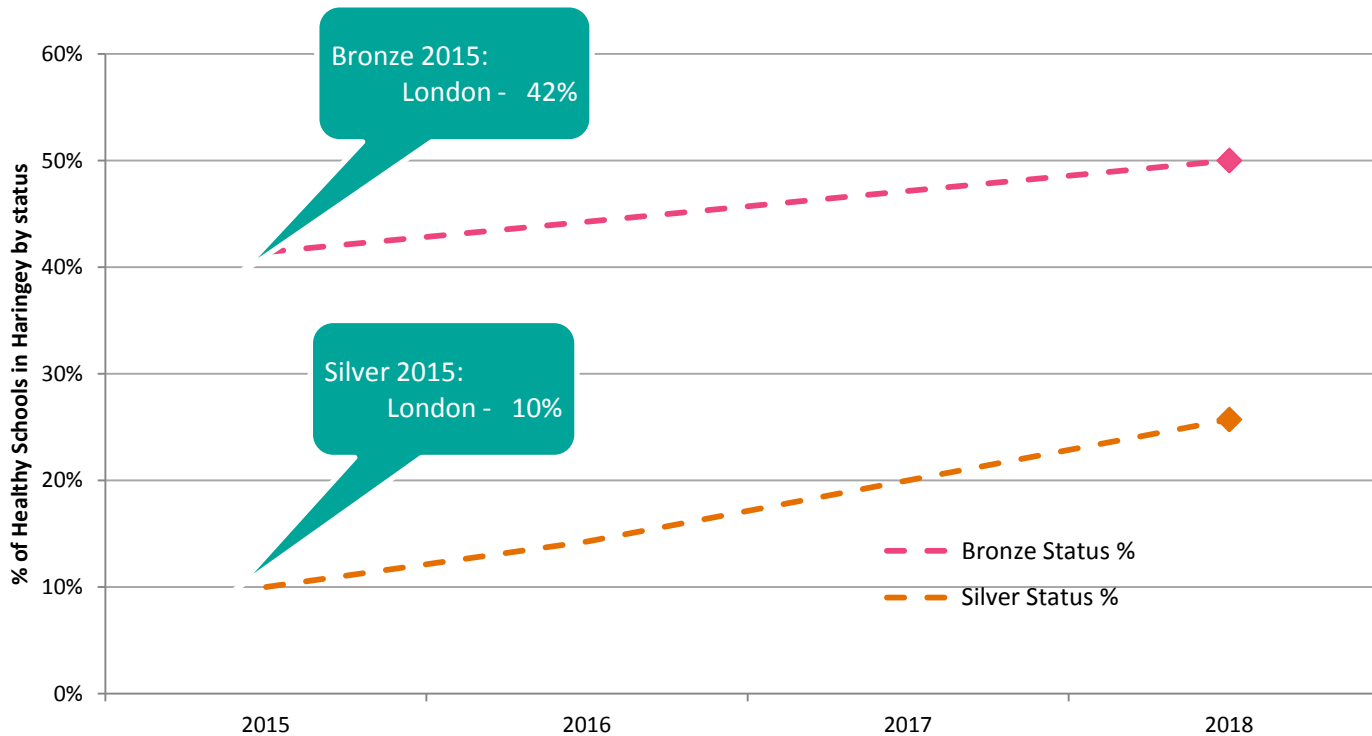
- a) Increase in number of schools obtaining bronze (Healthy Schools Status)
- b) Increase in number of schools obtaining Silver (Healthy Schools Status)



Target:

- a): 35 schools (50%) achieving bronze status by 2018
- b): 18 schools (26%) achieving silver status by 2018

What does the data say ?

2015: 29 schools Bronze and 7 Silver

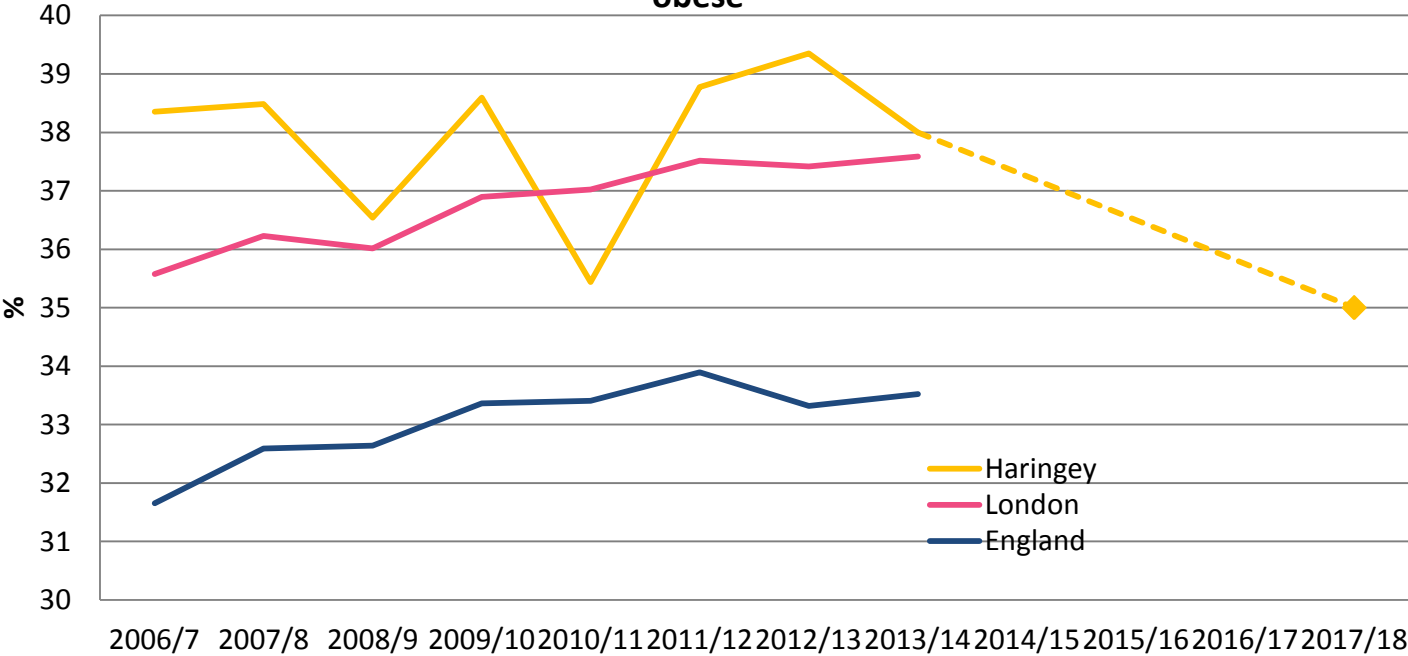
The target is to get 6 more schools to Bronze and 11 more to Silver Status

Objective 4:

➔ **Outcome Indicator:**
% of 10-11 year olds who are overweight or obese

➔ **Target:**
To reduce the percentage of 10-11 year olds who are overweight or obese to 35% by 2018

Proportion of year 6 children (aged 10-11) classified as overweight or obese



What does the data say ?

Latest data from 2013/14 show a decrease to 38% but still above London and England levels

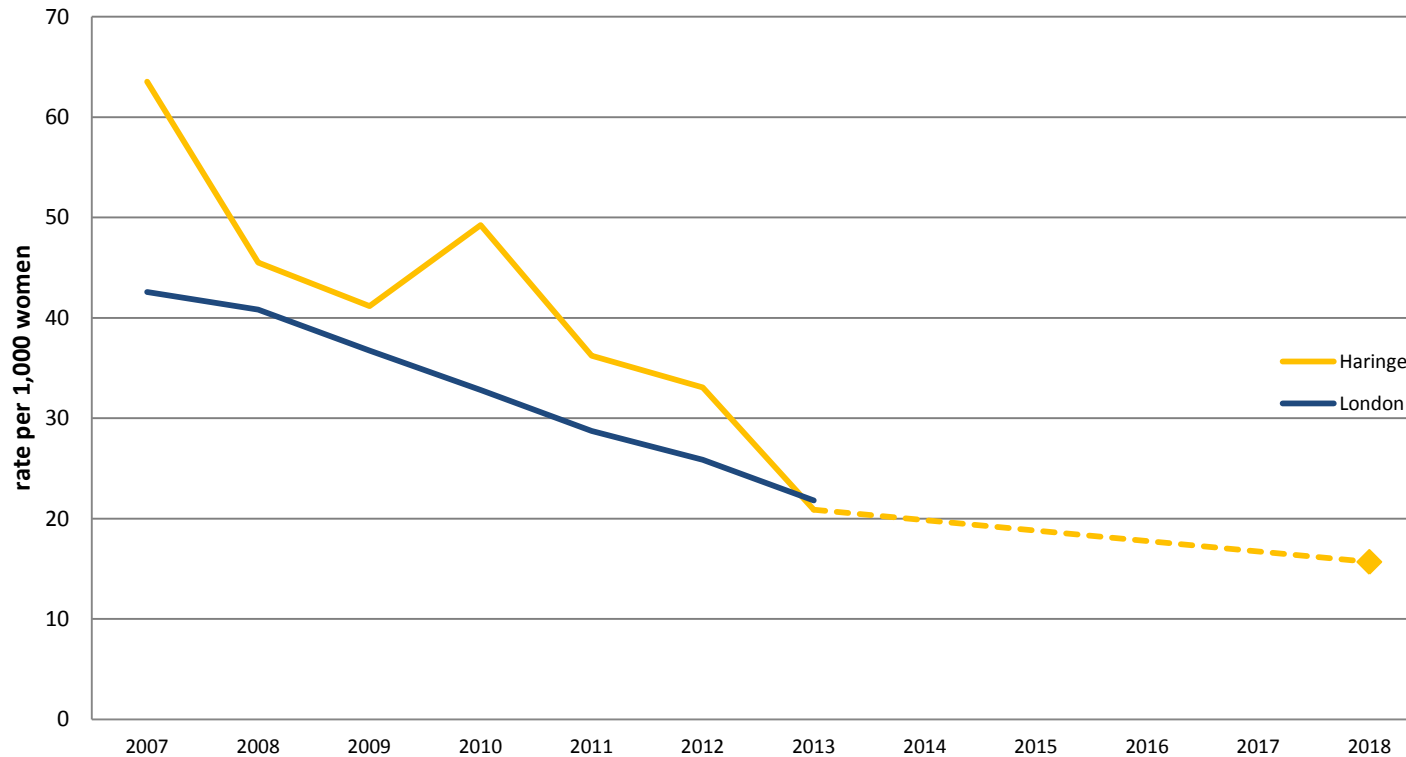
Rate of conceptions per 1,000 females aged 15-17



Target:

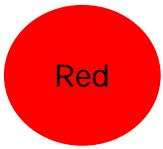
Teenage Conception rate to reach 15.7 per 1,000 females by 2018

What does the data say ?

Target of 15.7 conceptions per 1,000 women aged 15-17 (25% reduction in current rate (2013 = 20.9))

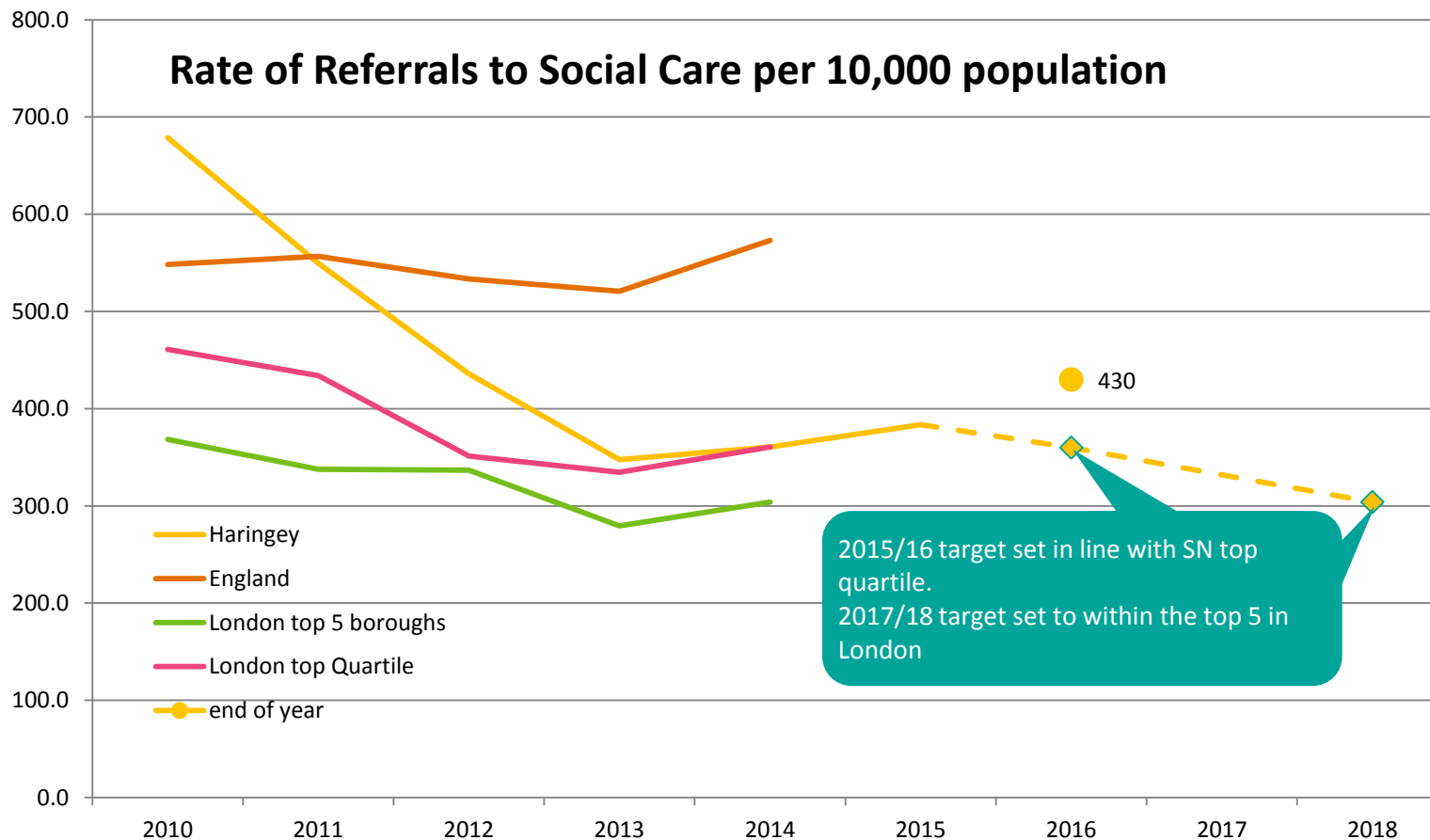
Outcome Indicator:

Reduce the number of referrals to children's social care



Target:

To be top 5 in London for lowest referrals to social care by 2018



What does the data say ?

If the current trend (year to September) is continued the end of year performance will be 430 - Above the target of 360

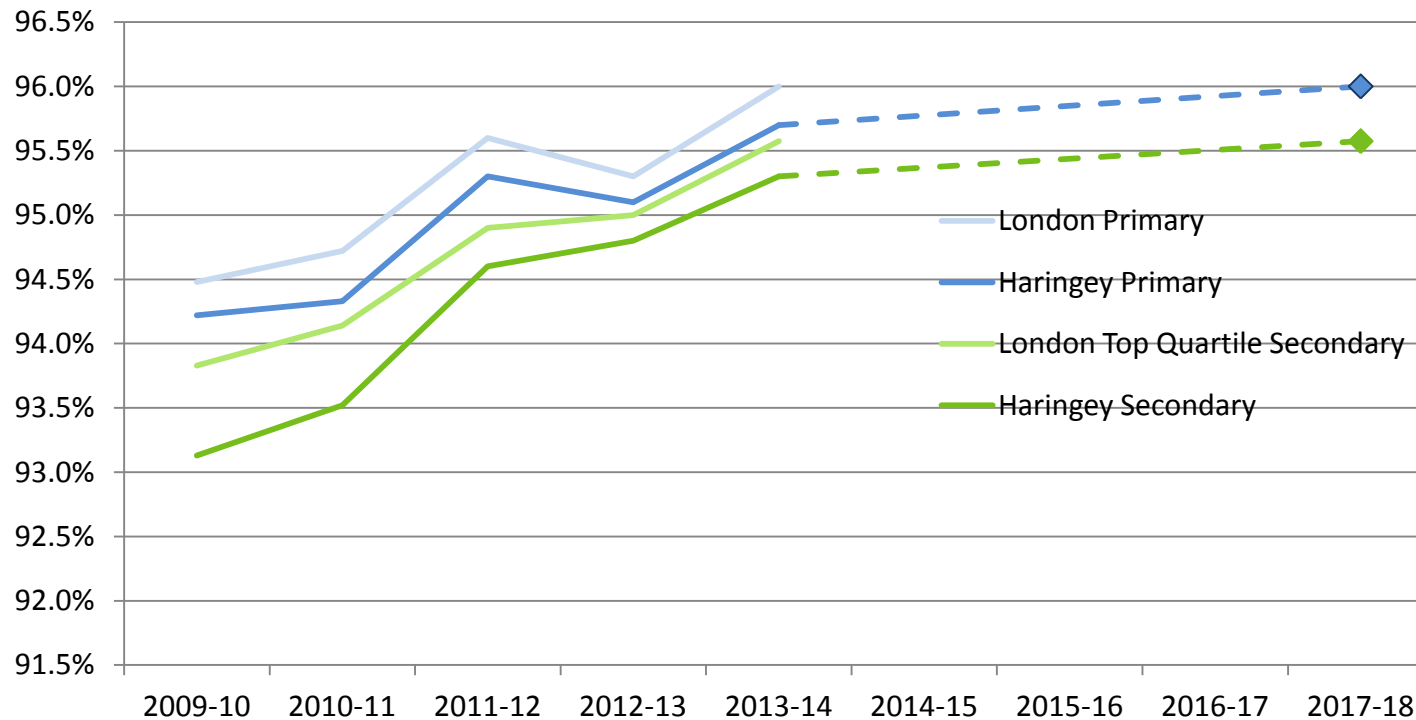

Increasing children's attendance



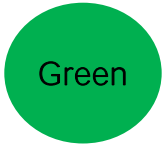
Target:
Primary school attendance to be higher than the London average & secondary attendance in top quartile by 2018

What does the data say ?

Both Primary and Secondary rates at 95.7 and 95.3% respectively are above the target trajectories

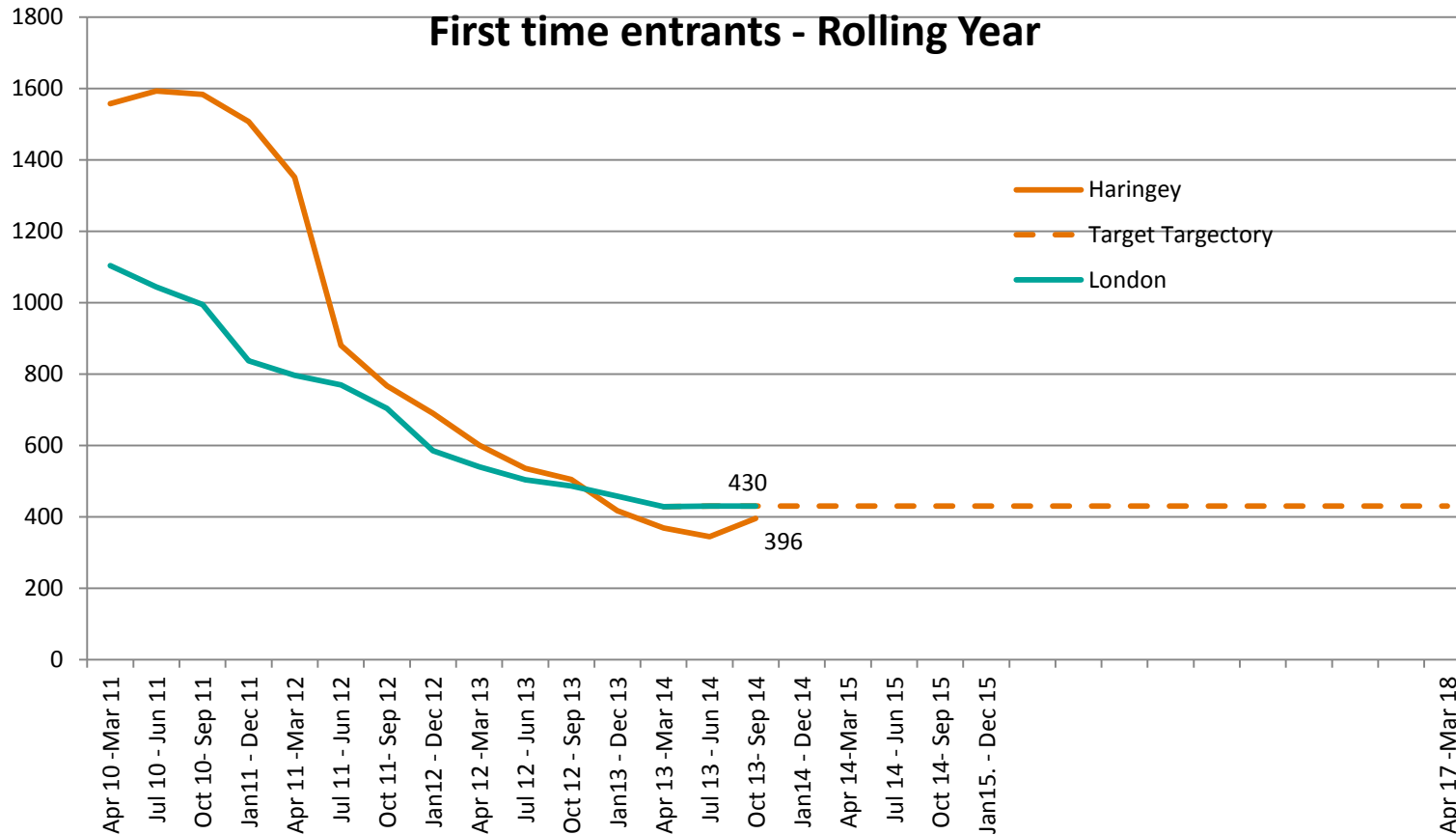
Indicator:

What does the data say ?

The latest available rate of 396 puts Haringey below the London rate of 430

Objective 5:

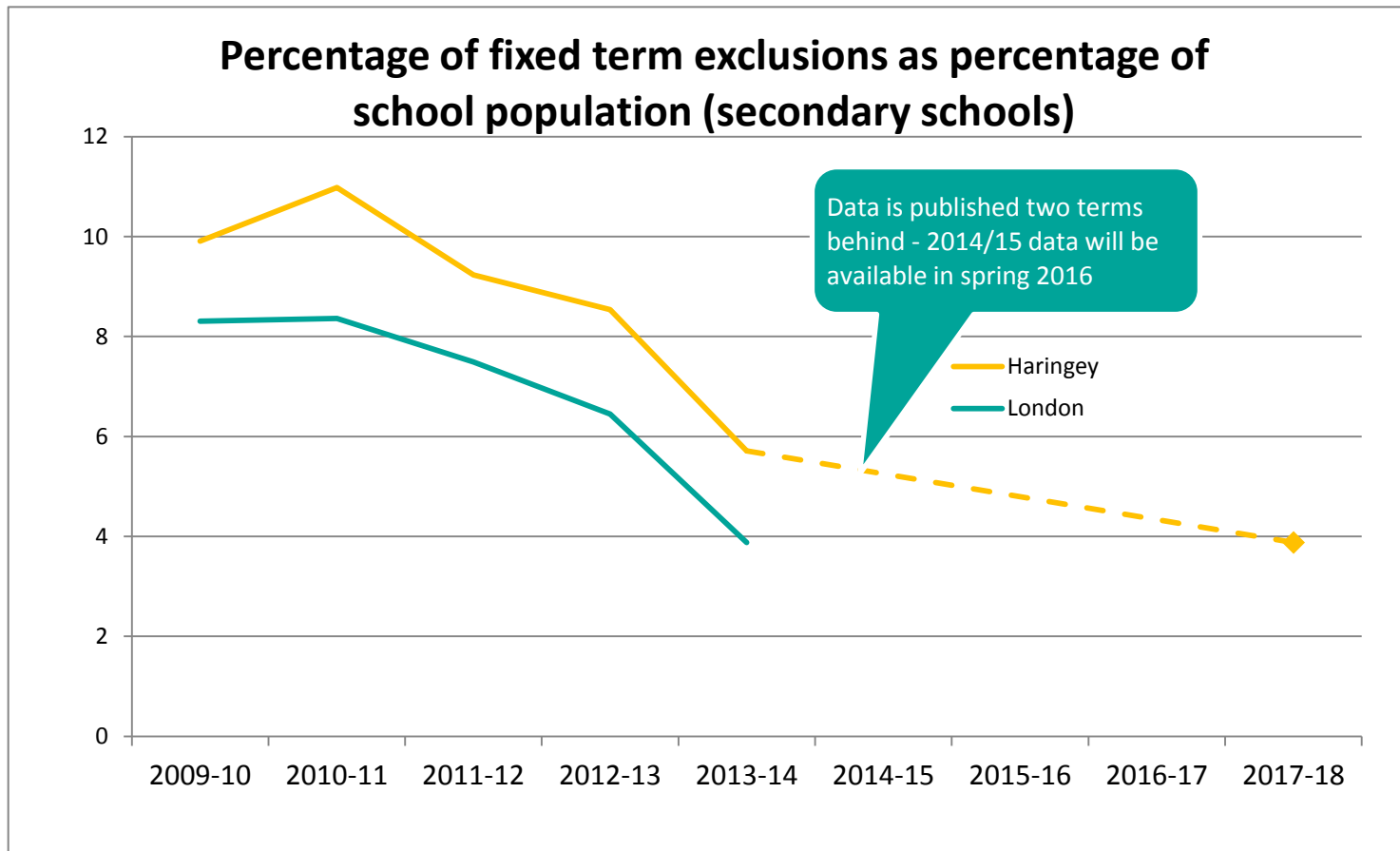

Reducing children's exclusions at secondary school


Target:

Exclusions to be below the London average by 2018



What does the data say ?

Haringey has a level of fixed term exclusions constantly above the London rate. The 2013/14 rate was 5.7 compared to 3.9

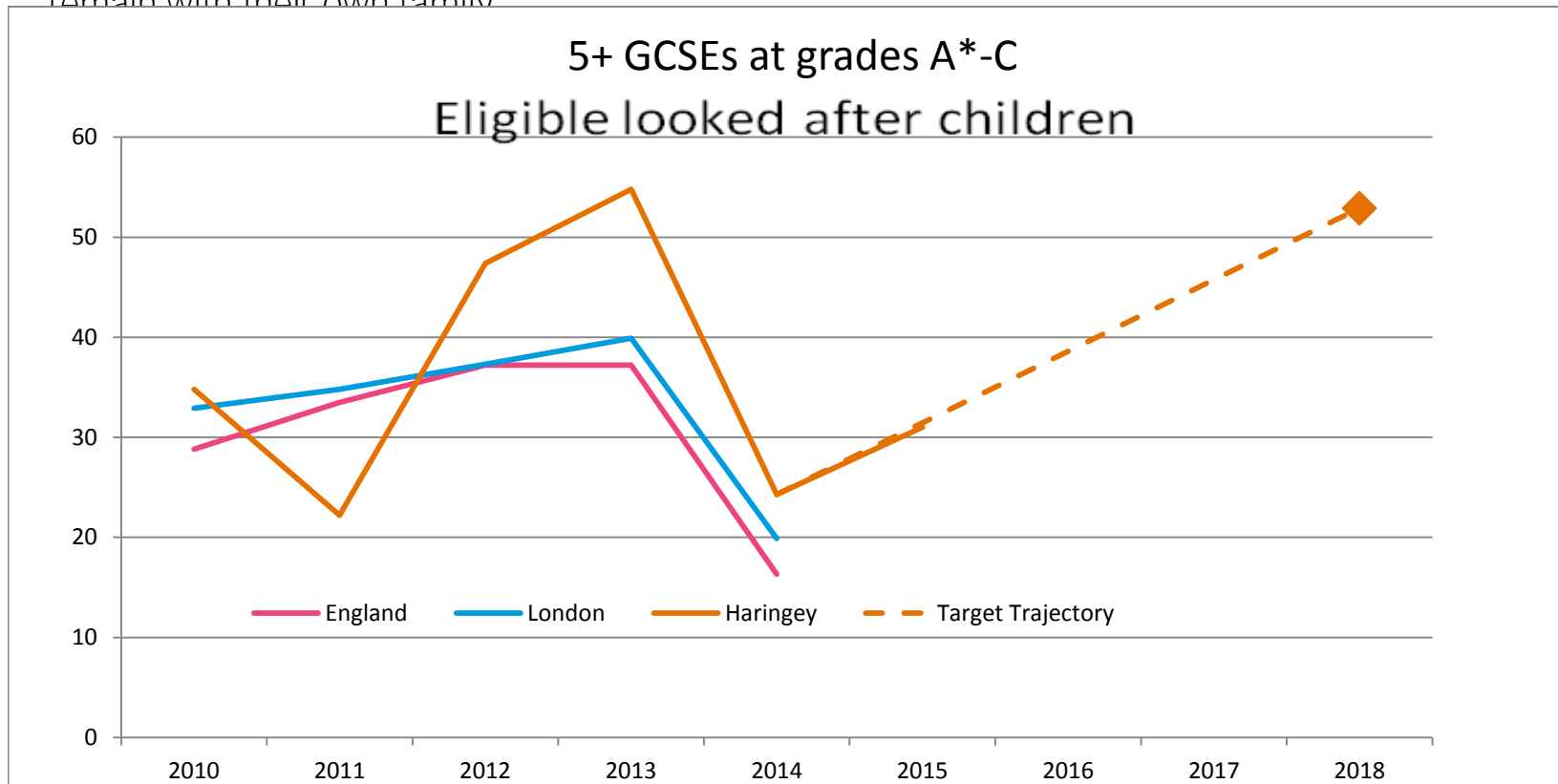
Outcome Indicator:

School results for eligible looked after children - percentage with 5 or more GCSEs



Target:

To be in the top 10 Local Authorities in the country consistently through to 2018



What does the data say ?

Haringey's 31% in 2015 is an improvement on 24.3% in 2014 but just below the trajectory required to meet the target

Objective 6:

All children and young people will be safeguarded from abuse and offered the best possible care if they cannot remain with their own family



Outcome Indicator:

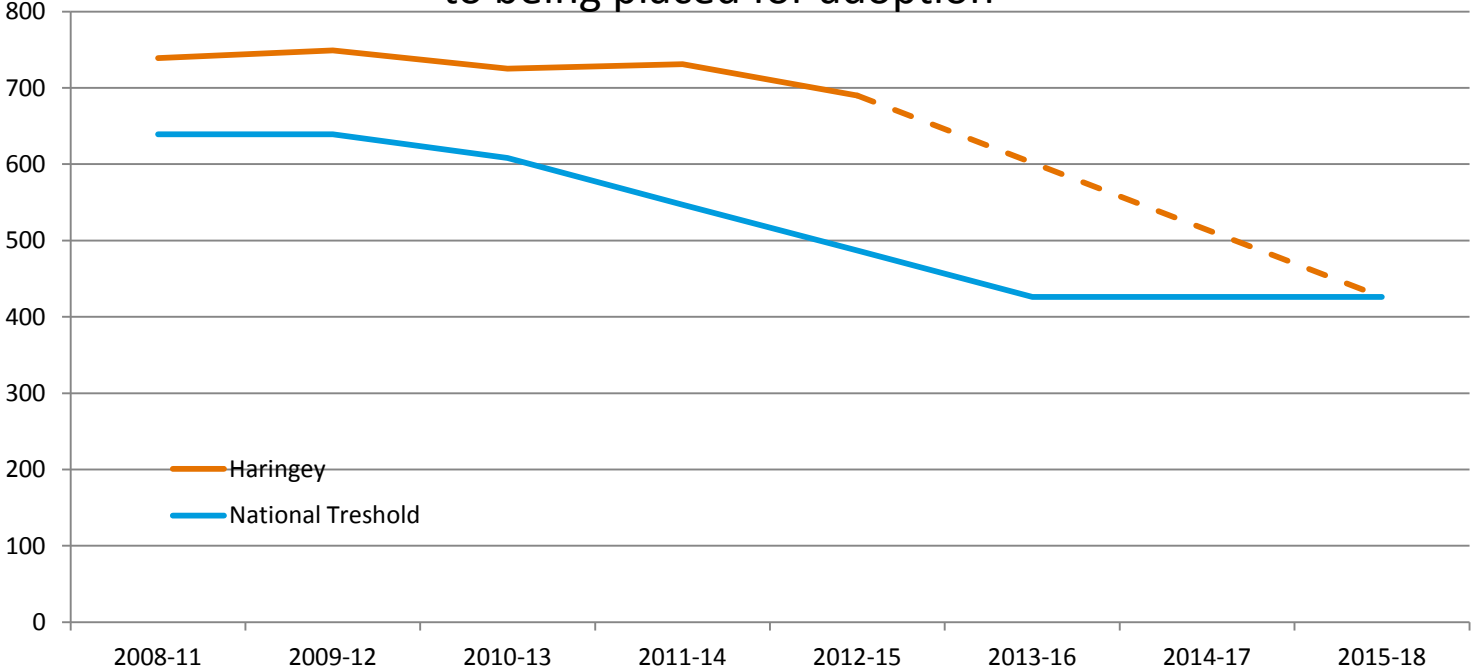
Reduce the average length of time children are in care before being adopted or achieving permanence as measured against the national threshold



Target:

For the average time for children adopted to move in with their adoptive parents to be within the national threshold

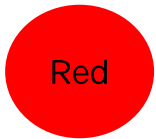
Days from becoming looked after to being placed for adoption



What does the data say?

Using a three year rolling average Haringey continues to take longer than the nation threshold.

However current, 2015/16 performance is in line with the national threshold

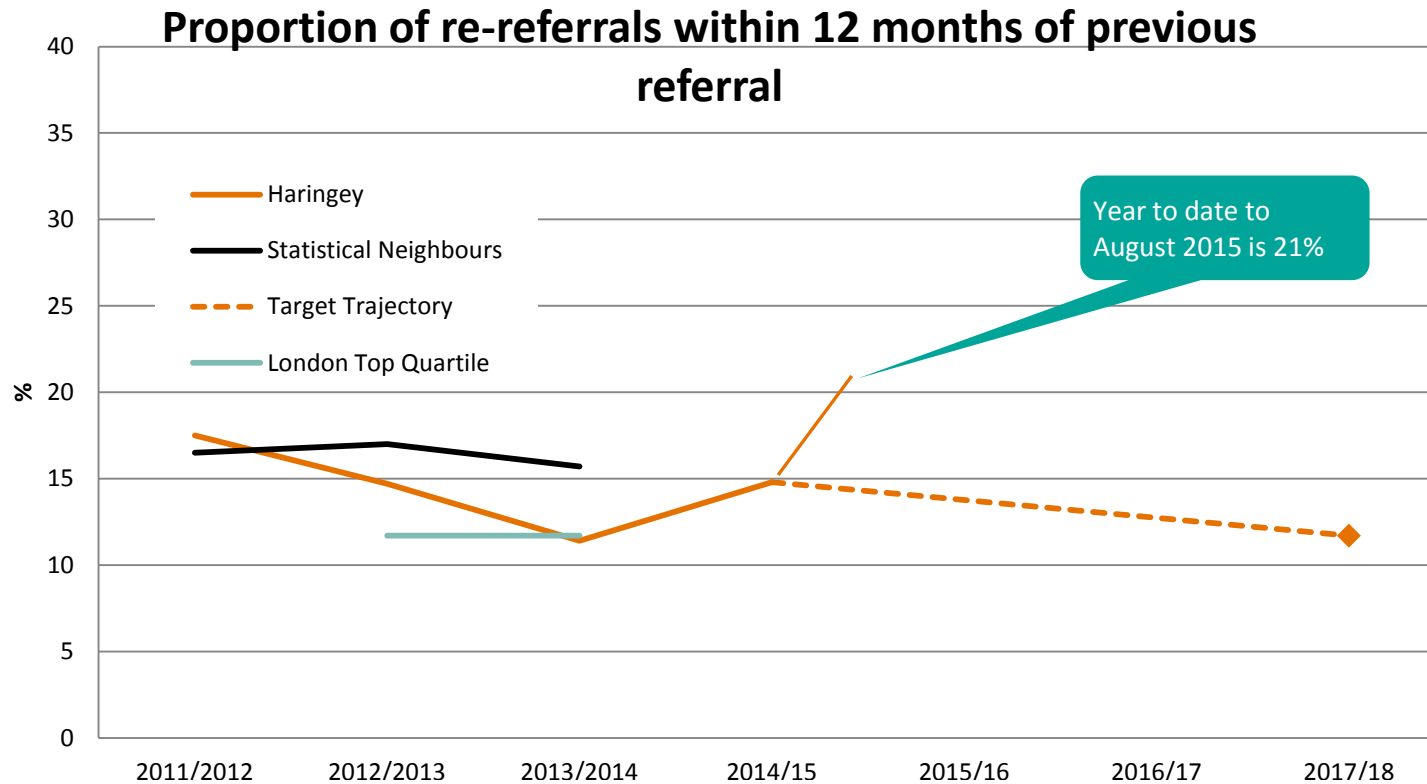


Objective 6:

➔ Outcome Indicator:
The proportion of referrals within 12 months of a previous referral

➔ Target:
To be London Top Quartile by 2018



What does the data say
Haringey's rate fell at a faster pace than Statistical Neighbours between 2011/12 and 2013/14.

Since then Haringey's rate has increased to 21% in 2014/15 (2014/15 data for Statistical Neighbours and London not yet available).
