






Objective 1:

All children will have the best start in life supported by strong relationships and be ready for school Outcome indicator: Ofsted ratings for Children's Centres, childminders and Private Voluntary Independent (PVI) settings Target:

All Children's Centres and at least 85% of childminders and PVIs to be rated good or outstanding by Ofsted by 2018



What does the data say ?

56 (30.9%) of our childminders, 29 (42.6%) of our Nurseries and 7 (28%) of our playgroups are currently either Requires improvement or Inadequate



Latest data gives us 67% against a 65% target for 2015






Objective 2:

London top quartile by 2017 and reduce by half the gap between FSM




What does the data say ?







Objective 3:



Target: To be above the national and London average on both measures by 2018



What does the data say ?

Haringey 54% is close to the all England percentage (56%) of entrants to Higher education but further below London (61%) and Russel group comparisons (11% compared to 15%)






To reduce the percentage of 10-11 year olds who are overweight or obese to 35% by 2018




Target: Primary school attendance to be higher than the London average

higher than the London average & secondary attendance in top quartile by 2018




What does the data say?





What does the data say

Haringey's rate fell at a faster pace than Statistical Neighbours between 2011/12 and 2013/14.

Since then Haringey's rate has increased to 21% in 2014/15 (2014/15 data for Statistical Neighbours and London not yet avaialble).
