
# Haringey SACRE Newsletter

# Haringey SACRE and the Non-Statutory National Framework for RE



The QCA Non-statutory National Framework for RE is now available for use by SACREs and Agreed Syllabus Conferences and all members of the SACRE have a copy.

Although this document is non-statutory SACRE will be using it where it can in development of new materials and later next year when a review of the Agreed Syllabus is undertaken.

Already the revised 8-level scale of Attainment has been used to develop revised Assessment Advice for RE, agreed by SACRE for use in Haringey schools earlier this year. This can be found on the Haringey RE pages on the London Grid for learning.

Schools should find and download this Assessment Advice and subject leaders should plan for its implementation during the next academic year. Should you wish for further advice, please contact the School Improvement Officer for RE, Denise Chaplin, or the SACRE.

Please note that in advance of a review of the Agreed Syllabus SACRE will be asking schools their views on the current syllabus. It would be helpful if subject leaders of all phases timetabled a review process into their Autumn term planning.

### Consultation on Term Dates 2006/07

I attach a draft calendar of term dates for the 2006/07 school year and would welcome comments, by no later than 27 June 2005. See below for email and post details.

This calendar is largely based on the Association of London Government (ALG) recommendations, which are designed to achieve similar dates across London.

We have also taken particular account of the dates proposed by adjoining boroughs with which we mainly exchange pupils - Barnet, Enfield and Hackney - and the views of the teaching trade unions as discussed at Teacher Negotiating Group (TNG).

They are a number of sometimes competing factors that need to be considered such as:

- ensuring as even a pattern of term lengths as possible, approximating to a six-term year;
- · whole weeks where possible;
- · examination timetables.

The notes below explain any variations from ALG recommendations.

The dates will be discussed again at TNG on 7 July before we finally determine and publish them.

### **INSET/ TAD days**

In common with practice in recent years and national agreements, we have proposed 195 days, leaving the schools to determine which are used for INSET. However, we do propose, as suggested by the NLC steering group, a common INSET day on the 20 October 2006. I would welcome views on whether we should continue to set the full 195, or reduce to the number of teacher availability days (TAD) to accommodate twilight INSET.

### Notes

### **Autumn Term:**

- We propose a term start on Monday 4 September.
- The half-term dates are the same as those planned by Hackney, Enfield and Barnet.

### Christmas break:

The TNG have suggested extending the Autumn Term to Friday 22 December and starting Spring Term on Monday 8 January 2007. The ALG proposal is for end of term on 19 December, starting back Wednesday 3 January. In common with Enfield and Barnet (Hackney are adopting the ALG model without variation) we propose breaking up on 20 December, thus adding one day to achieve the 195 TAD days.

I welcome comments on the TNG proposal.

### **Spring Term:**

The half term is proposed for 19-23 February, in common with Hackney and Enfield. Barnet plan 12-16 February.

### Easter break:

The ALG recommend a break from Thursday 5 April to 18 April, with the Easter weekend at the start of the break TNG favour breaking up on the 30th of March and returning on the 16th of April, placing the Easter weekend in the centre of the holiday, though shorting the previous half-term to 25 days. As Enfield and Barnet have adopted this variation, I propose adopting the TNG suggestion.

Again, I would welcome comments.

### **Summer Term:**

Apart from the start date, this is in line with ALG recommendations.

The 2007/8 school year is expected to start on 3rd September 2007.

### Clarification

In my recent letter on 2005/06 term dates, I referred to the views of an 'NUT Officer'. It has now been made clear to me that these were the views of the TNG, representing all the teacher associations. I apologise for any misunderstanding.
