### 1. Describe the issue under consideration

1.1 Variation of a Premises Licence to ad the ability to sell alcohol between the hours of 8ammidnight each day. The hours have been modified from the original application submitted.

**Supply of Alcohol** 

Monday to Sunday 0800 to 0000 hours

Supply of alcohol **OFF** the premises

Hours open to the public

Monday to Sunday 0000 to 0000 hours

To vary the layout of the premises in accordance with the plans submitted by the applicant.

To remove all conditions under Annex 2 of the premises licence.

To add new Annex 2 conditions in boxes b to e of Section 16 of the application.

### 2 Background

- 2.1 The premises has held licence that allows for Late night refreshment since May 2015. The current operators took over the premises in October 2015.
- **2.2.** Council officers are satisfied that the application has been made and advertised correctly.

### 3 Relevant Representations

### 6 Licensing Officer comments

- 6.1 The following information is intended to advise Members of the relevant aspects of the Statement of Licensing Policy, guidance issued by the Secretary of State, legislation and good practice. Members may depart from the Councils Policy and or Section 182 Guidance provided they consider it appropriate to do so and provide clear reasons for their decision.
- 6.2 Committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions.
  Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.
- 6.3 The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of retail sales of alcohol and the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.
- 6.4 The Section 182 Guidance advises the following:

### Garages and motorway service areas

5.22 Section 176 of the 2003 Act prohibits the sale or supply of alcohol at motorway service areas (MSAs) and from premises which are used primarily as a garage, or are part of premises used primarily as a garage. Premises are used primarily as a garage if they are used for one or more of the following:

- the retailing of petrol;
- the retailing of derv (diesel);
- · the sale of motor vehicles; and
- the maintenance of motor vehicles.



- 5.23 It is for the licensing authority to decide, based on the licensing objectives, whether it is appropriate for that premises to be granted a licence, taking into account the documents and information listed in section 17(3) and (4) which must accompany the application.
- 5.24 If a licence is granted in respect of a premises and the primary use of that premises subsequently changes (for example, the primary use becomes that of a garage rather than a shop) it would no longer be legal to sell alcohol on that premises. If a relevant representation is made, the licensing authority must decide whether or not the premises are used primarily as a garage. The licensing authority may ask the licence holder to provide further information to help establish what the primary use of the premises is.
- 6.5 There is further Guidance from the Home Office clarifying that Licensing Authorities are able to consider the primary activity after a licence in granted to ensure that the premises does not become primarily used as an off licence.
- 6.6 In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.
- 6.7 Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions with regard to noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 6.8 Also The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of the hearing that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Therefore conditions may not be imposed for the purpose other than promoting the licensing objectives and in some cases no additional conditions will be required.
- 6.9 The Licensing Act 2003 permits children of any ages to be on the premises which primarily sells alcohol provided they are accompanied by an adult. It is not necessary to make this a condition.
- 6.10 In cases Members should make their decisions on the civil burden of proof, that is the balance of probability.
- 6.11 Members should consider in all cases whether or not primary legislation is the appropriate method of regulation and should only consider licence conditions when the circumstances in their view are not already adequately covered elsewhere.
- 6.12 The Government has advised that conditions must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned. Conditions cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff.
  - The Councils Licensing policy generally expects applicants to address the licensing objectives and discuss how to do this with the relevant responsible authorities.

### 7 Options:

7.1 The Authority must, having regard to the application and the representations, take such steps (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

In determining this application the Sub-Committee may take any of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, namely:



- To grant the licence subject to such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, modified to such extent as the authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
- To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
- To reject the application.

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003 the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered or omitted or a new condition added.

8 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21 day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

### 9. Other considerations

### Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area".

### 9.1 Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 Right to respect for private and family life.
- o Article 1 of the First Protocol Protection of Property
- o Article 6(1) Right to a fair hearing.
- Article 10 Freedom of Expression

### **NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT**

In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is réquired for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.



The application has been amended significantly following and the police representation withdrawn.

The alcohol hours sought are now 0800 to 2400.

The following additional conditions have been agreed:

- 1. A CCTV system will be installed, or the existing system maintained, such system to be fit for the purpose such system to be to the reasonable satisfaction of the police.
- 2. The CCTV system shall be capable of producing immediate copies on site. Copies of recordings will either be recorded on good quality video tape or digitally on to CD/DVD or other equivalent medium. Images shall be provided to the police or to an authorised officer of the licensing authority within 24 hours of request.
- 3. Any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 31 days and shall be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the police for inspection on request.
- 4. The entrance will be covered by CCTV capable of enabling frontal identification persons entering the premises. The precise positions of the camera may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
- 5. The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of the recording.
- 6. The CCTV system will be maintained and fully operational throughout the hours that the premises are open for any licensable activity.
- 7. There will at all times be adequate levels of staff maintained at the premises. Such staff levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.
- 8. Adequate waste receptacles for use by customers shall be provided in and immediately outside the premises.
- 9. The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence.
- 10. Signage informing customers of the age verification policy adopted at the premises will be prominently displayed.

- 11. The licence holder will monitor the primary use of the premises and if transaction data demonstrates that the premises are excluded premises pursuant to S.176 of the Licensing Act 2003 the sale of alcohol will cease until such time as the data demonstrates that the premises are not—so excluded. Such data will be maintained on a 6 monthly basis and will be available on request to the police and the licensing authority. This condition will fall away in the event that S.176 is repealed.
- 12. An incident book/register shall be maintained to record:
  - all incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises
  - details of occasions when the police are called to the premises

This book/register shall be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

- 13. All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age restricted sales:
  - Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member.
  - Refresher/reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.

Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

Training records will be retained at the premises or at the offices of the licence holder for a minimum period of 12 months.

- 14. All cashiers shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals book/register. The book/register will contain:
  - details of the time and date the refusal was made;
  - the identity of the staff member refusing the sale;
  - details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase.

This book/register shall be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request

The book/register shall be retained at the premises or at the officers of the licence holder for a minimum period of 12 months.

15. The entrance door to the shop will be closed to customers between the hours of 2400 and 0600. Any sales between these hours will be made through the night pay window.

Please find attached a letter of objection and representation against the request for a 24 hour alcohol license for the Wellington Petrol Station in Highgate.

Attached to this letter (12 pages) are 25 names, addresses and signatures of very concerned and angry residents and neighbours.

Further to the letter we would also like to show our concern that, until it was brought to our attention last week by a neighbour, nobody was even aware of this licence request. As there has been no notification, we believe this list of signatures does not truly represent all those that will be concerned. The signatures only reflect those that were in at the weekend and were able to discuss this matter.

On talking to my neighbours, they were horrified by the idea and disgusted that they knew nothing about this whatsoever and therefore did not have the opportunity to write their own letters of representation.

Also, discussing this with my neighbours, it has been brought to our attention that there is a request for planning permission to develop the service station as well. This was only received by a resident in Toyne Way on Friday. This brings into question the bigger implications and plans associated with this 24 hour alcohol license. It is also concerning that only a few residents who live on the front of Toyne Way have actually received any notification of this planning permission. I would suggest the impact of these plans are more 'far reaching' than a few houses opposite. The majority of Toyne Way and as far as we are aware, those on North Hill, have not been notified.

I would also like to point out, when you search on Haringey's website for this planning application it can't be found. If you type the application number or the address you get no information on this matter and therefore presently our concerns raised are based on the alcohol license in isolation of any other plans.

Again, this is a residential and conservation area and the implications of 24 hour alcohol licence is very concerning.

I have been a resident at Toyne Way for over 40 years. I, along with other residents are very concerned with the idea of the Wellington Petrol Station being given a 24 hour licence to sell alcohol. We believe it will

- 1 Increase problems, noise and create a public nuisance and anti-social behaviour.
- 2 Could easily lead to crime and increased disorderly behaviour.
- 3 Introducing alcohol could be a real issue to public safety.

We, the local community are concerned about how it will affect the area. If alcohol and potentially a broader range of refreshments are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, this will inevitably increase the numbers of cars and pedestrians travelling to the area, particularly in the early morning. This will create more noise and general nuisance throughout the night for the whole area and its residents.

We are particularly concerned about how this could easily become an all night hangout after pubs close, causing problems in terms of anti-social and disorderly behaviour, which could result in crime.

Our concerns are based on the current real problems that we have to deal with. The petrol station currently sells cigarettes and other refreshments after hours, which brings people through the night—who sit on the walls outside the station and our Estate—creating a nuisance with noise and littering. Late at night they use our estate to cut through disturbing us further.

Local residents are currently having to clean up after them. Families, don't want to have smashed bottles, cans, cigarette butts left around, where they and their children have to put up with the mess the following morning. At worst, residents can get hurt if not dealt with quickly. The sale of alcohol could inevitably exasperate the current problem.

Our residential area is impacted heavily as we are positioned right by the station. Serving alcohol throughout the night will bring people on foot at all hours, creating an increase in general noise, disturbances but also the potential for anti-social behaviour and crime. This

will not only potentially introduce new problems, but make current behaviour around the garage worse.

This is also a concern for residents public safety. Late night loitering can be very intimidating to residents, especially when alcohol is involved. All night availability of alcohol will make this even more concerning.

We are also concerned about security and managing the sale of alcohol with the inevitable increase in cars and pedestrians. How is the security for the staff and the local area going to be maintained and controlled?

Alongside security, what measures would be put in place by the council and the garage to deal with this increased pedestrian traffic and policing additional people—potentially drunk in a residential area? How will you ensure there won't be any additional noise and antisocial behaviour?

We, including all the attached signatories from the area, would ask the council to decline this request.

I as a representative of the Director of Public Health act as the responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2003 and would like to make a representation regarding the application for a variation of premises license at: MRH WELLINGTON, 513 ARCHWAY ROAD, HORNSEY, LONDON, N6 4HX.

Public Health has specific concerns around the provision of alcohol 24 hours a day and its impact on the following licensing objectives:

- Protecting children from harm
- Public safety

#### Haringey: Alcohol and Health

Tackling alcohol misuse is key to achieving the outcomes in Haringey's Health and Wellbeing Strategy: giving every child the best start in life, reducing the gap in life expectancy between the east and west of the borough and improving mental health and well being. Part of achieving these involves community safety efforts to tackle alcohol crime and anti-social behaviour, and ensuring health considerations are taken into account in any licensing decisions. We want to create a culture that prevents problem drinking from starting and provides help for people early on should they be struggling.

Haringey experiences some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London and the harm due to alcohol is a growing concern. In the five year period of 2009/10 – 2014/15, alcohol related hospital admissions increased by 38% with the local cost of these admissions now estimated to be £7.5 million annually. During the same time period, the (DSR) rate of admissions per Haringey person also increased for both men and women, 31% and 26% respectively. Across the borough, there are currently over 800 licensed premises for the sale and supply of alcohol and this figure continues to rise, with some areas of high level clustering. Evidence shows that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm (including injury, violence and medical harm). Antisocial behaviour associated with street drinking has been recognised as a concern in Haringey. Problems identified include; litter, noise, urination and intimidation all of which have a detrimental impact to the quality of life for residents.

Though many factors are known to contribute to the above, the licensing committee has direct influence over two: density of licensed premises and trading hours.


#### **Local Context of the Premises**

The premises are located between Archway Road and North Hill, approximately 0.5 miles north west of Highgate underground station. The surrounding area comprises of residential streets and two greenspaces; Highgate Wood and Highgate golf club. There are three schools, one children's centre and a children's playground within 500m of the premises (Figure 1). There are 6 off-licenses and 2 on-licenses within a 500-meter radius, none of which hold a 24 hours alcohol license.

#### **Protecting Children from Harm**

There are three schools, one children's centre and a children's playground within 500m of the premises - see Figure 1.

#### **Public Safety**

The Highgate ward in which the premises is located is a low crime area - from December 2017 to November 2018 there were 1165 recorded crimes (Police.UK). However, the proportion of these which are related to anti-social behaviour (190 - 16.55%) and violence and sexual offences (200 - 17.42%) is high. These two types of crime are associated with alcohol intake and pose a risk to the safety of the general public including children. Alcohol is known to exacerbate the likelihood of night time violence and domestic abuse offences (GLA datastore, 2016).

Furthermore, the impact of the sale of high strength beers, lagers and ciders is having an adverse effect across Haringey. An increase in street drinking and ASB is related to the increase and easy availability of high strength cheap alcohol. Super strength ciders, larger and beer which are 6.5% Alcohol by Volume (ABV) and above are one of the most harmful forms of alcohol and this is a real concern from a public safety perspective.

In 2017/2018 the LSOA (small geographic area) ranked within the second quintile (of 144 LSOAs that comprise the borough) for alcohol related ambulance callouts. The proportion of all ambulance callouts that are alcohol related in the LSOA was higher than the borough average. Alcohol related ambulance callouts totalled 18 in 2017/2018, of which 1 involved a young person (under 18 years of age). Within 100 meters of the premises there have been 3 alcohol related ambulance callouts (SafeStats, Ambulance Callout Data, 2018).

#### Hours of operation

We note that the premises does not currently hold a licensed to sell alcohol and has requested a 24 hour license. As stated in Haringey's Statement of Licensing Policy "While the Council will treat each case on its individual merits there will be a presumption that permitted hours for the sale of alcohol will be restricted to between 8am and 11.30pm on Sunday to Thursday and 8am to midnight on Friday and Saturday in respect of premises in residential areas...".

We believe the following provide grounds to uphold the presumption of the SLP for shorter hours:

- i) The premises, while bound by roads is surrounded by residential areas.
- ii) Nearby premises have shorter licensing hours, with no licensed premises operating for 24 hours within 500m (SafeStats, 2018).
- iii) The proportion of alcohol related ambulance callouts in the LSOA between 11pm and 5am was 28.1% for the year 17/18 (SafeStats, Ambulance Callout Data, 2018). We have concerns that granting a 24-hour license could exacerbate this.

#### Recommendation

After reviewing the application, we believe that there is not sufficient reason to vary from the standards set in the Statement of Licensing Policy, and that granting a 24 hour license would be detrimental to the licensing objectives; public safety and the protection of children from harm.

Public Health therefore recommends that the hours are restricted to: 8am to 11.30pm on Sunday to Thursday and 8am to midnight on Friday and Saturday, consistent with the Statement of Licensing Policy. In addition, we recommend the following conditions are attached (in addition to those listed in the existing operating schedule) to minimise any potential harm:

#### Public safety

- The licensee should join the responsible retailers scheme OR
  - High strength alcohol sale restriction: no super-strength beer, lagers or ciders of 6.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises
  - O No irresponsible sales / promotion of super-strength alcohol (above 6.5% ABV) and single cans (i.e. buy one get one free) OR there shall be no promotional sales of alcohol at the premises where alcohol is sold at a price lower than that at which the same or similar alcoholic drinks are sold, or usually sold, on the premises
- All staff shall be trained in recognising signs of drunkenness, how to refuse service and the premises duty of care. Training shall be regularly refreshed and at no greater than 6 monthly intervals
- The premises shall display prominent signage indicating that it is an offence to sell alcohol to anyone who is drunk.
- There shall be no self-service of spirits on the premises.

#### Protecting children from harm

- The licensee shall adopt the 'Challenge 25 policy' and promote it on their premises through the prominent display of posters.
- Only a passport, photo-card driving licence, Armed Forces ID cards or a proof of age card bearing the official "PASS" accreditation hologram should to be accepted as proof of age.

- The licensee shall require staff to note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The
  refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The
  refusals log shall be made available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or
  trading standards.
- Age-restricted products training shall cover the following steps: the assessment of age; how and when to challenge for proof of age; acceptable proof of age and how to check it; and recording refusals.
- The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained on relevant matters including the conditions on the premises licence; age restricted products; and (if they are ever left in charge of the shop) the operation of the CCTV system and how to deal with visits from authorised officers. The licensee shall keep records of training and instructions given to staff, detailing the areas covered, and make them available for inspection upon request by authorised officers. Staff shall sign to confirm that they have received and understood the training.

These conditions are designed to ensure that the licensee takes appropriate steps to promote and uphold all four licensing objectives. We believe that all licensees who are fulfilling their duty to promote the licensing objectives will be already complying with many of these conditions. These are the type of precautions needed to meet Haringey's Statement of Licensing Policy requirement of a high standard of management.

We very much appreciate and welcome the amendments to the application.

We do feel strongly that as the premises will be open early in the morning, it is important to have protection for customers around single can and high alcohol content provision.

Public Health would be prepared to withdraw our representation if the applicant agrees to the addition of the following condition:

- No promotion of super-strength beer, lagers or ciders of 6.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above, nor single cans (i.e. buy one get one free or other multi-purchase deals)

#### Dear Daliah

Further to our conversation yesterday I have taken client instructions.

I am authorised to amend the application to reduce the alcohol hours sought to 0600 to 2400.

Our client agrees to the following condition being included on the licence:

• The licence holder will monitor the primary use of the premises and if transaction data demonstrates that the premises are excluded premises pursuant to S.176 of the Licensing Act 2003 the sale of alcohol will cease until such time as the data demonstrates that the premises are not so excluded. Such data will be maintained on a 6 monthly basis and will be available on request to the police and the licensing authority. This condition will fall away in the event that S.176 is repealed.

I also attach the email from Anna Dawson of the Home Office in which she sought to clarify the Guidance. It is not our practice to submit primary use data as part of the application process as it is not a requirement of the 2003 Act nor is primary use a ground for determining an application.

Finally you will be aware of the additional condition sent to Noshaba on 143 February:

An incident book/register shall be maintained to record:

- all incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises
- details of occasions when the police are called to the premises

This book/register shall be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

I hope that you will not now feel the need to make a representation. I am aware of the resident representation and should be grateful if you will let me know possible hearing dates.

Dear Sir/Madam,

We are currently considering the application for a major change to the licence to add the ability to offer alcohol sales and to do so on a 24 hr basis.

In order for us to do so however we need to clarify the following, Section 176 of the 2003 Act prohibits the sale or supply of alcohol at motorway service areas (MSAs) and from premises which are used primarily as a garage, or are part of premises used primarily as a garage. Premises are used primarily as a garage if they are used for one or more of the following:

- the retailing of petrol;
- the retailing of derv (diesel);
- · the sale of motor vehicles; and
- the maintenance of motor vehicles.

The Guidance goes on to say that it is for the licensing authority to decide, based on the licensing objectives, whether it is appropriate for that premises to be granted a licence, taking into account the documents and information listed in section 17(3) and (4) which must accompany the application. In order to clarify the primary use of the premises can you supply information to show the sales on the petrol forecourt to the sales taken for grocery please.

Mr Botkai,

I am writing in response to your query about the guidance issued to licensing authorities under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The guidance was revised and published on 27 March 2015. Changes have been made to paragraphs 5.22 and 5.23 concerning the sale of alcohol at garages and you have asked me to clarify the position described at paragraph 5.23.

At paragraph 5.22 the guidance is now clearer that a decision on whether to grant a premises licence should be based on the documents and information listed in section 17(3) and 17(4) of the Licensing Act 2003; and that in common with all licensing decisions, the statutory licensing objectives form the basis for this decision.

Paragraph 5.23 describes action that may be taken after the licence has been granted. For example, if the primary use of the premises becomes that of a garage rather than a shop then it would no longer be legal to sell alcohol from the premises (prohibited by section 176 of the Licensing Act 2003). This situation may give rise to a review, and paragraph 5.23 states that if a relevant representation is made, the licensing authority must decide whether or not the premises is used primarily as a garage.

You have raised a concern that use of the term 'representation' in this paragraph may cause some confusion as to whether this paragraph relates to representations made *before* the grant of a premises licence, or representations in relation to a review of an *existing* licence. Paragraph 5.23 is concerned with representations made *after* a licence has been granted or in respect of an existing licence. The term 'representation' is also used in this sense in chapter 11 of the guidance which deals with reviews. Chapter 11 refers to representations given in relation to a review, and representations which give rise to a review (also referred to as an application for a review).

I hope this helps to clarify the position.
