1. **Describe the issue under consideration**

1.1 An application has been submitted by Mr I Essumba for a licence to allow licensable activity namely , the sale of alcohol and late night refreshment. App 1

1.2 The applicant is seeking the following hours:

Late Night Refreshment

Monday to Thursday	2300 to 0100 hours
Friday to Sunday	2300 to 0100 hours

Monday to Thursday	1200 to 0030 hours

Supply of alcohol **ON** the premises.

Friday to Sunday	0900 to 0200 hours

1.2 Representations have been received against this application by ‘other persons’ and Responsible Authorities.

1.4 As such, in accordance with the legislation the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to consider the application and any relevant representations.

2 **Background**

2.1 The premises has operated as a cafe in the past. It is situated along a terrace of shops with residential above it.

The application has received representations against it due to the proposed change in operation to a restaurant business that would have customers staying onsite to socialise. The applicant also has a pending application with Planning to obtain permission for an outside area. The applicant has not mentioned the potential outside

area in the application.

- 2.2. Council officers are satisfied that the application has been made and advertised correctly.

3 Relevant Representations

3.1 All representations have to meet a basic legal and administrative requirements. If they fail to do so they cannot be accepted. When rejected the person or body sending the representation must be written and an explanation for rejection given in writing.

3.2 A responsible authority or other person can make a representation. There are two tests for other persons and only one for a responsible authority. The two tests are contained in Section 18 of the Act.

3.3 All representations must be "about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives" Likely means something that will probably happen, i.e on balance more likely than not.

3.4 Representations from responsible authorities do not have to meet the second test of not being vexatious and frivolous. Other persons have to meet this test.

3.5 The representations from Residents (Appendix 5) cite the potential for noise and anti social behaviour remaining into late in the morning from patrons attending the venue.

4 All the responsible authorities have been consulted about this application. They are as follows:

- The Licensing Authority
- The Metropolitan Police
- The London Fire and Emergency Planning Authority
- Planning
- Health and Safety (includes Building Control)
- Noise Environmental Health
- Food Environmental Health
- Trading Standards
- Child protection
- Public Health.

5. The applicant has offered measures in the operating schedule of the application that they say address the promotion of the Licensing Objectives. These can be found at Sec 18 of Appendix 1.

6 Licensing Officer comments

6.1 The following information is intended to advise Members of the relevant aspects of the Statement of Licensing Policy, guidance issued by the Secretary of State, legislation and good practice. Members may depart from the Councils Policy and or Section 182 Guidance provided they consider it appropriate to do so and provide clear reasons for their decision.

6.2 Committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions.

Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

- 6.3 The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of retail sales of alcohol and the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.
- 6.4 In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.
- 6.5 Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions with regard to noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 6.6 Also The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of the hearing that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Therefore conditions may not be imposed for the purpose other than promoting the licensing objectives and in some cases no additional conditions will be required.
- 6.7 The Licensing Act 2003 permits children of any ages to be on the premises which primarily sells alcohol provided they are accompanied by an adult. It is not necessary to make this a condition.
- 6.8 In cases Members should make their decisions on the civil burden of proof, that is the balance of probability.
- 6.9 Members should consider in all cases whether or not primary legislation is the appropriate method of regulation and should only consider licence conditions when the circumstances in their view are not already adequately covered elsewhere.
- 6.10 The Government has advised that conditions must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned. Conditions cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff.
The Councils Licensing policy generally expects applicants to address the licensing objectives and discuss how to do this with the relevant responsible authorities.

7 Options:

- 7.1 The Authority must, having regard to the application and the representations, take such steps (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

In determining this application the Sub-Committee may take any of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, namely:

- To grant the licence subject to such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, modified to such extent as the authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licesable activities to which the application relates.
- To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
- To reject the application.

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003 the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered or omitted or a new condition added.

- 8 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21 day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

9. Other considerations

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area".

9.1 Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 – Right to respect for private and family life.
- Article 1 of the First Protocol – Protection of Property
- Article 6(1) – Right to a fair hearing.
- Article 10 – Freedom of Expression

Licensing objectives

- a) **General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e):** All four licensing objectives to be in place and to be implemented to protect public nuisance and children away from harm.
- b) **The prevention of crime and disorder:** - To liaise with the local police
- To install CCTV system which will operate and record video images at all times that the premises are open to the public. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering the premises in any light condition.
 - All CCTV recordings made shall be retained for not less than 31 days with time and date stamping and be made available to a police officer or an authorised officer of any responsible authority upon request. Images shall be provided as soon as reasonably practicable, but not more than 24 hours after the request.
 - Operation of the CCTV equipment to be checked at least every seven days by the management and a written log recording this must be kept and made available for inspection. If inoperative this is to be reported to the Police and the Licensing Authority without delay.
 - CCTV images must be made available for playback in store to Police or Council Licensing Officers at any time the store is open.
 - Display clear signs at the premises stating `CCTV in Operation`
 - Display clear signs stating that anti-social behaviour will not be tolerated
 - Do not sell alcohol to drunk person
 - Beer and cider containing 7.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) and above shall not be sold at the premises.
 - A refusal book recording all refused sales of alcohol shall be kept at the premises and maintained at all times, which shall be made available to a police officer or an authorised officer of any responsible authority upon request. The register will contain:
 - a) details of the time and date the refusal was made
 - b) the reason for the refusal (including underage and attempted purchase by a person who is drunk)
 - c) the identity of the staff member refusing the sale
 - d) details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase
 - e) brief description of the customer concerned
 - An incident book shall be kept and maintained at the premises at all times, which shall be made available to a police officer or an authorised officer of any responsible authority upon request.
 - The incident book shall be used to record the date and time of any incident, the name of the staff member and a brief description of the customer concerned.
 - All incidences of the following shall be recorded in the incident book within 24 hours and retained for a minimum of 12 months.
 - a) theft or attempted theft of alcoholic drinks;
 - b) any criminal incident;
 - c) any incidents of disorder;
 - d) all ejections of patrons;
 - e) any visit by a relevant authority or the emergency services;

- f) any complaints received;
 - g) any faults in the CCTV system.
 - The licence holder shall ensure that staff are trained to use and maintain the refusal book and the incident book.
 - c) **Public safety:** - To meet all health and safety objectives
 - Liaise with the local police
 - Training of staff on a regular basis to ensure public safety
 - Do not sell alcohol to underage persons, always check ID`s if in doubt about person`s age.
 - d) **The prevention of public nuisance:** - Customers requested to leave the premises in a quiet and orderly manners. A suitably worded sign, of a size A4 or larger, shall be displayed at each exit point from the premises. The sign shall remind customers to respect the neighbours, leave the area quietly and request that they do not congregate outside the premises.
 - To keep deliveries of goods at afternoon times (Delivery times not to be very early or late)
 - Keeping noise to a minimum at all times.
 - e) **The protection of children from harm:** - Clear signs displayed to warn families to keep children with them at all times
 - To keep sharp and flammable objects from children
 - Do not sell alcohol to underage persons. A `Challenge 21` scheme that ensures any person attempting to purchase alcohol who appears to be under the age of 21 shall provide documented proof that he/she is over 18 years of age shall be implemented at the premises. Proof of age shall only comprise a passport, a photo card driving licence, or Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) approved proof of age identity card.
 - A prominent notice, of a size A4 or larger, shall be displayed at the point of entry to the premises and at the serving area advising customers that the premises operates the `Challenge 21` proof of age scheme.
 - All staff whose responsibilities include the retail sale of alcohol shall receive training prior to them being permitted to sell alcohol and refreshed not more than every six months thereafter. the training shall include, but is not restricted to:
 - a) the prevention of underage sales of alcohol which shall include:
 - i. operation of the `Challenge 21` scheme;
 - ii. types of acceptable ID;
 - iii. method of recording challenges;
 - iv. potential consequences of making an underage sale.
 - b) refusing sales of alcohol to persons who appear to be drunk;
 - c) identifying and preventing proxy sales;
 - d) the operation of the CCTV equipment.
- Such training shall be recorded, a version of which must be kept in English and these records shall, on request, be made available to any police officer or authorised person upon demand.

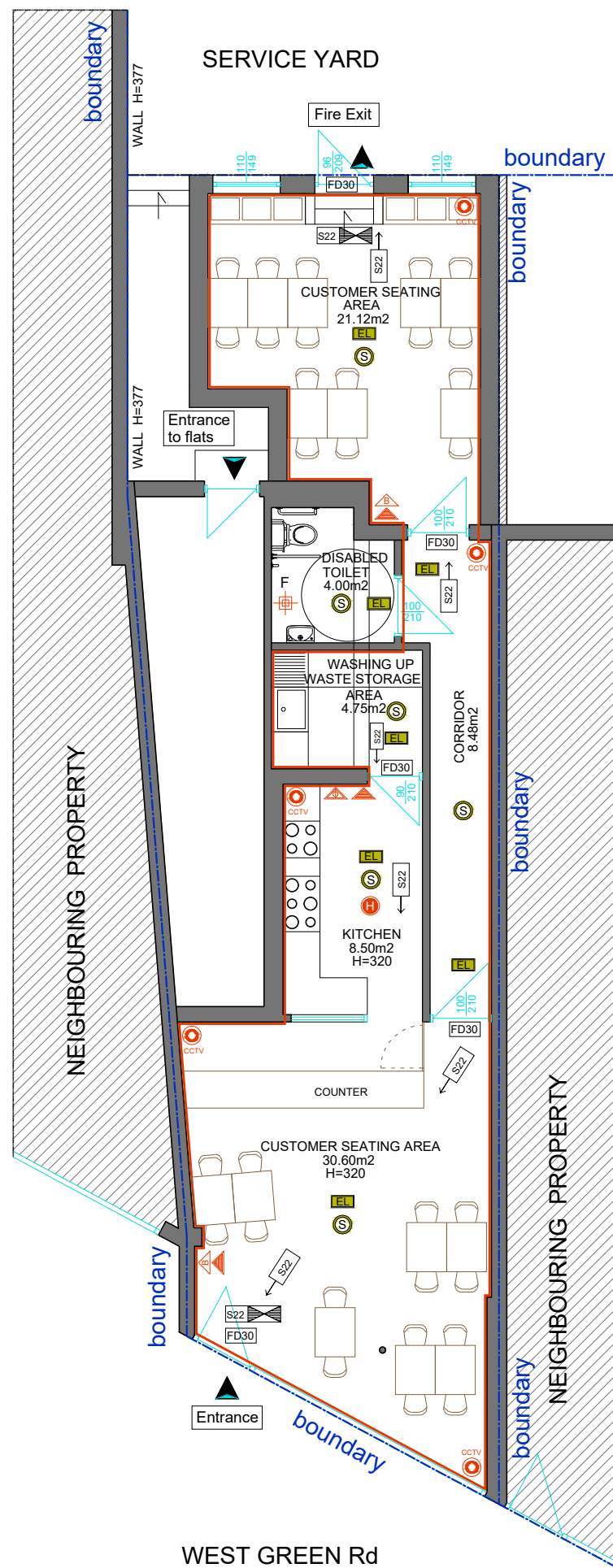

Thanks for all your representations on the licensing application for Mississippi Lounge at 114 West Green Rd N15 5AA,

We do understand all your concerns but we have to be responsible in every aspect and help the local authority assess the case and do its job.

The Resident mentioned noise pollution, public urination, stealing from cars on Grove park road, partying till 4am and finishes by saying its a dangerous place to bring up kids in that area.

As a business, we have a limited power as to control the public, our duty ends at speaking to our customers to control their noise while leaving the premise in order not to disturb the neighbours. On 20th Jul I visited premises at 114 West Green Road, N15 along with the licence applicant, Mr Essumbu and based on the following assessments I object for granting a late licence to the premises:

1. The site is still under construction (all the ceiling wooden beams were exposed, there was no fixture/ fittings of any kind, Mr Essumbu was not able to provide satisfactory answer to my enquiries regarding, safety risk assessment in place, sound insulation, i.e. the placement of speakers and other preventative measures to manage any possible noise nuisance.
2. Due to the urban layout of West Green Rd, N15 which is a densely populated and there are residents living directly above the property.
3. Based on our record, the music and the noise from the above premises will disturb the residents living above and within the vicinity of venue, as we have received a high number of noise complaints for the late licenced premises in West Green Rd, N15, including Belle Congolese, 103-105 West Green Rd, N15 which its late licence is under investigation for such reports)
4. In addition Mr Essumbu as the licence holder for Belle Congolese, as mentioned above, has not taken any action to address and control the noise level coming from this venue.

Supply of Alcohol

Sunday to Thursday 1000 to 2230 hours

Friday to Saturday 1000 to 0030 hours

- 2) A digital CCTV system recommended to be installed in the premises. I am aware of the applicants proposals in relation to CCTV, however wish to have the following added and complied with also;

(a) Camera(s) must be sited to observe the entrance doors from both inside and outside.

(b) Camera(s) on the entrance must capture full frame shots of the heads and shoulders of all people entering the premises i.e. capable of identification.

(c) Camera(s) must be sited to cover all areas to which the public have access, excluding toilets if on site.

(d) Provide a linked record of the date, time of any image.

(e) Provide HD digital quality images in colour during opening times.

(f) Have a monitor to review images and recorded quality.

(g) Be regularly maintained to ensure continuous quality of image capture and retention.

(h) Member of staff trained in operating CCTV at venue during times open to the public.

(i) Digital images must be kept for 31 days. The equipment must have a suitable export method, e.g. CD/DVD writer so that Police can make an evidential copy of the data they require.

- 3) An incident log shall be kept at the premises, it will be in a hardback durable format handwritten at the time of the incident or as near to as is reasonable and made available on request to the Police, which will record the following:
- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 4) On any occasion when the premises are to remain open after 2300 hours, one SIA licensed operative will be employed, to commence work at 2000 hours.
- 5) Smoking to only be permitted at the front of the premises. No more than 3 patrons to be permitted to smoke outside the front of the premises at any one time. The number of smokers to be supervised by a member of staff when an SIA is not in operation.
- 6) No public access to be permitted to the rear of the premises.

If these conditions were accepted in full, I would withdraw my representation. I reserve the right to provide further information to support this representation.

I am making a representation against a licence for this premises. I have seen a concurrent planning application to build an extension to the rear premises, which would become a 'hidden' area from the street and as previous similar premises in this road have done, create a drinking den-type club that is out-of-sight and encourage noise and anti-social behaviour into the early hours, in what is a residential area.

The prevention of crime and disorder/public nuisance

The West Green Road has been a sensitive area for many years and the Council's efforts installing more cameras, upgrading shop fronts, communal garden, etc) have had a positive impact on the local community here. However, there are still regular occurrences of night time violence, abusive behaviour, shouting and gatherings on the street corners around the bars/clubs that have sprung up recently. Most of these 'club/lounge' businesses flout their licence conditions anyway, with some still going at 3/4am. A 'hidden' back room (114 plan) will encourage this further.

This part of West Green Road has residential accommodation and also above shops/takeaways. Nearly all the shops operate between normal hours. A late-night premises serving alcohol all day would further saturate the area with these type of venues (already 3 in a 15m stretch), would generate disturbing and intrusive levels of noise and anti-social behaviour.

Public safety

During the day and night, the presence of customers standing on the street, smoking and intoxicated will cause people to avoid the vicinity, especially mothers with children and the elderly. There are a lot of obviously heavy drinkers in the area and encouraging these people is again a complete step backwards and compromises public safety. The increase in traffic will also put safety at risk in an already busy area.

Protection of children from harm

The area is becoming a better place for children to grow up in, the idea of having a venue selling alcohol, purveying loud music and resultant anti-social behaviour on their doorstep, next to their homes, where they walk to and from school, does not create a good and safe environment for children.
