

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(e) At all times during operating hours, there will be at least 1 member of staff on the premises who can operate the system sufficiently to allow Police or authorised Council officers to view footage on request;

(f) Recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and downloaded footage will be provided to the police or other authorised officers on request (subject to the Data Protection Act 2018) within 24 hours of any request.

(g) Signage stating that CCTV is in operation will be clearly and prominently displayed at the premises.

To the Licensing Team at Haringey Council,

I would like to record my objection to the granting of a late night licence for Kartal Cakes Limited as described in the notice of application displayed at the premises at 321 West Green Road.

Local residents are already faced with the increased traffic and subsequent noise and affected air quality caused by the introduction of the LTNs as well as historical and regular instances of anti-social behaviour and littering.

The granting of this application can only add to this, whilst bringing no quantifiable benefit to the residents outside of social hours.

A late night licence could see queues of delivery drivers/couriers parked on the street and congregating, thus creating noise, the congregating of customers, again, creating noise and the potential for increased littering, all with little to no regard to how this may be affecting residents. These observations are based on experience of living in the directly affected area and experience of living within an affected vicinity of other business premises with late night licences.

Hi

I am writing to OBJECT IN THE HIGHEST TERMS on the application by Baby Cakes, 321 West green Road.

Im s. This area:

* Is a high crime area, with a number of people with support needs often in the area, from local supported housing schemes, making noise at all times of the day and night, people with mental health and drug/alcohol issues

* The terrible idea and implementation of LTNs in the area mean that traffic and traffic noise is UP for us peasants who cant afford to live on the side roads. Noise and actual pollution has not gone down for us on the main road! Its UP.

* the 24 / 7 Supermarket, Atakan Food Centre , although convenient again increases NOISE. There's cars and people hanging around late at night [often playing their rubbish music loud, as they feel its needed] while they go into the shop. People park in front of the shop often which means buses cant get through, so they end up beeping all day and night. The staff here are working all day and night, making noise with deliveries and chat often at 0400AM

* Tesco, which is very close to us, will often have shoplifting, begging and loud confrontations all times of the day and night. We also have a large loud fridge that is part of Tesco at the back of our flat.

* Noise from the street travels up very easily to the flats in Strawbridge Court, sometimes Im working from home and hear the guys in the Rose Cafe's conversation.

This is a nice[ish] colourful character area [there's worse] BUT we have enough noise already, we dont need more, for the mental well being of people that live in Strawbridge Court [there's many young kids here too] AND the flats above Atakan and Baby Cakes.

We have our living room at the front on the building on West Green road, and many of our neighbours sleep at this side of the building. We are leaseholders who work very hard for what we have. We really DO NOT need more noise than what we already have.

Since Baby Cakes has opened I've seen the people there; it's hardly busy, and there's not lots of kids queuing up for ice cream. Mostly young men hanging around. Not seen a single person buy a cake or ice cream.

WHY ON EARTH DO YOU NEED TO BUY A CAKE / ICE CREAM at 0200am? Even 23:00 is late for that. What "hot food" are they selling there or want to sell there? Kebabs and ice cream? It all sounds suspect to me, and I'm all for business men doing business, we all have to work but I need to be able to live in my home in peace and quiet too.

In my view:

Later hours for this store will ADD to high noise levels already in the area

Will increase ASB as people hang around and eat "hot food", noise, drunkenness, fights etc. possible other ASB related issues with people hanging around, drug dealing, sex work etc.

Will increase rubbish in the area, attracting rats and foxes.

I think to sell cakes at 0200AM in a cake shop is spurious suggestion at best. Please DENY their later licence application.

I am writing to OBJECT IN THE HIGHEST TERMS on the application by Baby Cakes, 321 West green Road.

Im Mr N Ransom and I reside at . This area:

* Is a high crime area, with a number of people with support needs often in the area, from local supported housing schemes, making noise at all times of the day and night, people with mental health and drug/alcohol issues

* The terrible idea and implemantion of LTNs in the area mean that traffic and traffice noise is UP for us peasants who cant afford to live on the side roads. Noise and actual polution has not gone down for us on the main road! Its UP.

* the 24 / 7 Supermarket, Atakan Food Centre , although convenient again increases NOISE. There's cars and people hanging around late at night [often playing their rubbish music loud, as they feel its needed] while they go into the shop. People park in front of the shop often which means buses cant get through, so they end up beepin all days and night. The staff here are working all day and night, making noise with deliveries and chat often at 0400AM

* Tesco, which is very close to us, will often have shoplifting, begging and loud confrontations all times of the day and night. We also have a large loud fridge that is part of Tesco at the back of our flat.

* Noise from the street travels up very easily to the flats in Strawbridge Court, sometimes I'm working from home and hear the guys in the Rose Cafe's conversation.

This is a nice[ish] colourful character area [there's worse] BUT we have enough noise already, we don't need more, for the mental well being of people that live in Strawbridge Court [there's many young kids here too] AND the flats above Atakan and Baby Cakes.

We have our living room at the front on the building on West Green road, and many of our neighbours sleep at this side of the building. We are leaseholders who work [1.5 jobs!] in a Notting Hill Housing Association flat. We really DO NOT need more noise than what we already have.

Since Baby Cakes has opened I've seen the people there; it's hardly busy, and there's not lots of kids queuing up for ice cream. Mostly young men hanging around. Not seen a single person buy a cake or ice cream.

WHY ON EARTH DO YOU NEED TO BUY A CAKE / ICE CREAM at 0200am? Even 23:00 is late for that. What "hot food" are they selling there or want to sell there? Kebabs and ice cream? It all sounds suspect to me, and I'm all for business men doing business, we all have to work but I need to be able to live in my home in peace and quiet too.

In my view:

Later hours for this store will ADD to high noise levels already in the area

Will increase ASB as people hang around and eat "hot food" , noise drunken ness, fights etc. possible other ASB related issues with people hanging around, drug dealing, sex work etc.

Will increase rubbish in the area, attracting rats and foxes.

I think to sell cakes at 0200AM in a cake shop is spurious suggestion at best. Please DENY their later licence application.



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Licensing Objectives – 485A Seven Sisters Road

1. The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

- CCTV installed and operating in entrance and customer areas. Footage retained for 31 days.
- Challenge 25 policy in place for all alcohol sales. Valid ID required.
- Trained staff will manage alcohol sales and ensure responsible service.
- Incident/refusals log will be maintained and reviewed regularly.

- Premises limited to approx. 20–30 people due to its size (29.8m²).
- Emergency lighting, fire alarm, smoke and heat detectors installed.
- Fire-fighting equipment (extinguishers, fire blanket) on site.
- Staff trained in evacuation procedures and safety checks.

3. The Prevention of Public Nuisance

- Doors/windows closed after 22:00 to minimise noise leakage.
- Clear signage requesting patrons leave quietly and respect neighbours.
- Recorded music only, played at background level. No live music or DJ.
- Waste disposal managed during daytime hours to avoid disturbances.

4. The Protection of Children from Harm

- Challenge 25 strictly applied. No service of alcohol to underage persons.
- No children allowed on premises after 21:00.
- Staff trained to recognise and report safeguarding concerns.
- No adult entertainment or content that could cause concern for children.

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Operational Schedule – Habesha Lounge (485A Seven Sisters Road)

This document outlines how the premises will operate under the premises licence and manage compliance with all licensing objectives.

General Operation

- Habesha Lounge is a small café-lounge with a seating capacity of approx. 20–30 people.
- The venue serves hot drinks, light food, and alcohol in a calm, low-noise setting.
- Main activity includes background music and casual food service – no shisha, no live music, and no dancing.
- Customer base consists of regular locals and walk-ins. No promotional events or crowd-driven activities.

Staff Training & Management

- All staff trained on Licensing Act 2003 responsibilities, especially alcohol sale and public safety.
- Training includes Challenge 25, refusing service, and identifying signs of intoxication.
- Incident log kept behind the counter and reviewed weekly by management.

Alcohol Service Policy

- Alcohol served only for consumption on premises. After 22:00, the premises operates in a lounge-style format, not as a bar or nightclub.
- No external areas are used for alcohol consumption or smoking.
- Bar staff trained in responsible serving and how to deal with disorderly customers.

Noise & Nuisance Control

- Music played at low background level only, through small in-ceiling speakers.
- Sound limiter used to ensure levels never exceed set decibel thresholds.
- Customers asked to leave quietly after 22:00 with signage at exits.
- Deliveries and waste collections scheduled during daytime only.

Late-Night Operations (Fridays & Saturdays)

- • Venue remains open until 03:00 on Fridays and Saturdays to allow gradual dispersal of customers.
- • No new customers admitted after 01:30.
- • Lighting dimmed and music reduced after midnight to create a quieter atmosphere.
- • Extra staff available to help monitor and assist safe exit of patrons.

1. Describe the issue under consideration

- 1.1 This report relates to an application for a new licence submitted by Ms M Brennan. The application seeks the following:

Sale of Alcohol

Monday to Sunday 1100 to 2100 hours

Supply of alcohol **OFF** the premises.

2 Recommendations

In considering the representations received and what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, the steps the Sub-Committee can take are:

- Grant the application as requested
- Grant the application whilst imposing additional conditions and/or altering in any way the proposed operating schedule.
- Exclude any licensable activities to which the application relates
- Reject the whole or part of the application

- 2.1 Members of the licensing sub committee are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

3. Background

- 3.1 The boat is not officially moored at the proposed location on the River Lea. The LSC will note the various correspondence from the Canal River Authority making clear it is not giving permission for a secured location. The towpath is not viewed as public highway and is therefore not within scope to be considered for a pavement Licence application. A boat is considered "premises" under the Licensing Act 2003 when it's not permanently moored or berthed. This means even if the boat is moving and not tied to a specific location, it still needs a premises license to sell alcohol.

Home Port:

The "home port" for licensing purposes is typically the location where the boat is usually moored or berthed. This is where the application for the premises license should be submitted

- 3.2 The Home Office Guidance issued under Section 182 Guidance places a requirement on applicants to demonstrate when setting out steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives that they understand the area in which they are wishing to operate.

4. Policy Implications

- 4.1 The decision should be made with regard to the Secretary of the State's guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Where the decision departs from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal / challenge is increased.

4.2 Equalities impact

At the time of writing this report there were no implications for equality and diversity. Any decision taken by the Licensing Sub-Committee will be in accordance with the four licensing objectives as prescribed by the Licensing Act 2003.

5. Other considerations

a) **General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e):** We are experienced operators in the hospitality industry (running The Post Bar in Tottenham) and are committed to upholding all four licensing objectives through responsible trading, clear staff procedures, and thoughtful community engagement.

We will take the following general steps to ensure our business operates lawfully and safely:

All staff will be trained in licensing laws, responsible alcohol sales, and customer care.

A Personal Licence Holder will be present whenever alcohol is being sold.

We will maintain up-to-date risk assessments for the boat and towpath setup.

Signage will be displayed to encourage respectful behaviour, including reducing noise, disposing of litter, and not drinking beyond designated areas.

We will work closely with local authorities and police to ensure our activities complement community safety and well-being.

Alcohol will only be served in suitable containers (e.g. plastic, cans, or cups) to prevent danger to the public or wildlife.

Our public liability insurance (£2m) covers our towpath operations, and our Boat Safety Scheme certificate is valid until 2027.

Our setup (static boat, small-scale seating) is designed to complement and not disturb the local environment or other towpath users.

We take pride in running a welcoming and well-managed space that encourages responsible social interaction, supports local events, and respects the neighbourhood.

b) **The prevention of crime and disorder.** To prevent crime and disorder, we will implement the following measures:

We will operate a Challenge 25 policy and train staff to check valid photo ID (passport, driving licence, PASS cards).

No alcohol will be sold to individuals who are visibly intoxicated or causing a nuisance.

Staff will be trained in conflict management and how to report or defuse anti-social behaviour.

We will display signage stating that we do not tolerate abuse or aggression and reserve the right to refuse service.

Alcohol will only be sold within permitted hours, with all sales recorded and overseen by a Personal Licence Holder.

CCTV will be in use onboard and at The Post Bar; where appropriate, we may use portable CCTV for towpath trading locations.

We will work collaboratively with local police and community safety officers if any concerns arise.

As a mobile/static trading unit, we are able to move or pack down quickly if required to address any incidents or avoid gathering hotspots.

c) **Public safety:** We take public safety very seriously and have structured our operations to prioritise the well-being of customers and the general public. Key steps include:

The boat holds a valid Boat Safety Certificate until 2nd September 2027 and is insured under Craft Insure.

Public Liability Insurance is in place (£2 million cover).

The trading area is entirely separate from operational boat areas; customers will not board the vessel.

All seating/tables will be placed in areas that do not obstruct the towpath, keeping clear access for pedestrians, cyclists, and emergency services.

Equipment such as gas and electricity (where used) (Solar Panels & Battery) will be tested and maintained in line with safety standards.

Staff will be trained in basic health and safety, including manual handling, hot drink service, and first aid procedures.

Fire extinguishers and first aid kits will be available onboard at all times.

We will complete a full risk assessment for each site we trade from and adapt our layout based on local conditions.

d) The prevention of public nuisance: To avoid causing nuisance to the local community and towpath users, we will take the following precautions:

We will use quiet and respectful trading methods – no loudspeakers, amplified music, or generators that cause noise disruption.

Alcohol will be served in cans or plastic – no glass will be used in public areas.

Trading hours will be restricted to 11am–9pm in the summer and occasional daytime events in winter, avoiding late-night activity.

We will not allow loitering or disorderly behaviour around the towpath and will encourage customers to disperse quietly.

Waste will be managed carefully: bins will be available, and staff will regularly clear litter in and around the service area and we will never leave any area without a clean sweep.

We will engage with local residents, event organisers, and Haringey Council to ensure our presence complements the wider area and does not disturb wildlife or nature reserves along the canal.



THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

Digital CCTV conditions.

Cameras must be positioned to observe the entrance doors from outside.

Cameras on the entrances must capture full frame shots of the heads and shoulders of all people capable of identification.

Provide a linked record of the date, time of any image.

Be regularly maintained to ensure continuous quality of image capture and retention. Member of staff trained in operating CCTV at venue during times open to the public.

Digital images must be kept for 31 days. The equipment must have a suitable export method, e.g. CD/DVD writer so that Police can make an evidential copy of the data they require. Copies must be available within a reasonable time to Police on request.

An incident logbook shall be kept at the Premises and made available on request to a police officer or authorised officer of the Licensing Authority. The logbook shall record the following:

(a) All crimes reported to the venue

(b) Any complaints received

(c) Any incidents of disorder

(d) Any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment.

(e) Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

All staff will be given refresher training every twelve months on the legislation relating to the sales of alcohol to underage persons and drunken persons.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Alcohol must be stored securely and in compliance with fire safety and navigation safety regulations. Proper temperature control and secure storage to prevent access by unauthorized persons or minors. Alcohol's capacities will be carefully monitored and managed. Staff will be trained in the use of fire extinguishers.

The vessel must be permanently moored by obtaining permission from Canal River Trust.co.uk and operating within UK inland waterways.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

The volume of the music audibles at the perimeter of the premises to be at the conversation level.

Premises will not sell alcohol to those who are already intoxicated.

The alcohol sold for consumption off the premises to be in sealed in containers not consumed on the boat/vessel. A member of staff shall ensure the area immediately outside the premises is free from groups gathering to drink alcohol, from litter, including cigarette butts/packets etc, periodically throughout the premises opening hours and specifically at the end of trading hours.

A sign will be placed at the entrance requesting all customers to be aware of sale of alcohol off the premises only.

No customers shall be allowed to stand and consume alcohol on the public towpath or the green area right in front of the premises and no tables or chairs will be permitted to be set up on the green area. Furthermore, it was brought to police's attention by Area Operations Manager, East – Mr Howard Clark from Canal & River Trust that any use of the towpath for commercial purposes, such as placing tables and chairs on Trust land, is wholly inappropriate. The towpath is a heavily trafficked public right of way, and such obstructions present a clear and unacceptable trip hazard to pedestrians and cyclists.

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

The premises will operate the 'Challenge 25' proof of age scheme requiring anyone who appears under 25 to show ID proving they are at least 18.

- (a) All staff will be fully trained in its operation and record of this be kept on site and made available to police or an authorised officer.
- (b) Only suitable forms of photographic identification, such as passport or UK driving licence, or a holographic marked PASS scheme cards, will be accepted and any other ID approved by the Home Office.

All training relating to the sale of alcohol and the times and conditions of the premises licence shall be documented and records kept at the premises. These records shall be made available to the Police and/or Local Authority upon request and shall be kept for at least one year.

A written record of refused sales shall be kept on the premises and completed when necessary. This record shall be made available to Police and/or the Local Authority upon request and shall be kept for at least one year from the date of the last entry.

If agreed by the applicant, we would **withdraw** our representations contingent upon that agreement. I reserve the right to provide further information to support this representation.



As Area Operations Manager for the Canal & River Trust in East London, I wish to formally object to the proposed premises licence at this location. This objection is based on serious safety concerns, the known prevalence of anti-social behaviour in the area, and the operational and regulatory issues associated with this vessel.

Safety Concerns

This application proposes the sale of alcohol in close proximity to lock infrastructure and the riverfront – both of which present inherent dangers. A significant proportion of incidents on our waterways occur around locks, which are high-risk zones. Introducing alcohol into this environment drastically increases the likelihood of accidents, including those of a fatal nature.

Furthermore, any use of the towpath for commercial purposes, such as placing tables and chairs on Trust land, is wholly inappropriate. The towpath is a heavily trafficked public right of way, and such obstructions present a clear and unacceptable trip hazard to pedestrians and cyclists.

Anti-Social Behaviour

This area already suffers from persistent issues with anti-social behaviour, particularly around Stonebridge Lock. The addition of an alcohol-licensed venue – especially one operating from a boat – will predictably exacerbate these problems. It is well established that alcohol consumption near vulnerable infrastructure contributes directly to disorder, nuisance, and increased demands on emergency services.

Unlicensed and Potentially Unsafe Craft

We understand that the vessel in question is currently unlicensed. Unlicensed boats present significant management and safety challenges for the Trust. They are disproportionately associated with poor maintenance, higher risk of sinking or fire, and typically lack adequate (or any) insurance, including public liability cover. In the event of an incident, this poses an unacceptable risk both to the public and to emergency responders.

Navigation and Mooring Regulations

Only vessels with an appropriate private or permitted mooring licence from the Trust are permitted to remain in already established locations. All others are required to move regularly in line with continuous cruising guidelines. We are currently dealing with widespread non-compliance and overstaying in this area through active enforcement. A risk assessment for one specific mooring cannot simply be applied elsewhere, and we have no confidence that the operator intends to comply with movement requirements.

In summary, this application raises multiple red flags from a safety, operational, and regulatory perspective. The Canal & River Trust strongly advises that this licence be refused.

From the Canal & River Trust's perspective, we have several concerns regarding this premises licence application:

- The applicant does not have permission to be permanently moored at this location.
- They lack the appropriate business licence and necessary insurances to operate legally on our waterways.
- Granting a premises licence could create a misleading expectation that permanent mooring is permitted, which it is not.

Additionally, we are concerned about off-sales near the water, which may lead to littering, public drinking on both Canal & River Trust and council land, and safety issues due to a lack of appropriate security measures.

We therefore recommend that this premises licence be declined.

As previously mentioned, the Canal and River Trust would be happy to join a call to discuss this further and supply further information about how commercial vessels should operate on our waterways.

On 20th June, I visited the named premises regarding the above application. Following the inspection, we have identified the following:

- **Public Safety:** There is a significant safety concern regarding the gap between the vessel and the edge of the footpath where the vessel is moored. This is the area where customers are expected to place their orders (please see the attached photo).
- **CCTV Cameras:** The submitted plan does not include any CCTV cameras. There are no CCTV cameras covering the area where customers will interact with staff at the front of the vessel.

In addition, there are further concerns regarding the operational and regulatory issues associated with using such a vessel as a licensed premises. We believe the applicant must obtain all necessary licenses from the relevant authorities to meet the requirements for using the vessel as a licensed premises.

Furthermore, we have received an objection from the Canal & River Trust. Their representation highlights several issues, including safety concerns, the potential rise in anti-social behaviour in the area, and operational and regulatory issues associated with this vessel.

Given these concerns, we recommend the refusal of the above application until further notice.

The applicant must resolve the issues mentioned above, particularly the concerns raised by the Canal & River Trust, before applying again.

Thank you for your email and for taking the time to provide additional context.

To clarify your query, if your intention is to operate as a roving trader, then you would need to apply for a roving trader licence with the Canal & River Trust. If you also wish to serve alcohol, you would then require a premises licence from each local authority for each individual location where you plan to trade. This is a key constraint of trading in this way, as alcohol licences are location-specific, and boats must be at a fixed, licensed point to sell alcohol legally.

This presents a significant practical challenge. As you're aware, our network already has limited opportunities mooring, due to the number of vessels in this area, particularly for boats moving every 14 days as required by roving trader terms. It is not feasible to secure over 20 individual alcohol licences at different locations along the canal network, nor to guarantee that the boat would be in a precise spot each time – as an alcohol licence requires.

For these reasons, we cannot support this application as a roving trader selling alcohol. From our perspective, the only viable model for your proposed use would be as a fixed location trade boat, where the vessel remains moored at a designated and approved business mooring with all necessary permissions in place.

Unfortunately, we currently do not have any available moorings suitable for this type of operation.

I appreciate this may not be the answer you were hoping for, but I want to make sure you have all the relevant information before committing further time or money to the vessel. Please let me know if you'd like to discuss any other potential options.

Thank you for your recent email and for taking the time to outline your position regarding your application for a premises licence.

However, I must clarify that several of the points raised in your message do not accurately reflect the Canal & River Trust's position or previous communications. At no point have we advised that you should obtain an alcohol licence before securing the necessary permissions from the Trust. Our position has always been that no form of trading activity may take place on our waterways without a valid Canal & River Trust boat licence, an approved operating proposal, and, where relevant, permission to trade from land managed by the Trust.

Importantly, your business has been operating without **any** Canal & River Trust licence in place – we have screen shots of the vessel selling alcohol and this being advertised via social media – not just for set up as per your latest email. Your previous leisure licence was declined due to lack of movement, and our Licensing Support Team wrote to advise that we would be unable to offer a further licence unless a valid home mooring was secured. Without this, the vessel was no longer eligible to licence as a continuous cruiser. As such, your

business licence to become a Roving Trader could not be considered and was therefore declined.

We understand that you have now secured a mooring at Stonebridge South. While this enables you to apply for a leisure licence, it does not permit commercial activity. Your alcohol licence application refers not to your mooring but to a specific location along the towpath near Lock 17 – this area is for public use and is not able to be reserved. This area is also not a defined business mooring, and I would be unable to allow you to trade permanently from this area. While in your email you have identified that other traders have operated from this area they do so on a Roving Trader bases – moving every 14 days along our network and not serving alcohol - [Roving Trader Licence](#). Thanks for highlighting the use of tables and chairs by other operators we will review internally. You have submitted an alcohol licence for you to permanently be based from this area which again would not be approved.

Moving the vessel from Stonebridge South mooring to the towpath for the purpose of trading is also not acceptable under the Trust's policies or licence terms.

The Canal and River Trust would be unable to support a permanent business mooring at this location.

Thank you for the email.

I am not in agreement with your summary. The Council had to issue you with a warning due to you selling alcohol without a license.

You cannot say "from the outset you committed to work collaboratively" as you were doing something that you knew to be illegal without the correct authorisation.

There are various concerns with the application and I am seeking a legal steer in readiness for the application being placed before the Licensing Sub Committee for determination.

The sales of alcohol takes place outside of the boat itself as the customer is on the towpath. This brings into question street trading considerations.

A Pavement Licence

A boat cannot apply for a pavement licence for a towpath. Pavement licences are specifically for businesses to place furniture on public footpaths for the purpose of serving or selling food and drink. Towpaths, while sometimes used by pedestrians, are primarily for canal or river access and are not considered highways for the purposes of pavement licensing regulations.

Baltic Sea Food is of no interest with regard to your application. It is not within Haringey.

The application will be taken to a Licensing Sub-Committee, you will be advised of the details.

I hope you're both well.

Thank you for your message and for forwarding the Canal & River Trust's formal objection. I'd like to take this opportunity to respond and clarify our current position.

We initially applied for a business boat licence and were advised that a premises licence would be required before the application could proceed. Based on this guidance, we began engaging with our local council to understand the necessary steps.

Since then, we've had two very positive meetings—one with PC Andrea and another with Licensing Manager Amir. During our discussion with PC Andrea, she raised valid concerns regarding anti-social behaviour in the area. I proactively suggested installing CCTV, which she welcomed. She also noted that our presence on Hale Wharf Bridge could act as a deterrent and have a positive impact on the surrounding area.

With this in mind, it is both disappointing and somewhat unfair that anti-social behaviour has been cited in the formal objection. From the outset, we have committed to working collaboratively with the police and licensing authorities to support community safety.

The matter of not yet holding a river licence has also been raised. However, this presents a clear catch-22. As CRT were aware, the Canal & River Trust required us to have a home mooring in place before a river licence can be issued. Despite the limited availability of moorings in the area, I'm pleased to confirm that we successfully secured a mooring at Stonebridge South today. Once this is reflected on the system, we will proceed immediately with the river licence. We are actively engaging with the process and taking all necessary

steps to comply. Please also note that the boat has a valid BSS certificate (until October 2027) and is fully insured.

We had arranged to meet Amir on 27th June following a very constructive initial conversation and were looking forward to demonstrating the measures we've implemented based on his advice, including:

1. CCTV installation
2. Required signage (Challenge 25, CCTV in operation, and private signage to the rear)
3. A physical barrier and controlled access to prevent customers from placing a foot between the towpath and the boat counter

All of these are now in place, and photos are attached for reference. We were disappointed to receive his objection by email prior to this meeting, especially given the positive and solution-focused nature of our earlier discussions.

Regarding the tables and chairs licence: Amir advised us of the need to apply, and I followed up by email. The response from Daliah mentioned an objection from a land-owning organisation. I was surprised to read Howard's comment that such use is "wholly inappropriate"—particularly considering that the Baltic Sea Fish Boat has been granted similar permissions for comparable activity in the same location. Our proposed set-up would not obstruct public access, and customers would remain seated in a clearly designated area. We are committed to maintaining a clean and safe environment—indeed, we would leave the space cleaner than we found it, which unfortunately has not always been the case during recent boat rides for local schoolchildren Ferry Lane Primary, as shown in the attached photos from 28th June.

As responsible licence holders and local business owners, we are deeply committed to the Tottenham Hale area. Far from encouraging anti-social behaviour, we are fostering a safe, well-managed environment that contributes to the area's vibrancy and regeneration. As experienced boaters, we fully understand the risks associated with alcohol near locks and would not allow or encourage that behaviour. Again, our presence would serve as a preventative measure, not a risk.

It is frustrating to feel penalised despite our ongoing, constructive engagement with your teams. We hold full public liability insurance, and I am a qualified personal licence holder with a strong track record of responsible business management.

I would also like to confirm that we have a refusal book in place to comply with the trading standards condition for the protection of children from harm.

In light of all this, I kindly ask that you reconsider the objection. I would welcome the opportunity to meet—either online or in person—to discuss any outstanding concerns and demonstrate our full compliance.

As requested, I am again including the newspaper publication notice from Haringey Press.

As Area Operations Manager for the Canal & River Trust in East London, I wish to formally object to the proposed premises licence at this location. This objection is based on serious safety concerns, the known prevalence of anti-social behaviour in the area, and the operational and regulatory issues associated with this vessel.

Safety Concerns

This application proposes the sale of alcohol in close proximity to lock infrastructure and the riverfront – both of which present inherent dangers. A significant proportion of incidents on our waterways occur around locks, which are high-risk zones. Introducing alcohol into this environment drastically increases the likelihood of accidents, including those of a fatal nature.

Furthermore, any use of the towpath for commercial purposes, such as placing tables and chairs on Trust land, is wholly inappropriate. The towpath is a heavily trafficked public right of way, and such obstructions present a clear and unacceptable trip hazard to pedestrians and cyclists.

Anti-Social Behaviour

This area already suffers from persistent issues with anti-social behaviour, particularly around Stonebridge Lock. The addition of an alcohol-licensed venue – especially one operating from a boat – will predictably exacerbate these problems. It is well established that alcohol consumption near vulnerable infrastructure contributes directly to disorder, nuisance, and increased demands on emergency services.

Unlicensed and Potentially Unsafe Craft

We understand that the vessel in question is currently unlicensed. Unlicensed boats present significant management and safety challenges for the Trust. They are disproportionately

associated with poor maintenance, higher risk of sinking or fire, and typically lack adequate (or any) insurance, including public liability cover. In the event of an incident, this poses an unacceptable risk both to the public and to emergency responders.

Navigation and Mooring Regulations

Only vessels with an appropriate private or permitted mooring licence from the Trust are permitted to remain in already established locations. All others are required to move regularly in line with continuous cruising guidelines. We are currently dealing with widespread non-compliance and overstaying in this area through active enforcement. A risk assessment for one specific mooring cannot simply be applied elsewhere, and we have no confidence that the operator intends to comply with movement requirements.

In summary, this application raises multiple red flags from a safety, operational, and regulatory perspective. The Canal & River Trust strongly advises that this licence be refused.
