1. **Describe the issue under consideration.**

1.1 The application is submitted by FT FOODS LTD, to increase the hours for Late Night Refreshment to the following: (copy of the application is at App A)

1.2 **The application seeks the following:**

**Late Night Refreshment**  
**Monday to Sunday** **2300 to 0400 hours**

**Hours open to Public**  
**Monday to Sunday** **1000 to 0400 hours**

1.5 **Recommendation**

In considering the representations received and what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, the steps the Sub-Committee can take are:

- Grant the application as requested
- Grant the application whilst imposing additional conditions and/or altering in any way the proposed operating schedule.
- Exclude any licensable activities to which the application relates.
- Reject the whole or part of the application.

Members of the licensing sub committee are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

**2 Background**

2.1 The premises is located along a parade of shops in High Road Tottenham N17. The initial licence was granted in July 2022, a copy of the PL is attached at App 1A. The area is busy with multiple late evening food establishments and associated anti-social behaviour and street drinking. There is a representation from the Met Police outstanding. There is also a representation from a similar business raising concerns relating to the prevention of crime and disorder objective.

**3 Licensing Policy**

3.1 The committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of

licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

- 3.2 The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of licensable activities whilst promoting and upholding the licensing objectives the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.
- 3.3 In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.
- 3.4 Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions regarding noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 3.5 This Licensing Authority in determining what action to take will seek to establish the cause of concern and any action taken will be directed at these causes. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 3.6 Also the Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of the hearing that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Therefore, conditions may not be imposed for the purpose other than promoting the licensing objectives and in some cases no additional conditions will be required.
- 3.7 In cases Members should make their decisions on the civil burden of proof, that is the balance of probability.
- 3.8 Members should consider in all cases whether or not primary legislation is the appropriate method of regulation and should only consider licence conditions when the circumstances in their view are not already adequately covered elsewhere.
- 3.9 The Government has advised that conditions must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned. Conditions cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff.  
The Councils Licensing policy expects applicants to address the licensing objectives and discuss how to do this with the relevant responsible authorities.

## 4 Licensing hours

- 4.1 Where relevant representations are made, the Council will consider the proposed

hours on their individual merits. Notwithstanding this, the Council may require stricter conditions in areas that have denser residential accommodation to prevent public nuisance. The Council will endeavour to work with all parties concerned in such instances to ensure that adequate conditions are in place. The Council may restrict the hours that certain premises can offer alcohol for sale for consumption off the premises for preventing crime, disorder and nuisance.

## 5 Powers of a Licensing Authority

- 5.1 The decision should be made about the Secretary of the State's guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Were the decision departs from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal / challenge is increased.
- 5.2 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21-day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

## 6 Other considerations

**Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998** states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can prevent crime and disorder in its area".

### 6.1 Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 – Right to respect for private and family life.
- Article 1 of the First Protocol – Protection of Property
- Article 6(1) – Right to a fair hearing.

The Premises Licence Holder recognises that by extending the opening hours at the restaurant to allow for the sale of hot food and drinks, it has a duty to promote the Licensing Objectives. The systems that are in place are robust, thorough and will, as far as reasonably practicable, secure the promotion of the four licensing objectives.

No alcohol is served at this restaurant.

The Premises Licence Holder will work in partnership with all responsible authorities to ensure the promotion of the four licensing objectives and engage with the local communities to promote a successful relationship between its business operations and its neighbours.

The Premises Licence Holder is part of a group of companies which operates 42 KFC restaurants and which has been operating restaurants for over 30 years. None of the group of companies has been subject to revocation or review proceedings in respect of the Premises Licences and all are of good repute.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

The Premises Licence Holder is keen to work in partnership with the local police service to prevent crime and disorder.

CCTV

The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV System.

All entry and exit points shall be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition.

The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises.

All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stampings. Viewing of recordings shall be made available upon request of the Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period, subject to the general Data Protection Regulation and current Data Protection requirements.

Incident Log

An incident log shall be kept on the premises and made available on request to an authorised officer of the council, or the police which will record the following:-

- All crimes reported to the venue
- All ejections of patrons
- Any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
- Any incidents of disorder

- All seizures of drugs or offensive weapons Any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment
- Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service

Security System

A security system with both audio and visual monitoring capability is installed in the restaurant which can be activated by mobile panic buttons. Once activated the system links the restaurant to an external monitoring centre capable of intervening to resolve crime and disorder issues and/or provide the appropriate advice or instruction to support and protect the restaurant's staff and customers. All staff are trained to use this system.

At this restaurant all staff have safety and security training and Conflict Management Training which includes handling those under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Incidents are recorded on an on-line incident record form which is accessible to every manager and store leader.

Door Staff

The need for door staff is risk assessed, and if the assessment indicates that door staff are a suitable control measure, registered SIA door staff will be on duty as required.

c) Public safety

The Premises Licence Holder is keen to work in partnership with the Responsible Authorities to promote public safety.

The Premises Licence Holder has safety systems in place to protect the safety of customers and staff at all times. It complies, as far as reasonably practicable, with relevant Health and Safety, Food Safety and Fire Safety Legislation.

All staff receive comprehensive safety training to ensure that safe working methods are maintained including training on the evacuation procedure in the event of a fire or other dangerous occurrence.

The Premises Licence Holder operates a "No Open Alcohol Containers" policy to prevent persons carrying open alcohol into the in-store area. No glass is allowed on the premises.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

Litter

The Premises Licence Holder carries out litter patrols collecting both KFC's packaging and any other litter that has been carelessly discarded. It is happy to act on recommendations from the Environmental Health Officer on the extent of the patrol, as far as this is reasonably practicable.

A litter check is carried out by Team members and/or /Team leaders outside the restaurant every 30 minutes. The amount of waste in the area is assessed and if required, a litter patrol takes place.

All KFC packaging is branded. Further details regarding KFC's commitment to reducing waste and litter nuisance can be found on the KFC website [KFC | Behind the Bucket - Litter](#)

Noise

Where it is practical to do so, the Premises Licence Holder puts measures in place to limit noise. The doors are self-closing and music is played at low volume. Signage is displayed at the restaurant asking customers to leave the premises quietly.

Dispersal

Orders for food stops 15 minutes before closing and customers are reminded of the closing time. If necessary, staff will

encourage customers to leave.

#### Delivery Drivers

The restaurant uses third party delivery drivers who are reminded not to make too much noise or otherwise cause a nuisance. The delivery company is notified of any concerns with the drivers.

Delivery drivers are encouraged to wait inside the premises. If they are in their vehicles, they are asked to turn their engine off, the music down, park considerately, and to have respect for our neighbours. We do this by communicating with the drivers and the delivery companies.

Delivery drivers usually wait inside the store to collect the orders they are picking up. A couple of tables are generally set aside for the drivers to sit and wait and they are offered drinks and the toilet facilities whilst they wait.

#### e) The protection of children from harm

The Premises Licence Holder does not permit unaccompanied children under the age of 16 at any time. It does, however, take the safety of children and vulnerable adults very seriously and will ensure that they are protected from harm at all times when visiting the restaurant. KFC has a policy on Safeguarding and Modern Slavery.

All management will be trained regarding safeguarding issues.

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.

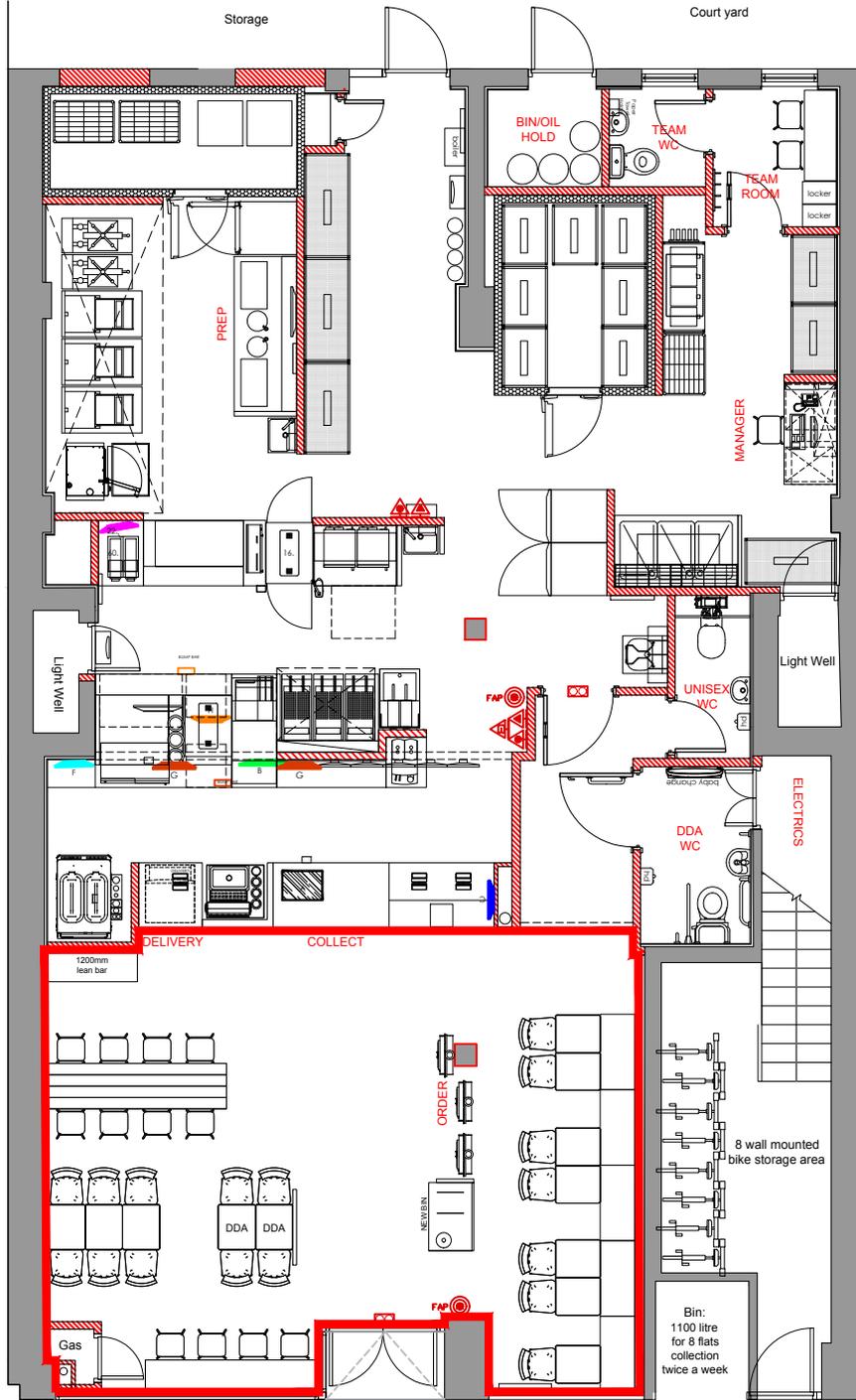

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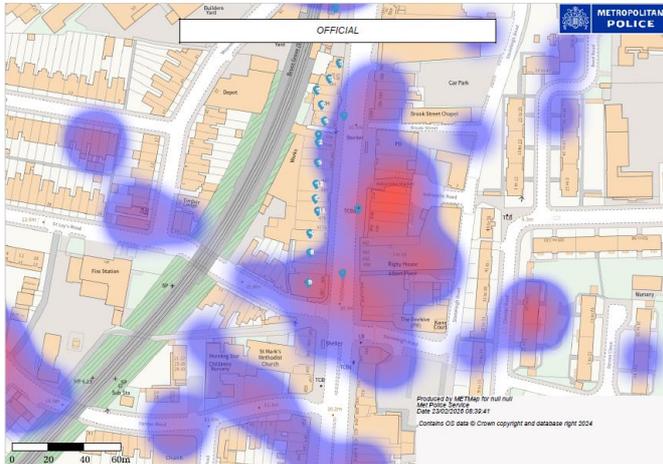
# Appendix B

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The premises is already well known to the local ward team for issues relating to drug dealing and ASB. One of Tottenham Central’s current ward priorities is “Reduce drug supply and ASB on High Road Tottenham around KFC”. The ward Sergeant, Sergeant Qureshi, has written a statement with his rational for objecting to an extension in hours, along with police action taken to tackle issues within this area. ( Annex 1).

The area in the immediate vicinity has previously presented as a Police hotspot for Drug offences and Violence against the person from the start of February 2025 - February 2026.

The proposed extension of hours raises significant concerns regarding the impact on the local community. Residents and businesses within the area already experience issues associated with late-night activity, including noise, congregation of individuals, street drinking, and drug-related behaviour. Extending operating hours until 04:00 every day would likely exacerbate these issues, adversely affecting the quality of life for residents.

The application has failed to propose measures to mitigate the ongoing problems associated with the premises or the surrounding area. One proposed condition states ***“The need for door staff is risk assessed, and if the assessment indicates that door staff are a suitable control measure, registered SIA door staff will be on duty as required”***. Police consider this condition to be inadequate, as it is vague, subjective, and unenforceable. It provides no clear criteria for when door staff would be required, no minimum staffing levels, and no specified hours. As such, it offers little assurance that appropriate controls would be in place during the proposed hours when crime and ASB are most likely prevalent.

Police have contacted the applicant’s agent on two occasions to explore the possibility of negotiating reduced hours, as of 26/02/2026 there has been no update.

Police suggest the use of TENS if the applicant wishes to extend their hours for an occasion. However, if the premises were to do this Police would be seeking actions from the premises to negate crime and ASB

For the reasons outlined above, Police object to the application as it currently stands. I reserve the right to submit further information in support of this Representation.

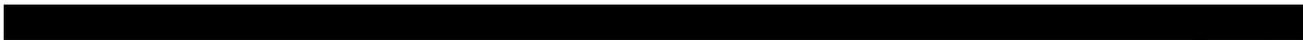
This statement relates to a request made by representatives of Kentucky Fried Chicken 468 High Road, London N17 6QA to extend their opening hours to 4am Monday to Sunday. I will seek to explain my position as a representative of the Metropolitan Police Service and make representations opposing the application.

My name is Briece Qureshi, and I am Police Sergeant for the Metropolitan Police Service. I am currently based at Tottenham Police Station as the ward Sergeant on Tottenham Central Safer Neighbourhood Team. I have worked in the Metropolitan Police Service for almost 22 years in various roles.

**About the ward**

The geographic area of Tottenham Central encompasses High Road N15/N17 and the KFC. It is considered a high harm ward, which means there are disproportionately high levels of violent crime often requiring increased, targeted, and data driven resources. It necessitates extra police staff and police officers, to deal with the added demand. The resourcing for the ward is 5 Police Officers and 4 Police Community Support Officers. These are aspirational figures; however, we are currently at 50% strength to service the local community.

Tottenham Central is ethnically mixed and culturally varied, with multiple communities living side by side. This is also reflected in their beliefs and values. Policing this environment is challenging, as we try and meet the needs of all that inhabit it. Any decisions that have a direct effect on these communities, must be considered.

**Rationale for rejecting the proposal**

I have carefully reviewed the application and representations made by the applicant, which provides a compelling case for the extension. Since becoming the ward Sergeant in Haringey, the high road has been a divisive issue, specifically in and around KFC restaurant. With its popularity, eat-in service and position on the high road. The venue and environs became a hub of drug supply/use and Anti-Social Behaviour. This affected other retailers operating nearby and we received regular complaints about these issues.

Traffickers were hiding drugs in the restaurant and using the window as a cover, to monitor law enforcement. In recent times this had somewhat diminished due to a surge of proactive policing in the area, arresting several prominent members of this organised crime network during the summer months. I have conducted research using police indices to support the summary provided above and provide a better understanding of what we as a police service face. If this application were granted, I envisage an increase in Anti-Social Behaviour, drug use/supply, noise nuisance, street drinking, a negative impact on local businesses and criminal damage.

**Three key points**

- 1. Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Extending hours is likely to facilitate further opportunities for criminal exploitation of young people and violence. It is also likely to have a negative effect on the local community through ASB.

- 2. Prevention of Public Nuisance

Alongside diners, KFC also attracted unsavoury characters who were not using the services for its intended purpose.

The behaviour of those frequenting the venue for criminality created an intimidating environment and making women and young girls feel unsafe, which is contrary to the aims of reducing Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) – a priority for both the Home Office and the Metropolitan Police. Noise nuisance, loitering and people blocking the public highway were always an issue outside the venue.

3. Public Safety

During extended hours there is an increased risk of assaults and vulnerability among residents, placing additional strain on emergency services. Some of the drug traffickers were also young people susceptible to exploitation. Weapons were both stored locally for easy access and carried freely.

The situation on the high road reached the stage where I had to put in place a Proactive Management Plan under the Operation name 'Comeback'. Together with specialist crime we spent several months building intelligence, increasing patrols and targeting individuals in a bid to reduce criminality. Residents and shop owners have expressed gratitude for the work we have done, and I believe we have won peoples trust and confidence. I believe it would be an error of judgement to allow KFC to open its doors until the early hours of the morning and would have a direct effect on public safety.

I have compiled a list of reports, intelligence and calls which have been redacted and can be provided if required

There also many other food shops, such as kebab shops, which are open in these same hours. Therefore, the extension of KFC's opening hours would only create a hot-spot for further public nuisance and loitering, which can be detrimental to other local businesses on the High Road.

Additionally, this could lead to a hot-spot for children to loiter at night and become an area involved in crime and disorder, such as drug dealing, causing further nuisance.

Moreover, this extension would lead to greater noise pollution in this area and Haringey does not need this. There would be further rubbish and disturbance to the local residents from the potential hot spot this area would become if the hours are to be extended.

I also strongly believe that FT Foods Limited should be investigated to assess for any past issues with other locations or any past breaches of licensing. Under their existing planning permission, they are currently allowed to operate until 10:30/11pm and this is how they should remain.

1. **Describe the issue under consideration.**

1.1 The application is submitted by LA FOODS UK LTD. TABREZ HUSSAIN is put forward as the designated Premises Supervisor. to permit the following: (copy of the application is at App A)

**Sale of Alcohol**  
**Monday to Sunday** **0700 to 2300 hours**

In considering the representations received and what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, the steps the Sub-Committee can take are:

- Grant the application as requested
- Grant the application whilst imposing additional conditions and/or altering in any way the proposed operating schedule.
- Exclude any licensable activities to which the application relates.
- Reject the whole or part of the application.

Members of the licensing sub committee are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

2 **Background**

2.1 The premises is located within the Broadwater Farm Estate a fully residential estate with a separate community centre. The Public Health representation remains outstanding.

3 **Licensing Policy**

3.1 The committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the

control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

- 3.2 The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of licensable activities whilst promoting and upholding the licensing objectives the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.
- 3.3 In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.
- 3.4 Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions regarding noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 3.5 This Licensing Authority in determining what action to take will seek to establish the cause of concern and any action taken will be directed at these causes. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.
- 3.6 Also the Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of the hearing that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. Therefore, conditions may not be imposed for the purpose other than promoting the licensing objectives and in some cases no additional conditions will be required.
- 3.7 In cases Members should make their decisions on the civil burden of proof, that is the balance of probability.
- 3.8 Members should consider in all cases whether or not primary legislation is the appropriate method of regulation and should only consider licence conditions when the circumstances in their view are not already adequately covered elsewhere.
- 3.9 The Government has advised that conditions must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned. Conditions cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff.  
The Councils Licensing policy expects applicants to address the licensing objectives and discuss how to do this with the relevant responsible authorities.

## 4 Licensing hours

- 4.1 Where relevant representations are made, the Council will consider the proposed hours on their individual merits. Notwithstanding this, the Council may require stricter conditions in areas that have denser residential accommodation to prevent public nuisance. The Council will endeavour to work with all parties

concerned in such instances to ensure that adequate conditions are in place. The Council may restrict the hours that certain premises can offer alcohol for sale for consumption off the premises for preventing crime, disorder and nuisance.

## 5 Powers of a Licensing Authority

- 5.1 The decision should be made about the Secretary of the State's guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Were the decision departs from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal / challenge is increased.
- 5.2 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21-day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

## 6 Other considerations

3. The Premises Licence Holder shall install and operate a CCTV system at the premises, capable of providing coverage of all entry points and areas to which customers have access in any lighting conditions.

4. The CCTV system shall continuously record whilst the premises are open to members of the public and shall be capable of providing clear images and frontal identification of customers.

5. All CCTV recordings shall be retained for a minimum of 28 days and shall be correctly date- & time-stamped; sufficient data storage shall be available to facilitate this.

6. CCTV recordings shall be made available within forty-eight (48) hours upon receipt of a request by the Police and / or an Authorised Officer of the Licensing Authority (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003), and recordings provided in an easily downloadable format.

7. A member of staff shall be present on the premises whilst they are open who is capable of operating the CCTV system and able to facilitate viewing of CCTV footage upon the demand by the Police and / or an Authorised Officer of the Licensing Authority (as defined by Section 13, Licensing Act 2003) in accordance with the provisions of the DPA.

8. Any retention, use, production to third parties or disclosure of personal information captured on CCTV must be carried out in line with data protection principles which shall override any conflicting element of these conditions.

c) Public safety

9. An incident register will be maintained at the premises and made available to a police officer, or any officer authorised under the Licensing Act 2003.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

10. A refusals register will be maintained at the premises in either written or electronic format. All staff will ensure it is completed whenever a sale is refused to a customer.

- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
  - evidence of the applicant's own identity – such as a passport,
  - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member – e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
  - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
    - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
    - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,

- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
  - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
  - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
  - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and

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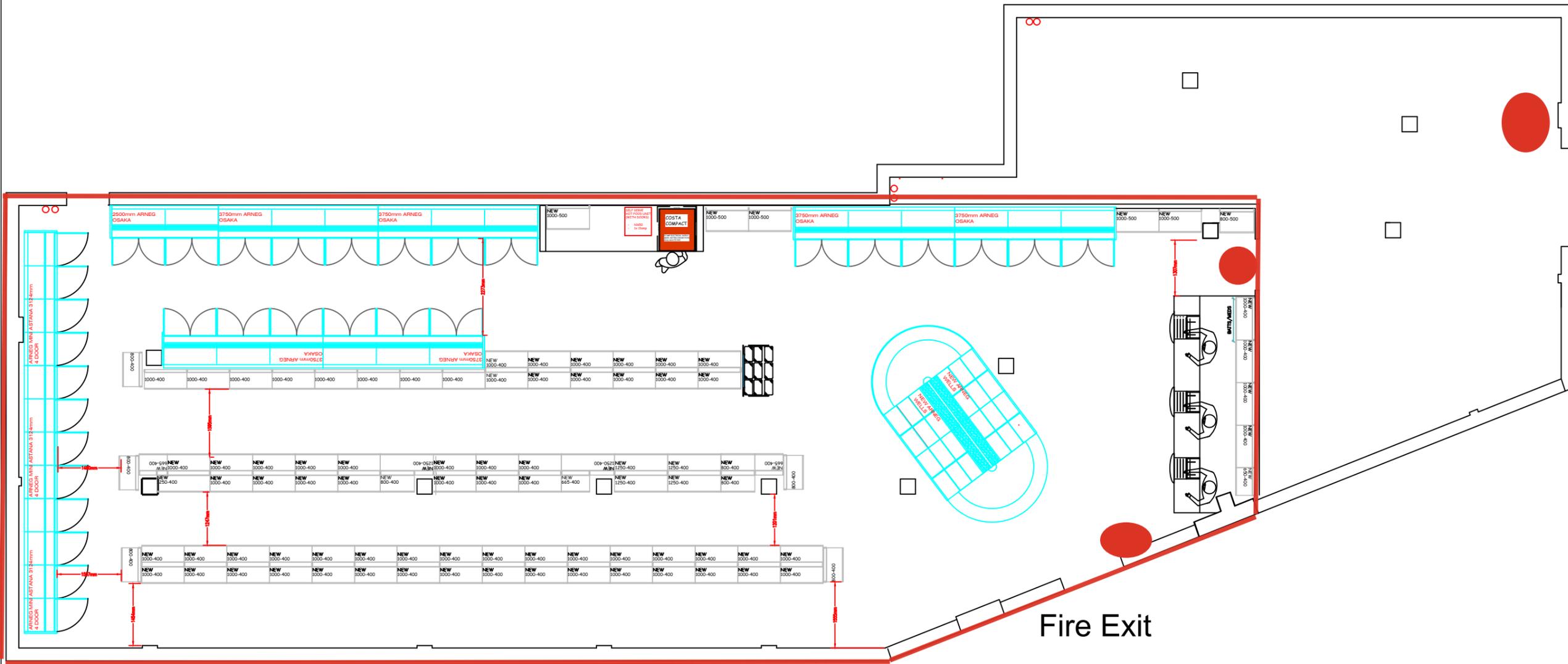

## Local Context

The premises is located in Broadwater Farm Estate, within the West Green ward. The premises is located in a vulnerable location with a significant make-up of residential properties, educational institutes, care homes, sheltered housing and substance misuse services.

### a. Overview of the Local Population

The premises is located within West Green, which has an estimated population of 14,895 residents. The area has a mixed make-up of children and young people (19%), working aged groups (69.5%), and those aged 65+ (11.4%).

West Green ward is an ethnically diverse ward, with 49.3% of the population identifying as an ethnic minority. Broadwater Farm is known for being one of the most ethnically diverse places in London<sup>1</sup>.

The area surrounding the premises includes Broadwater Farm and is located in N17 directly East of Lordship Recreation Ground. It comprises 1063 homes across 12 blocks and 27 low rise houses. The twelve blocks are made up from two towers (19 storeys), nine medium rise blocks (six and four storey) and one ziggurat (seven storeys). The vast majority of homes are either one bed or two bed (916 homes or 86%) with 113 three bed and 14 four bed homes<sup>1</sup>.

### b. Deprivation and Relevant Alcohol Local Health Risks

This LSOA (Haringey 013A) is ranked in the **top 7% most deprived nationally** according to the **Index of Multiple Deprivation**, and in Haringey, 90% of other LSOAs are less deprived than Haringey 013A<sup>2</sup>.

The rates of **alcohol related harm in West Green ward**, include:

- 35 alcohol related hospital admissions in 2024/25
- 3 ambulance callouts for alcohol related incidents related incidents<sup>3</sup>

Evidence consistently shows that alcohol harms are **more concentrated in deprived communities**, even when consumption is similar. Haringey experiences some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London and the harm due to alcohol is a growing concern. Haringey performs consistently poorer than the England average against a range of alcohol related indicators. Of particular concern, Haringey (23.5%) performs markedly below the England average (34.6%%) and ranks as the second-worst London borough in rates of successful completion of alcohol treatment<sup>4</sup>. The ratio of Alcohol Specific Hospital Admissions in the West Green ward, while higher than the national and regional average, is lower than the Haringey average<sup>3</sup>.

Tackling alcohol misuse is key to achieving the outcomes in Haringey's Health and Wellbeing Strategy: giving every child the best start in life, reducing the gap in life expectancy between the east and west of the borough and improving mental health and wellbeing.

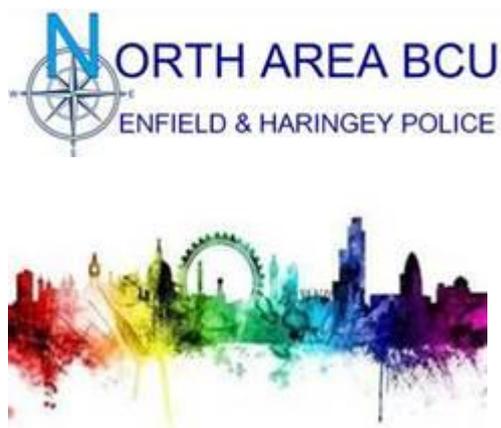

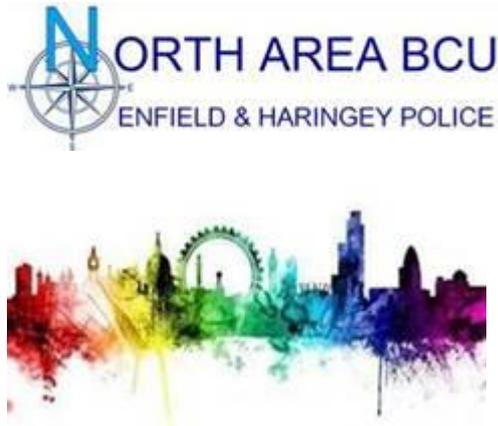
