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4. REPORT

Background

The premises licence was granted to a Mr Arben Neza in November 2005 to allow Provision of Late Night Refreshment and the Supply of Alcohol until 0230 hours Monday to Sunday. Mr Neza was granted a variation to his licence in October 2006 to allow him to have Regulated Entertainment on the premises. In September 2007 the Premises Licence was transferred to a Mr Omar Herso Wadar. Mr Wadar then applied to vary the Premises Licence to remove the sale of alcohol in October 2007 and this was granted. In August 2009 Mr Wadar varied the licence again to put the Supply of Alcohol back on the licence, with a Mrs Kayowa Kabeya acting as Designated Premises Supervisor. In January 2010 the licence was transferred to Mrs Kabeya.

"It is the intention of the Police to offer a balanced and fair perspective and to present all of the issues receiving Police interest since the middle of 2009. Police have dealt with over 60 incidents at these premises ranging from serious assaults and rowdy behaviour. See CRIS reports and CAD reports. The Blue Bar is a club which attracts a predominantly black clientele from the Congolese community. The Designated Premises Supervisor, Ms K Kabeva, appears not to take her responsibilities seriously and does not have any control over her clientele or Security Staff. On the 19th July she attended a police Station and I reminded her of her responsibilities and we tried to find ways of dealing with the problems at the club. It would appear that she did not heed my warnings and the assaults and rowdy behaviour continued. Local Authority CCTV and Police covert cameras have detected large scale disturbances outside the club in the early hours of the morning. It would appear from the CCTV that the club's management fails to comply to its trading hours and most of its Premises Licence conditions. The Police Clubs and Vice branch have attended the premises to discover that the door staff are not registered with the Security Industry Authority. I feel that all of the above highlight that this premises is having a disproportionate effect on the Policing of Haringey Borough. I believe that this must be seen as an opportunity to examine in detail the matters that have occurred based on the principles of the licensing objectives. I believe a full review of the licence will ensure the appropriate weight is given to the evidence included in this application and will allow the licensing committee to consider the options available to them. I also reserve the right to rely on further incidents of crime and disorder or breaches of licensing objectives that take place between now and the hearing."

6.0 POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

6.1 The following provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 apply to this application: Section 51-53 (review of premises licenses)

In determining the application the Licensing Sub Committee can take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, which are:

- 1. Take no further action
- 2. modify the conditions of the license
- 3. exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the license
- 4. remove the designated premises supervisor
- 5. suspend the license for a period not exceeding three months
- 6. revoke the license.

Where the Licensing Sub Committee takes steps mentioned in 3 or 4 it may provide that the modification or exclusion is to have effect for one such period (not exceeding

three months) as it may specify. The Licensing Sub Committee is asked to give full reasons for its decision.

The Licensing Sub Committee must make its decision within 5 working days of the end of the hearing. Any decision of the Licensing Sub Committee is stayed from coming into effect for 21 days from the date of the decision, pending any appeal that might be made and the determination of that appeal. Any party to the proceedings may appeal against the decision of the Licensing Sub Committee.

- 6.2 The following provisions of the Secretary of State's guidance apply to this application: Paras 11.1 11.10, 11.14 11.21. These provisions are attached at Appendix 2.
- 6.3 The following paragraphs of the licensing authority's Statement Of Licensing Policy apply to this application; 24.1 -24.2, 25.1 25.7, these provisions are attached at Appendix 3.
- 6.4 The Licensing Sub Committee is reminded that the Human Rights Act 1998 guarantees the right to a fair hearing for all parties in the determination of their civil rights. (2) Supply of alcohol: No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-

(a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or

(b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

(3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Door supervision

At specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity and each of these individuals must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

Premises to report any suspicious or illegal activities

Premises will have security employees who will man the doors and patrol the bar area.

The security team will check customers for drugs and weapons upon entering the premises and will not hesitate to call the relevant authorities.

The licensee will fix 6 CCTV cameras at the premises: 3 outside, 1 on the first floor and 2 on the ground floor.

The premises will be locked at night and closed.

Premises will have sufficient lighting inside and outside.

All excess stock and cash will be kept in the safe and premises will have 3 storages.

Policy is to be in place and posters will be in place at the premises to prevent alcohol and drug use.

Door supervisors will be used at all times when licensable activity is being carried out.

Persons suspected of carrying weaponry or illegal drugs will be searched and excluded from the premises.

An orderly queue will be maintained outside the venue.

Conditions as agreed with Metropolitan Police:

On Tottenham Hotspur Football Club Match Days:

- 1. Premises not to open for the sale of alcohol before 11.00 on Saturday and Sunday.
- 2. All drinks dispensed from the bar are poured into plastic containers—4 hours before the scheduled kick off time until 1 hour after the end of the match.
- 3. No glass bottles are sold over the bar—4 hours before the scheduled kick off time until 1 hour after the end of the match.
- 4. A minimum of two Door Staff who have been approved by the Security Industry Authority to be employed on the premises to control the entry and exit of customers—4 hours before the scheduled kick off time until 1 hour after the end of the match.

A digital CCTV is to be installed and made available to Police on demand. Copies are to be kept for 30 days.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Premises will adhere to all Health and Safety regulations

Fire exits will be checked on a regular basis.

Premises will have a full fire alarm and sprinkler system and illuminated exit signs.

There will be 4 fire extinguishers at the premises.

There will be a smoke detector, fire alarm, fire exit, heat detector and call point at the premises.

Premises will comply with all statutory fire and safety controls and will hold a fire certificate.

There will be a heat detector ventilation control and extractor fans will be in place.

All incidents will be reported.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Clear and visible notices will be displayed on the premises advising that CCTV has been installed and is being used on the premises.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Premises will not serve those who are intoxicated.

A 30-minute "drinking up" time will be implemented.

Customers will be asked to leave the premises quietly and the relevant signage will be displayed.

The premises will not play any loud music which may cause nuisance to the public.

No activities will take place at the premises which may cause noises or sounds to emanate from the premises.

Rubbish bins and refuse will be kept at the rear of the premises.

Bins will be provided for customer use.

Doors and windows will be kept closed (except for access and egress) to reduce noise nuisance from the premises.

During final hour of opening the music will be played at a lower volume than previously.

Conditions agreed with The Noise Team:

Operating hours

That the premises closes no later than 02:00 on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday; that the premises closes no later than 03:00 on Wednesday and Sunday; and not later than 05:00 on Friday and Saturday.

That regulated entertainment ceases 30 minutes before closing times in order to minimise noise breakouts as the premises empties.

Prevention of nuisance from noise/vibration

All doors and windows will remain closed during the regulated entertainment licensed activities or in any event after 11pm. The entrance door will be fitted with a self-closing device and staff required to ensure that it is not propped open. A member of staff shall be made responsible to ensure the door is opened for as brief a period as possible. Where necessary adequate and suitable mechanical ventilation should be provided to public areas

Entry to the premises will be restricted to a particular entrance whilst the premises is being used for regulated entertainment licensed activity

Entrance/exit from the premises whilst regulated entertainment licensable activities are ongoing shall be via a lobbied door to minimise noise breakout.

The regulated entertainment licensable activity shall conclude 30 minutes before the premises is due to close to prevent excessive noise breakout as the premises empties

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Structure borne noise

All speakers are mounted on anti-vibration mountings to prevent vibration transmission of sound energy to adjoining properties

Sound limits

The licensee shall ensure that no music played in the licensed premises is audible at or within the site boundary of any residential property

All regulated entertainment amplified activity will utilise the in-house amplification system, the maximum output of which is controlled by the duty manager

Outside Areas

No music will be played in, or for the benefit of patrons in external areas of the premises

No form of loudspeaker or sound amplification equipment is to be sited on or near the exterior premises or in or near any foyer, doorway, window or opening to the premises

Signs shall be displayed in the external areas/on the frontage requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours

The frontage will be closed and patrons requested to come inside the main structure of the premises at 23:00 hours

Deliveries and collections.

Deliveries and collections associated with the premises will be arranged between the hours 08;00 and 18:30, Mon- Sat, and none on Sundays and Bank Holidays so as to minimise the disturbance caused to the neighbours

Glasses will be collected at the beginning of the day rather than at closing time when neighbours in close proximity might be unduly disturbed

Empty bottles and non-degradable refuse will remain in the premises at the end of trading hours and taken out to the refuse point at the start of the working day rather than at the end of trading when neighbours might be unduly disturbed

Plant and machinery

All plant and machinery is correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from noise

Dealing with complaints

A complaints book will be held on the premises to record details of any complaints received from neighbours. The information is to include where disclosed, the complainants name, location, date time and subsequent remedial action undertaken. This record must be made available at all times for inspection by council officers

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Regular state frequency liaison meetings will be held where requested to enable neighbours to raise concerns about any aspect of the licensed activities

Patrons entering/exiting premises.

Where people queue to enter the premises a licensed door supervisor shall supervise and ensure the potential patrons behave in an acceptable manner

Signs should be displayed requesting patrons to respect the neighbours and behave in a courteous manner

When the premises turn out a licensed door supervisor shall supervise patrons and ensure the leave in a prompt and courteous manner, respecting the neighbours

A licensed door supervisor will be positioned on the exit door to ensure, as far as reasonably practical, that patrons do not leave drinks in public areas.

A licensed door supervisor will patrol the cartilage of the premises to prevent patrons urinating in public areas in the vicinity of the premises

Prevention of nuisance from litter

Adequate receptacles for use by patrons will be provided in the local vicinity. The positioning of the receptacles will be agreed with the licensing officer

Prevention of Nuisance from Odour

All ventilation and extraction systems shall be correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from odour

Prevention of nuisance from light

Illuminated external signage shall be switched off when the premises is closed

Security lights will be positioned to minimise light intrusion to nearby residential premises

THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

Alcohol may only be sold to individuals over the age of 18 with valid proof of identification with one of the following:

- A valid passport
- A photo driving license issued in a European Union Country
- A proof of age standard card system
- A citizen card, supported by the Home Office



As explained to you by Inspector Hembury and myself we have received numerous complaints of noise and fighting outside your premises in the early hours of Saturday and Sunday mornings from local residents and Police have been called on several occasions to deal with this disorder.

The purpose of this meeting is to find ways of you dealing with these problems. After a frank discussion you agreed the following.

1. Controlling the number of customers allowed onto the pavement at any one time to allow them to smoke.

2. Doorstaff to be employed permanently on the door to regulate the entry and exit of customers.

3. To report incidents to Police and liaise with Geoff Parker the Police Licensing officer on a regular basis.

If the situation does not improve it may leave us with no alternative but to review the licence of the premises.

APPENDIX 2 SECRETARY OF STATE GUIDANCE

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11. Reviews

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THE REVIEW PROCESS

- 11.1 The proceedings set out in the 2003 Act for reviewing premises licences represent a key protection for the community where problems associated with the licensing objectives are occurring after the grant or variation of a premises licence.
- 11.2 At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority, or an interested party, may ask the licensing authority to review the licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.
- 11.3 In addition, a review of the licence will normally follow any action by the police to close down the premises for up to 24 hours on grounds of disorder or noise nulsance as a result of a notice of magistrates' court's determination sent to the licensing authority.
- 11.4 Licensing authorities may not initiate their own reviews of premises licences. Officers of the local authority who are specified as responsible authorities under the 2003 Act, such as environmental health officers, may however request reviews on any matter which relates to the promotion of one or more of the licensing objectives.
- 11.5 Representations made by a department of the local authority which is a responsible authority should be treated by the licensing authority in precisely the same way that they would treat representations made by any other body or individual.
- 11.6 In every case, the representation must relate to particular premises for which a premises licence is in existence and must be relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives. After a licence or certificate has been granted or varied, a complaint relating to a general (crime

and disorder) situation in a town centre should generally not be regarded as a relevant representation unless it can be positively fied or linked by a causal connection to particular premises, which would allow for a proper review of the licence or certificate. For instance, a geographic cluster of complaints, including along transport routes related to an individual public house and its closing time could give grounds for a review of an existing licence as well as direct incidents of crime and disorder around a particular public house.

- 11.7 Representations must be in writing and may be amplified at the subsequent hearing or may stand in their own right. Additional representations which do not amount to an amplification of the original representation may not be made at the hearing.
- 11.8 It is important to recognise that the promotion of the licensing objectives relies heavily on a partnership between licence holders, authorised persons, interested parties and responsible authorities in pursuit of common aims. It is therefore equally important that reviews are not used to drive a wedge between these groups in a way that would undermine the benefits of co-operation. It is good practice for authorised persons and responsible authorities to give licence holders early warning of their concerns about problems identified at the premises concerned and of the need for improvement. A failure to respond to such warnings is expected to lead to a decision to request a review.

11.9 Where the request originates with an interested party – e.g. a local resident, residents' association, local business or trade association – the licensing authority must first consider whether the complaint made is relevant, vexatious, frivolous or repetitious.

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Guildance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

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11.10 Further information for interested parties about the review process is available in "Guidance for interested parties: applying for a review" which can be found on the DCMS website.

"SPETITIOUS REPRESENTATIONIS

- 11.11 Relevance, vexation and frivolousness were dealt with in paragraphs 9.8 – 9.13 above. A repetitious representation is one that is identical or substantially similar to:
 - a ground for review specified in an earlier application for review made in relation to the same premises licence which has already been determined; or
 - representations considered by the licensing authority when the premises licence was first granted; or
 - representations which would have been made when the application for the premises licence was first made and which were excluded then by reason of the prior issue
 - of a provisional statement;

and, in addition to the above grounds, a reasonable interval has not elapsed since that earlier review or the grant of the licence.

11.12 Licensing authorities are expected to be aware of the need to prevent attempts to review licences merely as a second bite of the cherry following the failure of representations to persuade the licensing authority on earlier occasions. It is for licensing authorities themselves to judge what should be regarded as a reasonable interval in these circumstances. However, the Secretary of State recommends that more than one review originating from an interested party should not be permitted within a period of twelve months on similar grounds save in compelling circumstances or where it arises following a closure order.

- 11.13 The exclusion of a complaint on the grounds that it is repetitious does not apply to responsible authorities which may make more than one request for a review of a premises within a 12 month period.
- 11.14 When a licensing authority receives a request for a review from a responsible authority or an interested party or in accordance with the closure procedures described in Part 8 of the 2003 Act, it must arrange a hearing. The arrangements for the hearing must follow the provisions set out by the Secretary of State in regulations. The details may be viewed on the DCMS website. The Secretary of State considers it particularly important that the premises licence holder is fully aware of the representations made in respect of the premises, any evidence supporting the representations and that they or their legal representatives have therefore been able to prepare a response.

POWERS OF A LICENSING AUTHORITY ON THE DETERMINATION OF A REVIEW

- 11.15 The 2003 Act provides a range of powers for the licensing authority on determining a review that it may exercise where it considers them necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 11.16 The licensing authority may decide that no action is necessary if it finds that the review does not require it to take any steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a licensing authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing

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objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the holder of the licence. However, where responsible authorities like the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement either orally or in writing — that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach.

- 11.17 Where the licensing authority considers that action under its statutory powers are necessary, it may take any of the following steps:
 - to modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of
 - conditions of any attention of a synthesis of an existing condition), for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times;
 - to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption);
 - to remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
 - to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
 - to revoke the licence.
 - 11.18 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns which the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than a necessary and proportionate response.

- 11.19 For example, licensing authorities should be alive to the possibility that the removal and replacement of the designated premises supervisor may be sufficient to remedy a problem where the cause of the identified problem directly relates to poor management decisions made by that individual.
- 11.20 Equally, it may emerge that poor management is a direct reflection of poor company practice or policy and the mere removal of the designated premises supervisor may be an inadequate response to the problems presented. Indeed, where subsequent review hearings are generated by representations, it should be rare merely to remove a succession of designated premises supervisors as this would be a clear indication of deeper problems which impact upon the licensing objectives.

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11.21 Licensing authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months could impact on the business holding the licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as a necessary means of promoting the licensing objectives. So, for instance, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives.

APPENDIX 3 LICENSING AUTHORITY'S STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICYAPPLICABLE TO THIS APPLICATION

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10.5 Trading Standards

Trading Standards will carry out test purchasing for underage sales in licensed premises.

10.6 Environmental Health - Food Team

The Food Team will inspect all food premises and are able to take action in relation to any contraventions found under the Food Safety Act 1990.

11.0 Operating Schedule

- 11.1 The operating schedule will form part of the completed application form for a premises licence. The schedule should contain the information necessary to enable any responsible authority or interested party to assess whether the steps to be taken to promote licensing objectives are satisfactory. In respect of applications for provisional statements, applications will need to contain information as prescribed in Regulation.
- 11.2 Risk Assessments

Risk assessments help to identify areas of concern in the operating of the premises which may undermine the licensing objectives. Applicants can use the information to complete their application and Operating schedule, and the steps identified by the applicant are transferred on to the license as a condition. Risk assessments should be specific to the premises, the proposed licensable activities and the proposed hours of trading and also the anticipated number of people likely to be on the premises when licensable activities are taking place.

11.2 Further guidance in this policy on the Operating Schedule is contained in the Appendix.

12.0 The prevention of crime and disorder

12.1 The Home Office has identified that a large percentage of violent crimes, assaults and criminal damage are from offenders under the direct influence of alcohol. The Haringey Crime Audit 2001 acknowledged that alcohol related violence was found to be a problem in night-time entertainment areas and that almost a quarter of all arrests were drink related. Direct findings summarised that the misuse of drugs and alcohol has contributed to the increase of crime and disorder in the borough with young men being of particular concern. Alcohol has also been shown to be a factor in occurrences of domestic violence. In comparison to similar boroughs, Haringey compared well and had fewer violent crimes per 1000 residents than the adjoining boroughs of Islington and Hackney.

12.2 The Council is committed to reducing crime and disorder throughout the borough through it's statutory duty under the Crime and Disorder Act and through the Haringey Safer Communities Strategy.

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12.3 Good management, best practices and sound procedures in licensed premises do and can make an important difference to the level of alcohol related crime.

13.0 Public safety

- 13.1 Members of the public visiting licensed premises have the right to expect that due consideration has been taken in relation to public safety. Licensees, as providers of the premises for the sale of alcohol and/or regulated entertainment, must be able to demonstrate that they have considered and put in effect measures to protect members of the public.
- 13.2 In order to promote public safety responsible authorities may make representations on the grounds of public safety. The Licensing Authority will encourage those applying for a premises licence to undertake the necessary fire safety risk assessment and to be compliant with all relevant building control rules and regulations.
- 13.3 The Council recommends that the Metropolitan Police Promotion/Event Risk Assessment Form 696 and the After Promotion /Event Debrief Risk assessment Form 696A be used as an effective tool in this process.

Adult Entertainment

- 13.4 Nudity, striptease and other adult entertainment of a sexual nature fall within the remit of the Licensing Act 2003. This section details the approach the Licensing Authority will take when considering applications for this type of activity on its own merits. These premises may also require a licence under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982.
- 13.5 Applicants to whom this applies are required to set out expressly in their Operating Schedule that they propose to offer entertainment involving nudity, striptease or other adult entertainment of a sexual nature. Any reference to music or dancing without express reference to adult entertainment will be interpreted as not including adult entertainment.
- 13.6 The Licensing Authority and the Police will have concerns about crime and disorder and public nuisance issues which may arise from the operation of the premises where these activities take place. The carrying on of these activities can provide the opportunity for prostitution, pimping, and other offences of a sexual nature. For these reasons there must be proper regulation of premises where these activities are offered.
- 13.7 When considering applications the Licensing Authority will have regard to whether the premises are in close proximity to the following:
 - Schools

Niall Bolger – Director Urban Environment Robin Payne - Assistant Director Enforcement Licensees will need to have measures or procedures in place to check the SIA register of door supervisors to ensure their premises and customers are only protected by door supervisors with an SIA licence.

14:0 The prevention of public nuisance

- 14.1 Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning can cause a wide range of nuisances that can impact on the people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the licensed premises. The Council is committed to protecting the residents and businesses in the vicinity of these licensed premises.
- 14.2 In particular, late night activities cause much of this nuisance. Late night cafés, clubs, pubs and restaurants can have a number of adverse effects on the residents in the vicinity of these premises. Nuisance such as noise, litter, anti-social behaviour, lights and odour all contribute to the loss of amenity to the general public.
- 14.3 Noise nuisance is of particular concern; music, people talking, ventilation equipment and traffic can all be disturbing especially at night when ambient noise is low.
- 14.4 The conduct of customers leaving premises or spilling out into public and open spaces is often a source of disturbance and anti-social behaviour. Problems can include littering, the breaking of glasses and bottles, vomiting and urination.
- 14.5 Fly posting or any other illegal methods of displaying advertisements relating to a licensed premises or events is considered to be a public nuisance and will not be tolerated by the Council. The Council will take action (including prosecuting) those that fly post and will support action by other Councils against those that fly post.
- 14.6 The Council is aware of the importance of the licensing trade to the local economy and its culture and leisure aspirations. Accordingly, it will try and work together with individuals and bodies who are able to make objection to licence applications, the statutory agencies and licensed businesses to ensure that licensed premises can provide a service in a responsible way and co-exist with the wider community.
- 14.7 In considering all licensed applications, the Council will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for nuisance and/or antisocial behaviour having regard to all the circumstances of the application. The council will expect applicants to address the issues under prevention of public nuisance detailed in the Appendix.

15.0 The protection of children from harm

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
