The Chair invites Members to disclose any prior contacts (before the hearing) with the parties or representations received by them The Chair explains the procedure to be followed by reference to this summary which will 3. be distributed. **NON-ATTENDANCE BY PARTY OR PARTIES** 4. If one or both of the parties fails to attend, the Chair decides whether to: grant an adjournment to another date, or (ii) proceed in the absence of the non-attending party. Normally, an absent party will be given one further chance to attend. **TOPIC HEADINGS** 5. The Chair suggests the "topic headings" for the hearing. In the case of the majority of applications for variation of hours, or other terms and conditions, the main topic is: Whether the extensions of hours etc. applied for would conflict with the four licensing objectives i.e. (i) the prevention of crime and disorder, (ii) public safety, (iii) the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm. (iv) 6. The Chair invites comments from the parties on the suggested topic headings and decides whether to confirm or vary them. WITNESSES 7. The Chair asks whether there are any requests by a party to call a witness and decides any such request. 8. Only if a witness is to be called, the Chair then asks if there is a request by an opposing party to "cross-examine" the witness. The Chair then decides any such request. **DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE** The Chair asks whether there are any requests by any party to introduce late documentary evidence. 10. If so, the Chair will ask the other party if they object to the admission of the late documents. 11. If the other party do object to the admission of documents which have only been produced by the first party at the hearing, then the documents shall not be admitted.







1) Operating hours

1.1 That the premises closes no later than 02:00hrs seven days a week

Reason: To minimise noise nuisance from customers using the premises late at night. There are domestic residential properties nearby who may suffer noise nuisance.

2) Outside Areas

- 2:1 Signs shall be displayed in the external areas/on the frontage requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours
- 2:2 CCTV shall operate at all times while the premises remains open to the public and all images captured will be recorded and stored on site for a minimum period of 31 days.
- 2:3 Copies of CCTV recordings will be made available to the Police and/or the Licensing Authority on request within 48 hours of the request being made together with facilities for viewing where requested. If the CCTV equipment is inoperative, or is otherwise not installed and working to the satisfaction of the Police and Licensing Authority, then within 48 hours the Police and Licensing Authority shall be notified and an estimate given of the repair timescale. The premises will comply with all reasonable requests from the Police, which may include the suspension of licensable activities if necessary.

3) Plant and machinery

3:1 All plant and machinery is correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from noise (e.g. extractor systems)

4) Prevention of nuisance from litter

4:1 Patrols of the area outside the premises shall be undertaken every four hours during the use of the licence and any litter accumulations cleared.



I am writing to you to object to the proposed opening hours at the premises noted above.

As you can see from the address, I live in the flat next door and I am dreading what will happen if the proposed take-away stays open until 3am or 5 am, seven days a week.

There has been a big improvment in Green Lanes over the last few years and this will really turn the clock back.

I will suffer from noise nuisance throughout the night, with car doors slamming, and playing radios or stereos, with noisy or drunk customers on the pavement outside my property. There are also likely to be problems with more litter, waste collecting arrangements and delivery times. In the past, very late night opening also attracted increased levels of crime, especially prostitution. I do not want to see that happen again.

If approved, the hours will amount to virtual 24 hours opening from Thursday to saturday, and no prospect of a good night's sleep on week-day nights until about 3 30am, after the take-away has locked up.

I hope you will agree that this is totally unacceptable in a residential area, especially with all the flats on three storeys about the shops on both sides of Green Lanes. many of us have to get up for work or school first thing in the morning and it is not fair to allow a take-away to stay open so late directly underneath our flats.

I am writing to oppose the application for opening hours of the above property to be extended to 0300 between Sunday and Wednesday and 0500 Thursday to Saturday.

The reasons for my opposition are as follows:

- There is a distinct likelihood that there will be a significant rise in crime. The experience of the neighbourhood with 24-hour social culture was very bad with problems of crime and prostitution. It is only recently, since the opening of premises has been limited to 0200 that this problem has abated.
- As stated above there are no other take-aways/restaurants in the area which have these hours (the latest is 0200) so the change will make a big impact on the community. There are residential flats and houses close by.

I am writing in respect of an application for a Premises Licence made by 'Luton Hall Food Limited' for a restaurant/takeaway premises (named 'Sam's Chicken') at 441 Green Lanes, N4 1HA.

My name is Anthony Love and my partner, Elizabeth Hull, and I are the tenants at 441a Green Lanes, which is the first-floor flat located directly above the restaurant premises. I wish to make a representation regarding the Premises Licence application for 441 Green Lanes on the basis that the application would contradict Licensing Objectives, namely Public Safety and the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The Premises Licence application includes 'The Provision of Late Night Refreshment' between the hours 11pm-3am (Sunday-Wednesday) and 11pm-5am (Thursday-Saturday). The premises' overall opening hours will be 9am-3am (Sun.-Weds.) and 9am-5am (Thurs.-Sat.). I believe that these hours will constitute a significant public nuisance and may pose a risk to public safety. I would therefore like to suggest a reduction of the late-night opening hours to 11pm-1am (Sun.-Thurs.) and 11pm-2am (Fri.-Sat.).

My reasons for believing that these opening hours will constitute a public nuisance are as follows:

- These hours (until 3am Sun.-Weds., until 5am Thurs.-Sat.) are significantly later than those of similar premises in the area. This means that the premises is likely to become a locus for a disproportionately large number of people late at night. This will create significant noise disturbance.
- The entrance door for the 1st and 2nd floor residential flats in this building is located directly adjacent to the door of the restaurant premises. This, coupled with the late night opening times will likely lead to crowding around both doors. This may lead to difficulty gaining access to the building late at night, or intimidation and fears for personal security. This is particularly worrying for a young woman such as Elizabeth.
- The bedroom of our flat is located at the front of the building, and therefore is directly above the restaurant premises. As such, noise from the street below can be clearly heard in this room. Previously, we have often been disturbed by noise associated with the adjacent restaurant at 443 Green Lanes this includes loud conversations conducted by customers outside the premises, and loud music from customers' cars pulling up at the restaurant. The proposed opening hours of the restaurant at 441 Green Lanes will have an even greater impact, both in terms of the volume of this noise, and how late in the night it continues.
- The fact that the restaurant will be a takeaway may lead to customers congregating outside, either eating or waiting for food. This will lead to the blocking of our doorway and an increase in noise disturbance.
- The late night hours will see an excessive number of inebriated customers, particularly on

Page 49

Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. The possibility of customers urinating in the vicinity of the doorway to residential flats is therefore increased by the late night opening hours. Inebriated customers may also cause increased disturbance either through excessive volume, damage to property or violence. When coupled with the location of the doorway to the above flats, this will make late-night entering or exiting of the residential flats possibly dangerous and extremely intimidating.

Finally, in the event of fire, there is an increased risk to public safety posed by these late opening hours. With opening hours as late as 5am, there arises the risk of a fire breaking out in the early hours of the morning. At such a time, both we and the residents of flats on both sides, will be more susceptible to harm in the event of a fire since we will be less aware of danger than at other times.

Please accept this email as my formal objection to the licensing application to the proposed opening opening times of a new Sam's Chicken outlet at 441 Green Lanes.

I understand the proposed hours are 3am (Sun-Wed) and 5am (Thurs-Sat). As I'm sure you're aware, at present no café/restaurant/takeaway/pub/club in the core area of Green Lanes has permission to open beyond 2am. If this application is granted I, and many in the local community, fear it will lead to a precedent being set leading to many more similar applications being made which would lead to a virtual 24 hour culture in this area. This could take us back to the bad old days of 2002 and undo all the hard work of the Green Lanes Strategy Group over the past 8 years, which I chair, which has made GL such a better place.

I endorse the concerns and objections of the Ladder Safety Community Partnership which I have quoted below.

We are therefore writing to you as members of the LCSP to oppose this application.

We believe that in the context of a residential area, granting a licence for the activities and hours requested would be against the general principles of Haringey's Licensing Policy and specifically under the following headings:

'licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a wide range of nuisances that can impact on the people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the licensed premises. The Council is committed to protecting the residents ... in the vicinity of these licensed premises.' [14.1]

'in particular, late night activities cause much of this nuisance. Late night ... restaurants ... can have a number of adverse effects on the residents in the vicinity of these premises. Nuisance such as noise, litter, anti-social behaviour, lights odour all contribute to the loss of amenity to the general public' [14.2]

'noise nuisance is of particular concern ... especially at night when the ambient noise level is low' [14.3]

'the conduct of customers leaving premises or spilling out into public and open spaces is often a source of disturbance and anti-social behaviour' [14.4]

'the potential for additional crime and disorder and/or public nuisance is increased with longer hours.' [19.1]

'when issuing a licence, stricter conditions with regard to noise control and/or limitations to opening hours may be imposed in the case of premises where relevant representations are made and that are situated in largely residential areas.

Operating hours between 23.00 and 07.00 are considered to give greater potential potential for noise nuisance' [19.3]

(b) Licensing Hours

In the light of the above statements and of the licensing objectives in general, we believe that daily closing times of 3am or 5am are very late, especially for ordinary weekday evenings, after which most residents will have to get up early to go to work or school.

We believe that these are unreasonable propositions, given the location of the premises in the heart heart of one of the most densely populated residential areas in the borough, and we shall say more about this in the following paragraphs.

(c) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Prevention of Public Nuisance

The proposed outlet is basically a fast-food take-away, with some internal seating. It will provide cheaply produced food with the consequent need for rapid turnover. Large numbers of take-away customers are therefore required if the outlet is to succeed. As there are no other venues in the core core area of Green Lanes with permission to be open at 3am or 5am in the morning, customers will be returning from a late night pub or club, or passing through the area by car or taxi. In both cases, such customers are very likely to be in a lively or noisy frame of mind, having had (more than) a few drinks, etc.

It is therefore very easy to see the impact of the proposed opening hours in terms of noise, antisocial behaviour, crime, litter and other associated nuisance. In the early hours of the morning, ambient and background noise is very low and slamming or even closing, car doors, raucous voices voices and laughter, or arguments, will all carry a long way and disturb sleep. Worse still, with the take-away trade, this sort of noise will be repeated endlessly until 3 or 5 in the morning, seven days days a week.

This is not speculation, but based on knowledge of past experience. Members of the Licensing Committee will no doubt recall, as we do, what happened to Green Lanes when a late-night culture took over in the early 2000s. Green Lanes became, frankly, a dirty, dangerous and unpleasant place to be, culminating in the violent and fatal incident of 2002. Since then, residents, traders police and council offers, and local Councillors have all worked together in the Green Lanes Strategy Group to make Green Lanes the safer, quieter, cleaner - in short, better - place which it is today.

We are therefore very anxious not to repeat the same mistake by moving back towards a very late/24 hour culture, which is where granting this application will take us.

3. CONCLUSION

Our comments and objections, clearly based on the key objectives and appropriate paragraphs of the borough's Licensing Policy (noted above), make clear that residents are extremely worried at the likely implications of the proposed very late hours.

We do not believe that any conditions could be imposed which would mitigate this. For example, the

the applicant has suggested notices, asking customers to leave quietly, but this would obviously have no impact on noisy arrivals, and it's hard to see how it could make any difference to noisy departures. In the real world, are merry late-night customers carefully going to study, and then abide abide by, a printed notice displayed somewhere in the premises?

We therefore recommend, as a way forward, that the permitted hours should be limited to no later than 2am daily (preferably somewhat earlier, Sunday-Thursday if the Committee is so minded). We believe that this would be a fair and reasonable compromise between the rights of residents to a good night's sleep in a safe environment, and the need for a trader to make a success of their business.

I am writing on behalf of the Gardens Residents Association (which represents the residents of Stanhope, Portland, Doncaster, Rutland, Roseberry, Chesterfield, Kimberley, Warwick and Cleveland Gardens, all in N4, leading off or close to Green Lanes) to object to the licensing application for the provision of late night refreshment at 441 Green Lanes N4 1HA.

We object most strongly to this proposal and believe that if permission for this late night opening were granted, it would have a seriously detrimental effect on the local neighbourhood.

We believe that to grant a licence for the activities and hours requested, in a densely populated residential area, would be against the principles of Haringey's Licensing Policy, specifically under the following headings:

- the prevention of crime and disorder
- the prevention of public nuisance.

The opening hours requested are extremely late – up till 3am on Sundays to Wednesdays, and up to 5am on Thursdays to Saturdays. This is completely unreasonable in a densely-populated area, and will inevitably cause noise disturbance to the residents who live in the flats above the shops and restaurants on Green Lanes. There will also be an increase in litter such as take-away cartons, which already cause a huge nuisance along Green Lanes and on the headers of the adjoining roads.

At present, none of the other numerous cafes, restaurants, take-aways, pubs and clubs along Green Lanes are permitted to stay open after 2am. If permission is granted for this application, this will set a precedent, making it harder for the council to refuse future applications from similar establishments on Green Lanes – leading to a virtual 24-hour culture, at the expense of the comfort and safety of local residents.

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

I am writing to object to the above license application. I am deeply concerned about the impact that an additional 3-5am licence would have on the area and hope you will take this, and the other representations from local people, into consideration when making your decision.

It is very likely that the people using these premises at this time will be people who have been drinking alcohol and will consequently not be particularly concerned about the maintenance of peacefulness or cleanliness of the local area. At 5am this is likely to be extremely disturbing for local residents and would certainly constitute a public nuisance.

Further, over the past ten years many people have worked extremely hard to turn Green Lanes at night from being a very difficult, dirty and often dangerous road to one which is clean, friendly and safe. A large part of this has been the limits placed on opening times restricting them to 2am. I am deeply concerned that granting this license would therefore be a deeply regressive step and I oppose it in the strongest terms.
