Public Health in the Local Government

1. Introduction

1.1 In accordance with regulations under the Health and Social Care Act 2012, public health responsibilities, together with a ring fenced grant, transferred from the Department of Health to local government on 1st April 2013. Local authorities will have a duty to promote the health of their population and will also take on key functions to ensure that robust plans are in place to protect the local population and provide public health advice to NHS commissioners.

2. What are the new responsibilities for public health?

- 2.1 The Health and Social Care Act 2012 is a key step towards the establishment of a new public health system. Local authorities already have important and wide ranging public health functions that will continue. Local authorities will be taking on significant new public health functions. The Director of Public Health (DPH) is the lead officer for delivering the new functions and a statutory member of the Health and Wellbeing Board.
- 2.2 Public Health in Local Government publication (Department of Health, 2012) sets out the functions:

2.2.1 Health improvement

A new duty to take appropriate steps to improve the health of the people in its area. Examples include giving information, providing services to promote healthy living or incentives to live more healthily.

2.2.2 Health protection

The Secretary of State will have a core duty to protect the health of the population in the new system. However local authorities are seen as having a critical role at the local level in ensuring that all the relevant organizations locally are putting plans in place to protect the population against a range of threats and hazards, namely infectious diseases and environmental hazards.

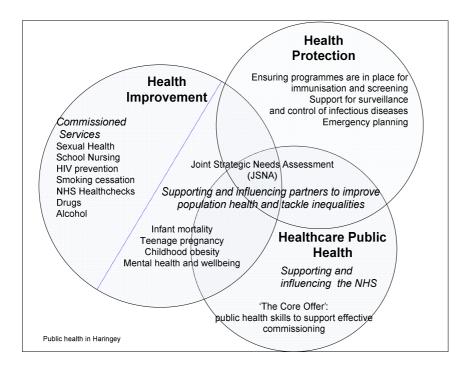
2.2.3 Healthcare public health

The government intends to make a regulation to require local authorities to provide public health advice to commissioners. There is an opportunity to build and maintain close links with clinical commissioners, complementing Health and Wellbeing Boards. The DPH would have responsibility and funding for a "core offer" of public health advice to the NHS locally. Examples are the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment, evidence based strategies, pathways and service specifications.

2.3 Central to these three core areas are new local authority duties to take steps to ensure that it is aware of and has considered what the health needs of its local population are and what evidence suggests the appropriate steps would be to take to address those needs. The DPH and their specialist teams would need access to appropriate information and evidence functions. The DPH would be required to produce an annual report.

Figure 1 represents the three public health functions as they apply in Haringey.

Figure 1: Public health in Haringey



3. What are the main public health priorities for Haringey?

- 3.1 Haringey is the 4th most deprived borough in London and the 13th most deprived in the country. An estimated 21,595 (36.4%) children live in poverty, largely in the east of the borough. High levels of deprivation, low educational attainment and unhealthy lifestyles (high smoking, low physical activity, high alcohol misuse), primarily in the east of the borough, are all interrelated determinants of poor health outcomes and the considerable health inequalities in the borough. Key priorities are:
- Only 53% of children show satisfactory development at age 5
- Highest teenage pregnancy rate in England
- High child obesity (1 in 3 children aged 10-11 are overweight or obese)
- Inequality in male life expectancy (men in the east die up to 9 years younger than men in the west)
- High smoking (contributes to 50% of the male life expectancy gap) and physical inactivity
- High levels of alcohol and drug misuse
- High levels of common and severe (3rd highest in London) mental health problems

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3.2 These public health priorities are reflected in the key outcomes of the shadow Health and Well Being Strategy: 1) Giving every child the best start in life; 2) Reducing the life expectancy gap; 3) Improving mental health and well being.

4. What are the main health needs for Muswell Hill, Fortis Green, Alexandra and Highgate wards?

- 4.1 Life expectancy in Muswell Hill, Fortis Green, Alexandra and Highgate is generally higher than in other parts of the borough. Fortis Green (83.4) and Highgate (82.7) females have higher life expectancy compared to Haringey (81.3) and the national rate (81.5), whereas Alexandra and Muswell Hill females life expectancy rates are equivalent (both 81.1). Males in all areas (range of 77.4 to 78.2) have higher life expectancy than Haringey (75.2) and the national rate (77.3).
- 4.2 The key public health issues for this area are:
- Early diagnosis and treatment for cancer
- Asthma in young people
- Alcohol awareness and support
- Over third of people diagnosed with dementia in general practice live in west of the borough
- Some women in Muswell Hill book late for antenatal appointments
- 10% of all diagnosed cases of tuberculosis (TB) come from GP practices in these areas
- Teenage pregnancy rates for 2007-2009 were 31.4 per 1000 in Fortis Green, 21.8 in Muswell Hill, 18.1 in Alexandra and 17.1 in Highgate. More recent data suggest a reduction in teenage pregnancy across the borough but more detailed information at ward level is still in preparation.

and felt that most patients and staff travelled by car, although there was no recent data to evidence this. Zoe Robertson advised that she and the Smarter Travel team were working with the Health Centre to progress the travel plan.

 MH56 and 55: It had been hoped that Joan Hancox would be able to update the Committee on progress in developing a business case for the use of LED bulbs and the feasibility of adding compost stirrers for sale on the *Haringey Get Composting* website.

 MH57: A response was awaited with regards to devolved funding to Area Committees. Lisa Redfern would chase this outside the meeting.

- MH58: 'Community planting projects' Cllr Scott advised that there was nothing to report with regard to community planting projects, however residents at Bolster Grove had raised other issues concerning safety and local policing.
- MH58: 'Community hubs' the Chair advised on the feedback received from Cllr Strickland on the issues raised during the walkabout last year; while it was reported that conversion of the land to the rear to a car park was not feasible, this did not address the suggestion that the space could be used for trading and events. This, and concerns regarding the lack of disabled access to the first floor of the library, would be pursued with the Cabinet Member.

 MH59: Lisa Redfern advised that she had spoken with the Director of Public Health, Jeanelle de Gruchy, regarding an item at a future meeting on the transition of public health services from the NHS to the Council, and that Dr de Gruchy would arrange a meeting with the Chair to discuss this further.

 The Committee discussed the issue of liaising with the Highgate Neighbourhood Forum and it was agreed that there should be more information online, linking between the two organisations.

MH64. FEEDBACK FROM AREA FORUM PART OF THE PROCEEDINGS

Youth Provision within the Area

Cllr Erskine noted that one of the key issues arising from the discussion during the area forum was the way in which young people could be involved in decision-making around services for young people – how this was currently being done, and how it could be improved; these issues were not felt to have clearly been addressed as part of the discussion at the area forum. It was suggested that this was an issue that could be raised at the Children and Young People's Scrutiny Panel, and it was

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agreed that Cllr Erskine would liaise with Cllr Newton regarding taking this forward.

Following a question raised by the Muswell Hill centre during the forum regarding whether the Council would be using the facilities at the centre, it was suggested that they should have an opportunity of making a deputation to the next meeting of the Children and Young People's Scrutiny Panel on this issue.

It was felt that it would have been positive to have had more of a chance to engage directly with the young people from Exposure, in addition to viewing the very high quality films they had presented to the area forum. While budget restrictions prevented the arrangement of a formal extraordinary meeting of the area forum and committee, it was suggested that the Chair could speak informally with Exposure regarding setting up an event to hear more from the young people directly about their work. It was felt that there was a valuable opportunity for intergenerational work in this area. In the meantime, it was suggested that Councillors look at Exposure's website (exposure.org.uk) to find out more about the organisation and its work.

It was noted that as Exposure was having to dedicate time to raising its own funds, this was detracting from the resources available for its core work. In response to a suggestion that the Council should be asked for assurance regarding the fairness of resources made available for young people in the four wards of the Forum / Committee, it was advised that this work was being taken forward by the Children and Young People's Scrutiny Panel.

Local Nursery Childcare Places

Cllr Allison outlined the presentation in the area forum which had included information on the free childcare entitlement for eligible 2 year olds from September 2013. It had been reported that the proposed funding rate of £5.28 per child per hour would be unsustainable for 100% take-up; there was an aim to provide places for 80% of the eligible children across the borough, based on likely take-up of the entitlement. Concern was raised regarding how this would be distributed fairly across the borough. It was agreed that the Chair would write to the Early Years Service for more information on this, and for further details of the locations identified for nursery places in the west of the borough.

<u>Guidelines for residents in respect of neighbour disruption caused by</u> building works

The Committee felt that it was useful to hear about what to do in the event of nuisance caused by dust, although it was recognised that this was a complex issue. The Committee discussed issues they wished to take forward with regard to dust nuisance, hours during which building work could take place, vibration, noise, etc and ways in which these could be addressed.

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The Committee made the following recommendations:

- That clarification of what residents could do to report dust emanating from building projects should be provided to the Committee, and clear information on this publicised on the Council's website.
- ii) That the Planning department be encouraged to include measures to mitigate against nuisance caused by dust within the conditions attached to planning permissions granted. Such conditions could include reference to best practice such as spraying to prevent dust; this could also be incorporated into conditions regarding the adoption of the Considerate Contractor scheme.
- iii) That the Planning department also be encouraged to address the potential nuisance caused by vibration and noise by means of conditions requiring monitoring of decibel and vibration levels, in line with best practice, on relevant planning consents. Where appropriate, such as in an areas with a high volume of building projects, conditions require more restrictive hours for permitted works could be considered, although a balance would need to be struck between limiting hours of operation and prolonging the overall length of the project.
- iv) That Planning conditions promoting sustainable construction methods should be encouraged.
- v) That handling of planning applications and planning enforcement should come within the remit of a single Cabinet Member, to enable a more coordinated approach to these functions.

MH65. AREA PLANS - UPDATE

Zoe Robertson confirmed that she had made a note of the discussion during the area forum for action.

With regard to the point raised during the forum regarding relocation of police services were Muswell Hill police station to close, Cllr Newton clarified that a fully-operational base for the SNTs within the Muswell Hill shopping area, to include a front counter staffed by volunteers, had the support of the local community as well as the SNT ward panels for Muswell Hill, Fortis Green and Alexandra.

There were no items of urgent business.

With regard to the next meeting of the Forum and Committee, scheduled
