
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LICENSING SUB-COMMITTEE HEARINGS PROCEDURE SUMMARY	
INTRODUCTION	
1.	The Chair introduces him/herself and invites other Members, Council officers, Police, Applicant and Objectors to do the same.
2.	The Chair invites Members to disclose <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i) any prior contacts (before the hearing) with the parties or representations received by them; and separately ii) any declarations of interest.
3.	The Chair explains the procedure to be followed by reference to this summary which will be distributed in advance.
NON-ATTENDANCE BY PARTY OR PARTIES	
4.	If one or both of the parties fails to attend, the Chair decides whether to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) grant an adjournment to another date, or (ii) proceed in the absence of the non-attending party. <p>Normally, an absent party will be given one further opportunity to attend.</p>
TOPIC HEADINGS	
5.	The Chair suggests the “topic headings” for the hearing. In the case of the majority of applications for variation of hours, or other terms and conditions, the main topic is: <p>Whether the extensions of hours etc. applied for would conflict with the four licensing objectives i.e.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) the prevention of crime and disorder, (ii) public safety, (iii) the prevention of public nuisance, and (iv) the protection of children from harm.
6.	The Chair invites comments from the parties on any other topic headings to be discussed.
WITNESSES	
7.	The Chair asks whether there are any requests by a party to call a witness and decides any such request.
8.	Only if a witness is to be called, the Chair then asks if there is a request by an opposing party to “cross-examine” the witness. The Chair then decides any such request.
DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE	
9.	The Chair asks whether there are any requests by any party to introduce late documentary evidence.
10.	If so, the Chair will ask the other party if they object to the admission of the late documents.
11.	If the other party do object to the admission of documents which have only been produced by the first party at the hearing, then the documents shall not generally be admitted.

12.	If the other party object to documents produced late but before the hearing, the following criteria shall be taken into account when the Chair decides whether or not to admit the late documents:	
(i)	What is the reason for the documents being late?	
(ii)	Will the other party be unfairly taken by surprise by the late documents?	
(iii)	Will the party seeking to admit late documents be put at a major disadvantage if admission of the documents is refused?	
(iv)	Is the late evidence really important?	
(v)	Would it be better and fairer to adjourn to a later date?	
THE LICENSING OFFICER'S INTRODUCTION		
13.	The Licensing Officer introduces the report explaining, for example, the existing hours, the hours applied for and the comments of the other Council Services or outside official bodies. This should be as "neutral" as possible between the parties.	
14.	The Licensing Officer can be questioned by Members and then by the parties.	
THE HEARING		
15.	This takes the form of a discussion led by the Chair. The Chair can vary the order as appropriate but it should include:	
(i)	an introduction by the Objectors' main representative	
(ii)	an introduction by the Applicant or representative	
(iii)	questions put by Members to the Objectors	
(iv)	questions put by Members to the Applicant	
(v)	questions put by the Objectors to the Applicant	
(vi)	questions put by the Applicant to the Objectors	
CLOSING ADRESSES		
16.	The Chair asks each party how much time is needed for their closing address, if they need to make one.	
17.	Generally, the Objectors make their closing address before the Applicant who has the right to the final closing address.

18.	Members retire with the Committee Clerk and legal representative to consider their decision including the imposition of conditions.

Background

5.1 An application for a new premises licence has been made by Mustafa Erdogan in respect of 266-268 Langham Road, Turnpike Lane, London N15 3NP. **Appendix 1**

5.2 **Details of the application being sought under the Premises Licence Application**

Supply of Alcohol:

Monday to Sunday 1000 to 0030

For consumption ON and OFF the premises

Late Night Refreshment:

Monday to Sunday 2300 to 0030

Hours open to the public:

Monday to Sunday 0600 to 0100

5.3 **General-all four licensing objectives**

The applicant will accept the following conditions. The alcohol only will sale in operation hours and the alcohol will be consumed ON and OFF the premises. CCTV will be installed to the premises, installed CCTV system that meets the standard in 'UK Police requirements for digital CCTV system. The premise operates the 'Challenge 25' the proof of age scheme. The premises will open and shut sat its permitted opening hours. The premises shall install and maintain a CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer.

All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon request of Police and authorised officer throughout the proceeding 31 day period.

5.4 **Crime and Disorder**

CCTV will be installed at the premises for safety and crime prevention. We will not serve alcohol to persons already drunk in the premises.

The DPS will undertake routine monitoring of the refusal records and record that this is being done. All staff that makes sales of alcohol receives regular training (Induction and refresher).

Installed CCTV systems that meet the standard in will meet the standard in 'UK Police requirements for digital CCTV system's shall operate and record video images at all times that the premises are open to the public and any recordings made will be retained for not less than 31 days and made available to Police upon request.

A member of staff on the premises at the relevant time will be capable of operating the CCTV system.

5.5 Public Safety

Emergency lighting will be installed and fire extinguisher will be installed. The fire exit is free of any impediments or obstacle at all times of the operating hours.

An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available upon request to an authorised office of the City Council or Police, which will include the following:

- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
- (b) all ejections of patrons
- (c) any complaints received regards to crime and disorder
- (d) any incidents of disorder
- (e) seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
- (f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol

5.6 Public Nuisance

For public nuisance alcohol will not be allowed to be drunk outside.

All occasions when persons have been refused service this will be recorded in a refusal book, which shall be kept at the premises for no less than 12 months.

Suitable signage will be displayed at the point of exit advising customers to leave the premises quietly

Deliveries to the premises shall only be made during normal working hours.

Bottles and similar goods shall not be handled outside the premises in the late evening, night or early morning.

Bins shall not be emptied outside the premises in the late evening, night or early morning.

5.7 Child Protection

Staff will be strict not to sell alcohol to children underage.

Any alcohol must be sold by DPS or a person authorised by the DPS at all times.

All staff who sells alcohol will be trained in the role by the DPS with regular refresher training.

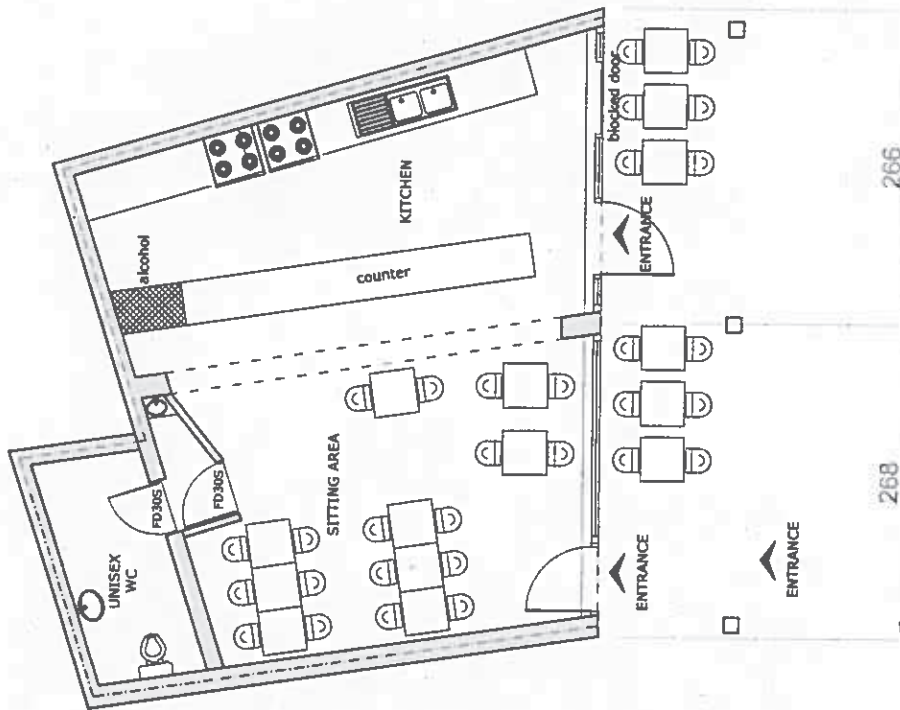

Dear Sirs,

I am writing in relation to the above application for an alcohol licence and to ask the committee to reject the application.

266-268 Langham Road is Fat Sam's take away and is managed by the same person who owns the mini cab office and hairdressers at 270 and 270A . In the last few years, these few shops have been of real concern to me in terms of litter and as a meeting place where at risk youngsters are encouraged into low level crime.

Fat Sam's has been the source of most of the litter which blows down Langham Road and onto the green at Graham Road. Since opening they have not provided proper waste disposal bins for customers, only a domestic dustbin with no lid. They have recently bought a larger commercial bin, but this is often full to overflowing and cannot be used by customers. The waste is extensive and includes not only cans, bottles and food boxes, but food waste which encourages pigeons, foxes and rats.

I have seen staff from Fat Sam's pouring oil down the drain on Langham Road. The pavement outside the premises was littered with old furniture including a sofa and an ottoman, a disused fridge freezer and old chairs. This furniture was outside for over a year and was eventually disposed. The replacement furniture now does not conform to environmental standards, is unhygienic, unsafe and cannot be properly cleaned. It is left on the street at night for rats and vermin to scavenge.

The signage in front of Fat Sam's includes an old cut off whiteboard, wired to a drain pipe, which has a raw cut metal edge and is dangerous for children. In addition, the takeaway obstructs the pavement with other chairs, bins and random signage which is difficult to negotiate for those with visual impairment, walking sticks, pushchairs and prams. The take away has gradually encroached on the public highway by moving signs and tables out on to the pavement forcing pedestrians onto the road.

The takeaway is a focus for the mini cab drivers who stand and hail women going past, litter the pavement with gum, cigarette butts and spitting. The area also acts as a focus for late night street drinking, public urination and various local gangs congregate in and around the take away selling soft drugs. The street gangs selling cannabis all move between Fat Sam's, the mini cab office/cafe and hairdressers on Langham Road, the betting shop/Tesco's on the High Road and Duckett's Common.

I have taken to altering my journey home from the underground and from the shops on the High Road in order to avoid this area, having seen men publicly urinate in the street outside and been jostled on the pavement by the cab drivers. The gangs of youth too have offered me drugs several times and I do not want them to follow me home, although twice I have been offered such an escort. The unwanted attention from the men in this area that I currently receive, coupled with the accelerant that alcohol provides, gives me real cause for concern.

Since the Wood Green improvement scheme, the benches and stools opposite 266-270 Langham Road are used by street drinkers who buy alcohol at one of the four locations on the axis of streets of Westbury Avenue, Langham Road, Turnpike Lane and the High Road. A cafe restaurant which includes a mini cab office will only exacerbate matters.

Past experience of Fat Sam's at 268 Langham Road and its willingness to circumnavigate the most basic environmental, food hygiene and waste disposal regulation, leads me to believe that the sale of alcohol would only further encourage anti social behaviour, which the licensee would do little to regulate or discourage.

On this basis I urge the licensing committee to refuse this application as I am of the firm opinion that granting such a licence would only increase the threat to public safety, add to local crime and anti-social behaviour and put already hard to reach and at risk young people in further jeopardy.

The area around Turnpike Lane station is already a hot-spot for anti-social behaviour and crime including begging, drug-dealing and public urination (which also impacts the residential areas directly behind). I am concerned that a late-licensed premises (I am guessing fast food) here will only worsen the situation by encouraging people to congregate in the area late at night drinking in the public space opposite the premises and in the residential areas nearby.

The above mentioned increase in people loitering around the area at night is bound to make the area more threatening to residents of nearby streets who have to walk through after taking the tube.

As a resident of Graham Road I am particularly concerned about the prospect of increased nuisance on Graham Green. We the undersigned wish to object to the licensing application for the above location on the following grounds:

The prevention of crime and disorder

A Public Dispersion Order has been in place on an intermittent basis around the immediate vicinity of the Fat Sams property for a number of years. This is a direct result of the continued use by drug dealers and other illegal trading freely plied among groups of youths attracted to this area. With the additional demise of any police on the beat, any 'expansion' of the previous business will signal an opportunity to ramp up and intensify previously opportunities.

Add alcohol into the equation and this pocket of Tottenham could soon develop into a major crime area. The aggressive behaviour, alongside illegal parking of the cab drivers also signifies the unregulated manner in which the premises owner runs his businesses.

With a proposed closing time of 00.30, such a venue does not fit within a residential area. And as such, will inevitably attract the kind of crime and disorder associated with late night drinking venues.

The prevention of public nuisance

This area of public thoroughfare was never designed to either accommodate continual 'entertainment' via eating and drinking (and its associated behaviours), or more importantly be built up with additional outside structures. As mentioned above, there is a history of this location needing help with unruly behaviour. Upscaling the focal point will surely lead to the general public seeing their residency affected by more public urination, littering, aggressive behaviour, dealing and drug pushing. Should the business expand, and receive an alcohol licence, the door will be open to those from further afield to add to an already existing public nuisance situation.

Public safety

With a very mixed age, and cultural community, the area around the proposed restaurant has historically existed in a very tolerant fashion. It thrives on easy access and small scale businesses running operations which bind the community. This new operation would create the first ever, large scale vendor of alcohol at this locale. This would inevitably tip the balance away from the resident, in favour of the occasional visitor looking for something contrary to the existing status quo. Public safety would be compromised with drunken behaviour at closing time, littering, potential disorder from those emboldened through alcohol consumption, rowdy exit of patrons into the surrounding streets, vandalism to the trees in the new concourse.

Alcohol and driving do not mix. So why should a cab office and a licenced restaurant be allowed to coexist under one roof.

The protection of children from harm

The blatant, all day dealing of drugs around Turnpike Lane has already spread into the side streets. Allowing the businesses at this location to upscale, and also take on another form of intoxication, will present a high level danger to children at risk from aggressive pushing. Such activity also goes hand in hand with knife crime. With a growing list of Tottenham youths affected by this growing menace, Haringey needs to do everything in its powers to protect the young and vulnerable. Turning down the licence application, and ideally the business expansion would go some way to keep our area as it was intended to be.

I write to object to the application by Mustafa Erdogan for a Premises Licence to permit the Supply of Alcohol Off The premises Monday—Sunday 10:00am – 00:30am for the premises located at 266-268 Langham Road, London, N15 3NP.

My objection is based on the following grounds:

The prevention of crime and disorder and The Prevention of Public Nuisance and public safety

At present, the area around Fat Sams and Turnpike Lane station frequently has a number of groups congregating and drinking in the street. The net result is antisocial behaviour including public urination, harassment, and litter. I have also witnessed fights breaking out, often exacerbated by the consumption of alcohol. The granting of a licence to permit the supply of alcohol off the premises is likely to increase such antisocial behaviour. I work long hours and regularly come home after 10 pm. I, and many other women, have experienced harassment in this area from various drunk men and night. I am concerned that an increase in the sale of off-premises alcohol, and the proposed outdoor seating area, will exacerbate this situation.

I understand from the Applicant's recent application for a change of use that the premises is intended to be used as a takeaway, rather than a sit down restaurant, thereby encouraging street drinking, and the associated anti-social behaviour outlined in this letter.

Environment and public disorder

The area is not sufficiently serviced by waste bins and those that there are already operating over-capacity. There is already extensive fly tipping and the sale of off-premises alcohol must inevitably lead to a greater littering which will further blight the area and stretch already inadequate resources to clean this up.

Noise levels from people walking home after late night drinking at the premises is also likely to increase if the premises is granted a late night licence, thereby disturbing local residents.

Accordingly, for these reasons alone, I submit that it would be inappropriate to grant the licence.

If the licence is granted it would go some way to help address the issue if restrictions are placed on the hours of sale, and hours for which patrons can use the outside seating.

I am writing in respect of the application by Mustafa Erdogan for a Premises Licence to permit the Supply of Alcohol Off The premises Monday—Sunday 10:00am – 00:30am for the premises located at 266-268 Langham Road, London, N15 3NP.

I am writing to object to any such licence being granted on the following grounds:

Prevention of Crime and Disorder/Public Safety

- The area around Turnpike Lane station has a well-documented problem with criminal and anti-social behaviour e.g. [http://www.tottenhamjournal.co.uk/news/crime-court/police work against drug dealers by turnpike lane tube wins them award 1 3873479](http://www.tottenhamjournal.co.uk/news/crime-court/police%20work%20against%20drug%20dealers%20by%20turnpike%20lane%20tube%20wins%20them%20award%201%203873479) whilst there are serious efforts to improve this situation the problem is still ongoing and highly visible and the granting of this licence is likely to reverse the work done to improve this situation.
- The hours of sale are inappropriate. The licence hours extend beyond the licence hours of the nearby pubs, again this is likely to result in the area becoming a focal point for individuals who want to drink after the pubs shut. Given the proximity of the premises to the tube/bus station this is likely to result in the area becoming a flash-point between people attending the premises after the pub to purchase alcohol and those arriving home late in the evening. Nor will the premises have the safety protocols and staff that the local pubs have.
- The granting of an off-premises alcohol licence at these premises is highly likely to result in it becoming a focal point for loitering, especially as the street outside the premises has recently been pedestrianized which increases its attractiveness for groups to congregate. The combination of these factors will only increase the tension in what is already a highly hostile environment for those people returning home via the nearby tube/bus station.
- My partner works long hours and regularly comes home after 10 pm. She, and many other women have experienced harassment in this area from various drunk men and night and I regularly meet her at the tube where I witness this abuse. An increase in the sale of off-premises alcohol will exacerbate this situation.
- There is an existing problem with public urination on Langham Road after the toilets at Turnpike Lane bus station are shut (and indeed when they are open). The well documented effects of alcohol will only exacerbate this and the associated crime of public-exposure.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

- The area is not sufficiently serviced by waste bins and those that there are already operating over-capacity. The sale of off-premises alcohol must inevitably lead to a greater littering which will further blight the area and stretch already inadequate resources to clean this up.
- The increased traffic to the premises for the sale of alcohol will inevitably lead to late-night noise pollution in what is essentially a residential area.

On these grounds alone it would be inappropriate to grant the licence applied for.

The Friends of Graham Green,(FOGG) former members of the West Green Residents Association (WGRA) and the Turnpike Art Group, (TAG) represent a broad range of residents and small business in the area. We want to present a balanced view of the opinions emailed to us and the outcome of meetings at which the above application was discussed. It is important that the licensing committee is aware of the sometimes conflicting needs of nearby residents and local businesses. **(We request that our individual names and details are redacted from online publishing. We have a right privacy and avoidance of possible intimidation.)**

Fat Sam's chicken takeaway at 266-268 Langham Road is well known to local residents as a small takeaway counter, part of the subdivided premises at 266 to 270a Langham Road which include a café, mini cab office, hairdressers and chicken takeaway counter, occupying a total frontage of some 10 metres. It is directly opposite the public toilets which form part of the listed Transport for London premises. Fat Sam's is frequented by teenagers and school children. Outside, the tables are used by mini cab drivers who congregate to drink, smoke, eat and occasionally valet their cars.

As a result of various F.O.G.G meetings about the license application, board members met with the Met police licensing officer for Haringey on 27th June.

The prevention of crime and disorder:

Most local residents have experience of local youths gathering at Fat Sams who are seen dealing to younger children and other adults. This is a daily occurrence. Public urination, aggressive harassment of women, street drinking and littering are also problematic at the address and parents have reported their children being offered drugs. Residents report seeing goods being sold from backs of cars and being offered mobile phones and cheap "tax free" cigarettes. It is commonplace to see young people roll joints when seated outside.

A number of residents have contacted F.O.G.G as they want to write and object to the licence application, but do not want their names and addresses made public. Many feel vulnerable and fearful of the intimidation experienced from the mini cab drivers at the address and the youth that congregate there. Residents have asked how they can redact any personal details of their objection from the public record. Of particular concern is the suggestion made by Trident a few years ago, that the area was a centre for organized criminal activity which culminated in the murder of a prominent Turkish gang member in 2012. This fear, whether unfounded or not, stops residents and local businesses from regularly contacting police about the persistent anti social behavior and criminal activity they witness at the address.

We would urge the Licensing Committee to seek the views of the local Safeguarding Children Team about their knowledge of the activities at Fat Sam's and their opinion as to the benefit of awarding a licence to premises frequented by children and teenagers.

Recommendations

Most residents would prefer that the licensing committee reject the application out of hand on the basis of the persistent and consistent criminal and anti social behavior which emanates from the address. For many residents, Fat Sam's has brought only increased litter, noise nuisance, crime and exacerbated existing anti-social and public disorder problems.

If any licence is to be awarded, we strongly suggest that the committee issue a time limited licence in the first instance, in accordance with Section 8.14 of the Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. In this way the levels of associated anti social behavior, drug dealing, harassment and the environmental impact of the licence, can be monitored by local residents and relevant agencies.

The applicant has requested a late night licence for consumption of alcohol both on and off the premises. Residents feel any licence should cease at 10.30pm promptly and be limited to consumption on the premises.

Strict controls should apply to the patron's use of the outside area in front of the premises. The noise impact on residents should be noted and restrictions placed on drinking and sitting outside beyond 10.00pm. With less ambient noise levels late at night, the voices of groups of people drinking in the open carry a long way, and it's not realistic to assume that customers will all be talking quietly. As a guide, we suggest that outside hours might be limited to 10pm (Mon to Mon) but we appreciate that some residents still feel these hours are too late. Either way, it is important that the outside use hours should be considerably shorter than the full hours which may be permitted by the outcome of this application.

The premises should have clear signs informing patrons to respect the neighbouring residents when outside (smoking) or leaving the take away. An S.I.A registered security person should be responsible for ensuring people disperse after the premises have closed at 11pm.

The premises should operate a ScanNet ID scan system (or similar) for age verification, to ensure the age appropriate visitors are on the premises.

The licence should be limited to the sale of wine and beer only.

It is highly recommended that an incident log be kept at the premises, handwritten at the time of any incident and made available on request to the police and which will record all crimes, ejections of patrons, complaints received, any disorder and any faults in the CCTV system or scanning equipment.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to make representations with regard to the licensing application submitted on 1 June 2015 by Mr Rabindranauth Sukhdeo with the above details, to open a "community hub at Bruce Castle Park... a cafe and community space for all... a family and children oriented space with a cafe providing healthy food and snacks".

I have no reason to doubt Mr Sukhdeo's bona fides or his good intentions. However, there are several significant issues with this application which I believe should lead the Council to refuse it in its current form.

(I realise that Mr Sukhdeo holds a lease from the Council for the space in question. I am confident that the Council will not permit itself to take into account any issues arising from its decision to grant that lease, such as any contention that the license is necessary for the leased property to be a success, since that would be an abuse of the Council's discretion and an irrelevant consideration.)

By way of background, and to establish my standing in this matter, I live on Bruce Castle Road with my wife and our 8-year-old daughter. Our daughter's bedroom is at the back of the house. The property (which is on the west side of the north-south street) directly abuts the east side of Bruce Castle Park, which is sited in the middle of an overwhelmingly residential area of the Borough. Any increase in noise and disturbance in the park therefore has a direct effect on our daughter's wellbeing, since it prevents her from sleeping.

Before addressing the statutory grounds for objection under the Licensing Act 2003, I must point to a fundamental contradiction in the application itself. The description of the intended use of the property is as a "family and children oriented space". But the application seeks permission to serve alcohol on the premises, and play both live and recorded music and permit dancing inside and outside, till midnight every weekday and till 2am on Fridays and Saturdays. This cannot be solely for pre-booked functions, since these are explicitly mentioned as "non-standard timings" in each of these licence categories. A place that stays open till midnight or 2am each night is categorically not a "family or child oriented space". Mr Sukhdeo should be clear in his application whether he intends the Pavilion to be a family oriented establishment, as the application describes - or, as it implies, one which also caters for adults late into the evening. If the latter, for the reasons below, the licence should be refused, or the hours sharply curtailed.

I draw the Council's attention to its own statement of licensing policy, which says that "stricter conditions with regard to noise control and/or limitations to opening hours may be imposed in the case of premises where relevant representations are made, and that are situated in largely residential areas". In this context, I note that the application as currently framed would permit outdoors music, both live and recorded, till midnight or 2am each night.

Please also note that borough police records, particularly those of the safer neighbourhoods teams, will corroborate my comments below about illicit and anti-social use of Bruce Castle Park at present.

The protection of children from harm

Bruce Castle Park has two children's play areas. One, a nature area, is close to the proposed site of the cafe. All too often, this area is already sometimes unuseable by children owing to the presence of cigarette and drug paraphernalia, drink cans and bottles, rubbish and used condoms, left there by adults abusing the space in the day and late at night and keeping children away from a space that should be theirs by right. The mitigating steps the application describes do not address how this space can be prevented from even more routine abuse by having dozens, if not hundreds on occasion, of extra people passing through the park in the middle of the night.

Moreover, the fact that the park is not locked at night already means that it is used in relation to the use and sale of illegal drugs during the night (not to mention drinking and indecent behaviour), and subject to noise and disruption. As noted above, this periodically makes it impossible for my daughter - and I understand other children on this side of Bruce Castle Road - to sleep. The licensed presence of significant numbers of inebriated adults in the middle of the night, potentially every night (if the timings currently applied for are granted), are certain to exponentially increase the levels of disruption, as well as providing cover - and an additional market - for the illicit activities already taking place.

The prevention of crime and disorder

As noted, Bruce Castle Park is already subject to significant levels of criminal behaviour. As well as the disorder noted above, this has included trespass onto properties abutting the park and criminal damage caused to them. Our home has more than once been one of those affected. The presence of significant numbers of extra people in what should be an unoccupied space during the night risks simply providing cover for further activities of this kind, or (depending on the degree of inebriation) contributing to them. (An argument could be made that more people might dissuade some of the current misuse, but it is just as possible, if not more possible, that the reverse will be true.)

Nothing in the licensing application addresses the disorder and potential for additional criminality that it seems highly likely to cause, adding to the already elevated amount of

anti-social behaviour which exists in the neighbourhood of the Park and the borough generally (according to the Council's Community Safety Strategy).

Public safety at the licensed premises

The application seeks permission to play music, live and recorded, outside till midnight or 2am. The council's own statement of licensing policy notes that "the use of tables and chairs will cease by 21:00 to minimise any late night noise that may arise". It is hard to see how this restriction can co-exist with the license timings applied for.

The prevention of public nuisance

For residents such as ourselves, who live close to the park, the prospect of the a space which is meant to be dark and quiet from the evening on being instead licensed to contain significant numbers of inebriated people in the middle of the night, along with nightly outdoors music (as the current application would permit) and lighting, seems wholly inappropriate for a residential area. The only background noise in the park into which the additional noise could realistically blend is that caused by illicit activity; I am sure the Council would not see this as a proper justification for the additional disruption and nuisance.

Moreover, the fact that none of the park's four entrances are locked at night - and that the cafe space has no direct egress to the street - means that there will be no realistic limitation on departing patrons leaving in whatever direction they wish, including remaining in the park itself indefinitely. Unless the new cafe is proposing blanketing the entire park with security and CCTV, it is hard to see how it can realistically limit this drastic incursion of additional nuisance. Equally, the presence of so many people late at night is likely to hugely increase the amount of litter (whether clean or - as noted above - dangerous) left in the park. Again, there is no indication of how the cafe intends to mitigate this issue. Finally, the lack of parking controls on the surrounding roads (my own included) risks having patrons create disruption in adjoining streets as they return to vehicles.

Conclusion

I appreciate and congratulate Mr Sukhdeo on his dedication to our borough. This application, however, is the wrong way to go about demonstrating that dedication. A "family and child oriented space" in Bruce Castle Park, open in the daytime, clearly offers necessary and welcome amenities, and a licensing application framed to achieve those ends would be hard to argue with. But this application does not aim to achieve that. Instead, it seeks to use the Park as a venue for late-night drinking and dancing, adding significantly to the risks its misuse already poses to neighbouring residents. Even if the initial intent is to use these permissions only sparingly, this Park is still entirely the wrong place for that to happen - even on a limited basis.

Please refuse this application in its current form, or vary it so as to prevent the possibility of late-night activities which form the foundation for my representations. Thank you.

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
