- 1. Describe the issue under consideration
- 1.1 The Elite Cattery has been licensed for many years in the borough of Haringey to operate as a facility for the boarding of cats. The property is required by law to submit an application on a yearly basis, which it has done for a licence for 2017. A copy of the new application is shown at DB1.

The premises are licenced under the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963 and have been subject to inspection by the City of London Animal Health Inspectors and Vets for a number of years.

In June 2014 the City of London Veterinary Services informed Haringey of the new set of Model Licensing conditions for catteries that had been published by the Chartered Institute of Environmental Health, a copy of the new conditions were provided to Mr Morgan to make him aware of the new requirements that affected his business.

At the time of this visit the City of London Vet reported that the size of the accommodation was not adequate as there was no access to any exercise runs in the majority of the kennels. At the time this was in breach of the Haringey Licence conditions 17 and would also not have met the new requirements in the 2013 CIEH Model conditions. Haringey had not adopted these conditions at the time. A copy of the email and the vets report are attached as DB2.

A further inspection was carried by CoL Veterianry Services in November 2014, concerns were again raised by the vet. A copy of the vets inspection report and an advisory warning letter was sent to Mr Morgan asking for the various matters to be addressed. These are shown as DB3. The then Council animal welfare officer was asked to carry out a visit and to work with Mr Morgan to ensure compliance with the conditions and meeting the standards for the unit sizes. The letter and email are shown at DB4.

An unannounced visit was carried by the CoL Veterianry Services in July 2015, whilst it was noted that a number of recommendations had been implemented, the cattery remained non compliant in terms of the new CIEH model conditions. See DB5. The annual renewal licence inspection was carried in December 2015 and again the sizes of the units were the main concern. The licence for 2016 was not issued until March 2016 and a covering letter along with the vets report advised Mr Morgan of the agreement he had made with officers to upgrade the units from the previous year.





On the 23rd February 2016 the Service received a formal complaint from a couple who had left their cat in the care of the cattery whilst they were out of the UK. We know that the cat was unwell prior to being placed in the cattery and subsequently died whilst in situ at the cattery. The customers submitted a complaint based on what they claim to be the lack of care given to the animal by staff at the cattery, which they say pointed to the animal suffering for a long period of time before ay action was taken to seek medical attention. A copy of the complainants letter is attached as DB6.

The Council then undertook an inspection following the complaint and the officer Found the operation of the premises to be non compliant with conditions 21, 53, 54 and 64. A copy of the officers report is at DB7. The investigating officer requested a formal interview with Mr Morgan but this was responded to by Mr Morgan by engaging solicitors who sought to question the Councils authority in dealing with this matter. Mr Morgan was subsequently interviewed under PACE in relation to the complaint relating to the dead cat. He declined to say anything but submitted a written statement.

Due to the cat being ill prior to being left at the cattery we could not take this particular complaint any further.

The CofL Veterinary Services carried out a joint visit on the 5th October 2016 with the EHO. It was noted that in addition to the existing cages, the cattery had built new cages. All of which were non compliant with the 2013 CIEH Model Licence Conditions. These had been built and installed even after all the information that had been sent to Mr Morgan advising of the CIEH Model Conditions and the need to adhere to them. These newly built cages were even smaller than the sizes permitted by the then Haringey conditions. The vets also raised concerns over the welfare of some of the cats seen at the time of the visit that were displaying signs of stress.

The supplementary vet report for 5th October 2016 and subsequent animal health inspectors report can be seen at appendix DB8 & DB9 along with letters sent to Mr Morgan.

On the 4th January 2017 the CoL Veterinary Services carried out another joint visit, again accompanied by the EHO. The cattery had failed to implement any changes to the size of the cages in line with the 2013 CIEH Model Licence Conditions and since the last visit on the 5th October 2016. This was documented in the supplementary vet report and subsequent animal health inspection report provided on the 5th and 6th January 2017 appendix DB10. At DB11 is the letter received from Mr Morgans solicitors and supporting documentation along with the Council letter in reponse.

2 Recommendations

The recommendation from the City of London is that this cattery should be refused a licence unless they can produce a schedule of proposed plans with a time frame to replace the small units in this cattery with new units that meet the requirements and give each cat/family of cats their own exclusive space with a sleeping area and joined exercise run and the policy of mixing cats in communal exercise is stopped entirely. Mr Morgan has been given the opportunity to submit a schedulem of works but has failed to do so, this is why the decision has been made to bring the matter to the LSC for determination.

Options available to the Council



Any determination by the Committee must be both proportionate and reasonable under the provisions of the Human Rights Act and be balanced against the freedoms afforded to the cats boarded at the premises under the Animal Welfare Act.

3.2 Comments from City of London Vets.

The City of London Vets understand that Haringey Licensing wrote to Mr Morgan asking for him to submit a schedule of works to bring the cat accommodation to the standard set by the requirements of the 2013 MLC and to stop the practice of communicable exercise for the cats. Morgan has failed to submit this programme of works our recommendation therefore is for refusal of the licence application.

3.3 Comments from EHO Animal Welfare Officer.

The Environmental Health officers comments are attached as appendix DB12.

- 4. Policy Implications
- 4.1 Regulation of the animal boraing trade is a statutory function carried out by the Council. The decision should be made with regard to the Animal Boarding Establishment Act the Welfare Act and the CIEH Model Conditions. Mr Morgan is able to exercise his right of appeal to the Magistrise Court.
- 4.2 Eqalities impact

At the time of writing this report there were no implications for equality and diversity. Any decision taken by the Licensing Sub-Committee will be in accordance with the relevant legislation.

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COMMENTS

- This was a routine midyear unannounced visit Previously tried to carry out an inspection on the 13th June 2014, but the owner was away on holiday Donna was at an Osteopath appointment spoke to Anthony
- I was accompanied during the visit by Donna Lewis who gave me a tour of the cattery
- The whole premises appeared to be clean and tidy with no adverse smells
- There were a number of cats boarding at time of the visit and Donna explained that although each kennel is only a sleeping area, cats are let into communal areas for exercise if permission is given by owners
- I was concerned over the size of accommodation for the cats as in the size of each kennel would be adequate for a sleeping compartment but there is no access to any exercise runs in the majority of the kennels — This is in breach of Haringey Licence condition 17 and if Haringey were to adopt the 2013 CIEH model conditions they this cattery would not meet the requirements
- I have also noted that although Haringey condition 45 states a vaccination record should be kept on site during the boarding this procedure in not in operation./ Vac certs are checked but a copy is not kept and original is not kept on site
- Details on the booking form need to be verified at full licence inspection to ensure they meet requirement 53 of Haringey's licence conditions
- No concerns was raised over the welfare of the cats during the inspection but I do have concerns over the practice of communal exercising in a cattery. My concerns come from previous experience where cats have become infected with disease at other catteries operating this protocol but Donna Lewis informed me that they had not received any complaints re this practice and owners had to sign to say cats could be communally exercised

Notification of intention to revise the Model conditions for Pet Vending Licensing 2013.

We are consulting you on the Council intention to revise the conditions attached to pet shop Licences granted under the Pet Animals Act 1951.

These changes are being brought in across the UK and will ensure that premises comply with the legislation.

The main changes are:

- Larger accommodation is now required for rabbits and other small mammals, and in particular rabbits must now have sufficient height to be able to rear up.
- Introduction of stocking densities for birds.
- Introduction of detailed conditions for reptiles and amphibians, including space standards
- Prey animals such as rabbits must now have hiding places within their accommodation.
- There is more emphasis on provision of environmental enrichment such as toys and gnawing objects.
- Hay must now be provided for rabbits and other mammals as appropriate
- New applicants for pet vendor licences must not only obtain a recognised qualification within two years, as required in the current standards, but must also now be registered with that recognised body right from the start and have suitably progressed within 12 months.
- Care advice must now be given to purchasers of pets.
- A greater emphasis on signage and record-keeping.

We would urge you to read the document and familiarise yourself with it as it will be the conditions attached to all pet shop licences in future.

I do have ongoing concerns re Elite cattery and the units – I do understand that the cattery has been running for many years but veterinary science has evolved and there is evidence that cats do not socialise well and mixing of cats in catteries is not recommended – Although with this cattery there would be no other way of cats to gain exercise other than by communal exercise The majority of units in this cattery would not meet the standards expected in regards to size and access to an exercise area as stated in the 2013 conditions and for your reference I have attached a copy of the 2013 CIEH licence conditions for catteries of which we would encourage all Local Authorities to adopt. I have also highlighted areas in my report where the cattery does not meet the LB Haringey current conditions

You can see that among the organisations that were instrumental in putting the CIEH 2013 conditions together were the British Veterinary Association, The British Small Animal Veterinary Association and the RSPCA

I enclose a copy of the inspection report complied by the City of London Vet following the recent inspection of your cattery.

As you will see there are a numbers of areas where the Vet found that you were not compliant with your licensing conditions. In both August and November 2013 the lack of a written training policy was identified as it has been again now. Please address this as a matter of urgency.

Earlier this year Haringey adopted the new model conditions for cat boarding. These will be reflected in your next licence when it is renewed next year. You should familiarise yourself with them. The Vet report notes some areas where you will not be compliant with the new licence conditions.

I visited the above premises yesterday 18/12 following the report that you forwarded to me.

I went through the comments and concerns raised by Sharon Edwards and can confirm the following:

- 1. Condition 35 the water bowls have all been de-scaled, and cleaned. Proprietor has decided to replace the water bowls, these had mostly been done before the visit but they state they have a few more to change when the new batch comes.
- 2. Condition 45 in terms of the vaccination cards they are not kept on site but the relevant information is placed onto the check in card which is completed for every cat that arrives before they are left at the premises. The only details kept on a vaccination card is the date of the vaccination, the type of vaccination and batch number. They take date and type down and keep on the card.
- 3. Condition 54 the records are now being maintained for the relevant period of 6 months.
- 4. Condition 59 they are currently developing the fire risk assessment, advice has been given.
- 5. Condition 64 training schedule is now documented and signed by the individual workers, training policy in the process of being completed, advice has been given.
- 6. Condition 15 to 18 these are subject to discussion.

If you require any more information please let me know.

I will be working with them on the new standards to be adopted for the units.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to complain about the circumstances around my cat's death while in the care of Elite Cattery.

I was away abroad because I have serious health issues I needed to deal with. My husband noticed that my cat, Yoda, was a bit lethargic Saturday morning 23/01/2016 and had not eaten the food served that morning. My husband dropped our 2 cats at Elite Cattery, 512 Archway Road, London, N6 4NA at 2pm that day as he had to travel overseas the next day for work. He told the staff at Elite Cattery that Yoda was not well and asked them keep an eye on him and to let him know if he got worse.

Sunday 24/01/2015 at 9:10 Sarah (the Assistant) finds Yoda in a critical condition; I quote: "he was yowling, was freezing cold as if he had spent 10 hours in the snow and could not move nor stand up. He could barely move his head."

My husband only got a call from Sarah at 11:03 on 24/01/2016. She informed him of Yoda's critical condition and said they were taking him to the emergency vet, Medivet. Yoda arrived at Medivet at 12:00 and died there at 12:45.

Upon my return to Europe, I called Donna (the Manager) from Italy to speak to her and get all the facts. I recorded the conversation as I could not understand why my cat was left agonising for 2h50mn (which is an extremely long time) without any emergency care.

I asked Donna if my cat had eaten the night before (Saturday night) and she was unable to tell me whether he had eaten or drank any water. She seemed quite unconcerned and played it down, which is very unprofessional if not inhumane. I reminded her I had given all our vet's detail (The Royal Veterinary College) and that the first time I ever left my cats with them, I had authorised them to call the vet or emergency vet straight away if anything was wrong with the cats. The response I got from her made no sense and was very evasive.

I then asked why they had not called the vet or my husband straight away and she said that they couldn't get hold of my husband. I checked my husband's phone log and there were no missed calls and no voicemails prior to 11:03, when he received the first call from Elite Cattery (from Sarah).

When Yoda finally arrived at the vet his mentation was very low and his temperature was not reading (according to Jeremy, the vet who took him into care and to the vet's report + post-mortem)

I would also like to bring your attention to the fact that instead of computers they have a handwritten logbook so no prompt access to information, cat's history, vet info, owner's directives, etc.

I have since looked at their website which contains 50% poor reviews, which reinforces my belief that they have neglected my cat and left him to suffer needlessly. They decreased his chances of survival with every minute they wasted.

I do not find it acceptable that Donna was unable to give me precise information as to why it took so long to help my cat. She was evasive, unorganised, and also blamed traffic on a Sunday morning as an excuse. She clearly was not telling the truth about getting hold of my husband who was at home all this time and had only started making his way to the airport at 11:15.

My husband got a second call from Donna at 11:21 repeating Yoda didn't look good and that she was taking him to the vet. She asked him if we had pet insurance and my husband said no but that cost did not matter.

PS: The vet told me it took 12 hour for Yoda to die from HCM (progressive fluid accumulation in his lungs and eventually heart failure). My other cat wiskey threw up and had diarrhea for several days after returning home from Elite cattery.

I would sincerely appreciate your support and guidance in investigating this matter and holding Elite Cattery to account.

Animal Boarding Establishments Act 1963 Licence Conditions (Cats)

Unless otherwise stated, these conditions shall apply to all buildings and areas to which cats have access and/or which are used in association with the boarding of cats. The term "unit" relates to the individual unit of accommodation for each cat, including bedding and exercise area.

- 1. The maximum number of cats to be kept at any one time is 280. This relates to the number and size of the units. Each cat must be provided with a separate unit except cats from the same household who may share a unit with the written consent of the cats' owners subject to the unit size being adequate.
- No animals other than cats are to be boarded within the licensed facilities without the written approval of the local authority. Any animals kept for other purposes must be completely separate from the cats being boarded.
- 3. All units must be of substantial construction and provide damp proof protection for the weather.
- 4. All exterior wood must be properly treated against wood rot. No product to be used that contains any substance toxic to cats.
- 5. All internal surfaces used in the construction of walls, floors, partitions, doors and doorframes to be durable and impervious. There must be no projections liable to cause injury.
- 6. It must be nose and paw/claw proof and safe for the animals within.
- 7. Sleeping areas of units must be so insulated as to prevent extremes of temperature.
- 8. The construction must be such that the security of the cat is ensured.
- 9. All areas to which cats have free access must be roofed with impermeable material.
- 10. Where the gap between units is less than 2 feet, sneeze and hygiene screens must be provided to a minimum height of 1.0m (3'3"). The same protection must be provided to adjoined raised shelving etc.
- 11. Drainage must not pass towards sides or partitions, so that contamination does not pass between units. Litter trays must be adequate in positions to avoid cross-contamination.
- 12. Doors must be strong enough t resist impact and scratching and must be close fitting and capable of being effectively secured.
- 13. Where plastic doors with metal edging are used, the strip metal edges must be adequately shaped and smoothed to prevent injury to the cat.
- 14. Al windows must be escape proof at all times. Such windows must be protected by weld mesh, or be made of reinforced glass, polycarbonate or other impact resistant material.
- 15. Each unit must be provided with a sleeping area of, at least, 0.85 sq. (9sq. ft) for a single cat, or 1.5 sq (16 sq. ft) for up to a maximum of three cats from the same household. Suitable bedding equipment, which allows the cat to be comfortable and which is capable of being easily and adequately cleaned and sterilised must be provided. Such equipment must be sited out of draughts. Bedding material must be maintained in a clean, parasite free and dry condition. This applies when owners provide their own bedding material.

- 16. The sleeping area must have a minimum height of 0.9m (3ft).
- 17. Each unit must be provided with an exercise area of, at least, 1.7 sq m (18sq. ft) for a single cat, or 3.0 sq m from the bedding area and exclusive to that pen. There must be free and easy access for the cat between the bedding and exercise area at all times, except when bedded down for the night. This entire area must be roofed.
- 18. Units must have a minimum height of 1.8 m (4 sq. ft), although 6ft is recommended.
- 19. Where a group exercise policy is followed, the owners of the cats must be informed and an agreement obtained in writing.
- 20. Where a group exercise policy is followed, a maximum number of 10 cats are to be exercised together at any one time. This exercise period is to be closely supervised to prevent fighting/injuries.
- 21. Units must be open onto secure corridors or other secure areas so that cats are not able to escape from the premises.
- 22. Exercise areas must not be used as bedding areas.
- 23. The establishment must be connected to mains drainage or an approved, localised sewage disposal system.
- 24. The bedding area of the unit must be maintained at a temperature of between 10 C (50F) and 26C (79 F).
- 25. In isolation units there must be a means of maintaining the temperature at a level suitable for the condition of the cat, and dependant on veterinary advice. However, the temperature in the isolation unit must not be allowed to rise above 26C (79F) or fall below 13C (60F).
- 26.A "minimum-maximum" thermometer must be provided in each unit block and isolation unit.
- 27. Permanent ventilation must be provided to the animal quarters without the creation of excessive draughts.
- 28. Adequate artificial lighting must be provided to all areas of the establishment, so positioned as to constitute no danger to the cats.
- 29. All parts of the establishment must be kept clean and free from accumulations of dirt and dust and must be kept in such a manner as to be conducive to maintenance of disease control and cat comfort.
- 30. Litter trays containing approved material, which are easy to clean and impermeable must be provided. These must be emptied and cleaned in the morning and changed if necessary at anytime during the day if found to be unduly soiled.
- 31. All bedding areas must be kept clean and dry.
- 32. Each unit must be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected upon vacation or every seven days whichever is the shorter. All fittings and bedding must also be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected prior to re-use.
- 33. Facilities must be provided for the proper reception, storage and disposal of all waste in accordance with legal requirements. Particular care should be taken to segregate clinical waste arising from the treatment and handling of cats with infectious diseases and the final disposal route for all such waste must be incineration.
- 34. All vehicles used by the establishment for the transportation of cats must be kept clean and disinfected. Cats must be transported in cages/baskets or boxes of adequate size and construction (including sneeze barriers to control the spread of infectious diseases), and be provided with adequate ventilation. All vehicles must be secure. Legal requirements concerning transport of animals must be complied with.

- 35. All boarded cats must be adequately supplied with suitable food. Wholesome water must be available at all times and changed as needed, at least daily.
- 36. Eating vessels must be cleaned after each meal.
- 37. Drinking vessels must be cleaned at least once daily.
- 38. Facilities must be provided for the storage and preparation of food for the cats.
- 39. Food storage and preparation areas must be hygienically constructed and be kept clean.
- 40. Where fresh and cooked meats are stored, refrigeration facilities must be provided and contamination must be avoided.
- 41. A sink with hot and cold water must be provided for the washing of food equipment and eating vessels. A wash hand basin with hot and cold water must also be provided for staff.
- 42. Containers must be provided for the storage of food and shall be so constructed and kept in such good order, repair and condition as to be proof against insects and other pests.
- 43. Eating and drinking vessels must be provided; these must be of a material which is capable of being easily cleansed and sterilised.
- 44. Adequate precautions must be taken to prevent and control the spread of infectious and contagious disease and parasite among cats, staff, and visitors.
- 45. Cats boarded or resident must be accompanied by an up to date record of vaccinations against infectious feline enteritis, feline respiratory disease and other relevant diseases. Vaccination must have been completed at least 4 weeks before the first date of boarding. This record of vaccination must be kept on site throughout the period that the cat is boarded. A shorter period of time is acceptable if suitable veterinary evidence is provided based on manufacturers instructions.
- 46. Adequate isolation facilities must be provided.
- 47. These isolation facilities must be in compliance with the other boarding requirements but must be separate and physically isolated from the main units. Isolation facilities must be used where the presence of the infectious or contagious disease is suspected.
- 48. Adequate facilities and procedures to prevent the spread of infectious disease between the isolation unit and other units must be provided.
- 49. Measures must be taken to keep establishments free of rodents, insects, and other pests and cats free from external parasites.
- 50. The establishment's veterinary surgeon must be called in case of signs of disease, injury or illness. Where any cat is sick or injured, any instruments for its treatment which have been given by a veterinary surgeon must be strictly followed.
- 51. Any deaths of cats on the premises must be referred immediately to the establishment's veterinary surgeon and the local authority inspector.
- 52. A well stocked first aid kit suitable for use on cats must be available and accessible on site.
- 53. A register must be kept of all cats boarded. The information kept must include the following:-
 - Date of arrival and unit number
 - Name of cat, and any identification marks

- Description, breed, age and sex of cat
- Name, address, telephone number of contact person whilst boarded.
- Name, address and telephone number of cat's veterinary surgeon
- Anticipated date and actual date of departure
- Health, welfare and nutritional requirements
- 54. Records must be kept available for a minimum of 24 months and kept in such a manner as to enable an authorised officer to easily access such information. Where records are computerised, a hard copy must be kept. The register must also be available to members of staff of the establishment at all times.
- 55. Each unit must be clearly and permanently numbered, and must carry a notice giving the name of the owner, the name and description of the cat, it's date of arrival and date of departure.
- 56. A fit and proper person aged 18 or over must always be available to exercise supervision and deal with emergencies whenever cats are boarded at the premises. Cats must be visited at regular intervals, at least 3 times daily, as necessary for their health, safety and welfare. No person under 18 must have control or supervision of the premises or cats.
- 57. Appropriate steps must be taken for the protection of the cats in case of fire or other emergencies. The name, address and telephone number of the licensee must be permanently displayed on the premises and must also be logged with the police and fire authorities. Fire protection advice must b sought from the Fire Prevention Officer and implemented.
- 58. A proper emergency evacuation plan and fire warning procedure must be drawn up and posted on the premises. This must include an instruction as to where the cats are to be evacuated to in the event of a fire or other emergency.
- 59. Fire fighting equipment must be provided in accordance with any advice given by the Fire Prevention Officer.
- 60. All electrical installations and appliances must be maintained and in a safe conditions.
- 61. Heating appliances must not be sited in a location or manner where they may present a risk of fire or a risk to cats.
- 62. Precautions must be taken to prevent any accumulation, which may present a risk of fire.
- 63. There must be adequate means of raising an alarm in the event of fire or other emergency.
- 64. A written training policy must be provided. Systematic training of staff must be demonstrated to have been carried out; including Animal Welfare, Cleanliness and hygiene, Feeding and food preparation, Disease control, First Aid, Health and Safety, and emergency procedures.
- 65. A copy of the license and its conditions must be suitably displayed to the public in a prominent position in, on or about the boarding establishment.

Elite Cattery 512 Archway Road London N6 4NA

Veterinary Inspector: - Monica David MRCVS

- This was a joint multi-agency inspection carried out with Sharon Edwards, City of London Animal Health Inspector and Charley Osinaike of the London Borough of Haringey
- The inspection was made unannounced and the purpose was to assess the premises for the suitability to be issued with a licence renewal under the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963 for 2017 should an application be received to the London Borough of Haringey
- This is a supplementary vet report to accompany the full licence inspection report submitted by Sharon Edwards
- The first thing I noticed when we entered the reception area was the strong smell of urine, which was an indication to me that this was a cattery not operating at a satisfactory standard. This smell was then evident throughout the cat areas
- The 1st area we inspected was a room referred to as "The Annex" In this area I noted that all the cats were in cages, two of the cages had one of the gates covered by a towel, because the occupant was too nervous to be in full view of all the other cats.
- Hiding is a behaviour that cats can use to help them cope with changes in their environment. Cats will hide to avoid interactions with other cats or people, or stressful situations. Providing cats with places to hide can reduce stress and can be as simple as providing a cardboard box, an igloo-type bed or other structures within the unit. Every cat unit should be provided with the hiding space as per 2013 CIEH model condition. During the visit I noted that only a couple of cats had boxes to hide in most just had beds that left them exposed while we were in the Annex area we heard a number of the cats growling and grumbling
- It is important from a welfare perspective to ensure the need that a cat has to be housed, with or apart from, other animals, is met. The cat is by nature a territorial and solitary animal, and contact with or seeing unfamiliar/strange cats can be very stressful. Most adult cats will only be friendly to siblings or certain other cats they live with. Strange cats are usually avoided. Cats can find the presence of other cats very stressful and can suffer if they cannot avoid cats with whom they are not familiar or do not like. It must be possible for cats to be able to avoid seeing other cats by being provided with hiding places and translucent (allowing light to pass through, but only diffusely, so that objects

- on the other side cannot be clearly distinguished) barriers between units. There was no sleeping quarters as described by the 2013 CIEH model condition in any of the accommodations.
- The size and layout of the cages did not permit there to be enough separation between litter tray, water bowl, food bowl and beds, which is also part of the 2013 CIEH model condition.
- All food must be positioned well away from the litter tray, (minimum 60cm), as cats will
 not eat if it is placed too close to their toilet site, same principle is valid for water the
 bowls. this was not observed in this cattery due to the restriction in size of the units
- Each unit had a litter tray but the trays were only lined with absorbent material as a sheet of newspaper. Only a couple of cats were seen to have litter in their trays and even then it was only a sprinkling. Cats are meticulous animals and a dirty litter tray may deter use. Natural behaviour is to scratch in loose material (litter), to be able to dig a hole and to cover their waste. The tray should be large enough (average size is 30 x 42 cm (12" x 16") to let the cat turn around and the litter deep enough (a minimum of 3 cm is recommended) to allow digging activity. Loose sawdust, shredded or sheet newspaper, or soil, are not considered acceptable as litter material. I witnessed on the day different cats trying to cover the waste to no avail since the substrate of a sheet of newspaper was unsuitable.
- In this establishment the exercising area(s) are the communal area(s) this practice is in clear contravention with the 2013 CIEH model condition where is clearly stated that cats from different units must not share exercise runs or an exercise area either at the same time or sequentially. This is also a breach of the Animal Welfare Act 2006 as per the section 9 requirement for animals to be housed with or apart from other animals
- During the inspection when we entered the area referred to a "MIB" I noted that there
 were 4 cats in the communal exercise area and all were exhibiting stress related
 behaviours
- When a cat is placed in a stressful situation such as communal exercise in a new environment, in proximity with other cats and new routine, this will increase the stress level of the cat(s) and as consequence this can lead to shedding of viruses or greater susceptibility to diseases.
- The Animal Welfare Act 2006 in section 9 makes it an offence for a person not to comply with the basic 5 welfare needs of an animals and these are as follows
 - 1. its need for a suitable environment,
 - 2. its need for a suitable diet,
 - 3. its need to be able to exhibit normal behaviour patterns,
 - 4. any need it has to be housed with, or apart from, other animals, and
 - 5. its need to be protected from pain, suffering, injury and disease.
- I was informed by Sharon Edwards and Charley Osinaike, the Licencee Tony Morgan and
 the Manger, Donna Lewis had been informed that the CIEH had published updated
 MLC's in 2013 As a consequence I was very surprised, when we were shown to an area
 named as "New Block" That again contained small units with no exercise area, that this
 area had been installed in Summer 2016 by Tony Morgan It was evident by the
 installation that no regard had been given to the CIEH 2013 conditions or the cats welfare
 needs as per the Animal Welfare Act 2006

• Conclusion

I am of the opinion that in this cattery, the cat(s) welfare has not been given enough consideration

The Units are small and not suitable for any use other than to board cats for more than a few hours – they would only be suitable as a holding pen for a restricted number of hours.

- In boarding cats in these units, the requirement for a suitable environment has not been met. This also leads in the fact that if the cat does not have a suitable environment it cannot exhibit normal behaviour patterns.
- The cats can also not exhibit normal behaviour when using the litter trays as there is only a sheet of newspaper in most of the trays as details above
- In allowing the cats to have communal exercise, the need to be housed with, or apart from, other animals has not been met.
- Cats observed during the visit were showing a range of stress related behaviours, from
 growling, cowering and hiding to panic running to try and find a place to hide. In
 increasing the stress in the cats they will be more prone to disease and so the need to be
 protected from pain, suffering, injury and disease in my opinion have been disregarded by
 the way the cattery is managed.

Please see attached a licence inspection report and the additional vet report following the inspection of Elite cattery on the 5th October 2016

Both Monica David and myself are in agreement that the units that provide accommodation for boarding cats do not meet the requirements of the CIEH model licence conditions for cattery's

Cats are not a suitable species to be mixed with cats from other households — The only exercise the cats receive at this cattery is when they are given communal exercise — At the time of the visit we observed cats exhibiting signs of stress and aggression

We were particularly disappointed to see the new installation of 27 units in the "new Build area" especially as the owner, Mr Morgan, had been made aware of the 2013 CIEH conditions prior to this installation - It is our recommendation that these units are not licenced for use

All cats should be supplied with a separate unit that gives the cat a sleeping unit and an exercise area – the food and water should be separate from the litter tray and sleeping area

As it is our opinion that the units in place are not fit for purpose it is the City of London's recommendation that Mr Morgan supplies plans for a schedule of work to install new units into this cattery to bring it into compliance with the 2013 CIEH model licence conditions

The Council continues to have concerns relating to the operation of the cattery.

As you will recall there were a number of areas where the Vet found that you were not compliant with your licensing conditions. Since 2013 the Authority has been issuing you with a licence on the condition that the problems identified are sorted out within a given time period as well as compliance with the licence conditions.

In determining whether to grant a licence for the keeping of a pet shop by any person at any premises, a local authority shall in particular (but without prejudice to their discretion to withhold a licence on other grounds) have regard to the need for securing—

- (a)that animals will at all times be kept in accommodation suitable as respects size, temperature, lighting, ventilation and cleanliness;
- (b)that animals will be adequately supplied with suitable food and drink and (so far as necessary) visited at suitable intervals;
- (c)that animals, being mammals, will not be sold at too early an age;
- (d)that all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent the spread among animals of infectious diseases:
- (e)that appropriate steps will be taken in case of fire or other emergency; and shall specify such conditions in the licence as it deems necassary.

The Vet has carried out a further inspection and have advised of the following matters that will need to be addressed prior to any licence being issued:

- Cattery units in use do not meet the requirements in the CIEH current published Conditions
- Recommendation that cattery supplies a schedule of works to bring the units into compliance with the CIEH conditions within the next 12 months by the end of 2017
- None of the units in the New Build area to be used as these were built in 2016, but you have failed to ensure that they are compliant with the current standards even though you have previously been notified of these.

It was previously agreed that you would undertake the upgrade of the cattery to ensure compliance with the standards. It is disappointing that the Vet has carried out an inspection yet again and this work has not been undertaken as agreed.

You must ensure that you are compliant with the conditions in order to be considered suitable to be licensed going forward.

I refer to joint multi-agency inspection at ELITE CATTERY, 512 ARCHWAY ROAD, LONDON N6 4NA by Sharon Edwards (City of London Animal Health Inspector), Monica David (MRCVS) Charley Osinaike (Haringey Council's Environmental Health Officer) on the 5th October 2016 at 10:50.

The purpose of the visit is to assess both animal welfare and the suitability of Elite Cattery for the re-issuing of a Cat Boarding Establishment Licence under the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963.

You are advised the Council continues to have concerns over the operation of the cattery. You are strongly advised to carefully read the enclosed Supplementary Vet Report submitted by Monica David and the Full Licence Inspection Report submitted by Sharon Edwards. These highlight those matters needed to ensure compliance with current standards/regulations.

Both reports should be read in conjunction with the CIEH Model Licence Conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013.

You are further advised that in determining whether to grant a licence for the operation of a cat boarding establishment by any person at any premises, a local authority shall in particular (but without prejudice to their discretion to withhold a licence on other grounds) have regard to the need for securing—

- (a) that animals will at all times be kept in accommodation suitable as respects to size, temperature, lighting, ventilation and cleanliness;
- (b) that animals will be adequately supplied with suitable food and drink and (so far as necessary) visited at suitable intervals;
- (c) that animals, being mammals, will not be sold at too early an age;
- (d) that all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent the spread among animals of infectious diseases;
- (e) that appropriate steps will be taken in case of fire or other emergency; and shall specify such conditions in the licence as it deems necessary.

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In summary, both the Animal Health Inspector and the Vet are in agreement that the units that provide accommodation for boarding cats (including the recently built units) are not fit for purpose, as they do not meet the requirements of the CIEH model licence conditions for cattery's. As the operator you are required to submit a detailed schedule of works (including timeframes etc.) to install new units in the cattery in order to comply with the 2013 CIEH model licence conditions.

I will be revisiting Elite Cattery in January 2017 in order to assess compliance with the above.

You must ensure that you are compliant with the conditions in order to be considered suitable to be licensed going forward.

We are in receipt of your application for the renewal of the Animal Boarding Establishment at ELITE CATTERY, 512 ARCHWAY ROAD, LONDON N6 4NA.

We wrote to you in November to advise you that the Council continued to have concerns over the operation of the cattery.

You were asked to submit a detailed schedule of works (including timeframes etc.) to install new units in the cattery in order to comply with the 2013 CIEH model licence conditions. You have been advised that the accommodation units for boarding cats (including the recently built units) are not fit for purpose, as they do not meet the requirements of the CIEH model licence conditions for cattery's.

Other matters to be addressed are:

- The cattery was found to be operating under even the minimum standard in terms of the welfare considerations this was evident in the strong smell of urine throughout the premises at the time of the visit.
- The Units were found to be small and not suitable for any use other than to board cats for more than a few hours – they would only be suitable as a holding pen for a restricted number of hours.
- Due to the unsuitable environment some cats were seen to not be able to exhibit normal behaviour patterns.
- The need to be housed with, or apart from, other animals has not been met.
- Cats observed during the visit were showing a range of stress related behaviours, from growling, cowering and hiding to panic running to try and find a place to hide

Under the Animal Welfare Act 2006, it is the duty of the person responsible for the animal to ensure welfare

- (1) A person commits an offence if he does not take such steps as are reasonable in all the circumstances to ensure that the needs of an animal for which he is responsible are met to the extent required by good practice.
- (2) For the purposes of this Act, an animal's needs shall be taken to include—
- (a) its need for a suitable environment,
- (b) its need for a suitable diet,
- (c) its need to be able to exhibit normal behaviour patterns.
- (d) any need it has to be housed with, or apart from, other animals, and
- (e) its need to be protected from pain, suffering, injury and disease.

The management practices at the Cattery put the welfare of the animals at risk,

You are further advised that in determining whether to grant a licence for the operation of a cat boarding establishment by any person at any premises, a local authority shall in particular (but without prejudice to their discretion to withhold a licence on other grounds) have regard to the need for securing—

- (a) that animals will at all times be kept in accommodation suitable as respects construction, size of quarters, number of occupants, exercising facilities, temperature, lighting, ventilation and cleanliness;
- (b) that animals will be adequately supplied with suitable food, drink and bedding material, adequately exercised, and (so far as necessary) visited at suitable intervals;
- (c) that all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent and control the spread among animals of infectious or contagious diseases, including the provision of adequate isolation facilities;
- (d) that appropriate steps will be taken for the protection of the animals in case of fire or other emergency;
- (e) that a register be kept containing a description of any animals received into the establishment, date of arrival and departure, and the name and address of the owner, such register to be available for inspection at all times by an officer of the local authority, veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner authorised under section 2 (1) of this Act;

You are now required to do the following;

- Provide a detail plan of the works to bring units to the standard sizes and a timeline for completion of the works.
- Provide details of cleaning rota and management of the animals to ensure welfare requirements are met.

Failure to respond to this request or address the concerns raised satisfactorily will result in the application being taken to a Licensing Sub Committee with a view to refuse the application. Be advised that the consultation period on the application is 28 days, so you need to ensure your documentation is with us no later than 13th January 2017.

You must ensure that you are compliant with the conditions in order to be considered suitable to be licensed going forward.

- The was an unannounced visit to Elite Cattery to carry out an inspection to assess the premises for suitability for a licence to be issued under the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963
- The officers present arrived on site at 10:42 We waited in the reception area while an
 employed known to us from previous inspections as Sarah Furlong, dealt with clients
 collecting their cats
- During this time we observed I cat being given back to its owner with its owner being
 informed that the cat had been unwell with a cold while in boarding and had been taken to
 a vet and given an antibiotic injection. No further details were given to the client and no
 medical history or details of the drugs given was handed to the client There was no
 conversation that stated any of this information would be passed on at a later date
- A total of 2 cats were handed to their owners in this office area while we were waiting to introduce ourselves All were brought out of the cattery not in their travelling containers with staff and owners boxing the cats in an unfamiliar environment and all cats were exhibiting stress behaviours towards the end of the inspection we commented to Tony Morgan and Antony the stress we had observed and their answer was that the cats were stressed as the office was an unfamiliar environment When we asked why the boxes were not taken into the cattery and the cats put into them in a familiar environment and so the stress would be reduced there was no answer forth coming
- Once the clients had left with their cats we introduced ourselves to Sarah Furlong and asked to see the owner or manager as we were at the premises to carry out a licence inspection
- At 10:50, the current licensee and applicant for 2017, Mr Tony Morgan arrived into the
 office and introductions of all the officers was made and the purpose of the inspection
 explained

- Mr Tony Morgan was quite adamant we could not enter the cattery as it was a busy period – He was quite belligerent but eventually after conversations with the officers agreed we could enter at 11:15
- We enquired to the availability of the cattery manager, Donna, but we were informed she was not on site during the inspection she was found in one of the rear areas of the cattery but did not participate in the inspection of offer any assistance
- We were accompanied during the visit by Mr Morgan and a man who identified himself as Anthony a part time casual employee During previous inspections I had been informed by Donna that Anthony was her partner and lived on site with her, but he denied this during this visit, but. Despite claiming he was only a casual member of staff, he was left to accompany us during an important licencing inspection when it was apparent to the officers that the manager, Donna, had made herself deliberately unavailable
- There have been concerns highlighted over the cat accommodation in this cattery for the
 past few years In 2014 I presented a report and correspondence to the London Borough
 of Haringey highlighting my concerns
- The London Borough of Haringey have now adopted the CIEH (Chartered Institute of Environmental Health) Model Licence conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013 – Mr Morgan has previously been advised that these conditions exist and were being adopted by LB Haringey on a number of occasions in the past 2 years – His manager Donna, has also been given this information on a number of occasions

The Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963 under Section 1(3) requires that Animals (cats) are:-

- (a) that animals will at all times be kept in accommodation suitable as respects construction, size of quarters, number of occupants, exercising facilities, temperature, lighting, ventilation and cleanliness;
- (b) that animals will be adequately supplied with suitable food, drink and bedding material, adequately exercised, and (so far as necessary) visited at suitable intervals;
- (c) that all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent and control the spread among animals of infectious or contagious diseases, including the provision of adequate isolation facilities;
- (d) that appropriate steps will be taken for the protection of the animals in case of fire or other emergency;
- (e) that a register be kept containing a description of any animals received into the establishment, date of arrival and departure, and the name and address of the owner, such register to be available for inspection at all times by an officer of the local authority, veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner authorised under section 2 (1) of the Act;

The Act allows Local Authorities to shall specify such conditions in the licence, if granted by them, as appear to the local authority necessary or expedient in the particular case for securing all the objects specified in paragraphs (a) to (e) (above).

In securing conditions as per the Act the London Borough of Haringey have adopted CIEH (Chartered Institute of Environmental Health) Model Licence conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013. These conditions are split into 6 Schedules. 5 of these (A to E) mirror the duties of care as required by the Animal Welfare Act 2006 – In meeting the minimum requirements of each schedule of the 2013 MLC then the Duty of Care in Section 9 should also be met

Schedules A - E are a requirement for all catteries and then there is a further Schedule at F that refers to the construction of New Build Kennels

Under the Animal Welfare Act 2006 a person has a legal duty to ensure an animal in their care meet the following and to not to do so is an offence under the Act

- A. its need for a suitable environment,
- B. its need for a suitable diet,
- C. its need to be able to exhibit normal behaviour patterns,
- D. any need it has to be housed with, or apart from, other animals, and
- E. its need to be protected from pain, suffering, injury and disease.

The following refers to the 2013 MLC for Cat Boarding Establishments and should be read in conjunction with it and refers to areas that the officers have assessed not to meet the requirements of the schedules of the 2013 MLC and so do not meet the requirements of the Animal Welfare Act 2006

Section A – Environment: Providing the cat(s) with a suitable place to live/stay This is an indoor cattery and reference is made to this on page 11 of the MLC

A1.23 The Safety corridor must not be used as an exercise area

All communal areas are used as exercise area – at the time of the visit there were a number of cats loose around the building – one of these was in the kitchen

A.2 Cat Units – A boarded cat is accommodated in a "unit" comprising enclosed sleeping accommodation and an adjoined individual covered exercise run

Cats are accommodated in small units and are given exercise in the communal area in the centre of each room of units that are installed against the walls — The cats do not have access to an exclusive exercise run

A.2.1 Cats from Different Households must not share cat units

The cats do not share the small sleeping units but they are let out to mix with cats from various households in the general space in the cattery

Accessing the cat unit – Each unit needs to be easily accessible and provide a means of identification for each cat

Each unit is numbered but once the cats are let out there is no way of identifying them to their specific small unit

A.2.11 The unit must have a securable, full height door for access

Apart from 13 pens referred to as the runs, where there is full height access – the units in the rest of the building have a max height between 60cm and 80cm (this is 158 units in total)

Litter Trays

Natural behaviour for a cat is to scratch in loose material (litter) to dig a hole or cover waste. (a minimum of 3cm of litter is recommended) to allow digging actively. Loose sawdust, shredded or sheet newspaper, or soil are not considered acceptable as litter material

All units had standard size litter trays – a number of units had 2 trays – All had flat newspaper and some had a very light sprinkling of litter – none met the 3cm requirement





A.2.14 Each unit must have a space to allow for at least 60cm separation between the litter tray, resting place and feeding area. This allows cats to sit, rest and eat away from areas where they urinate and defecate

This could only realistically be achieved in the pens in the area referred to as "the runs" — See example in photograph below where you can see the water next to the litter tray with only newspaper provided and this is next to the bedding and eating area



A.2.16 A safe and absorbent litter material must be provided

This has not been provided as per the requirement - All units had standard size litter trays - a number of units had 2 trays - All had flat newspaper and some had a very light sprinkling of litter - none met the 3cm requirement for litter

NOTE THE FOLLOWING IS FOR EXISTING CATTERIES AND NOT NEW BUILD – THESE ARE REFERRED TO IN SECTION F

Page 15 - A.3 Sleeping Accommodation

Cats need separate sleeping accommodation which in most cases (except some indoor catteries) must be separate from the run and provide somewhere for the cat to hide away.

Apart from the pens in the runs the rest of the units would just about be sufficient for the space allowance for a sleeping area only – but they are not away from the run as there are no exercise runs attached to the units – The cats are exposed to the Nosie and everyday workings of the cattery and not given anywhere to hide – There were a few kennels where the kennel door had a towel draped over the unit

Page 17 – Access to run

A.3.20 A cat must have access between the sleeping accommodation and run (eg a cat flap) so it can easily and safely access all parts of its unit

There are no units with runs attached for the cats to have access to – they only have their small sleeping unit and communal exercise

Page 18 – Exercise Run (in addition to and not including sleeping accommodation) The exercise run must be large enough o allow cats to play /exercise

There are no exercise runs

A.4.5 Communal exercise areas must not be used

There are only communal exercise areas in this cattery

Section B – DIET – Providing the cat(s) with an appropriate diet

B.1.4 Water must be positions well away from the litter tray, as cats will not drink if it is placed too close to a toilet site

Water bowls are placed on bars near to litter trays - see photograph above in report

B.2.13 Food intake must be monitored daily and any problems recorded

On each door there is a sheet stating the diet the cats is on but there is no recorded of how much is eaten of left – a number of cats were observed during the visit to have left wet food in their bowls but we were informed this is only noted mentally by a member of staff

Section C - BEHAVIOUR: Allowing the cats(s) to express normal behaviour patterns

C.1.2 Cats must be able to access different levels with the unit

The units are very small and restricted in space and there are no exercise runs attached to allow for different levels

C.1.4 A hiding place must be provided for cats the sleeping accommodation

No hide is available - see photograph above

C.1.6 Cats must be proved with suitable facilities for Scratching

There are no scratching posts in units - only in communal exercise areas

C.1.7 Any surface available for scratching must either be disinfected between use for different cats, or disposable.

The cats only have access to scratching posts in the main communal area of the cattery and they are not for exclusive use and given this there is no way that they could be disinfected between each cat having access to them

Section D - COMPANY: Providing cat(s) with the appropriate company

Feline company and interactions -Most adult cats will only be friendly to siblings or certain other cats they live with. Strange cats are usually avoided. Cats can find the presence of other cats very stressful and can suffer if they cannot avoid cats with whom they are not familiar or do not like. Housing cats at high densities increases the potential for them to be stressed. Only cats from the same household may share a unit.

Where possible cats must be able to avoid seeing other cats by being provided with hiding places and translucent (allowing light to pass through, but only diffusely, so that objects on the other side cannot be clearly distinguished) barriers between units.

There is no way of preventing cats from seeing other cats in this cattery

D.1.1 Cats from different units must not share exercise runs or an exercise area either at the same time or sequentially.

This cattery does not meet this requirement and all cats are exercised in communal groups—the officers have witnessed a number of cats exhibiting stressed behaviour in the communal exercise during the inspections carried out in 2016/2017

Section E - HEATLH AND WELFARE: Protecting the cat(s) from pain suffering injury and disease

The well-being of the boarded cat is paramount. It is recommended that all cats are weighed on entry and exit from the cattery. This allows the proprietor to monitor any changes and provides information should clients challenge the cat's condition on their return. This is especially important for older cats and kittens. Geriatric, ill or debilitated cats should also be monitored more closely for appropriate management. It is recommended that cats that are boarded for longer than 2 weeks are weighed every 2 weeks, and older cats and kittens weighed weekly, and records kept.

No cats are weighted on site and when I asked Anthony if this procedure was following he replied in the negative and did not seem to be aware of why it would be a beneficial requirement

E.2 Keeping Records - Page 24

The records do not appear to be as detailed as required – There is not written recording monitoring of the administration of veterinary medicines

E.3 Disease Control

No cats should be allowed in the safety corridor or to share an exercise area (unless they come from the same household

This is not complied with as all cats get communal exercise

Conclusion

This report is supplementary and outlines the mains area of concerns cross referenced to the CIEH (Chartered Institute of Environmental Health) Model Licence conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013 – It is not a complete report on the establishment

Both Mr Morgan and Anthony who accompanied us during the visit were advised that they should read the MLC and that it was not designed to be a husbandry manual but a minimum set of conditions that the premises should be operating to — They both stated during the inspection that they were aware of the document

Mr Morgan seemed more concerned with his loss of income than providing the cats in his care with a suitable environment in which to be boarded which would meet their needs and the legal requirement under the Animal Welfare Act 2006

The establishment has been running for many years (47) and Mr Morgan keeps referring to this as his defence – We have tried to explain to him that the science and understanding of the science and the needs of the cats has developed over the years and the cattery with its existing use of small sleeping units with communal exercise areas does not allow cats their legal needs as per the Animal Welfare Act 2006 –

It was explained to Mr Morgan that the CIEH (Chartered Institute of Environmental Health) Model Licence conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013 were complied with input from industry experts including vets from the British Veterinary Association, The Cats Protection and the British Small Animal Veterinary Association and that these people had a wealth of knowledge on Feline care, behaviours and requirements

The recommendation from the City of London is that this cattery should be refused a licence unless they can produce a schedule of proposed plans with a time frame to replace the small units in this cattery with new units that meet the requirements and give each cat/family of cats their own exclusive space with a sleeping area and joined exercise run and the policy of mixing cats in communal exercise is stopped

Please note that we are solicitors instructed by Elite Cattery in response to your letter dated 13 December 2016. We are instructed that Elite Cattery have addressed the concerns raised in your letter satisfactorily. There is therefore no basis upon which you may place the application before a Licensing Sub Committee with a view to refuse the same.

Please note that if the matter is placed before a Licensing Sub Committee, we are solicitors instructed to present evidence before the Sub Committee to demonstrate that Elite Cattery are compliant and ought to be granted a license to enable them to continue to operate their cat boarding establishment which has operated continuously for 47 years with no upheld complaints throughout its history.

We now deal with specific points raised in your letter. The concluding opinions of the veterinary inspector are not accepted for reasons not limited to but including the fact that they differ from the opinion of C W Hill, MRCVS, Veterinary Surgeon who has visited Elite Cattery many times in the past 40 years. Ms Hill's professional opinion is set out in the enclosed copy letter dated 09 January 2016 in which it is stated that the cats in Elite Cattery generally settle most quickly if handled, cleaned and fed by the same people in a stable situation without any stress from unknown people.

It appears that cats showing stress related behaviors on 05 October 2016 were stressed because of the presence of unknown people, particularly Ms Edwards, Ms Oslnaike and Ms David.

Ms Hill also disagrees with Ms David's opinion in respect of the welfare of the cats. Ms Hill states in her letter that Elite Cattery always ensures the best interests of the cats. She further confirms that any clinical issues are reported immediately to her and the fact that the welfare of the cats in Elite Cattery is paramount is borne out by the evidence of many cat owners who return year after year to board their animals with Elite Cattery.

in any event, you ask in your letter for a "detail plan of the works to bring units to the standard sizes and a timeline for completion of the works." You further ask for "details of cleaning rota and management of the animals to ensure welfare requirements are met." We therefore enclose the detail plan and the cleaning rota and management documents pursuant to your request.

We look forward to hearing from you with confirmation that the 2017 license has been granted. Please correspond directly with ourselves in respect of any further queries you may have in this matter.

Firstly, allow me to clarify that the decision about the matter going to a Licensing Sub Committee sits solely with the Licensing Authority.

Having read your letter and supporting documents we are unable to ascertain the proposed timeline for the required works to be carried out. Is this an oversight as you have mentioned that we have asked for this in your letter but there is no clarity on this from your client. The London Borough of Haringey have adopted CIEH (Chartered Institute of Environmental Health) Model Licence conditions and Guidance for Cat Boarding Establishments 2013. We note the daily work schedule but there is no reference as to when the building works required in relation to bringing the cages up to the minium standard required by the above stated MLC will be carried out and completed.

We also note that your client is not in agreement with the findings of the City of London Vets but we also note that the vet Mr/Ms Hill states that he/she is 'not au fait' with the rules and regulations associated with running a boarding establishment for cats. We have also noted that no comment has been passed on the practice of communal exercise of the cats while boarding – There is also no reference from C W Hill as to the last time he/she carried out a visit to the cattery.

We note the comment relating to unknown people and citing the officers authorised to make visits to such premises under the relevant legislation as the cause of the behaviour shown by the cats. Please be advised that the premises operates under the regulations and as such is accessible to inspections at any given time by officers of the Council and partners contracted on behalf of the Council.

The Council has the responsibility of overseeing these rules and regulations and it is our view that practices are not as they should be at Elite Cattery at the present time and we cannot therefore issue a licence to this business.

The Council has previously provided Mr Morgan with time to make changes to the premises to bring it up to the new standards in line with the model licensing conditions. At this time we shall prepare a report for submission to the Licensing Sub Committee on 2nd March 2017 at 19:00 at Wood Green Civic Centre, High Road Wood Green London N22. I invite you to submit to me any documentation in support of your client's position that you will wish the LSC to have sight of by 7th February 2017.

With reference to the above application I confirm that I have considered the proposal with regard to the above legislation on behalf of the Commercial EH Team.

I would like to bring to your attention the following matters that are currently being dealt with:

In February 2016, the service received a formal complaint from as couple following
the death of their cat whilst under the car of Elite Cattery. The investigation, which
involved an inspection of the premises with the City of London's Veterinary Services
and discussions with staff and management revealed some concerns to animal

welfare. In light of these concerns the operator (Mr Morgan) was invited to attend an interview under caution. Mr Morgan, accompanied by his solicitor, declined to answer any question but instead submitted a written statement.

- 2. On completion of the investigation, it was revealed that the deceased cat was in poor health prior to being left in the care of the cattery. The investigation also highlighted that the establishment did not meet the standards prescribed in the CIEH MLC 2013. It was decided that the complaint would not be escalated in terms of enforcement. However, concerns over the establishment not meeting the standards prescribed by CIEH MLC 2013 would be best dealt with by the Council's Licensing Team as directed by the City of London's Veterinary Services as part of the licensing process for Animal Boarding Establishment.
- 3. Establishments such as Catteries are subjected to periodic inspections under the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963 and the Animal Welfare Act 2006. Elite Cattery was inspected on the 5th October 2016 and again on the 4th January 2017. Subsequent veterinarian reports dated the 14th November 2016 and 5th January 2017 and license condition inspection reports dated 14th November 2016 and 6th January 2017 were provided by the City of London Veterinarian (Monica David) and Animal Welfare Inspector (Sharon Edwards) respectively. The above reports identified concerns over the running of the Cattery in terms of Animal Welfare Act 2006 and the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963. I enclose copies of the above inspection reports confirming that the establishment does not meet the minimum standards prescribed in the CIEH MLC 2013.
- I further confirm the operator Mr Morgan has been forwarded copies of the CIEH MLC 2013.

Recommendation

The recommendation from the City of London is that this cattery should be refused a licence unless they can produce a schedule works with an appropriate timeframe to meet the CIEH MLC 2013 standard. Namely:

- To replace the existing small cat units with larger units, with exclusive space, combining both a sleeping area and exercise run.
- The policy of mixing cats in communal exercise is stopped.
- To provide appropriate documentation certifying the establishment electrical installation is in a safe condition and compliant with current legislation.

The Council did receive a schedule from Mr Morgan in January 2017; conversely this was insufficient as it did not provide any details pertaining to the type of work to be undertaken, the location and/or timescales. I also confirm the Council have not received an electrical installation certificate confirming the electrical installation is maintained in a safe condition and installed in line with current legislation.

In the absence of the above I recommend the application for an Animal Boarding Establishment Licence is refused -as detailed by the City of London's Veterinarian and Animal Welfare Inspector.
