LICENSING SUB-COMMITTEE HEARINGS PROCEDURE SUMMARY	
INTRODUCTION	
1.	The Chair introduces him/herself and invites other Members, Council officers, Police, Applicant and Objectors to do the same.
2.	The Chair invites Members to disclose <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i) any prior contacts (before the hearing) with the parties or representations received by them; and separately ii) any declarations of interest.
3.	The Chair explains the procedure to be followed by reference to this summary which will be distributed in advance.
NON-ATTENDANCE BY PARTY OR PARTIES	
4.	If one or both of the parties fails to attend, the Chair decides whether to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) grant an adjournment to another date, or (ii) proceed in the absence of the non-attending party. Normally, an absent party will be given one further opportunity to attend.
TOPIC HEADINGS	
5.	The Chair suggests the “topic headings” for the hearing. In the case of the majority of applications for variation of hours, or other terms and conditions, the main topic is: <p>Whether the extensions of hours etc. applied for would conflict with the four licensing objectives i.e.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) the prevention of crime and disorder, (ii) public safety, (iii) the prevention of public nuisance, and (iv) the protection of children from harm.
6.	The Chair invites comments from the parties on any other topic headings to be discussed.
WITNESSES	
7.	The Chair asks whether there are any requests by a party to call a witness and decides any such request.
8.	Only if a witness is to be called, the Chair then asks if there is a request by an opposing party to “cross-examine” the witness. The Chair then decides any such request.
DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE	
9.	The Chair asks whether there are any requests by any party to introduce late documentary evidence.
10.	If so, the Chair will ask the other party if they object to the admission of the late documents.
11.	If the other party do object to the admission of documents which have only been produced by the first party at the hearing, then the documents shall not generally be admitted.

12.	If the other party object to documents produced late but before the hearing, the following criteria shall be taken into account when the Chair decides whether or not to admit the late documents:	
(i)	What is the reason for the documents being late?	
(ii)	Will the other party be unfairly taken by surprise by the late documents?	
(iii)	Will the party seeking to admit late documents be put at a major disadvantage if admission of the documents is refused?	
(iv)	Is the late evidence really important?	
(v)	Would it be better and fairer to adjourn to a later date?	
THE LICENSING OFFICER'S INTRODUCTION		
13.	The Licensing Officer introduces the report explaining, for example, the existing hours, the hours applied for and the comments of the other Council Services or outside official bodies. This should be as "neutral" as possible between the parties.	
14.	The Licensing Officer can be questioned by Members and then by the parties.	
THE HEARING		
15.	This takes the form of a discussion led by the Chair. The Chair can vary the order as appropriate but it should include:	
(i)	an introduction by the Objectors' main representative	
(ii)	an introduction by the Applicant or representative	
(iii)	questions put by Members to the Objectors	
(iv)	questions put by Members to the Applicant	
(v)	questions put by the Objectors to the Applicant	
(vi)	questions put by the Applicant to the Objectors	
CLOSING ADRESSES		
16.	The Chair asks each party how much time is needed for their closing address, if they need to make one.	
17.	Generally, the Objectors make their closing address before the Applicant who has the right to the final closing address.	
THE DECISION		
18.	Members retire with the Committee Clerk and legal representative to consider their decision including the imposition of conditions.	
19.	The decision is put in writing and read out in public by the Committee Clerk once Members have returned to the meeting.

1. Describe the issue under consideration

1.1 An application has been submitted by Blueberry Gardens Property Ltd for a new premises licence for The Lord Nelson. The application was received on 3rd July 2017. Please see Appendix 1.

1.2 The applicant is seeking the following hours:

Regulated Entertainment: Plays, Films, Indoor Sporting Events, Live Music, Recorded Music, Performance of Dance & Anything of a Similar Description

Monday to Sunday 0000 to 0000 hours

Late Night Refreshment
Monday to Sunday 2300 to 0500 hours

Supply of Alcohol
Monday to Sunday 0000 to 0000 hours

For the consumption ON and OFF the premises

Hours Open to Public:
Monday to Sunday 0000 to 0000 hours

The premises licence holder is seeking a 24 hour licence for the public house. Representations have been received against this application.

1.3 As such, in accordance with the legislation the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to consider the application and any relevant representations.

1.4 The premises currently benefits from a premises licence that permits:

Sunday 1100 to 0100

Provision of Late Night Refreshment

Monday to Wednesday 2300 to 0000

Thursday to Saturday 2300 to 0200

Sunday 2300 to 0100

Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, New Years Day, all Bank Holidays plus the day preceding a Bank Holiday, Easter Saturday, Easter Sunday 1100 hours until 0200 hrs. New Years Eve from the start of permitted hours on 31st December until the start of permitted hours on 1st January. On the morning which summer time begins where the terminal hour is later than 0100 hrs, the terminal hour shall be extended by one hour for all the above licensable activities.

The opening hours of the premises

Monday to Wednesday 1100 to 0100

Thursday to Saturday 1100 to 0300

Sunday 1100 to 0200

Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, New Years Day, all Bank holidays plus the day preceding a bank holiday, Easter Saturday, Easter Sunday 1100 to 0230. New Years Eve from the start of permitted hours on 31 December until the start of permitted hours on 1 January. On the morning on which summer time begins, where the terminal hour is later than 0100am, the terminal hour shall be extended by one hour.

1.5 Representations

1.6 The Environmental Health Service, The Licensing Authority and Metropolitan Police and Public Health as responsible authorities have submitted representations against the application. Please refer to Appendix 3 for further information.

1.9 A residential representation has been received from Cllr Mitchell. Please refer to Appendix 4 for further information.

2 Background

2.1 The premises have been owned by Greene King for many years and came into the new regime in 2005 and varied the licence to allow the following:

Sale of alcohol:

Monday to Wednesday 11:00-00:00

Thursday to Saturday 11:00-02:00

Sunday 11:00-01:00

Regulated Entertainment

Thursday to Saturday 21:00-01:00

The premises received a number of noise nuisance complaints from these increased hours of operation.

A further variation was sought in November 2010 seeking an increase in hours again. This application received objections from ward members and residents alike at the time as well as the Council Noise team. The LSC determined to grant the application in part and increase the hours to 3am closure Thursday to Saturday. The various additional licensable activities were permitted but not the increase in the license hours. The pub has continued to operate to the hours shown on the licence.

- 2.2 During the consultation period letters of representation were received from Cllr Mitchell the ward member. There is potential for any increase in hours to give rise to noise nuisance to nearby residents.
- 2.3 Under the Act representations can be received from responsible authorities or other persons. Representations must be relevant and, in the case of another person, must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 2.4 The Licensing Authority considers that restrictions maybe made to the proposed hours of use where, after receiving relevant representations, the council considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to do so. The council may take into account the existing pattern of licensed premises in an area when considering what is appropriate to promote the objectives.

3 Licensing Policy

The committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of retail sales of alcohol and the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.

In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.

Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions with regard to noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application

and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place.

This Licensing Authority in determining what action to take will seek to establish the cause of concern and any action taken will be directed at these causes. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.

3.1 Licensing hours

Where relevant representations are made, the Council will consider the proposed hours on their individual merits. Notwithstanding this, the Council may require stricter conditions in areas that have denser residential accommodation to prevent public nuisance. The Council will endeavour to work with all parties concerned in such instances to ensure that adequate conditions are in place. The Council may restrict the hours that certain premises can offer alcohol for sale for consumption off the premises for preventing crime, disorder and nuisance.

3.2 Powers of a Licensing Authority

3.3 The decision should be made with regard to the Secretary of the State's guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Where the decision departs from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal / challenge is increased.

3.4 Options:

3.5 The Authority must, having regard to the application and the representations, take such steps (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

In determining this application the Sub-Committee may take any of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, namely:

- to modify the conditions of the Licence; or
- to reject the whole or part of the application.

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003 the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered or omitted or a new condition added.

3.6 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21 day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

4. Other considerations

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area".

4.1 Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- o Article 8 – Right to respect for private and family life.
- o Article 1 of the First Protocol – Protection of Property
- o Article 6(1) – Right to a fair hearing.
- o Article 10 – Freedom of Expression

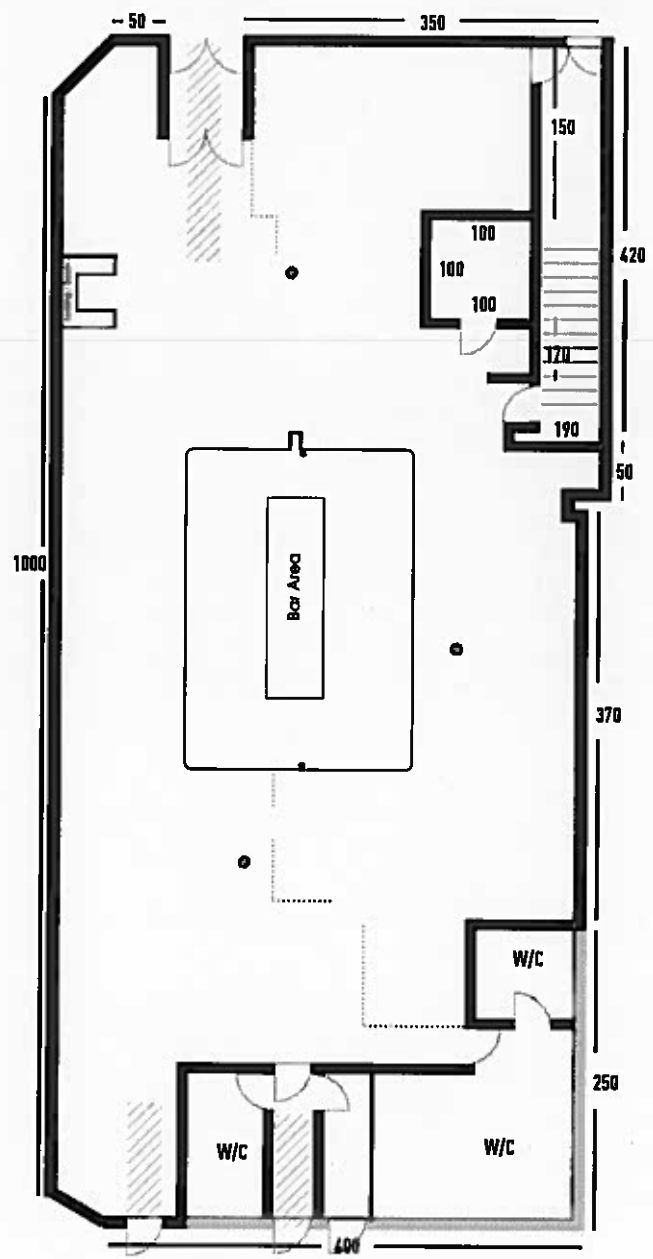

1. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31-day period.
2. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a Police or authorised council officer recent data or footage when requested.
3. There shall be a SIA registered door supervisor employed at the premises on Friday and Saturday from 2100 hours at a ratio of 1:100. Extra SIA will be considered continually as part of an ongoing operational risk assessment. All door supervisors shall enter their full details in the premises daily register at the commencement of their work. They shall record their full name, contact details, their SIA registration number, and the time they commence and conclude working. If the door supervisor was provided by an agency the name, registered business address and contact telephone number will also be recorded. This register will be made available to police or authorised officer immediately upon request.
4. Signs will be prominently displayed at all exit points reminding customers to leave quietly and respect local residents.
5. The premises will have a venue management policy, approved by the police licensing officer and/or Crime prevention officer, detailing the following;
 - a. Entry and search policy
 - b. Drugs Policy, Queuing and dispersal policy
 - c. Security Policy
 - d. Noise Policy
 - e. Smoking Policy

6. Any queues to enter the venue will be supervised by the door supervisor.
7. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as driving licence or passport.

8. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the council or the police, which will record the following.
 - a. All crimes reported:
 - b. All ejections of patrons
 - c. Any complaints received.
 - d. Any incidents of disorder.
 - e. Seizure of drugs or offensive weapons.
 - f. Any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment. Any refusal of the sale of alcohol.

9. Signs will be prominently displayed by entry and exit points reminding customs:

10. The licence holder shall maintain a dedicated telephone number of the Designated Premises Supervisor for use by any Responsible Authority or any person who may wish to make a complaint. This contact number shall be provided to licensing authority, police and to any local residents upon request.

11. Reasonable steps to be taken to ensure that an authorised person is a member of a local Pubwatch.

12. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff are fully trained and made aware of the legal requirement of businesses to comply with their duty of care as regards the disposal of waste produced from the business premises. The procedure for handling and preparing for disposal of the waste shall be in writing and displayed in a prominent place where it can be referred to at all times by staff.

Noise Management Policy

1. No rubbish will be taken out of the premises during hours which will cause a nuisance. You must comply with the local time bands with waste dispersal as per the waste management plan of London Borough of Haringey.
2. Deliveries are only to be received during working hours
3. Ensure that the DPS Mark McEvoy's phone number is available to all surrounding residents in order for them to have a 24 hour direct line with him.
4. Whilst we do not expect there to be any queuing involved with the day to day running of the premises, if one develops please refer to your queuing and dispersal policy.
5. No open containers of drink are to be taken outside of the premises.

Annex 1 –Mandatory Conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence –
 - (a) At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or
 - (b) At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence.
3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
 - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to –
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
5. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-

6. The responsible person shall ensure that –
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures –
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 –
 - (a) “duty” is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
 - (b) “permitted price” is the price found by applying the formula –

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$
 Where –
 - (i) P is the permitted price
 - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
 - (c) “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence –
 - (i) The holder of the premises licence
 - (ii) The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

- (iii) The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
 - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
 - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from the paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Exhibition of films:

Admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be in accordance with the recommendations of the British Board of Film Classification for that film. Where permission has been given by the Licensing Authority to show a film not classified by the British Board of Film Classification, the requirements made by the Licensing Authority for the admission of children to the exhibition of that film must be followed.

Door supervision:

All individual(s) at the premises for the purpose of carrying out a security activity must

- (a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or

Strong management controls and effective training so that all staff are aware of the licensing objectives and in particular ensure—no underage drinking, drunkenness in public, use of drugs, violent and anti-social behaviour, and to protect children from harm.

THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

Manager will train and supervise all staff. Premises will adopt best practice guide e.g. adhering to the BBPA, Portman Group on drinks strategy, the National Alcohol Harm Reduction Strategy Tool Kit and other voluntary codes of practise. Premises will be a member of the Pubwatch scheme. CCTV will be installed and maintained on the premises. Toughened glass will be used at all times. There will be provision of secure deposit box for confiscated items, provision of litter bins and other security measures e.g. lighting outside the premises.

On Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, two SIA registered door staff will control the entry and exit of customers.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Risk Management assessment will be carried out weekly.

There is to be provision of general staff levels to secure safety of the premises and customers.

There is to be regular testing and certification of all procedures, appliances and systems pertinent to safety.

The total number of persons accommodated at any one time within the Ground Floor of the Nelson Public House shall not exceed 200.

The doors or gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied/in use under the Licence and Notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded: **'THIS DOOR TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED/IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE'** (Main entrance from the High Road)

The fire alarm change-over switch shall be in the **'FIRE ALARM LIGHTS AND BUZZERS'** position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the Licence.

The fire alarm shall be under the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The results of the tests shall be recorded in a Logbook which shall be readily available for inspection by Officers of the Council or L.F.E.P.A.

All Certificates required by the Council to be submitted promptly when they become due.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Premises to manage people including staff and traffic arriving and leaving the premises.

Premises to liaise with public and private transport providers.

External lighting and security lighting to be installed and maintained on the premises.

VARIATION RESOLUTION OF 1ST FEBRUARY 2011

The Committee carefully considered the application, representations by the Environmental Health Officer and the interested parties. The Committee took into account the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy and the Section 182 Guidance issued under the Licensing Act 2003.

The Committee decided to grant the application to the variation as amended during the course of the hearing on the basis that additional conditions are imposed to promote the licensing objectives, in particular that of the prevention of public nuisance.

New Years Eve from the start of permitted hours on 31st December until the start of permitted hours on 1st January. On the morning which summer time begins where the terminal hour is later than 01:00 hrs, the terminal hour shall be extended by one hour for all the above licensable activities.

Subject to the above, the conditions put forward by the Applicant in the written application are imposed.

Additionally, the following conditions which have been agreed by the Applicant are imposed:

Prevention of nuisance from noise / vibration

The inner entrance door be fitted with a self – closing device and staff will be required to ensure this is not propped open. When on duty a member of door staff shall be made responsible to ensure the door is open for as brief a period as possible. Where necessary, adequate and suitable mechanical ventilation should be provided to public areas. At times when door staff are not required to be working the manager shall ensure that a member of staff is able to observe the main door and ensure it is not propped open

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

Entry to the premises will be restricted to the main door onto the high road whilst the premises is being used for regulated entertainment licensed activity i.e. the rear door to the external smoking area to be kept closed.

Sound Limits

The Licensee shall ensure that no music in the Licensed Premises is played at a level that is audible at or within the site boundary of any residential property at such a level that is likely to be intrusive to local residents within their homes.

A noise limiter will be installed and used at all times and set at a level agreed with a Council Environmental Health Officer. For the avoidance of doubt this is a condition to the variation to the hours of licensable activities but will run for the entire period that licensable activities are permitted.

During regulated entertainment, half hourly checks will be made at the site boundary of the nearest residential property to ensure that such regulated entertainment is not likely to be so intrusive and a log will be kept of those checks and made available to the Responsible Authorities (as defined by The Licensing Act 2003).

All regulated entertainment amplified activity will utilise the in house amplification system the maximum output of which is controlled by the sound limiter.

Outside Areas

No music will be played in, or for the benefit of patrons in external areas of the premises

No form of loudspeaker or sound amplification equipment is to be sited on or near the exterior premises or in or near any foyer, doorway, window or opening to the premises

Signs shall be displayed in the external areas/on the frontage requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours

Deliveries and collections

Empty bottles and non-degradable refuse will remain in the premises at the end of trading hours and taken out to the refuse point at the start of the working day rather than at the end of trading when neighbours might be unduly disturbed

Plant and machinery

All plant and machinery is correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from noise.

Dealing with complaints

A complaints book will be held on the premises to record details of any complaints received from neighbours. The information is to include, where disclosed, the complainant's name, location, date

time and subsequent remedial action undertaken. This record must be made available at all times for inspection by council officers.

Patrons entering/exiting premises.

Signs should be displayed requesting patrons to respect the neighbours and behave in a courteous manner.

Door supervisors

When door staff are on duty a licensed door supervisor shall supervise patrons and ensure the leave in a prompt and courteous manner, respecting the neighbours.

When door staff are on duty a licensed door supervisor will be positioned on the exit door to ensure, as far as reasonably practical, that patrons do not leave drinks .

When door staff are on duty a licensed door supervisor will patrol the cartilage of the premises to prevent patrons urinating in public areas in the vicinity of the premises.

Prevention of nuisance from litter

Adequate receptacles for use by patrons will be provided in the local vicinity. The positioning of the receptacles will be agreed with the licensing officer. Smoking waste (e.g. cigarette butts) to be cleared from the main entrance area and rear external smoking area on a daily basis, preferably at the beginning of business.

Prevention of nuisance from Odour and Noise

All ventilation and extraction systems shall be correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from odour or noise.

Prevention of nuisance from light

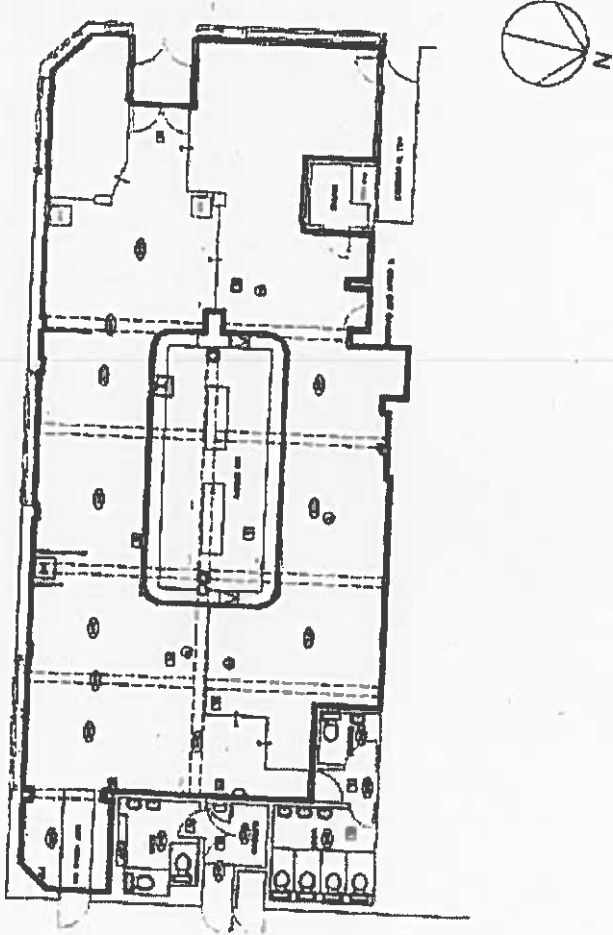
Illuminated external signage shall be switched off when the premises is closed

Security lights will be positioned to minimise light intrusion to nearby residential premises

The Committee accepted that there were issues of public nuisance and felt that the additional conditions, that could be imposed as part of a variation application (which could not have been imposed had the application been rejected outright) would in fact promote the objective of preventing public nuisance.

As an informative, all parties were reminded that if there were issues relating to the licensing objectives with the operation of the licence, procedures exist to have the licence reviewed.

I would like to confirm that I have considered the above proposal with regard to the prevention of public nuisance on behalf of the Enforcement Response (Noise) Team & would like to make representations to the Application

The operating schedule does not address the prevention of public nuisance from:

- airborne entertainment noise
- Structure borne noise or vibrations from entertainment
- Noise generated by patrons in external areas of the premises
- Noise generated from patrons queuing to enter
- Noise from patrons exiting the premises
- Noise generated from deliveries
- Noise generated from refuse collections
- Noise from plant and machinery
- Light nuisance
- Cooking odour
- Litter nuisance

The proposed operating hours are inappropriate due to the close proximity of residential dwellings and likely to generate further complaints regarding noise from premises and patrons leaving in the early hours if extended from recommended hours below.

The noise caused by patrons exiting the premises and locating suitable transport home is likely to be detrimental to the residential amenity. This may be exacerbated by the level of public transport available at the proposed closing hours.

This representation recommends that the following alterations/conditions to the operating schedule:

The potential is there for residents to be subjected to a negative impact from the late night operation of the venue on local residents and loss of amenity. In my opinion the applicant have made no reference to the Statement of Licensing Policy and have failed to demonstrate the variation will not have a detrimental impact on the night time economy; the local environment and the amenities of the local residents.

53 LICENSING HOURS

The Council will generally deal with the issue of licensing hours having due regard to the individual merits of each application, considering the potential for nuisance associated with the style, characteristics and activities of the business and type of premises, examining any steps that might reduce the risk of nuisance. However, although the Council will treat each case on its individual merits, generally it will not grant permission for licensable activities beyond 2330 hours on Sundays to Thursdays and Midnight on Fridays and Saturdays in respect of public houses situated in areas having denser residential accommodation. The Council would expect good reasons to be given to support any application for extensions beyond these hours, including addressing possible disturbance to residents and local parking. Additionally, in these areas, consideration will be given to imposing stricter conditions in respect of noise control.

80 THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Licensed premises, especially those that operate late at night or in the early hours of the morning, can give rise to a range of nuisances that may potentially impact on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. Principal concerns relate to noise nuisance, light pollution and noxious smells.

This authority expects applicants for premises licences and club premises certificates to have made relevant enquiries about the local area and prepare their operating schedule on the basis of a risk assessment of the potential sources of nuisance posed to the local community by their intended operation. The operating schedule should demonstrate an understanding of the level of risk of nuisance and include positive proposals to manage any potential risks.

We are unable to support the requests for a 24 hour operation, the sale of alcohol on a 24 hour basis in our view does not promote responsible drinking and can lead to excessive consumption of alcohol in those persons who may be suffering with alcohol dependency issues. The health of our residents is of paramount importance and we have a duty to consider their health, safety and welfare at all times and we can ensure this by implementing a maintaining a responsible approach to Licensing within the borough particularly such premises retailing alcohol we therefore wish to recommend some alterations to the application as follows:

For the reason stipulated we assert the original hours requested for 24 hours is not supported by the ethos and objectives of the Licensing Policy, and therefore the Licensing Authority respectfully request Members to consider the reduction in hours recommended.

Dear Mrs Barrett

I am making this representation objecting to the application for a New Premises Licence at The Lord Nelson, 232 High Road N22 8HH. I have been Police Licensing Officer since 2012 and The Lord Nelson has been known to me since that time as a venue that has suffered from late night alcohol fuelled crime and disorder although things have improved in the last year. The area surrounding the venue has been known for some years as suffering from alcohol related crime and disorder with East Europeans using the park 100 yards away for all night drinking in the summer with subsequent serious violence. The surrounding 800 - 1000 yards incorporates the Boroughs busiest night-time economy of pubs, night clubs, restaurants and Off Licences all late opening and this will increase with the proposed all night tube opening at Wood Green tube station in the centre of the 800 yard area and already having problems with late night disorder. It is also our highest area for late night crime / disorder including alcohol related offences from street drinking and licensed venues as well as gang related serious violence and drug dealing although they do not frequent the licensed venues. With this in mind we should look at applications to increase the hours of alcohol sales to ensure they do not increase risk of increased alcohol fuelled crime and disorder.

With regards incidents at venue since October 2016, not counting thefts I believe the list below supports the SIA representation I will make and gives a snapshot of the alcohol related concerns in the surrounding area.

CAD 517 on 18th March 2017 at 0113 call to ten males arguing in venue. Left before arrival of Police.
 CAD 699 on 2nd July 2017 at 0116 call from Door Supervisor states 7 / 8 people causing a problem and more coming. States 'It's going off'. One arrest for Public Order Offence. See CRIS 2816480/17
 CAD 491 on 24th July 2017 at 0117 call from staff to 12 aggressive travellers refusing to leave and helping themselves to drinks without paying.
 CRIS: 2826151/16 Saturday 8th October 2016 at 0200 assault. Male in venue bothering females followed outside and beaten by group of males.
 CRIS: 2828185/16 Sunday 30th October 2016 at 0210 victim lying in road o/s venue with bleeding head. Taken to hospital for stitches. Altercation in venue continued outside with victim being hit on back of head with bottle believed of water. He accused suspect and was aggressive to him so suspect punched him to the floor and ran away but arrested nearby by Police.
 CRIS: 2813154/17 Saturday 27th May 2017 at 0040 security from pub detaining suspect outside pub. Suspect had been ejected by SIA who he punched SIA twice in face and spat blood in his face and shirt. Outside he smashed pub window.
 CRIS: 2813147/17 Saturday 27th May 2017 at 0155 Police find victim with cut above eye in pub toilet. Victim states male in pub punched him in the face for no reason except perhaps his friend had touched a girls bum when she was dancing and suspect may have believed victim did it.
 CRIS: 2814271/17 Wednesday 7th June 2017 at 2230 a group of 4 / 5 males entered venue whilst intoxicated and caused a disturbance and told to leave. One male threw a brick at pub window damaging it.
 CRIS: 2816480/17 Sunday 2nd July 2017 at 0110 SIA on door of venue call Police about males refused entry causing problems with one threatening him. Male arrested for Public Order offence and Drink Drive.

to a 24 operation. Such a change would mean the venue selling alcohol later than any other licensed venue in the area with the exception of 24 / 7 Off Licences one of which is within 50 yards of The Lord Nelson. Police concern is that alcohol fuelled clients from nearby pubs / clubs will attend The Lord Nelson after the other venues closed. This risks confrontation at the entrance as SIA registered door supervisors refuse entry or further alcohol consumption should they be allowed entry. There are also concerns that the facility to drink in the venue all night seriously risks an increase in alcohol consumption that cannot be properly monitored by busy bar staff resulted in alcohol fuelled crime and disorder. A recent meeting with the new owners and the attached flyer reveals the venue is competing for clients with other venues and that the low competitive beer prices at venue under previous licensees will continue.

In the application the venue has offered a good CCTV system, Police CCTV recommendations below, and one SIA officer per 100 clients from 2100 hours on Friday and Saturday although they do not say how long the officer will be on duty considering venue does not have to close and persons could still be consuming alcohol into the following morning. Police consider a venue wishing to operate alcohol sales 24 / 7 in an area known for alcohol fuelled crime / disorder should not rely on one SIA officer on a Friday and Saturday night. The long hours risk alcohol fuelled crime / disorder from 2100 every night and SIA presence should reflect this. The venue says extra SIA will be considered continually as part of an ongoing operational risk assessment but should disorder start to threaten in the early hours it would not be easy to find extra SIA or if Sunday – Thursday an SIA officer to come in and deal with the situation. With regards SIA of 1 per 100 clients I assume until 200 is reached they do not consider another SIA officer required meaning one SIA officer is controlling an all-night licensed venue with up to 199 clients inside. How will they monitor how many people are in the venue? With a 'clicker' they require the SIA officer to stay on the door monitoring persons entering and leaving as well as clients smoking outside but who would then be monitoring clients inside the venue and the rear door? On Sunday to Thursday no SIA officer will be monitoring the clients either smoking outside, entering venue or inside venue. Should there be crime / disorder at entrance or inside Police do not consider one SIA officer sufficient to prevent escalation and eject or detain suspects.

Police consider the beer prices, flyer and lack of SIA security to be cost effective rather than risk averse. The application also mentions a dispersal policy of clients in a residential area but not who will carry it out as no SIA Sunday to Thursday and on Saturday & Sunday if the SIA officer is ensuring clients leave the vicinity of the venue quietly who is monitoring alcohol fuelled clients inside?

Police consider it appropriate for 2 SIA officers controlling the entrance to monitor clients entering and those smoking outside in what the applicants acknowledge is a residential area, and 1 inside monitoring clients to deter alcohol fuelled crime / disorder and monitor alcohol consumption not visible from the bar to prevent intoxication and monitor rear door. The second SIA officer controlling the door can also support the single officer inside.

Police consider the standard of CCTV should be:

Cameras must be sited to observe the entrance doors from both inside and outside to protect SIA searching entrants or refusing entry / ejecting clients.

Cameras on the entrances must capture full frame shots of the heads and shoulders of all people entering the premises i.e. capable of identification.

Cameras must be sited to cover all areas to which the public have access including any outside smoking areas.

Provide a linked record of the date, time of any image.

Provide good quality images - colour during opening times.

Have a monitor to review images and recorded quality.

Be regularly maintained to ensure continuous quality of image capture and retention.

Member of staff trained in operating CCTV at venue during times open to the public.

Digital images must be kept for 31 days. The equipment must have a suitable export method, e.g. CD/DVD writer so that Police can make an evidential copy of the data they require. Copies must be available within a reasonable time to Police on request.

With regards the requested opening hours the applicants acknowledge it is a residential area and Police are aware of the surrounding areas alcohol fuelled crime and disorder issues throughout the night and therefore feel 24 / 7 alcohol sales will increase risk of alcohol fuelled crime / disorder from clients and potential clients attempting to enter venue after other licensed venues close by to be high. Therefore they suggest a compromise to increase opening hours but more in line with other similar venues with a 30 minutes cessation of alcohol sales and regulated entertainment as a calming down measure for clients and to deter persons from slightly earlier closing venues from attending as they will not be served and told so at the door. Police consider the following hours appropriate under crime and disorder and public nuisance:

Sunday to Wednesday venue opens for licensable activity at 0800 and closes at 0200 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0130.

Thursday to Saturday venue opens for licensable activity at 0800 and closes at 0400 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0330.

Should the Committee support the Police recommendation relating to the venues licensable and opening hours then the SIA requirement should be reduced to 2 SIA registered officers Sunday to Wednesday from 2100 until venue closes and clients dispersed.

Background:

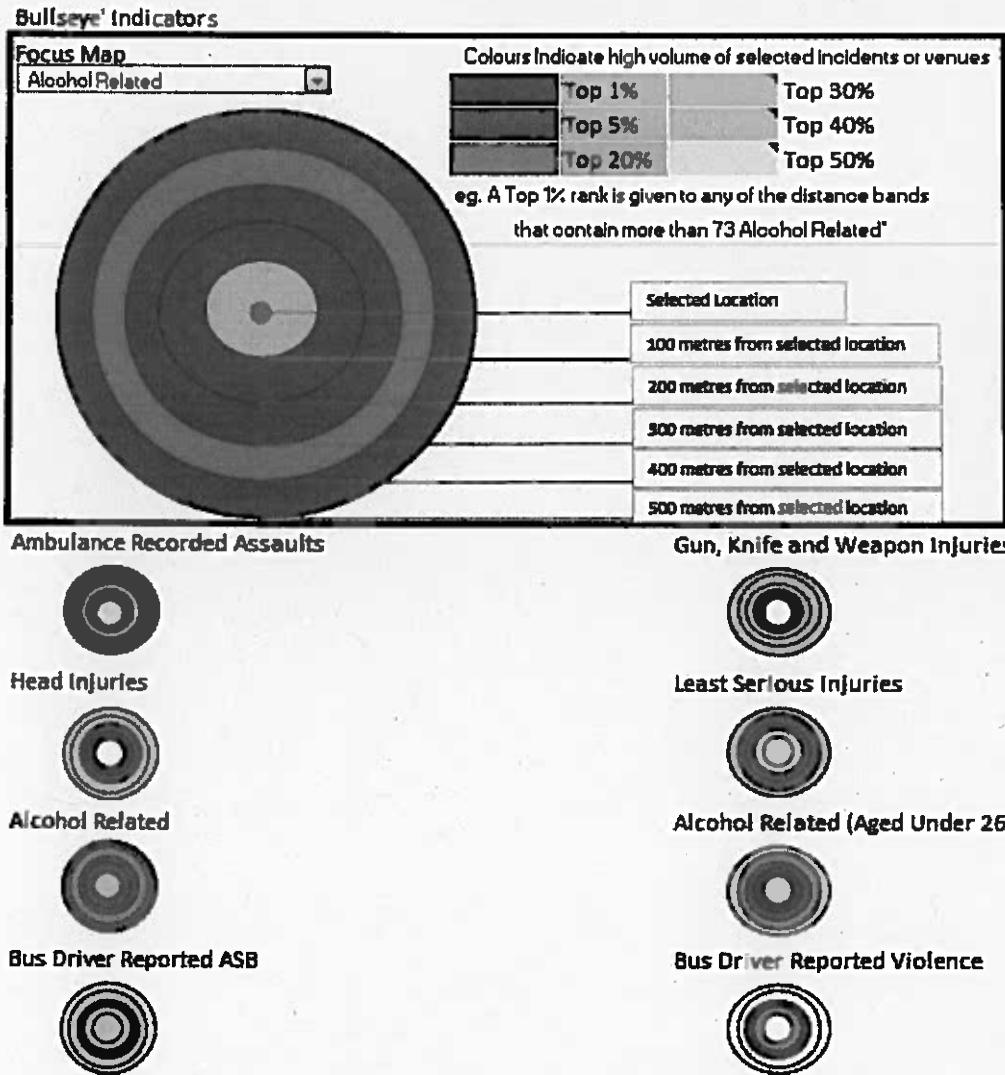
Haringey experiences some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London and the harm due to alcohol is a growing concern. In the five year period of 2009/10 – 2014/15, alcohol related hospital admissions increased by 38% with the local cost of these admissions now estimated to be £7.5 million annually. Across the borough, there are currently over 800 licensed premises for the sale and supply of alcohol and this figure continues to rise, with some areas of high level clustering. Increasingly, evidence shows us that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in both alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, including injury, violence and medical harm. Many factors are known to influence this including density of licensed premises and trading hours.

Tackling alcohol misuse is key to achieving the outcomes in Haringey's Health and Wellbeing Strategy. We want to create a culture that prevents problem drinking from starting and provides help for people early on should they be struggling.

The premise is located on the busy and highly frequented High Road of Wood Green. It is a major transport hub for Haringey and a key route for commuters and those who visit the borough. It is also home to the Wood Green shopping centre, a number of retail outlets and off licences. The

application to supply alcohol to the early hours of the morning as well as 24 hour opening hours in this busy and residential area is of concern and could contribute to further public disorder, crime and nuisance being experienced in the local area.

Crime and disorder:

In 2015, Woodside the ward in which the premises is located, ranked 1st out of 19 wards for sexual assault incidents; 1st for probation clients with alcohol misuse risk; and 3rd for alcohol illness treated by London Ambulance service for 18+. Bullseye Indicators show 208 alcohol related injuries within 500m of the premises in 2015. There are a further 37 incidents of alcohol related injuries in those aged under 26 (*SafeStats, 2015*).

The above findings are of significant concern from a public health perspective in terms of the prevention of crime and disorder. There is an increasing amount of evidence which shows that those under the influence of alcohol are more likely to commit crimes and engage in anti-social behaviour (ASB). They are also more likely to be the victim of crimes such as common assault and robbery which are significant issues in Haringey. Alcohol is known to exacerbate the likelihood of night time violence and domestic abuse offences (*GLA datastore, 2016*). ASB calls to Haringey Anti-Social Behaviour Action Team (ASBAT) and Police are in excess of 10,000 per year.

Antisocial behaviour associated with street drinking has been recognised as a concern in Haringey. Problems identified include; litter, noise, urination and intimidation all of which have a detrimental impact to the quality of life for residents. As a result, Haringey Council's Street Enforcement Team has designated a number of areas within the borough as Alcohol Control Zones (ACZ). The High Road on which the premises is located is one of Haringey's Alcohol Control Zones.

Public Safety:

The impact of alcohol on health in Haringey is particularly severe. In the fiscal year 2016-17, local ambulance callout data shows us that the Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) in which the premises is located had 47 alcohol related ambulance call outs, ranking 2nd out of the 144 LSOAs in Haringey (*SafeStats, 2017*).

The levels of ambulance related callouts reflects the increased pressure and costs to the NHS as a result of alcohol in Haringey. These impacts are also felt across a range of groups including the council, policing and the community as a whole.

Public Nuisance:

As stated in Haringey's Statement of Licensing Policy 2016-2021 "licensed premises, especially those that operate late at night or in the early hours of the morning, can give rise to a range of nuisances that may potentially impact on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. Principal concerns relate to noise nuisance, light pollution and noxious smells."

The Licensing Authority's expectations of license holders are set out in the policy where it states that "licensees have a responsibility for the conduct of their customers while they are in and around their premises. If provision is made for customers to congregate or smoke outside of premises, then sufficient management controls must be put into place to ensure that no nuisance or disturbance is caused to local residents. Failure to control customers outside of premises can result in licence reviews being submitted and impact upon the premises licence".

We have specific concerns about the impact of operating late in the night / early hours of the morning on every day of the week on local families living in this mainly residential area.

Protecting Children from Harm:

There are 6 schools within 500m of the premises (including 4 primary schools and 2 secondary schools) so we would encourage any license holder to be responsible and clear on implementing the Challenge 25 policy.

Recommendation:

In summary, Public Health believes that the area has sufficient premises to meet demand for alcohol. Whilst Public Health welcomes the consideration given in the operating schedule as to how the applicant will uphold the licensing objectives, we have significant concerns over the requested operating hours, given the extensive crime and safety issues highlighted above. Furthermore, this is a mainly residential area with a high number of schools in close proximity to the premises so we have concerns that licensable activities into the early hours of the morning may cause nuisance and disruption to local residents living in the surrounding area. Whilst the applicant has proposed use of a noise limiter for recorded and live music played in the premises, Public Health are not satisfied with the proposals for controlling patrons that would be leaving the premises at all hours of the morning.

If this licence is to be granted, Public Health recommend that the following conditions are to be attached (In addition to those listed in the operating schedule) to minimise any potential harm to our local residents:

I wish to object to the application from the Lord Nelson pub in High Road N22 for a 24/7 licence for the sale of alcohol and provision of entertainment and the supply of refreshments until 5am every day. There is no justification for the pub to be open at all hours. It already has a licence allowing it to remain open until 2am on Thursday-Saturday and until 1am on Sundays.

This pub is on the corner of a residential street, Cranbrook Park, and it is unacceptable that it should remain open all night. Councillors for Woodside ward have received complaints from residents about anti-social behaviour and drug dealing in Cranbrook Park and adjacent roads and having a 24/7 pub on the corner risks exacerbating these problems. I could not see from the application what additional steps the licence holder proposes to take to deal with crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance, or protection of children from harm. Currently the pub is committed to having a door supervisor from 21.00 on Fridays and Saturdays, but this is inadequate for a 24/7 licence. It is inconceivable that anyone out for a drink in the middle of the night is simply there for a quiet drink. The application does not consider the nature of a 24/7 pub and the steps needed to manage the likely customer base.

The potential for entertainment 24/7 raises concerns about noise nuisance for local residents. The conditions on the current licence refer to notices asking customers to leave quietly, but this is insufficient for a 24/7 operation.

The current licence allows the pub to open at 11.00. The application raises the risk that children going to school could be exposed to unacceptable behaviour or bad language when passing the pub as it will be open at all hours and some customers could have been there all night.

While the ward Councillors want to see the Lord Nelson being successful, we cannot support this application and do not believe that the case has been made for a 24/7 pub in this location.

- 1.5 Representations
 - 1.6 The Environmental Health Service, The Licensing Authority and Metropolitan Police as well as Public Health as responsible authorities have submitted representations against the application. Please refer to Appendix 3 for further information.
 - 1.9 During the consultation period letters of representation were received from many residents and a ward member as well as responsible authorities. There is potential for any increase in hours to give rise to noise nuisance to nearby residents. Please refer to Appendix 4 for further information.
- 2 Background
- 2.1 The premises have been owned by Greene King for many years and came into the new regime in 2005 and varied the licence to allow the times shown in Appendix 5.

The pub has continued to operate to the hours shown on the licence. The new company transferred the existing licence into their name in July 2017.

- 2.2 Under the Act representations can be received from responsible authorities or other persons. Representations must be relevant and, in the case of another person, must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 2.3 The Licensing Authority considers that restrictions may be made to the proposed hours of use where, after receiving relevant representations, the council considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to do so. The council may take into account the existing pattern of licensed premises in an area when considering what is appropriate to promote the objectives.

3 Licensing Policy

The committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of retail sales of alcohol and the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.

In considering licence applications, where relevant representations are made, this Licensing Authority will consider the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for public nuisance and/or public disorder having regard to all the circumstances of the case.

Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions with regard to noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place.

This Licensing Authority in determining what action to take will seek to establish the cause of concern and any action taken will be directed at these causes. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be appropriate and proportionate.

3.1 Licensing hours

Where relevant representations are made, the Council will consider the proposed hours on their individual merits. Notwithstanding this, the Council may require stricter conditions in areas that have denser residential accommodation to prevent public nuisance. The Council will endeavour to work with all parties concerned in such instances to ensure that adequate conditions are in place. The Council may restrict the hours that certain premises can offer alcohol for sale for consumption off the premises for preventing crime, disorder and nuisance.

3.2 Powers of a Licensing Authority

3.3 The decision should be made with regard to the Secretary of the State's guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Where the decision departs from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal / challenge is increased.

3.4 Options:

3.5 The Authority must, having regard to the application and the representations, take such steps (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

In determining this application the Sub-Committee may take any of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, namely:

- to modify the conditions of the Licence; or
- to reject the whole or part of the application.

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003 the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered or omitted or a new condition added.

3.6 The licensing authority's determination of this application is subject to a 21 day appeal period or if the decision is appealed the date of the appeal is determined and /or disposed of.

4. Other considerations

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area".

4.1 Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 – Right to respect for private and family life.
- Article 1 of the First Protocol – Protection of Property
- Article 6(1) – Right to a fair hearing.
- Article 10 – Freedom of Expression

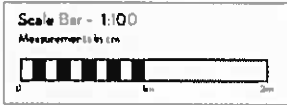

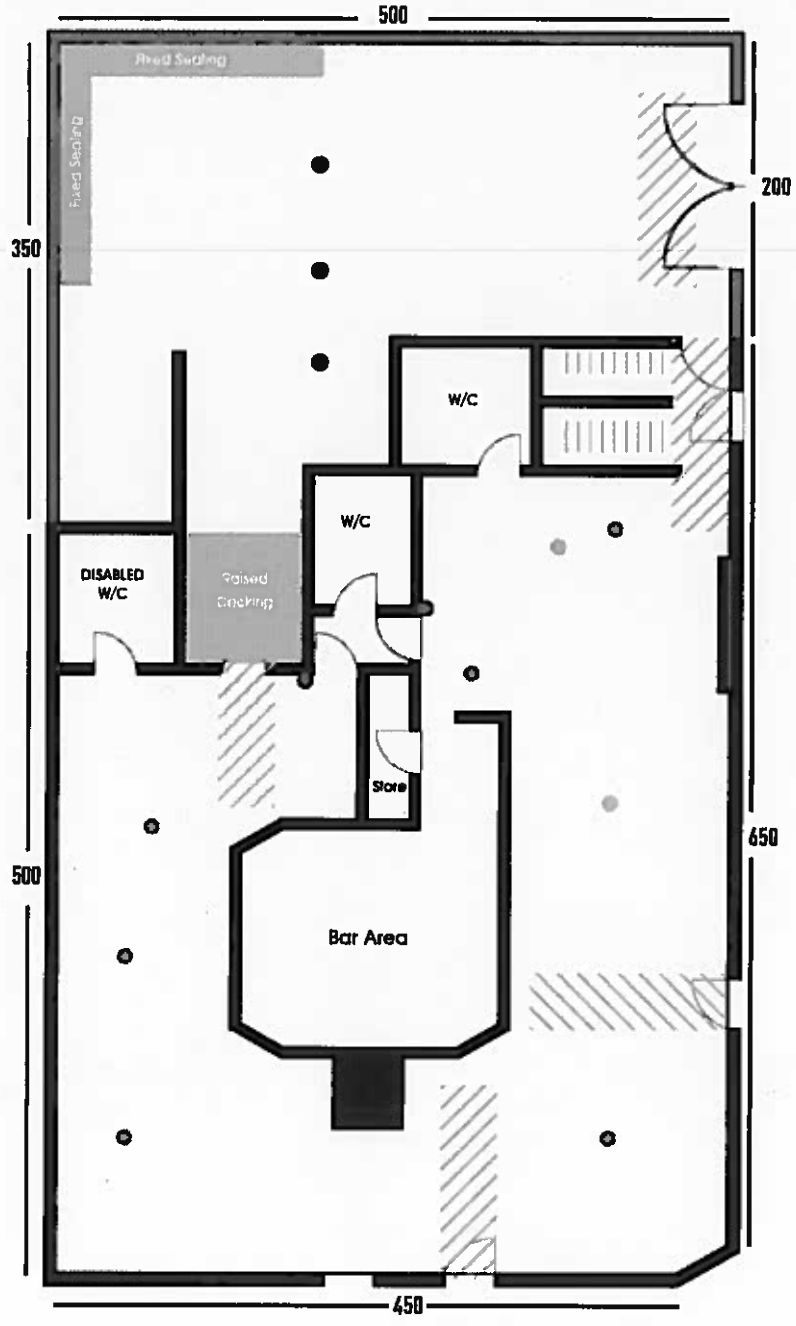

1. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31-day period.
2. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a Police or authorised council officer recent data or footage when requested.
3. There shall be a SIA registered door supervisor employed at the premises on Friday and Saturday from 2100 hours at a ratio of 1:100. Extra SIA will be considered continually as part of an ongoing operational risk assessment. All door supervisors shall enter their full details in the premises daily register at the commencement of their work. They shall record their full name, contact details, their SIA registration number, and the time they commence and conclude working. If the door supervisor was provided by an agency the name, registered business address and contact telephone number will also be recorded. This register will be made available to police or authorised officer immediately upon request.
4. Signs will be prominently displayed at all exit points reminding customers to leave quietly and respect local residents.
5. The premises will have a venue management policy, approved by the police licensing officer and/or Crime prevention officer, detailing the following;
 - a. Entry and search policy
 - b. Drugs Policy, Queuing and dispersal policy
 - c. Security Policy
 - d. Noise Policy
 - e. Smoking Policy
 - f. Alcohol Policy
6. Any queues to enter the venue will be supervised by the door supervisor.
7. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as driving licence or passport.

8. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the council or the police, which will record the following.
 - a. All crimes reported:
 - b. All ejections of patrons
 - c. Any complaints received.
 - d. Any incidents of disorder.
 - e. Seizure of drugs or offensive weapons.
 - f. Any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment. Any refusal of the sale of alcohol.

10. The licence holder shall maintain a dedicated telephone number of the Designated Premises Supervisor for use by any Responsible Authority or any person who may wish to make a complaint. This contact number shall be provided to licensing authority, police and to any local residents upon request.
11. Reasonable steps to be taken to ensure that an authorised person is a member of a local Pubwatch.
12. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff are fully trained and made aware of the legal requirement of businesses to comply with their duty of care as regards the disposal of waste produced from the business premises. 3. Ensure that the DPS Mark McEvoy's phone number is available to all surrounding residents in order for them to have a 24 hour direct line with him.

10. Ensure that all signage advising patrons of the residential premises in the area and requesting that they leave quietly, are kept refreshed and constantly displayed in prominent positions.
11. On peak trading hours please ensure the staff disperse your patrons in a calm and organised fashion.

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence –
 - (a) At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or
 - (b) At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence.
3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
 - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to –
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
5. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

Annex 1 –Mandatory Conditions

- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce, on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
- (a) a holographic mark or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
6. The responsible person shall ensure that –
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures –
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Provision will be made for litter bins and other security measures, e.g. lighting outside the premises.

On Friday and Saturday nights a minimum of two door staff approved by the Security Industry Authority shall be employed on the premises to control the entry and exit of customers. Alternatively the doors of the premises are closed to the public for entry at midnight.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Risk Management assessment will be checked weekly.

Provision of door staff and general staff levels will be made to secure safety of the premises and customers.

Regular testing and certification will be implemented for all procedures, appliances and systems pertinent to safety.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Regular visits will be made to all parts of the premises including the exterior and deliveries, etc. outside of opening hours.

Premises will liaise with public and private transport providers.

External lighting and security lighting will be installed.

Premises will ensure the collection and management of litter and effective ventilation systems to prevent nuisance from odour.

Outside Areas

Signs shall be displayed in the external areas requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours.

The external area will be closed and patrons requested to come inside the main structure of the premises at 2200 hrs.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

Children will only be allowed on the premises between 1200 and 1930.

No children will be allowed in bars during entertainment

Children must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

Alcohol may only be sold to individuals over the age of 18 with valid proof of identification with one of the following:

- A valid passport
- A photo driving license issued in a European Union Country
- A proof of age standard card system
- A citizen card, supported by the Home Office

I would like to confirm that I have considered the above proposal with regard to the prevention of public nuisance on behalf of the Enforcement Response (Noise) Team & would like to make representations to the Application

The operating schedule does not address the prevention of public nuisance from:

- airborne entertainment noise
- Structure borne noise or vibrations from entertainment
- Noise generated by patrons in external areas of the premises
- Noise generated from patrons queuing to enter
- Noise from patrons exiting the premises
- Noise generated from deliveries
- Noise generated from refuse collections
- Noise from plant and machinery
- Light nuisance
- Cooking odour
- Litter nuisance

The proposed operating hours are inappropriate due to the close proximity of residential dwellings.

The noise caused by patrons exiting the premises and locating suitable transport home is likely to be detrimental to the residential amenity. This may be exacerbated by the level of public transport available at the proposed closing hours.

This representation recommends that the following alterations/conditions to the operating schedule:

Recommended operating hours

Sunday to Wednesday 0900 to 0100
Thursday to Saturday 0900 to 0200

With all licensable activity ceasing 30 minutes before the above closing times.

Reason: To reduce the possibility of regulated entertainment noise escaping when closing and allow for drinking up time.

Prevention of nuisance from noise / vibration

All doors and windows will remain closed during the licensed regulated entertainment activities or in any event after 11pm. The entrance door will be fitted with a self-closing device and staff required to ensure that it is not propped open. A member of staff shall be made responsible to ensure the door is opened for as brief a period as possible. Where necessary adequate and suitable mechanical ventilation should be provided to public areas

Entry to the premises will be restricted to main front entrance whilst the premises is being used for regulated entertainment licensed activity

Entrance/exit from the premises whilst regulated entertainment licensable activities are ongoing shall be via a lobbied door to minimise noise breakout.

The regulated entertainment licensable activity shall conclude 30 minutes before the premises is due to close to prevent excessive noise breakout as the premises empties

Structure borne noise

All speakers are mounted on anti-vibration mountings to prevent vibration transmission of sound energy to adjoining properties

Sound limits

The licensee shall ensure that no music played in the licensed premises is audible at or within the site boundary of any residential property

All regulated entertainment amplified activity will utilise the in-house amplification system, the maximum output of which is controlled by the duty manager

The level of amplified regulated entertainment shall be controlled by means of a limiting device set at a level which upon request may be agreed with the licensing authority. It will be a responsibility of the Premises Licence holder to request assistance, in writing and to ensure that the limiter is working effectively.

Outside Areas

No music will be played in, or for the benefit of patrons in external areas of the premises

No form of loudspeaker or sound amplification equipment is to be sited on or near the exterior premises or in or near any foyer, doorway, window or opening to the premises

Signs shall be displayed in the external areas/on the frontage requesting patrons to recognise the residential nature of the area and conduct their behaviour accordingly. The management must reserve the right to ask patrons to move inside the premises or leave if it is felt that they could be disturbing neighbours

The number of persons permitted to utilise the external area/frontage will be restricted to 10 patrons at a time to reduce possible people noise.

Deliveries and collections.

Deliveries and collections associated with the premises will be arranged between normal working day times so as to minimise the disturbance caused to the neighbours

Empty bottles and non-degradable refuse will remain in the premises at the end of trading hours and taken out to the refuse point at the start of the working day rather than at the end of trading when neighbours might be unduly disturbed

Plant and machinery

All plant and machinery is correctly maintained and regularly serviced to ensure that it is operating efficiently and with minimal disturbance to neighbours arising from noise

Dealing with complaints

A complaints book will be held on the premises to record details of any complaints received from neighbours. The information is to include, where disclosed, the complainant's name, location, date time and subsequent remedial action undertaken. This record must be made available at all times for inspection by council officers

Liaison meetings will be held where specifically requested by residents to enable neighbours to raise concerns about any aspect of the licensed activities

Patrons entering/exiting premises.

The main reason for making the representation is that the premises are located close to residential property and the late hours being sought will see a major shift in the operation of this venue were the new licence to be granted. The potential is there for residents to be subjected to a negative impact from the late night operation of the venue on local residents and loss of amenity. In my opinion the applicant have made no reference to the Statement of Licensing Policy and have failed to demonstrate the variation will not have a detrimental impact on the night time economy; the local environment and the amenities of the local residents.

The Council Statement of Licensing Policy advises the following in this instance:

53 LICENSING HOURS

The Council will generally deal with the issue of licensing hours having due regard to the individual merits of each application, considering the potential for nuisance associated with the style, characteristics and activities of the business and type of premises, examining any steps that might reduce the risk of nuisance. However, although the Council will treat each case on its individual merits, generally it will not grant permission for licensable activities beyond 2330 hours on Sundays to Thursdays and Midnight on Fridays and Saturdays in respect of public houses situated in areas having denser residential accommodation. The Council would expect good reasons to be given to support any application for extensions beyond these hours, including addressing possible disturbance to residents and local parking. Additionally, in these areas, consideration will be given to imposing stricter conditions in respect of noise control.

80 THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Licensed premises, especially those that operate late at night or in the early hours of the morning, can give rise to a range of nuisances that may potentially impact on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. Principal concerns relate to noise nuisance, light pollution and noxious smells.

This authority expects applicants for premises licences and club premises certificates to have made relevant enquiries about the local area and prepare their operating schedule on the basis of a risk assessment of the potential sources of nuisance posed to the local community by their intended operation. The operating schedule should demonstrate an understanding of the level of risk of nuisance and include positive proposals to manage any potential risks.

Recommended hours:

We are unable to support the requests for such an increase in hours at this premises and recommend a revised operating as follows:

Sunday to Wednesday venue opens at 0900 for licensable activity and closes at 0100 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0030.

Thursday to Saturday venue opens at 0900 for licensable activity and closes at 0200 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0130.

The area of Philip Lane has existing street drinking issues and the proposed increased times for the sale of alcohol in our view does not promote responsible drinking and can lead to excessive consumption of alcohol in those persons who may be suffering with alcohol dependency issues. The health of our residents is of paramount importance and we have a duty to consider their health, safety and welfare at all times and we can ensure this by implementing a maintaining a responsible approach to Licensing within the borough particularly such premises retailing alcohol we therefore wish to recommend some alterations to the application as follows:

The use of SIA shall be a minimum of 3 SIA registered officers Sunday to Wednesday from 2100 until venue closes and clients dispersed.

For the reason stipulated we assert the original hours requested for are too excessive for this residential area and wish the LSC to consider the revised recommended hours.

I am making this representation objecting to the application for a New Premises Licence at The Lord Palmerston, 197 Philip Lane N15 4HQ. I have been Police Licensing Officer since 2012. The area surrounding the venue has been known for some years as suffering from alcohol related crime and disorder with particular concerns in nearby West Green Road.

With this in mind we should look at applications to increase the hours of alcohol sales to ensure they do not increase risk of increased alcohol fuelled crime and disorder.

With regards incidents related to the venue since April 2017 the following crimes have been reported:

CRIS: 2810081/17 on Monday 24th April 2017 at 2045 landlady of pub ejects 2 intoxicated males. Five minutes later they return and one has been hit on head with a bottle and is bleeding. Suspect arrested for GBH. He had apparently been causing a disturbance in the row of shops for the last hour. Suspect also intoxicated.

CRIS: 2818074/17 Saturday 15th July 2017 at 2355 male told to leave pub due to behaviour towards female staff and on hearing breaking glass outside assistant manager locked doors of pub. Outside male assaulted by males leaving a cut to his head.

Such a change would mean the venue selling alcohol later than any other licensed venue in the area with the exception of 24 / 7 Off Licences. Police concern is that alcohol fuelled clients from nearby pubs / clubs will attend The Lord Palmerston after the other venues closed. This risks confrontation at the entrance as SIA registered door supervisors refuse entry or further alcohol consumption should they be allowed entry.

In the application the venue has offered a good CCTV system, Police CCTV recommendations below, and one SIA officer per 100 clients from 2100 hours on Friday and Saturday despite venue wishing to open until 0530 on Thursdays as well as Friday and Saturdays. Police consider a venue wishing to operate alcohol sales this late in an area known for alcohol fuelled crime / disorder should not rely on one SIA officer on a Friday and Saturday night. The long hours risk alcohol fuelled crime / disorder from 2100 every night and SIA presence should reflect this. The venue says extra SIA will be considered continually as part of an ongoing operational risk assessment but should disorder start to threaten in the early hours it would not be easy to find extra SIA or if Sunday – Thursday an SIA officer to come in and deal with the situation. With regards SIA of 1 per 100 clients I assume until 200 is reached they do not consider another SIA officer required meaning one SIA officer is controlling an all-night licensed venue with up to 199 clients inside. How will they monitor how many people are in the venue? With a 'clicker' they require the SIA officer to stay on the door monitoring entrants and persons smoking outside but who would then be monitoring clients inside the venue and the rear door? On Sunday to Thursday no SIA officer will be monitoring the clients either smoking outside, entering venue or inside venue. Should there be crime / disorder at entrance or inside Police do not consider one SIA officer sufficient to prevent escalation and eject or detain suspects.

The application also mentions a dispersal policy of clients in a residential area but not who will carry it out as no SIA Sunday to Thursday and on Saturday & Sunday if the SIA officer is ensuring clients leave the vicinity of the venue quietly who is monitoring alcohol fuelled clients inside.

Police consider it appropriate for 2 SIA officers on the entrance to monitor clients entering and those smoking outside in what the applicants acknowledge is a residential area, and 1 inside monitoring clients to deter alcohol fuelled crime / disorder and monitor alcohol consumption not visible from the bar to prevent intoxication and monitor rear door. The second SIA officer controlling the door can also support the single officer inside.

Police consider the standard of CCTV should be:

Cameras must be sited to observe the entrance doors from both inside and outside to protect SIA searching entrants or refusing entry / ejecting clients.

Cameras on the entrances must capture full frame shots of the heads and shoulders of all people entering the premises i.e. capable of identification.

Cameras must be sited to cover all areas to which the public have access including any outside smoking areas.

Provide a linked record of the date, time of any image.

Provide good quality images - colour during opening times.

Have a monitor to review images and recorded quality.

Be regularly maintained to ensure continuous quality of image capture and retention.

Member of staff trained in operating CCTV at venue during times open to the public.

Digital images must be kept for 31 days. The equipment must have a suitable export method, e.g. CD/DVD writer so that Police can make an evidential copy of the data they require. Copies must be available within a reasonable time to Police on request.

With regards the requested opening hours the applicants acknowledge it is a residential area. There are houses directly opposite venue which are likely to be adversely affected by venues clients parking in side streets and

returning in the early hours making noise and alcohol fuelled clients smoking outside venue, with no SIA control Sunday to Thursday according to application. Therefore Police suggest a compromise to increase hours but more in line with other nearby venues and a 30 minutes cessation of alcohol sales and regulated entertainment as a calming down measure for clients and to deter persons from slightly earlier closing venues as they will not be served and told so at the door. Police consider the following hours appropriate under crime and disorder and public nuisance in a residential area :

Sunday to Wednesday venue opens at 0900 for licensable activity and closes at 0100 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0030.

Thursday to Saturday venue opens at 0900 for licensable activity and closes at 0200 with all licensable activity ceasing at 0130.

Should the Committee support the Police recommendation relating to the venue licensable and opening the hours then the SIA requirement should be reduced to 1 SIA registered officer Sunday to Wednesday from 2100 until venue closes and clients dispersed and 2 SIA registered officers Thursday to Saturday from 2100 until venues closes and clients dispersed.

were 75 alcohol related incidents recorded within 500m of the premises. In addition, there were a further 17 alcohol related incidents amongst those aged 25 and under within 500m radius (*SafeStats, 2016*). Between April 2016 and March 2017, there were 77 crimes reported on Phillip Lane, the highest out of the 73 roads that make up the policing neighbourhood area. 13 of these crimes were for anti-social behaviour and 22 for violent and sexual offences.

The above findings above are of significant concern from a public health perspective in terms of the prevention of crime and disorder. There is an increasing amount of evidence which shows that those under the influence of alcohol are more likely to commit crimes and engage in anti-social behaviour (ASB). They are also more likely to be the victim of crimes such as common assault and robbery which are significant issues in Haringey. Alcohol is known to exacerbate the likelihood of night time violence and domestic abuse offences (*GLA datastore, 2016*). ASB calls to Haringey Anti-Social Behaviour Action Team (ASBAT) and Police are in excess of 10,000 per year.

Antisocial behaviour associated with street drinking has been recognised as a concern in Haringey. Problems identified include; litter, noise, urination and intimidation all of which have a detrimental impact to the quality of life for residents. As a result, Haringey Council's Street Enforcement Team has designated a number of areas within the borough as Alcohol Control Zones (ACZ). The Tottenham Green ward, including Philip Lane on which the premises is located, is one Haringey's Alcohol Control Zones.

Public Safety:

The impact of alcohol on health in Haringey is particularly severe. In the 2016/17 financial year, there were 22 alcohol related ambulance callouts located within the LSOA, ranking it 11th out of the 144 LSOAs that make up the borough (*Safestats, 2017*). The levels of ambulance related callouts reflects the increased pressure and costs to the NHS as a result of alcohol in Haringey. These impacts are also felt across a range of groups including the council, policing and the community as a whole.

Public Nuisance:

As stated in Haringey's Statement of Licensing Policy 2016-2021 "licensed premises, especially those that operate late at night or in the early hours of the morning, can give rise to a range of nuisances that may potentially impact on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. Principal concerns relate to noise nuisance, light pollution and noxious smells."

The Licensing Authority's expectations of license holders are set out in the policy where it states that "licensees have a responsibility for the conduct of their customers while they are in and around their premises. If provision is made for customers to congregate or smoke outside of premises, then sufficient management controls must be put into place to ensure that no nuisance or disturbance is caused to local residents. Failure to control customers outside of premises can result in licence reviews being submitted and impact upon the premises licence".

We have specific concerns about the impact of operating late in the night / early hours of the morning on every day of the week on local families living in this mainly residential area.

Protecting Children from Harm:

There are 3 primary schools and 1 secondary school located within a 500m radius of the premises so we would encourage any license holder to be responsible and clear on implementing the Challenge 25 policy.

Recommendation:

In summary, Public Health believes that the area has sufficient premises to meet demand for alcohol. Whilst Public Health welcomes the consideration given in the operating schedule as to how the applicant will uphold the licensing objectives, we have significant concerns over the requested operating hours, given the extensive crime and safety issues highlighted above. Furthermore, this is a mainly residential area with a high number of schools in close proximity to the premises so we have concerns that licensable activities into the early hours of the morning may cause nuisance and disruption to local residents living in the surrounding area. Whilst the applicant has proposed use of a noise limiter for recorded and live music played in the premises, Public Health are not satisfied with the proposals for controlling patrons that would be leaving the premises at all hours of the morning.

If this licence is to be granted Public Health recommend that the following conditions are to be attached (in addition to those listed in the application) to minimise any potential harm to our local residents:

I have been contacted by concerned residents regarding the recent application made by The Lord Palmerston Public House of 197 Philip Lane, Tottenham, London N15 4HQ to extend licensing hours (see table below for details). I am writing to register my objection in my capacity as a ward councillor for extension of the premises license. The Lord Palmerston Public House is located on the corner of Philip Lane and Summerhill Road. Although the pub lies on the other side of Philip Lane and not actually in Bruce Grove Ward, it falls just outside the ward boundaries and many of my residents will be adversely affected (Philip Lane lies in both Bruce Grove and Tottenham Green wards). The basis for this opposition is that granting a license for this premises will not promote the licensing objectives particularly the prevention of public nuisance, and the prevention of crime, disorder and antisocial behaviour.

Unlike the High Road, Philip Lane is in a residential area. The location of the pub is on the corner of Summerhill Road and Philip Lane. There is a sheltered accommodation along Summerhill Road and I am concerned that noise from the pub including people leaving the pub will cause a disturbance to not only residents living along Philip Lane and surrounding roads but also to the vulnerable residents living in the sheltered accommodation. In addition, in the table below under the heading 'Supply of alcohol' it states for consumption ON and OFF the premises up until Sam strengthening my earlier argument that it will not promote the licensing objectives of the prevention of public nuisance, and the prevention of crime, disorder and antisocial behaviour.

I have also been informed by some residents that initial plan was the introduction of a 'gastro pub' which residents were in favour of but this application indicates otherwise and is more in line with that of a potential night club which is not suitable for a residential area. Especially one with sheltered accommodation.

In view of the above, I would urge the Licensing Authority/Committee to refuse the application.

I wish to object in the strongest terms to The Lord Palmerston pub's application for a licence for regulated entertainment and the sale of alcohol until the early hours of the morning, seven days a week.

The Lord Palmerston pub is located in a residential area, which includes a lot of families with young children, working people and older and/or vulnerable people in nearby supported housing. Entertainment until the early hours of the morning will be disruptive to people needing to sleep at night. Entertainment and alcohol consumption until 5am is completely unacceptable for people to live in ear shot of; it will damage individual's mental health and community relations. 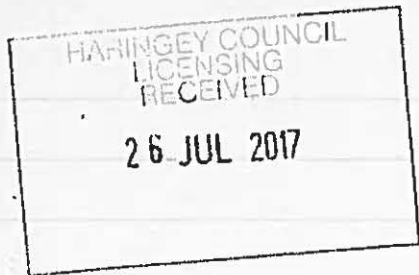

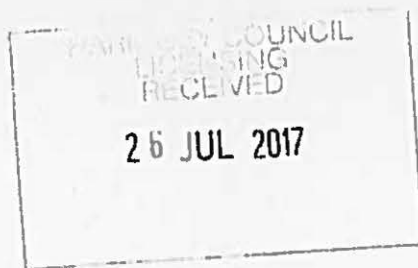

I have just received a notice from our local police Team, to whom I am "extremely grateful" as we don't receive any local newspapers with public notices in where Haringey Council tend to place notices like this, rather than inform the people to whom these notices most effect. So I want to strongly object to the proposals of the new owners of the Lord - Palmerstone public House. on the corner of Phillip lane and Summerhill Road for a change in the Licensing Hours at the Above premise. I and a couple of other people have lived in our road all our lives. and have known members of some families who have lived in this road since it was built in 1853 along with Western Terrace (now Clyde road) and Bathurst Road (now Lawrence road) and the original Lord Palmerstone P. H at 6 Dudley Terrace (Phillip lane) which was pulled down in the early 1930s to be replaced by the now Lord Palmerstone. so this site has been a public House since the change from meadow land when the area was known as "green park." before being changed to Holy Trinity parish with fields opposite the premises in Phillip lane and the slaughter House on the opposite corner of Summerhill road where us London kids first saw farm animals of all types going to their deaths and ~~in~~ during all this time it remained a residential area apart from Dudley Terrace and the Montebella Terrace to ^{the} west on the South side of Phillip lane, with two other local public Houses the greyhound in Phillip lane which has since close

Regarding the application of a license for the above premises I would object most strongly on the following grounds:

1. This is a residential area consisting of houses next door (Summerhill Road) and a housing estate backing onto the pub. The noise of the music would make the lives of us, the residents, a nightmare.
2. There is sheltered accommodation close by where a number of the residents suffer from dementia, mental and alcohol related problems.
3. The proposed hours for live music, dancing and the supply of alcohol are completely unsuitable. Currently we have ongoing noise problems with a meat factory at the Philip Lane end of Summerhill Road who operate their fork lift truck and accept deliveries at all hours of the morning. 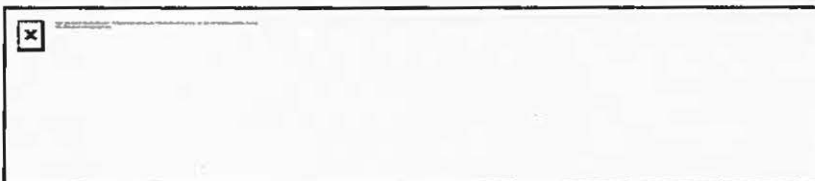

We write to express our strong objections to the application recently made by The Lord Palmerston public house for a premises licence which would significantly extend their permitted opening hours. We, and our two children, will be very directly and significantly affected by any such extension of the permitted opening hours.

For the reasons set out below, we request the Licencing Authority to reject the application on the grounds that the proposals are contrary to the statutory licensing objective of preventing public nuisance, ensuring public safety, preventing crime and disorder and protecting children from harm.

The Lord Palmerston is situated in what is otherwise a quiet, densely populated, residential area. Many of the surrounding properties are occupied by families such as ours with young children. Many have been resident in the area for many years. It falls into the Clyde Circus conservation area.

The nearest local public transport links are buses on West Green Road, Phillip Lane and Seven Sisters Station. There is no taxi rank or minicab office in the immediate vicinity. This will mean the dispersal of patrons of the Lord Palmerston through the surrounding quiet residential streets at unsocial hours. We are concerned this will mean rowdy behaviour and significant levels of noise on the streets.

The opening hours that are being applied for are later than the other public houses in the area and is therefore likely to attract a large number of 'late drinkers' likely to cause noise and nuisance to the residents after midnight.

An application has been made to play live music, recorded music which we strongly object to. This is completely unsuitable for a residential area and in our view unnecessary. It will also be a nuisance to neighbours as they abut directly on the pub, there is no buffer of a large garden. It is worth noting that there is a home for the elderly across the road and this would constitute a nuisance for them especially with the late hours involved.

People leaving the pub tend to do so in groups and are inevitably in a lively mood. They walk to public transport, or take minicabs. With 11pm closing the would peak at about 11pm to 11.30pm each night. Under the proposals put forward for late night refreshment this would mean increased traffic throughout the night but most likely between the hours of 3am to 3.30am Sunday to Wednesday, 5am to 5.30am Thursday to Saturday. To put this in context, at this time of night there is essentially no other noise in the area and only minimal vehicular traffic. However quiet customers think they are being at this time of night there will be nuisance and at least apparent disorder as they leave.

This is not something that can be dealt with any other way. There is no additional condition on the licence or assurance from the landlord that can possibly control the behaviour of departing patrons at some distance from the pub.

Later opening hours also bring with it the risk of increased drug dealing and drug taking as was the experience of the Pride of Tottenham which has had its licence revoked.

Shorter hours would be consistent with other licensed premises in residential areas of the borough.

The Clyde Circus conservation area is a quiet leafy area in the heart of Haringey and we as residents want to keep it that way, if the licensing requests are agreed it will have the most severe and unpleasant effects on the quality of our life and I would ask you to reconsider the contents of the application.

I was alerted by Super Neighbourhood Police Team that the above has applied for an extension of their licencing hours, which if granted would mean the above opening practically 24 hours 7. They have also not taken into consideration that there is a Sheltered Housing Scheme in Sunnyside Road and an Assisted Living Scheme done by in Philip Lane. 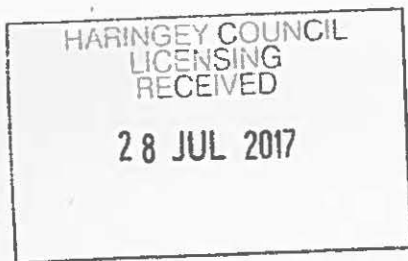
The Council have already experienced problems with these

I am writing to object to the granting of the licence as currently requested for The Lord Palmerston Pub at 197 Philip Lane, N15 4HQ. I have no objection to the building continue to operate as a pub as it has for many years. or even that it has a licence extending a little after 11pm. My objection is to the request that the pub be open until 3.30am on weekdays and 5.30am at the weekend.

These hours are totally out of keeping with the type of area in which the pub is situated. The area is residential save for a small parade of shops including the pub. This is not a busy high street. There are residential properties directly behind and opposite the pub. The granting of such a late licence would be very likely to create noise nuisance both from the pub and from pub goers leaving the premises. I also feel that it is likely that anyone staying up until 5.30am is not doing so on the basis of having a few pints of shandy...I think it is likely drug taking will happen. I have lived previously near a similar venue and it was horrible going past people who are clearly coming down from a night on drugs when all you want to do is get a pint of milk! I now have a young son and do not want him exposed to that early in the morning.

I feel that granting such a late licence would breach at least two of the conditions listed;

- The prevention of crime and disorder - likely drug use
- The prevention of public nuisance - noise, drugs, 'drunk' people trying to get home from somewhere with only limited transport connections at night.

Thank you for your email. Given the limited time available I have set out some of my concerns below:

- The current licence runs to midnight and 1am respectively - a public house as the application describes would not normally exceed this sort of terminal hour. It is suggestive of the venue being used as a live music hub or nightclub, either of which would have an impact on the area in terms of noise
- The building is 1930s with many single glazed windows and as such is not suited to this sort of activity being carried out without modification. There is no such modification allowed for on the plans
- The concern is that the application is being made to look like a pub with option to run late occasionally and flexibly meet the needs of local customers, but the granting of the licence gives the operator scope to run a noisy establishment in a largely residential area. Specifically there is residential accommodation immediately adjacent and opposite to the premises, and all immediately surrounding streets are predominantly for residential use.
- There are existing problems with street drinking, litter and people urinating in the street in the immediately surrounding areas. The on and off sales aspect together with late terminal hours would likely exacerbate this.
- There are a high number of existing off licences on the area which also contribute to this - so off sales at least should be removed.
- There is already a high level of drug related crime in the area and nearby west green road is a hot spot for relatively open sales of and consumption drugs in the street - these activities often centre around drinking establishments and specifically late night vertical environments - a likely effect of the licence being granted is migration of this drug trade to a more residential area
- Anti social behaviour / public nuisance is often caused late night such as people vomiting in the street, alcohol related ill health impacting the neighbourhood etc.
- The applicants proposed late hour and lack of consultation with local residents demonstrates a disregard for the needs of local residents
- The current manager of the premises has identified the applicant to me and there is a history of operating business which negatively impact residents in neighbouring Hackney, which I have witnessed first hand. Specifically venues trading as late as 5am and beyond creating such external noise that it can be heard several streets away.
- There is no realistic possibility of residents not being disturbed by a 5am licensed premises in this location. The applicant will not be able to promote the public nuisance licensing objective.
- There is a very serious risk the additional hours will result in crime, disorder and antisocial behavior
- The proposed conditions do not provide will not adequately deal with the significant impact of a 5am licence in this residential area
- The absence of a noise report means the applicant cannot demonstrate the public nuisance licensing objective will be promoted
- The applicant has proposed a (very short and undetailed) dispersal policy. No matter how well managed persons are when leaving the premises there will inevitably be an associated risk of nuisance late at night
- It is unclear if external drinking is proposed and no measures appear to have been offered to control this activity – despite it apparently being proposed throughout the night. There is an existing condition relating to external drinking but it is unclear if the proposed conditions are proposed to replace existing conditions.

- The conditions relating to SIA supervisors give the applicant flexibility to reduce the number of SIA supervisors currently required under the existing licence despite the proposed extension in hours.
- I have not seen a copy of the newspaper advert. Please can the council verify this was placed in a local newspaper in accordance with the regulations and correct consultation dates advertised.

I respectfully request that the application is refused in it's entirety.

- b) It is likely to increase crime in the area

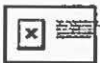
The existing licence allows opening until midnight Mon-Thurs and until 1am Fri and Sat which is an arrangement that has been acceptable for many years.

The new owners of the pub have applied to extend these hours until 3am on weekdays and 5am at weekends and allow the playing of live and recorded music. This is certain to cause a noise nuisance to the immediate neighbours especially the flats above the pub and the sheltered housing of Summerhill Village.

People leaving the pub at these early hours are likely to be noisy as they walk down Summerhill Rd. There is no nearby cab office so the N41 bus and Seven Sisters tube are likely options.

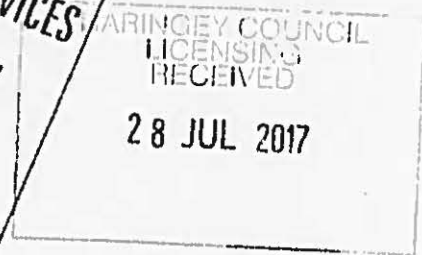

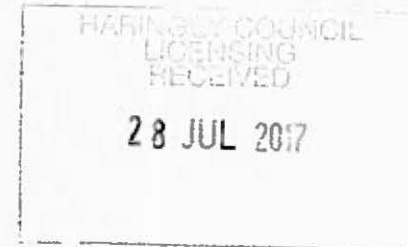

We write register our objection to the application above. We object on the following principal grounds:

Licensing Hours

The existing licence runs to midnight and 1am respectively. For a public house in a residential area this would seem a reasonable limit.

We are of the view that the option to open late occasionally and flexibly is not advisable or necessary and is not generated by the request of the existing customers nor by the local community

An extension of the licensing hours to 03.00 or 05.00 gives rise to an unacceptable risk that the operator will have the opportunity to run a noisy establishment, such as a music venue or nightclub, in this residential area. We understand that this operator runs nightclubs in Shoreditch, so we anticipate that the granting this licence will result in this very outcome.

Noise and Nuisance

Current activities at the pub, which include sport, karaoke and outside drinking, already generate a certain amount of noise and nuisance. Whilst this occasional intrudes on the local community it has been to a level to which can be controlled and to which the local community have become accustomed.

It does not follow that the all current problems of noise, drinking, litter, urinating, etc. in the immediate surroundings are generated by the activities Lord Palmerston, but it would be reasonable to expect that they would increase with the change of the pub to a late night venue.

It is not realistic to expect that local residents will not disturbed by the presence of a late night licensed premises in this location. Even if the premises were to be sound proofed the late night street activity would be impossible for the operator to control.

Recent events at 45 Lawrence Road

The Council should be aware of the recent history of noise abatement problems at 45 Lawrence Road where the occupants were holding long and noisy events both in breach of their lease and without any licences of any sort for their activities or for the

sale of alcohol. Even without licences it took 8 months for this problem to be resolved. The local Police and Noise Abatement teams expended considerable resources to bring this matter to a conclusion.

Crime and Antisocial Behaviour

We are of the view that there is a serious risk that an increase in crime, disorder and antisocial behaviour would result from a late night venue in this location.

Ongoing events in Elizabeth Place

Elizabeth Place is bordered by the Bedford Road Homes for Haringey and the Elizabeth Clyde Estate. The relative width of the road, the adjacency of the recreation area and the cul de sac nature of the road layout, mean that this is an area in which people and vehicles congregate at night. It is also a good layout for youngsters who wish to ride motor scooters without detection. This already results in noise disturbance, drug dealing, alcohol consumption, litter and dumping, together with a threat to people's personal safety, particularly at night. There was recently a stabbing outside a drug dealer's house – which we witnessed. The level of litter has required the intervention of the local Ward Councillors and the Local Cabinet Member.

Lawrence Road Developments

With the completion of every new project in Lawrence Road, the pressure on local resources and public spaces will increase. It is hard to anticipate that

Protecting Children from Harm

The children's play area in Elizabeth Place is already used by teenagers and adults out of hours. This results in litter and broken glass, and occasionally urine or vomit being present in and around the playground. The failure of the Parks department to maintain decent standards of litter collection and cleaning make the use of this playground for young children increasingly hazardous. The football area is also used for games late at night, causing a disturbance to local residents. Because it is not lit it is also used for drug dealing and use and for people having sex. It is similarly hard to anticipate that this situation will not be exacerbated by the presence of a late night venue in the area.

Off Sales

There are already problems with street drinking and its attendant problems in the area. The off sales aspect together with late terminal hours would likely exacerbate this. There are also already a high number of existing shops licensed to sell alcohol in the area.

We object in the strongest terms to this application and recommend that Officers and Members reject it. We reserve the right to expand upon these representations in due course. We also support the many other objections that have been submitted by individual households.

We are writing to strongly object to this application for a late licence.

We object on the following grounds

1. Prevention of public nuisance

The Lord Palmerston is situated in a primarily residential area with a high density of families. Opening hours until 5am and the functions of a business operating such hours I.e music, late night drinking, inebriated clientele is not appropriate in this location. Late night drinking venues attract drunk, loud people. They play loud music to the drunk loud people. It would effectively change the use of the property from a local pub serving the local community to a nightclub in the middle of a residential area. There are some commercial properties nearby but all of these are closed by 11pm. It's therefore a quiet and predominantly residential area where noise carries. This type of business activity in this area will cause unreasonable disturbance for the local community many of whom will be having to get up for work a few hours after the venue has closed (5am closing v's 7am the start of a normal working day). Not to mention the impact for the many families with young children living close to this site.

2. Drain on public resources

We have recently had experience whereby 45 Lawrence Road was rented to a tenant who was using the site to hold illegal raves. We urge the licensing team to look at the trail of complaint in relation to this property with both the noise abatement team, police and licensing team themselves. It caused a massive disturbance to local residents and resulted in a significant drain to public resources as a result of complaints by the local community to the noise abatement and police teams - both of which attended the site 4 to 5 times a week, every week for 8 months until the tenant was finally evicted. It's a quiet residential area and noise carries. This application will have the same disturbing effect pitting the licensee against the local community with public services being called forward to mediate. Late night drinking / party, venues in residential areas do not mix and it will result in a strain on public services.

3. The prevention of crime and disorder

The Lord Palmerston abuts Elizabeth Place and Elizabeth Place Parkland. It is an area that due to geography has lots of 'open' public ground and suffers from high levels of antisocial behaviour as large groups congregate in the area and our streets are filled with litter from these gatherings. Similarly groups that gather in the church yard of St Philip The Apostle church opposite The Lord Palmerston. We are concerned a late night drinking venue will attract more antisocial gatherings in the area and exacerbate the antisocial behaviour and littering which is already a significant challenge for our local community and council.

4. Protecting children from harm

Referencing back to the illegal raves at 45 Lawrence Road. When the venue closed the attendees would often end up the Elizabeth Place Parkland. This is area that is open and not under the Parks Authority and consequently attracts gatherings at antisocial hours. This Parkland is in the immediate locality of The Lord Palmerston and houses a children's playground. It is often unusable due to the litter and broken glass from these gatherings. We are concerned a 5am drinking venue in the close locality would cause even more gatherings in this area and further degrade the children's playground. Also as referenced many times

already, The Lord Palmerston is located in a residential area that is home to lots of families as it is close to our local school. We personally pass the venue on the school run every morning as do many of our neighbours with children - 5am drinking dens soak up those that don't want to go home when the pub closes. They create noise, mess (litter, public urination, vomit) and attract drugs and related paraphernalia. This is not going to be welcome to the many parents who walk past the Lord Palmerston on their way to the Harris Academy. Lastly many of these families will be disturbed by the noise from the venue itself. 3am closing Sun to Wed and 5am Thurs to Sat will have a serious and damaging impact on the many families living in the residential houses surrounding this site (in some cases literally next door, and opposite).

5. Terms of License

We echo comments made by some of our neighbours re managing dispersal (not enough detail), off-site sales (will attract even more antisocial behaviour), and outside drinking both outside the venue itself and in the smoking shelter to the side (no mention at all).

In short we support local business but business that improves our neighbourhood and has a positive impact for local residents. Tottenham is an area that suffers from above average crime, littering and many other types of antisocial behaviour. We hope the council take this into account when reviewing the application and refuse it on the grounds that not only is this the incorrect location for such a venture (I.e it's primarily a residential area with a high number of families) but that it's the type of business that will bring more antisocial behaviour to an area already blighted by extremely high levels of antisocial behaviour. We desperately need businesses that will improve our area not the opposite.

I strongly object to the grant of a licence which would enable an increase the opening hours of this establishment.

There is no real benefit to the local community. The establishment currently enjoys reasonably long hours even though it is surrounded on three sides by residential buildings. The general noise and drunkenness is tolerable.

Increasing the hours might have a number of impacts:

Inevitable use of the venue as a night club, by either the current or future owners, would lead to an increase in the number of loud music events. The building is not designed for this, leading to discomfort for the locals.

The extended drinking hours will act as a magnet for people wanting to continue their imbibing after their usual venue has closed. This will result in an increase in the numbers of drunken people, with a rise in the noise and an increase in the urinating in the surrounding area. In particular, the handy bushes in Elizabeth Place, already used as a latrine, dumping ground and drug venue, provide a handy location for nefarious activities. It is a shame that Haringey Council doesn't make more effort to keep this area under control. The application, if successful, will merely add to this.

Experience in West Green Road, which has late-hours drinking establishments, has shown that local people returning home on foot and by public transport get harassed by the drunkards on the street. This would increase in the area around The Lord Palmerston.

I write to register my objection to the application above on the following principal grounds:

The existing licence runs to midnight and 1am respectively. For a public house in a residential area this would seem a reasonable limit.

An extension of the licensing hours to 03.00 or 05.00 would potentially give rise to further applications for a music venue or nightclub. We understand that this operator runs nightclubs in Shoreditch, so we anticipate that the granting this licence will result in this very outcome. This would be entirely suitable in this quiet residential neighbourhood.

In addition we believe that the extension of opening hours would increase the risk for crime, disorder and antisocial behaviour. Furthermore, the children's play area in Elizabeth Place is already used by teenagers and adults out of hours. This results in litter and broken glass, and occasionally urine or vomit being present in and around the playground. The failure of the Parks department to maintain decent standards of litter collection and cleaning make the use of this playground for young children increasingly hazardous. The football area is also used for games late at night, causing a disturbance to local residents. Because it is not lit it is also used for drug dealing and use and for people having sex. It is similarly had to anticipate that this situation will not be exacerbated by the presence of a late night venue in the area. 
