1. Purpose of the report (That is, the decision required)

1.1 This is to update Cabinet on the decisions and recommendations of Overview and Scrutiny on 20th April in the report presented on the Review of School Exclusions (part 2) and seek their approval.

2.1 Overview and Scrutiny have produced a helpful report which CYPS has considered carefully. I am happy to agree all the recommendations.

- 5.1. Overview and Scrutiny made their recommendations following consultation with young people and their families, schools and local authority services and officers.

- 6.1. None
- 7. Summary**
- 7.1. The secondary Pupil Support Centre received 'Good' in both the Ofsted inspection of its own provision and in the more recent review into day-6 provision.
- 7.2. The secondary Pupil Support Centre is part of the Building Schools for the Future programme and work is due to start on the Commerce Road site at the end of this summer term. The provision will temporarily relocate to the second site at Coppett's Wood after the Y11 GCSE examinations, with a planned return to Commerce Road early in 2010, at which point the whole provision will be located on a single site.
- 7.3. The Keys to Wellbeing Strategy currently in the first phase of implementation, is intended , through the BSF programme at secondary and through the DCSF Back on Track funding at Primary, to enable schools to retain more young people in mainstream as a result of earlier intervention and targeted support nearer to home. This will reduce the number of places needed in the secondary centre.
- 7.4. Haringey was one of only 12 local authorities to receive Back on Track funding from the DCSF to enable it to develop and share its good practice with other schools nationally.

7.5. Haringey continues to have reducing numbers of permanent and fixed term exclusions.

8. Chief Financial Officer Comments

8.1. Given that:

- investment through BSF will enable the YPC to be situated on a single site; and,
- the actions taken have and are expected to continue to deliver reductions in the number of pupils excluded;
a revenue saving should become available.

8.2. The YPC is funded as a Pupil Referral Unit through the centrally retained element of the Dedicated Schools Budget (DSB) and any savings generated will be available to redistribute within the DSB in consultation with the Schools Forum.

That the Children and Young People's service be commended on the quality of provision currently provided at the secondary Pupil Support Centre and in being recognised nationally as a 'leading edge' authority of such provision and being fully compliant with the provisions set out in the Government White Paper 'Back on Track'. | <p>CYPs will ensure that it maintains its reputation for making good provision for pupils excluded from school, for preventing exclusions and for remaining fully compliant with national requirements. Key to this will be ensuring that the new Ofsted inspection requirements relating to attendance are complied with. The new regulations state that a Pupil Referral Unit (PRU – shortly to be renamed Short Stay School) cannot be judged 'Good' if absence levels are high as they will now be judged on the attainment for all registered pupils and not just those who attend. Attendance levels at Haringey's secondary PRU have risen over the last 4 years from an average 47% to an average just over 70%. There is a robust plan for improving this further in their school development plan.</p> <p>Haringey schools have a high level of commitment to retaining young people within mainstream through a range of strategies, including inter-agency / multi-agency working and close collaboration with each other.</p> <p>There has been a reduction in the number of permanent exclusions in secondary schools year on year.</p> <p>The development of multi-agency working is bringing together a range of partners to develop earlier and more timely intervention, including the working with health partners, and in particular CAMH services, particularly through the Keys to Wellbeing Strategy (November 2008).</p> | CYPs core team |

The membership and structure has been approved by the DCSF. The role of this multi-agency committee needs strengthening and the committee has undertaken a self review of their needs to develop an action plan for their work. This needs further development, especially as the secondary PSC undergoes the BSF developments.</p> <p>In line with DCSF requirements, from September 2009 the attendance and attainment data for pupils at PRUs will be included in the attendance and attainment data for Haringey schools.</p> | <p>Peter Lewis – Director CYPS</p> |

It will also result in a training directory of providers, utilising partners with advanced skills as well as training packages and units available from the DCSF and external providers. We have secured additional support and involvement of the National Strategies Behaviour and Attendance team and the Regional Advisor is a member of the Training & Development sub-group.</p> |
