Community Safety Strategy Development Plan 2023-2027 Pre-Engagement Outcomes

1. Introduction

The Community Safety Strategy which is due for publication in the summer of 2023 will present the Haringey Community Safety Partnership's approach and priorities to improving the safety of our residents, business and visitors and achieving a reduction in crime and disorder in Haringey.

The strategy will be supported by a comprehensive strategic assessment (22-23) (see appendix 2) which has drawn upon data from across the partnership to identify trends, patterns, and drivers relating to crime and disorder.

The strategy will also be informed by extensive consultation and engagement with partners across the system, with community groups, and with Haringey residents and businesses.

The outcomes that the Community Safety Partnership seeks to achieve through the strategy will reflect both the data and what we have heard through our engagement activity.

Based upon what we already know, and subject to further engagement with our stakeholders we have identified the following key priority themes that will help to form our Community Safety Strategy:

The identified priorities seek to address the types of crime and offending behaviour which most affect residents, businesses, and visitors Haringey, and which local community safety partners are able to influence, with a focus on the lived experience of children, young people, women, victims, vulnerable adults, and families.

2. Strategy Development Process:

In order to allow for pre-consultation engagement, evaluation of responses and authoring and sign off, the Community Safety Strategy, development has been broken down into four distinct phases. These are outlined below and the activities that will support each of the phases are detailed within the attached GANTT chart (see appendix 4).

Phase 1 – Pre-Engagement Nov- Dec 2022: (Community Safety and Hate Crime Strategy development.

During the development stage of the Community Safety and Hate Crime Strategies and in line with the Haringey Deal we wanted to ensure that we hear from as many of residents and stakeholders as possible to gain their views about the key identified priorities. We then organised a short period of pre-engagement which took place over a two-week period during December 2022.

Phase 2- Evaluation Pre-Consultation Responses/Preparation Cabinet Report- Jan-Feb 2023

We have now evaluated the responses to Pre-Engagement and the findings are detailed below. Essentially the feedback reflected strong support for the key identified priority areas and provided some key responses from our residents and stakeholders around the issues that they would like the Strategy to focus on.

> Phase 3 Feb-June 2023

Subject to Cabinet approval on 8th February to hold a 12-week consultation period up to week ending 5th May 2023.

This will be by way of a series of formal consultations sessions, workshops, and focus groups, with the community, e.g., community groups, faith groups, as well as utilising digital and other communication platforms surveys etc.

Review/evaluate the feedback we have received from our residents and stakeholders in Phase 1 and Phase 2, and prepare the final Strategy document and Action Plan

Engage with Stakeholders/CSP Board re draft strategy regarding any feedback additional commentary before final version completed.

The Pre-Consultation Engagement Plan in the below table details the stakeholder groups and community engagement that was carried out for a two-week period during December 2022. This allowed for us to engage with a significant number of residents and stakeholders across the borough.


Findings from Community Safety Strategy Survey

Over the two-week period of Pre-Engagement, the team collated 104 respondents from the survey and attended face to face sessions with residents and stakeholder groups. Essentially there was overwhelming support from those who participated in the surveys and face to face engagement meetings around the six identified key priorities.

Q1: Based upon what we already know, we have identified the following key themes that will help to form our Community Safety Strategy:

- Violence and high harm crimes (including gangs, knife crime and other high harm crimes)
- Violence against women and girls
- Exploitation (including child sexual exploitation, child criminal exploitation, County Lines, trafficking, extremism, and modern slavery)
- Public trust and confidence.
- Reducing victims of crime and anti-social behaviour.
- Reducing Reoffending.

.... Reducing crime in open spaces- particularly important for women and girls' safety, especially in routes where no alternative is available....

Q4. Do you have any other comments or thoughts around the safety in your neighborhood or the borough that you would like to mention?

Responses:

- I think having reasons to have pride in our areas helps us feel safe, and to occupy spaces that many of us avoid because of crime risk (e.g., alley's, parks at night' etc.)
-I think effort may need to be focused in the busier areas where I imagine more of this type of crime happens...
- Motorists driving well above the speed limit. So dangerous....
- Graffiti is a major problem. It is ugly and indicates the presence of gangs. It needs to be removed quickly....
- Petty theft appears to have gone stratospheric. With no interventions by police. Open drug use not tackled....
- there is much sexism and domestic violence in practically all communities this needs to be included and given high priority, too....

Wood Green Voices, Wood Green Week of Action

We will also be utilising some of the early evaluation from the Wood Green Voices consultation, which took place during November 2022 and the Week of Action which took take place in Wood Green December 2022.

Broadly speaking in Wood Green, the same issues around safety and perceptions of safety were mirrored where for example concerns were highlighted that certain local areas did not feel safe to walk in at night, particularly for women. This was linked to concerns about the presence of antisocial behaviour and intimidating gatherings of men, and presumed gang, drug dealing and other criminal activity.

Respondents were also concerned about the role that some businesses play in enabling these behaviours in and around their premises.

"The areas around Wood Green Tube and Turnpike Lane tube are blighted by drug dealing and a lot of begging. The two Wetherspoon pubs encourage antisocial behaviour."
