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Background

- In November 2020, Cabinet approved the current School Street programme through the <u>School Street Action Plan</u>. A new <u>School Street Plan</u> was subsequently approved in June 2023
- 2. The key objectives given in the Plan for implementing School Streets are to:
 - a) Encourage active travel
 - b) Reduce pollution
 - c) Reduce car use and congestion near schools
 - Reduce road danger and improve safety for pupils and parents/carers travelling to and from school



A School Street is typically a road (or roads) outside a school with a restriction upon motorised traffic at school drop-off and pick-up times

Report objectives

- Summarise the feedback received to 12 proposed School Streets, consulted upon in November to December 2022
- 2. Assist in the decision making process when deciding whether to introduce the School Streets








Overall number of responses



Total number of individual responses by project area




Respondent groups (Q6)

- In Q6, respondents were asked in what capacity they were responding.
- Respondents could tick more than one box (for example, they might be a resident outside of the school street *and* a parent of a child at the school) and so the total count <u>will add up to more than</u> the individual number of responses.
- The most common group selected (427) was 'resident within the proposed School Street' followed by 'pupil or parent of a pupil at this school' (420).
- Some caution should be applied when analysing answers to this question. The response to Q6 has been cross-referenced against Question 10 (postcode) which shows that a significant number of respondents did not understood the proposed boundary of the proposed School Street. For example, at St Mary's C.o.E. School, 29 respondents to Q6 said they were a "resident within the proposed School Street" but according to the postcode given in Q10 fewer respondents (22) actually have a property with a postcode within the proposed School Street.

- Overall 54% of respondents were positive or very positive about the proposals and 42% were negative or very negative.
- It is important to consider the results on a project-by-project basis as they are discrete schemes with considerable variation in response rates within them.




Overall views on the proposed School Streets by project area (Q2)


Overall view of proposed School Street




Heatmap showing geographic distribution of all responses

View of proposal by respondent group





Heatmap showing geographic distribution of all responses







- Mixed levels of support, including from Rectory Gardens.
- Many of the comments relate to potential displacement. However analysis of traffic count data shows that (assuming worst case that all school run traffic was displaced to Nightingale Road from Rectory Gardens) this would only result in an increase of approx. 1 vehicle every 2 minutes.



- Stakeholder engagement with NHS has identified that the proposed 'except for access' exemption in the southern section of the school street is no longer necessary as deliveries / visitors to hospital site can be carried out via the main entrance. Hospital supportive of proposal.







- Copy emailed to ward members in advance of wider distribution



- Call centre staff were briefed on the project and Q&A provided. If callers required help this was provided directly by call centre staff or could be followed up with the project team.

Engagement activities at each school

In November and December 2022 Sustrans ran engagement events at 11 Schools on behalf of Haringey Council during a 3-week School Street consultation period.

During these events multiple Sustrans staff, accompanied by a member of Haringey Council, spoke to as many parents, pupils and staff as possible. The main aim was to inform parents about the consultation and encourage them to complete an online survey.

Sustrans officers were able to answer questions about the scheme and explain the benefits, whilst encouraging parents to participate in the consultation.

Sustrans officers made notes of any additional comments or issues regarding the School Streets, and these are included in this report.

Postcards

Postcards were used as parents often do not stay for long outside the school gate so it was important to have some material on hand to explain the scheme and link to the online consultation.





Engagement Boards

Sustrans developed two A2 engagement boards that were used at all engagement events.

The first board outlined the purpose and benefits of the school street as well as explain next steps and how parents can get involved in the consultation.

The other board display a printout of the relevant school street design.

These got people's attention as well as providing an opportunity for parents to read information about the scheme.

I am writing to you to provide information about a School Street that is proposed in this area and to invite you to share your views as part of this consultation.

What is a School Street?

School Streets transform roads to create a better environment for children to walk, cycle and wheel to school.

How do School Streets help?

When a School Street is in operation, the road temporarily becomes a Pedestrian and Cycle Zone, at school drop-off and pick-up times.

By temporarily closing the road to motor vehicles at the start and end of the school day, School Streets help by:

- Reducing traffic outside the school, which reduces emissions and makes the air around the school cleaner at peak times for children
- Making it safer to walk, cycle, scoot, and wheel to school. Children will benefit from increased physical activity on their journey to and from school
- Reducing traffic congestion and parking problems outside the school and reducing road danger

Residents and businesses can apply for exemptions (details overleaf), giving them the ability to drive into the School Street if needed. Emergency service vehicles have access at all times.

What is being proposed?

- Woodstock Road, Ennis Road, Perth Road, Florence Road and Oxford Road proposed to become a School Street that would operate:
 - o Term time only
 - Monday to Friday
 - o 8.15am 9.15am and 2.45pm 3.45pm
- Motor vehicles (cars, vans, motorcycles etc.) will not be allowed to enter the School Street during the above times <u>unless</u> they had been issued an exemption (see details below)
- To inform drivers, we will install traffic signs and send updates to sat-nav companies
- Motor vehicles that enter the School Street without an exemption, during operational hours, will be identified by camera and may be issued a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN)
- No one needs an exemption to drive out of a School Street. You only need an exemption to drive into the School Street during operational hours
- School Streets remain open to people walking, cycling and wheeling
- Emergency services will always have unhindered access

If the scheme goes ahead, the following groups would be eligible to apply for an exemption:

- Residents or businesses who have an address within the School Street (see note below) to a maximum of two per property
- Blue Badge holders who require access to the School Street
- Pupils with a disability that prevents them walking or cycling to school
- Medical practitioners visiting someone with an address in the School Street
- School vehicles transporting disabled children

Note: properties within the boundary of the School Street would be eligible for a resident or business School Street exemption. Those properties are outlined in blue on the enclosed plan.



School Street Consultation South Harringay Primary School (SS40 and SS41)

Dear Resident or Business,

I am writing to you to provide information about a School Street that is proposed in this area and to invite you to share your views as part of this consultation. The School Street being proposed here is complementary to the ongoing, wider Harringay Ladder Traffic and Transport review.

What is a School Street?

School Streets transform roads to create a better environment for children to walk, cycle and wheel to school.

How do School Streets help?

When a School Street is in operation, the road temporarily becomes a Pedestrian and Cycle Zone, at school drop-off and pick-up times.

By temporarily closing the road to motor vehicles at the start and end of the school day, School Streets help by:

- Reducing traffic outside the school, which reduces emissions and makes the air around the school cleaner at peak times for children
- Making it safer to walk, cycle, scoot, and wheel to school. Children will benefit from increased physical activity on their journey to and from school
- Reducing traffic congestion and parking problems outside the school and reducing road danger

Residents and businesses can apply for exemptions (details overleaf), giving them the ability to drive into the School Street if needed. Emergency service vehicles have access at all times.

What is being proposed?

- Mattison Road and Pemberton Road proposed to become a School Street (comprising of two separate pedestrian and cycle zones) that would operate:
 - Term time only
 - Monday to Friday
 - o 8:15am 9:15am and 3pm 3:45pm
- Motor vehicles (cars, vans, motorcycles etc.) will not be allowed to enter the School Street during the above times unless they had been issued an exemption (see details below)
- To inform drivers, we will install traffic signs and send updates to sat-nav companies
- Motor vehicles that enter the School Street without an exemption, during operational hours, will be identified by camera and may be issued a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN)
- No one needs an exemption to drive out of a School Street. You only need an exemption to drive into the School Street during operational hours
- School Streets remain open to people walking, cycling and wheeling
- Emergency services will always have unhindered access

Who is eligible for a School Street exemption?

If the scheme goes ahead, the following groups would be eligible to apply for an exemption:

- Residents or businesses who have an address within the School Street (see note below) to a maximum of two per property
- Blue Badge holders who require access to the School Street
- Pupils with a disability that prevents them walking or cycling to school
- · Medical practitioners visiting someone with an address in the School Street
- School vehicles transporting disabled children

Note: properties within the boundary of the School Streets would be eligible for a resident or business School Street exemption. Those properties are outlined in blue on the enclosed plan. The exemption would only be valid for the street in which the property was located (ie residents living in Pemberton Road would be entitled to a SS41 exemption but this could not be used in Mattison Road (SS40) and visa-versa. This is to minimise the amount of traffic passing the school.

Motor vehicles without an exemption, including visitors, tradespeople or delivery drivers are not permitted to drive into the School Street during operational times. But no exemption is required to drive out of a School Street, eg. those vehicles that were already parked when it came into operation.

Why is the Council considering a School Street?

These proposals are part of Haringey's plan to improve air quality, children's health, tackle the climate emergency and to make it safer and easier for children to walk and cycle. The council has been working with schools across the borough and has delivered 23 School Streets to date.


