#### 1 Describe the issue under consideration

- 1.1 To report on the objections and submissions to the statutory consultation carried out from 13 December to 11 January 2024 on the proposal to introduce cycle hangars at various locations in the borough.
- 1.2 To request approval to proceed with implementation for 21 of the proposed 31 cycle storage facilities, having taken objections and submissions into consideration.

#### 3 Recommendations

- 3.1 It is recommended that the Head of Service for Highways and Parking in consultation with Cabinet Member for Climate Action, Environment and Transport, and Deputy Leader of the Council.
- 3.2 Considers the objections and submissions raised during the statutory consultation on the proposals and set out in section 4 of this report, and officer responses to each objection set out in table 2, section 6 of this report.
- 3.3 Having considered the proposals, the responses to the statutory consultation and officer comments, and having due regard to the needs set out in Section 149 (public sector equality duty) of the Equality Act 2010, approve:
  - Agree to proceed with Implementation of 21 new cycle storage (cycle hangar) facilities at the proposed locations detailed in Table 1 of section 6.

- Agree not to proceed with the installation of the proposed Bikehangar in Earlham Grove for the reasons set out in section 4.7 of this report.
- Agree not to proceed with the installations of Bike hangars at the proposed locations for Alexandra Park Road, Creighton Road, Granville Road, N22, Flexmere Road N17, Hornsey Lane Gardens N6, Muswell Road N10, St. Albans Crecent and Thackeray Avenue for the reasons set out in section 4.6 of this report.
- 3.4 Approve the total estimated implementation cost of £146,711 which includes consultation, inventory survey, design, traffic management orders, supply, and installation of the cycle hangars. This is from the £506k approved budget for the implementation of the Cycle Parking Programme for year 2023/2024.

#### 4 Reasons for decisions

- 4.1 Encouraging more people to cycle is an important part of the central Government and Haringey council policy to tackle traffic congestion, improve air quality, promote physical activity, and improve accessibility. However, many residents, particularly those who live in flats, find it difficult to keep bicycles at home due to a lack of storage space. The Council, therefore, has a rolling programme which started in October 2014 to provide more secure cycle storage (cycle hangar) on street for residents' use.
- 4.2 The locations for the proposed cycle hangars have been selected based on requests received from local residents.
- 4.3 A total of 142 responses were received to the statutory consultation with:
  - 107 objections
  - 23 in favour
  - 12 comments
- 4.4 Objections received to the statutory consultation were in response to the proposals for cycle hangars to be introduced into the following roads Alexandra Gardens N10, Bailey close N11, Creighton Road N17, Granville Rd N22, Lyndhurst Road N22, Thackeray Avenue N17, Brownlow road N11, Church Crescent N10, Connaught Gardens N10, Cornwall Avenue N22, Earlham Grove N22, Elder Avenue N8, Flexmere Road N17, Foyle Road N17, Granville Road N22, Hornsey Lane Gardens N6, Linzee Road N8, Marshall Road N17, Muswell Road N10, Newnham Road N17, Nightingale Road N22, Osier Crescent N10, Russell Avenue N22, St Anns Road N15, Sylvan Avenue N22, St. Albans Crescent N22, Talbot Road N6, Thackeray Avenue N17, Windermere Road N10 and Woodland Gardens N10.
- 4.5 Of the objections received, the main theme presented related to the loss of vehicle parking space. Most objectors were concerned about the proposed cycle hangars would have in pact on available car parking space in their street. The majority of objections received for this batch of cycle hangar locations have not been upheld, as they did not present any substantial reasons why the hangars should not be introduced. The Council, as the highway authority has a duty of care to manage the network, ensuring, along with other responsibilities, that cycle storage facilities are provided for those residents who find it difficult to keep bicycles at home due to lack of storage spaces. The provision of cycle hangars also contributes to the **Council's** commitment to encourage the use of alternative sustainable modes of Transport.
- 4.6 Objections received from residents in Alexandra Park Road, Creighton Road, Granville Road, N22, Flexmere Road N17, Hornsey Lane Gardens N6, Muswell Road N10, St. Albans Crecent and Thackeray Avenue have been upheld. Residents recommend alternative locations for placing the bikehangars. Officers agreed with the suggested locations and will revise the proposed cycle hangar locations accordingly. This will require for re-advertisement of Traffic Order and report approval before the installation of the cycle storage facilities.

- 4.7 Objections received from residents in Earlham Grove have been upheld and officers recommend not to proceed with this proposal. In addition to the objections received, the resident who requested for a cycle hangar contacted the council and withdrawn the request stating that their request was for hangar in the Cypriot Community Centre car park rather than on the street. Therefore, the council will not proceed with the installation of a cycle hangar at this location.
- 4.8 A summary of objections received, and officer recommendations are detailed in Table 2, section 6 of this report.
- 4.9 The proposals contained within Table 1 section 6 impact 2 or more wards; however, in assessing the proposals, officers conclude that the proposed changes are not likely to be significant in terms of their effects on communities living or working in the area. Therefore, approval can be sought through Delegated authority in consultation with the Cabinet Member for Climate Action, Environment and Transport and the Deputy Leader of the Council to make the relevant traffic management orders and implement the recommendations.

#### 5 Alternative options considered

5.1 An alternative considered was to 'not' undertake the requested introduction of new cycle hangers. However, this is not recommended as it would be against the Council's commitment to providing more secure cycle storage facilities (cycle hangars) on street for residents' use.

#### 6 Background Information

- 6.1 Many residents in the borough, particularly those who live in flats, find it difficult to keep bicycles at home due to a lack of storage space. This is often inconvenient and impractical, meaning that people may not be able to own a cycle at all.
- 6.2 In recent years, cycle hangars have emerged as a game-changing solution. These offer secure, sheltered cycle parking on residential streets. A cycle hangar is a communal bicycle locker that stores six bicycles and only takes half a car parking space on street. It is easy to open with a self-lifting door and protects bicycles from vandalism and wet weather.
- 6.3 The Council, therefore, has made a commitment and has a rolling programme from October 2014 to provide more secure cycle storage (cycle hangars) on street for residents' use and also to encourage the uptake of cycling.
- 6.4 A cycle hangar is a communal bicycle locker that can accommodate six bicycles, it occupies 2.5m of kerb side space, approximately half a car parking space.
- The Council has a contract with Cyclehoop, one of the companies in the market that provide cycle storage facilities, to install and manage cycle hangars in Haringey.
- 6.6 Locations for the installation of cycle hangars are selected based on requests received from residents and a point-scoring system is established to enable requests to be prioritised. The sites selected then undergo a detailed site assessment by Haringey's engineers, who will consider the best location for the hangar.
- 6.7 Once locations are determined, a statutory consultation exercise is carried out in accordance with the Road Traffic Act 1984 and the Local Authorities Traffic Orders Procedure Regulations 1996. This is a legal process involving a notice of the proposal to be placed in the newspapers allowing 21 days during which anyone wishing to object can write to the Council providing reasons for their objection.
- 6.8 The allocation of cycle hangar space is managed by Cyclehoop once the hangar has been installed. Given the high number of requests across the borough, 1 hangar space is allocated per applicant unless there are sufficient spaces for the number of requests received from the road.

- 6.9 Residents can currently rent a space inside a cycle hangar. The actual cost of renting this space which intended to cover costs is £72. Those costs are subsidised by the council at present, with the Council meeting 50% of those costs and residents paying the remainder. This subject to review at present.
- 6.10 To date the Council has installed 209 and currently delivering a further 22 cycle hangars, bring the total to 231 cycle hangars on the public highway (excluding LBH Housing Estates) at various locations across the borough. With the introduction of the proposed 21 new cycle hangars detailed in this report, the total number will increase to 252 cycle hangars in the borough.
- 6.11 The sites for these new proposed cycle hangars were selected based on requests received from residents and further site assessment to determine suitability for each of the proposed locations. Table 1 below lists the proposed cycle hangar location.

6.12 Plans, which show the layout of the proposals, are provided in **Appendix 1** of this report.

#### **Statutory Consultation**

- 6.13 Statutory consultation commenced on 13 December 2023 for a period of 28 days. The usual Statutory Consultation period is 21-days, but extended response time was given due to Christmas holidays to give residents sufficient time to respond to the consultation. The process consisted of a Notice of Proposal published in the London Gazette, Enfield, and Haringey Independent and the notice was erected on site in each of the affected streets. The closing date for representations and comments was 11 January 2024.
- 6.14 Although not a legal requirement, statutory notification letters informing of the proposals and process were also posted to frontages in the streets for the proposed cycle hangars. **Appendix 2** contains copies of the statutory notification letter delivered to affected frontages.
- 6.15 It is noted that LATOR provides local authorities with the discretion of whether or not to hold a public inquiry prior to the making of a TMO. This report does not include the recommendation to hold a public inquiry on account of: the effect of the order (see paragraphs 6.7 & 6.13), no objections, the wider support for the project, that the project will contribute towards achieving a number of policy objectives and that holding a public inquiry would lead to expense and delay while being unlikely to alter the ultimate decision.

#### Responses to Consultation

- 6.17 A total of 3336 properties were written to notify their occupants of the statutory consultation and how they could object should they wish to. A total of 142 representations from residents and businesses were received, comprising 107 objections, 23 submissions in favour and 12 comments.
- 6.18 Table 2 below summarises the objections received; these have been grouped by the reasons provided for the objections, and an officer response to each reason for the objection is provided. All the responses received are outline in **Appendix 3** of this report.

6.19 After considering the statutory consultation responses and taking appropriate adjustment to proposals, it is concluded that the Council progresses with the installation of 21 of the 31 proposed cycle storage hangars as it will promote the use of sustainable forms of Transport.

#### 7 Contribution to strategic outcomes

- 7.1 It is important that we have safe, green travel to prevent our roads from being overrun by cars and to support active travel, which is the ambition of the Council as laid out in its <a href="Borough Plan">Borough Plan</a> and <a href="Transport Strategy">Transport Strategy</a>. The installation of the cycle hangars will support the objectives set out in these documents as well as the wider initiatives to improve air quality and support the health of residents as per the Council's <a href="Climate Change Action Plan">Climate Change Action Plan</a>.
- 7.2 The introduction of the cycle storage facilities is in accordance to the **borough's** adapted <u>Walking</u> and <u>Cycling Action Plan</u> and aligns with the Council's agreed Transport Strategy and supports its 'aims' which include:

- To make Haringey which has a reputation for being a walking and cycling borough both regionally and nationally
- Encourage more journeys to be taken by walking and cycling, to improve the wellbeing of our residents, reduced obesity, and improving air quality
- A well-maintained road network that is less congested and safer

#### 8 Comments of the Chief Financial Officer

8.1 This report seeks approval for the implementation of new cycle storage (cycle hangar) facilities at 29 locations within the Borough for circa £146,711. There is sufficient funding within the current capital programme plan to meet the estimated cost for this proposal.

#### 9 Comments of the Head of Legal Services and Governance

- 9.1 Before reaching a decision to make the necessary traffic management order to implement specific use designated parking bays, the Council must follow the statutory consultation procedures pursuant to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended) ("RTRA") and the Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 (as amended) ("the Regulations"). All representations received must be properly considered in the light of administrative law principles, human rights law and the relevant statutory powers.
- 9.2 The Council's powers in relation to the making of traffic management orders arise mainly under sections 6, 9, 45, 46, 122 and 124 and schedules 1 paragraphs 1-22 the RTRA
- 9.3 The power of a local authority to make an order regulating or controlling vehicular and other traffic is contained within the ambit of section 6 of the RTRA.
- 9.4 When determining what parking places are to be designated on the highway, section 45(3) requires the Council to consider both the interests of traffic and those of the owners and occupiers of adjoining properties. In particular, the Council must have regard to: (a) the need for maintaining the free movement of traffic, (b) the need for maintaining reasonable access to premises, and (c) the extent to which off-street parking is available in the neighbourhood or if the provision of such parking is likely to be encouraged by designating paying parking places on the highway.
- 9.5 By virtue of section 122, the Council must exercise its powers under the RTRA so as to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic, including pedestrians, and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway. These powers must be exercised so far as practicable having regard to the following matters: -
  - The desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises.
  - The effect on the amenities of any locality affected including the regulation and restriction of heavy commercial traffic so as to preserve or improve amenities.
  - The national air quality strategy.
  - Facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and securing the safety and convenience of their passengers.
  - Any other matters appearing to the Council to be relevant.
- 9.6 Prior to making any order the Council must carry out carry out the consultations as set out in Schedule 9 of the RTRA and Regulations 6 and 7 of the Local Authority Traffic Orders Procedure Regulations 1996. A consultation will not be lawful unless it is (1) undertaken at a time when proposals are still at a formative stage; (2) sufficient reasons are given for any proposal to enable people who are interested in the same to consider the proposals and make representations; (3)

- adequate time has been given for such consideration and response; and (4) all representations have been conscientiously taken into account when finalising the proposals.
- 9.7 Having carried out the statutory consultation, the Council can proceed with the recommendations set out in this report.

#### 10 Equalities Comments

- 10.1 The Council has a Public Sector Equality Duty under the Equality Act (2010) to have due regard to the need to:
  - Eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation and any other conduct prohibited under the Act
  - Advance equality of opportunity between people who share those protected characteristics and people who do not
  - Foster good relations between people who share those characteristics and people who do not.
- 10.2 The three parts of the duty apply to the following protected characteristics: age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy/maternity, race, religion/faith, sex and sexual orientation. Marriage and civil partnership status applies to the first part of the duty. Although it is not enforced in legislation as a protected characteristic, Haringey Council treats socioeconomic status as a local protected characteristic.
- 10.3 The proposed decision is to proceed with the introduction of the cycle hangars outlined in Appendix 1 and agree for the Traffic Management Order to be made for these, under sections 6 and 124 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.
- 10.4 The overall objective of the cycle hangar installation programme is to provide more secure cycle storage on street for **residents**' use and also to encourage the uptake of cycling. Cycling reduces CO2 emissions, improve air quality and also encourage a healthy lifestyle. Achievement of these objectives will have positive impacts on young people, older people, and people with disabilities, who are disproportionately affected by air pollution. As such, the proposed decision represents a measure to address existing inequalities.
- 10.5 Of the objections received, the main theme presented related to the loss of vehicle parking space. Most objectors were concerned about the proposed cycle hangars would have in pact on available car parking space in their street. The majority of objections received for this batch of cycle hangar locations have not been upheld, as they did not present any substantial reasons why the hangars should not be introduced.


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## POSTCODE N8 LOCATION PLAN

Bikehangars are noted to offer a solution for people who are limited by a lack of outside secure cycle storage, as echoed by your letter which suggests that residents "particularly those who live in flats" are affected by a lack of storage space. This means that all residents have access to outdoor storage for bicycles, should they need it, and their own gardens would be more secure than a bikehangar, and do not attract a rental fee. Accordingly it would be expected that anyone in Lyndhurst looking for space to park a bicycle would use their own garden; there is no argument here that residents of Lyndhurst have more need for cycle storage than the surrounding roads simply due to the size of their homes.  Lyndhurst is already badly affected by fly tipping and bike storage commonly attracts unauthorised dumping of rubbish and bulky items. FOIs published on your website show that Lyndhurst was one of the roads most affected by fly tipping in the borough and this continues to be a problem to date. What research has been conducted on the link between fly tipping and presence of bikehangars and what measures are Haringey putting in place to monitor and deal with the increased risk of this issue which the bikehangars is likely to make Junghurst a
			There is plenty of information online concerning thefts from bikehangars, as well as attempted thefts and the presence of a bikehangar is likely to make Lyndhurst a target for criminals. Cyclehoop's own website includes a page of tips on keeping bikes left in their hangars safe, acknowledging that theft attempts from these lockers is common. The hangar is being proposed to sit just outside of my property and raises significant concerns for my safety and the security of my home. It is not unreasonable to think that someone who comes to Lyndhurst to steal a bike would then be capable of other criminal activity or damage to the surrounding areas.  I strongly reject this proposal and would suggest the hangar is instead placed either in one of the neighbouring roads (i.e. Maryland or Arcadian) where parking is at less of a premium, or at the top of the road on Wolves Lane, which is more public and would decrease the risk of theft and fly tipping. Further, security cameras can be set up on Wolves Lane (if Haringey deem this necessary) which is not possible for the residential roads. The crossroads at Woodside Road would also be a more suitable option, as it is located next to a park and a school, and remains within a local distance of Lyndhurst. An alternative would be another electric car charging point but speaking as an EV owner there are currently enough charging spaces in the area, although that may change and the space opposite 73 is equidistant from the charging stations on Priory Road and Onslow Gardens.

I am also appalled at the arrogance of the statement that cycling in London is a healthy pursuit. It is tantamount to an encouragement to pursue a dangerous activity in London. Taxi drivers and bus drivers are extremely frustrated by the cycle lanes in London as you will know. My niece suffered a dreadful injury on her bicycle whilst cycling in London though she is an extremely intelligent and careful cyclist.  During lockdown I cycled round the car park at Alexandria Palace in order to exercise but I would NEVER cycle on the roads as I know that this is not a safe activity - I swim for one hour every day. I suggest that if anyone is looking for a safe and healthy form of exercise they should swim at Park Road or The Laboratory or cycle round the car park at Ally Pally as a healthy pursuit rather than resorting to the dangerous pursuit of cycling in London. 			Many of us have got rid of perfectly serviceable vehicles to comply with recent clean air restrictions (which I support). Many of my neighbours have moved to smaller as well as cleaner vehicles. 			On the whole, the parking situation in Talbot Road works pretty well as long as there are no road works. Please keep it that way.
Talbot Road	N6	Whollyobject	I strongly object to the specific siting of the Bikehangar Batch 2 cycle housing (location 44) outside 39 Talbot Road for 4 main reasons:
			1) It is directly outside small residential flats that have their bedrooms facing outward onto the road and the coming and going of cyclists locking up their bikes will cause noise and conversation late at night and early in the morning. This will cause a degrading of quality of life for flat owners especially as there are far more suitable parts of the road it could be sited where there are no residential flats or housing directly adjoining such a structure.
			2) The ideal placing of a Bikehangar would be beside All Saints church where there is adequate space and absolutely no residential housing. There would be a buffer zone for any noise caused by any coming and going of people locking and unlocking their bikes. It would also be a lot safer and less restrictive to traffic flow than on the only bend of the entire road.
			3) Talbot road is a very narrow road with only room for one car to travel up it. 39 Talbot Road is situated on the bend of the road and often provides a passing place for cars to pass each other. However because of its position there have been frequent minor accidents where wings of cars have been damaged on a regular basis. If a Bikehangar were to be placed directly outside number 39 this would decrease the opportunity for traffic flow creating traffic jams which often occur at school pickup times and when the A1 has had an accident. It would also be more unsafe for cyclists coming and going - outside All Saints Church would be a much better siting.
			4) If you look at the siting of the Electric charging points and car hire spaces on Church road - perpendicular to Talbot road, you will see that they are placed conveniently beside large fences well away from any residential housing - they are placed there to create the minimum of noise to local residents.

This exacerbates both the parking and space constraints, affecting residents' daily activities such as unloading passengers, especially children, babies, the elderly and sick, transporting heavy items, and maintaining vehicles. Additionally, it hinders property owners in arranging works or repairs, complicating matters for contractors dealing with century-old properties.  Considering the proximity of Hawke Park Road, which lacks the parking issues mentioned above, I strongly urge you to reconsider the proposed location on Sirdar Road.  To provide some context to the above, I own a car, that I use once a week to drive my 3-year-old son to his grandmother's in Essex for childcare, while I work. Also , due to the lack of Parking Restrictions in this street residents struggle for parking spaces when people from outside Muswell Hill are constantly parking in Alexandra Gardens . Those who don't live on the street who work in Muswell Hill , visit MH , shop in MH and those who use the commercial buildings on the street cause mayhem and blockage on a daily basis day and night. There is very little room for residents to park in this road, due to police people parking their private cars before going to work at the custody suite at the top of this road. Also at weekends and in the evening the congregation of the evangelical church next to the custody suite also park in this road. Again that reduces parking spaces for those of us who pay our council tax and also pay for parking permits.
			This will particularly affect me because it is opposite my garden and therefore takes space away from the road, meaning people will park in front of my property. Moreover, there are not large numbers of people in this part of Nightingale Road who want to store their bikes. I have a resident's parking permit which costs £129 per year.
			I am very supportive of the idea of having a bike hangar in Haslemere Road. I think that cycling should be encouraged for environmental and other reasons and it is important to provide as many places as possible for bikes to be parked.
			The issue I am concerned with is the location in Haslemere Road where the bike hangar should be placed.
			The need for parking spaces for residents is unevenly distributed along Haslemere Road. Some parts of Haslemere Road only have residential buildings on one side of the road. This is the case with the area adjacent to 32-38 Haslemere Road where on the opposite side of the road is the Bright Horizons nursery and the area adjacent to 2-4 Haslemere Road and Monkridge where the Coleridge school is on the other side.
