Statutory Consultation

Proposed Zebra Crossing on Willoughby Lane near the junction with Willoughby Park Road, N17

Dear Resident or Business,

As part of this year's Road Danger Reduction Investment Plan, the Council is proposing to introduce a zebra crossing on Willoughby Lane near the junction with Willoughby Park Road.

Following requests from the local community, officers investigated the latest 3 years' road traffic collision data at this location and noted that there have been 2 slight recorded collisions. A site visit was subsequently carried out which indicated that this location is a popular crossing point for pedestrians, a large number of which are children, due to the presence of several businesses and a place of worship. The volume of motor traffic using this road is high and without a dedicated crossing point, pedestrians find it difficult to cross the road.

The proposed zebra crossing on Willoughby Lane near the junction with Willoughby Park Road will provide a clearly defined crossing point and will give pedestrians the right of way over traffic, enabling them to cross the road safely.

Details of the proposal are listed below and set out on the plan overleaf:

- Introduce a zebra crossing on Willoughby Lane near the junction with Willoughby Park Road, including associated lighting equipment and road markings.
- Build out the eastern footway outside no.70a Willoughby Lane and relocate the existing guardrail onto the footway build out.
- Provide high skid resistant surface treatment on the approach to the zebra crossing.

In order to introduce the proposals and legally enforce their use, we are required to enter into a period of consultation known as Statutory Consultation. This is the legal part of the process and takes the form of a Public Notice advertised in the local press, London Gazette and visible locations within the area to inform the public of the Council's intentions.

The statutory consultation process normally runs for three weeks but given the approaching summer holiday period, it will run for five weeks until **21 August 2024**. You can send us your objection or representation by scanning the QR code above or using the link to complete our online feedback form. Alternatively, you can use the enclosed Freepost feedback card. If you object to the scheme, please give reasons for your objection.


What Happens Next
