Dear Daliah,

Thank you very much for sending over the two representations to the above application.

Would you be kind enough please to send the following to the two people who have made a representation?

“Dear Local Resident,

I am the solicitor who has submitted the application for the new Slim Chickens premises licence at 133 High Road, Wood Green.

I am aware that you have made a representation against the application and I wanted to write to you on behalf of my client.

Please do not hesitate to contact me and I can put you in touch with the Operations Director at Slim Chickens, who would be happy to discuss the proposed new business with you.

Slim Chickens have over 30 restaurants in the UK with many in Central London and they trade successfully.

They do all have the benefit of a premises licence to allow the sale of alcohol, but this is a relatively small part of the overall sales; there is no bar as such (service is from the counter) and a limited range of alcohol is provided, but this is enjoyed by some customers.

We have followed in terms of hours of operation the same licence which ITSU had.

There are a number of conditions we have offered in the application which will (if it is granted) appear on the premises licence and these are as follows:-

1. Anyone who leaves the premises (for example to smoke) will not be permitted to take alcohol with them unless these customers are seated in the small external area in front of the premises.
2. Consumption of alcohol on the premises (including the external area mentioned above) will only be to a person seated taking a meal there and for consumption by such a person as ancillary to their meal.
3. Sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only and supplied as ancillary to their meal.

In a nutshell, any off sales of alcohol must be in sealed containers and all customers who are drinking alcohol must be doing so seated at a table and enjoying a meal.

There can be no sales of alcohol to customers who are drinking and not eating.

I do hope therefore in these circumstances that this explanation and these conditions may go some way to satisfy your concerns and if that is the case, please do let me know.
