4.1 This report provides information on the number and value of spot contracts utilised by the Children's & Families Division of the Children's Service during the period 1st April 2005 to 31st March 2006. 7. Background

- 7.1 Contracts for individual are either 'block' contracts (where a set number of beds or places for services is provided by the contractor at a predetermined price to which the Council may refer users over the contract period), 'framework' contacts (with a predetermined price, which are similar to block contracts but with no guaranteed number of places) or 'spot' contracts (one off contracts meeting an individual's needs). Efforts are made to maximise the use of block and framework contracts where this represents best value for the Council.
- 7.2 Contract Standing Orders authorise the Director of Children's Services to award spot contracts whilst requiring that an annual report on the level of usage is provided to the Executive Procurement Committee

8. Description

- 8.1 Block and framework contracts can have advantages in that it is sometimes possible to secure provision from selected providers at a more advantageous price.
- 8.2 It is not always appropriate or indeed possible to secure block or framework contracts as the residential home market can be a sellers market with providers often not willing to enter into this form of contract preferring to sell on the open market.
- 8.3 However in the case of Children's Services the Pan London Consortium works very successfully with the independent sector to secure quality care and control the price of these services by way of framework contracts.
- 8.4 The table below shows that there has been an overall decrease in both the number and cost of spot contracts for the period covered by this report.

Reasons for percentage reductions

 Asylum Service client numbers reduced dramatically due to a Government amnesty which reclassified clients previously considered to be asylum seekers, these clients have now been transferred to other appropriate services such as Housing Service, Children's Service and other Adult Services.

A more detailed breakdown of the figures shown in the table above is attached at Appendix A.

Historically the Social Services report contained information with regard to spot contracts for Children and Families. Members were informed last year that due to the setting up of the Children's Service that future reports would be separate.
