1. Purpose

• To report overall progress since September 2012

- To report key outcomes from the implementation of Haringey's Prevent Strategy
- To outline a timeframe for PREVENT priority work in 2013-14

2. Background

Following analysis of Home Office and Police data in 2011/12, Haringey and a number of other local authorities were identified as Prevent priority boroughs.

The borough will receive up to £85,000 annually from the Home Office until 2015 which funds the posts of the Senior Community Safety Policy Officer (Prevent) and part of one Community Safety Project Officer.

Following a number of high profile crimes in London connected to PREVENT, this has been added to the Community Safety Strategy as a priority area in its own right.

3. Key programme aims and outcomes

All authorities participating in Prevent work are required to produce a 'Prevent Delivery Plan' which is submitted annually to the Office of Security and Counter Terrorism (OSCT) as part of its oversight role.

The national Prevent strategy has three specific objectives which all local plans must seek to address. These are:

- 1. To respond to the **ideological challenge** of terrorism and the threat we face from those who promote it;
- 2. To prevent people from being drawn into terrorism and ensure that they are given appropriate advice and support; and

3. To work with **sectors and institutions** where there are risks of radicalisation which we need to address.

In response to the above, the local authority Prevent Co-ordinator developed a local delivery plan for 2012-13, endorsed by the Delivery Group, which addresses the three national Prevent objectives and local priorities identified from Police intelligence.

The delivery plan identified the following three key issues for development.

- Issue 1. Joint strategic governance
- Issue 2: Gaps in knowledge, data and intelligence
- Issue 3: Co-ordinated commissioning of programmes, interventions and monitoring

4. Priority actions for 2013-14

This financial year's key actions will be based on the final recommendations identified in the situational analysis research, combined with local intelligence.

We anticipate endorsement by the Delivery Group on 13th June. A draft plan will then be circulated to the Muslim Forum and other relevant community leaders. A final draft will be sent to CSP members in July for information
