This booklet shows a technical representation of the final scheme design.

Key elements are listed below:

- Widen and renew footways (using 900 x 600 concrete block paving)
- Improve and relocate formal and informal pedestrian crossings
- Renew footways outside shops and businesses
- Raised level road surfaces and junction entry treatments
- Drainage improvements
- Street lighting improvements
- Rationalise and improve cycle facilities
- Renew and relocate bus stops to more logical and accessible locations
- New trees and landscaped/planted areas
- Removal of guard rail throughout (where feasible)
- Decluttering of signage and street furniture
- New bins, cycle stands and benches

Site-specific proposals include:

- New "strip" of granite paving, bespoke seating and tree planting at Spouter's Corner
- New gate and public realm improvements adjacent to Morrison's
- Improvements to the Library facade and forecourt
- New brick wall and various improvements within the walkway adjacent to the Library
- "Green screen" (planted wall) within Gladstone Mews
- New "stepped" kerbs under The Mall bridge
- Signals removal at the Alexandra Road junction
- Raised carriageway and reduced carriageway width at Alexandra Road junction
- Installation of in-ground trading stalls infrastructure within Lymington Avenue and Dovecote Avenue
- Removal of formal pedestrian crossing near Coleraine Road
- Closure at the end of Langham Road to motorised vehicular traffic creating a new public space outside Turnpike Lane station
- Installation of a 15m high "Steel Tree" sculpture at the Turnpike Lane junction
- Landscaping, fence adjustments and decluttering at the northern edge of Ducketts Common
- Special feature lighting, including tree lighting at key areas
- "Terrazzo" paving mats at selected locations
- Bespoke seating / resting points at key areas
- Bespoke granite quadrants (corner pieces) at the side street crossings and at key junctions

Wood Green Town Centre proposals overview

Haringey Council is delivering a public realm improvement scheme in the Wood Green area known as the Wood Green Town Centre Transport for London (TfL) Major Scheme. The scheme aims to make various improvements along the High Road and some of the key side routes, in the area between Wood Green Underground station and Turnpike Lane Underground station.

The proposed improvements comprise of two aspects; a general upgrade / renewal and special site-specific improvements. A summary of the proposals is detailed on this page and the page below:

* General upgrade and renewal

The section of the High Road between Lordship Lane and Carlingford Road is proposed to have the improvements listed below:

- Widened and repaved footways
- Improved drainage of the carriageway and footways
- Improved or relocated formal and informal pedestrian crossings
- Raised level road surfaces and junction entry treatments introduced on the highway at numerous locations throughout the scheme
- New standard bus shelters and relocation of selected bus stops to more logical and accessible locations
- Brighter, more consistent and sustainable street lighting
- New street tree planting
- Improved drainage
- Decluttering of signage and removal of unnecessary street clutter
- Delivery vehicle bays raised to footway level, enabling their use by pedestrians when not occupied
- New cycle stands and benches
- Improved cycle parking and cycle routes
- Introducing Legible London wayfinding signage
- Removal of guard railings (where feasible)

* Site-specific improvements

The general upgrade and renewal proposals are complemented by a series of more place specific treatments to the key areas identified on the plan to the right. The design principles for those areas are:

Make better use of generous public spaces

Where buildings are set back at certain junctions along the length of the High Road, the street is wide enough to accommodate a rich variety of public uses. Proposals for the High Road aim to support these uses by making these spaces more generous and flexible. By encouraging new public life in these spaces, we can help to make Wood Green a more attractive place to spend time.

Improve access to transport connections


The junction of Turnpike Lane and the High Road will be significantly improved to make a more pedestrian friendly environment that better connects the underground station and bus interchange to the High Road and Ducketts Common. Access to Wood Green Underground station will be improved by making a clear visual connection to the High Road by removing the existing bus shelter structures. Spouters Corner will be improved with new mature trees and carefully located street furniture.

Strengthen existing market stall trading

We will remove unnecessary clutter and provide power supply points. The trading stalls will be clearly marked on the footway. Feature lighting and seating opportunities will be introduced in the proximity to improve the setting of the existing stalls.

Enhance signage and local identity

A key objective of the scheme is about enhancing awareness of the place, by clarifying and revealing its special buildings, and identifying where identity and legibility could be improved. This also aims to ease pedestrian and cyclist movement along the High Road and connections around the edges. Elements of the design including signage and street furniture will be distinctive in character and unique to Wood Green.

A Spouters Corner will become a more legible and attractive area, by decluttering obstructive street furniture, laying new footway surfacing and installing better lighting.

The restrictive feel of the area, caused by the many bollards around the edges of the space, will be removed. Instead, a variety of new carefully placed street furniture will continue to manage vehicle access and will create a positive social environment.

Mature trees will be planted to create a green space that evokes the historic woodlands of Wood Green and that acts as a screen against the busy road for pedestrians.

A new landscape treatment in front of the library, coupled with new library signage and improvements to the building facade, will celebrate this as a key civic space. Better lighting, tree planting and other planting will improve the pedestrianised east-west links (leading to Park Road and Gladstone Mews)

At the section of the High Road adjacent to the shopping centre, the pedestrian experience will be improved with wider footways, lighting along the covered walkways and bridge, as well as improved kerb edges and railing treatments.

Lymington Avenue and Dovecote Avenue offer important eastern routes from the main road, and will be made to feel safer and more accessible. Both these areas have potential for extended trading stall uses.

New special feature lighting, unique patterned paving, new street furniture, and trees are proposed to improve the vitality of these spaces.

Turnpike Lane junction is to have wider crossing points, decluttered footways and most guardrails removed, which will to help to reduce vehicle dominance, whilst maintaining the current vehicle capacity.

The junction will be marked with a prominent tree sculpture that links Ducketts Common, Turnpike Lane station and the High Road. The sculpture will also provide street lighting.

The western end of Langham Road will be closed to motorised vehicles, which will create a new public space adjacent to the station. This space will have new street furniture, new trees and better lighting.






Statutory Notification Plans

Some proposals are not included in the key below and are labeled separately on the drawing.


The road markings shown are the proposed or renewed markings only, unchanged road-markings are not shown on the plan.
