

#### **Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions**

- (2) Supply of alcohol: No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

**Door supervision:** At specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity and each of these individuals must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

#### **OTHER CONDITIONS:**

There will be substantial food refreshment available at all times.

#### Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

#### THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

A digital Closed Circuit Television System will be installed and maintained on the premises.

The CCTV system will be recording at all times when the premises are open and the recordings shall be made available to the police and council on request.

Two door supervisors will be stationed on the premises between 23.00 and the closing of the premises.

A Panic alarm system linked to the central Police Station will be installed.

Anti-drugs signs will be displayed in the premises.

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

Fire safety equipment will be checked regularly and any requirements made by the Fire Safety Officer will be complied with.

Total number of persona accommodated at any one time shall not exceed 150.

The doors and gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied/in use under the Licence and notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded:-

## "THIS DOOR TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED/IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE"

- a) The main outer entrance doors
- b) The gates to the side exit

The fire alarm changeover switch shall be in the "FIRE ALARM AND BUZZERS" position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the Licence

The fire alarm installation shall be under the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The results of the tests shall be recorded in a logbook which shall be readily available for inspections by Officers of the Council or LFEPA.

The system of wiring used for the electrical installation is not of the type required by the Councils Technical Regulations for Public Entertainment. However the Council will not require its removal so long as its maintained in a satisfactory condition. Any alterations or additions to the installation (including those which may be found necessary as a result of an Electrical Inspection) shall be carried out using a system of wiring approved by the council (e.g. cables enclosed in screwed metal conduit or metal trunking, or mineral insulated metal sheathed cables).

#### THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

Signs will be displayed at the exit reminding customers to leave quietly and respect the neighbours.

#### Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Staff will call Taxis/Mini cabs for the use of customers leaving the premises when requested to do so.

Soundproofing of the premises is recommended and the applicant should liaise with the Council's Building Control Department in this regard.

#### THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

All staff will be trained that alcohol will only be sold to persons who can produce photographic identification where there is any doubt that they are over the age of 18.

Persons under the age of 18 will not be permitted to use Gaming machines.

Alcohol may only be sold to individuals over the age of 18 with valid proof of identification with one of the following:

- · A valid passport
- A photo driving license issued in a European Union Country
- A proof of age standard card system
- A citizen card, supported by the Home Office

## Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

That the Committee grants the application for a variation of the license in full and subject to the conditions set out in the amended operating schedule. In addition, the licence is subject to the following conditions:

- (i) That the standard mandatory conditions are enforced.

Glass bottles containing wine may be sold for consumption with a meal taken at a table, by customers who are seated in an area set aside exclusively for persons taking table meals.

No customers carrying open or sealed bottles shall be admitted to the premises at any time that the premises are open to the public.

Alcoholic drinks shall not be advertised, promoted or supplied in such a way that is intended or likely to encourage persons to consume alcohol to an excessive extent.

Alcoholic drinks shall not supplied in such a way which will enable or which is intended to enable persons to consume unlimited quantities of alcoholic drinks on payment of a single payment or payment arrangement which is not related to the amount or number of alcoholic drinks supplied.

An attendant shall be positioned in the cloakroom area during the whole time that is in use

A minimum of one SIA Registered Door Supervisor per 100 customer's, or part thereof, shall be on duty whilst the premises are in use under the License

#### c) Public safety

Bottle bins shall be provided at the exit doors and staff shall show due diligence in preventing bottles and glasses being taken from the premises.

Appropriate fire safety procedures are in place including fire extinguishers (foam, H20 and CO2), fire blanket, internally illuminated fire exit signs, numerous smoke detectors and emergency lighting (see enclosed plan for details of locations). All appliances are inspected annually.

All emergency exits shall be kept free from obstruction at all times.

#### **Supporting Information**

The Music Palace is located in an area consisting mainly of commercial premises on the ground floor with residential accommodation on the upper floors. It is situated on a busy road.

There is a brief history of noise nuisance from this address: loud music was reported but not witnessed in July 2005 and June 2007.

#### Prevention of nuisance from noise/vibration

#### **Airborne**

All doors and windows will remain closed during the licensed activities. Where a door is used for patrons to enter or leave the premises, the door will be fitted with a self-closing device and staff told to ensure that it is not propped open.

#### **Sound Limits**

The level of amplified entertainments shall be controlled by means of a limiting device set at a level agreed with an Acoustic Consultant.

#### Patrons entering/exiting premises

Where people leave the premises, a licensed door supervisor shall supervise and ensure that they leave in a courteous manner.

#### Recommendation

The Noise Team have considered the application and nature of noise sensitive premises.

I understand that the Music Palace on Tottenham Lane, N8, has applied for extended licensing hours for live / recorded music to 2 am Monday to Thursday and 3 am Friday and Saturday and 1 am Sunday.

We live behind this premises in Fairfield ROad.

I strongly object to this application due to the level of noise which this bar generates already, on a nightly basis. The music is extremely loud and can easily be heard from inside our house when all the windows are closed. It is impossible to enjoy a quiet evening in the garden due to the noise, and our children often have difficulty sleeping due to the noise. It is bad enough having this antisocial noise pollution during the existing licensing hours. We have previously asked that the bar install effective noise insulation and air conditioning (so that the doors and windows are not opened in summer) Given the bar is in the midst of a residential area, and already creates alot of noise, I implore you to refuse the bar extended licensed hours to play loud music.

Please note that I would not object to extended licensing hours for the bar if it were only quiet, background music allowed. It is the loud, intrusive music which should not be playing any later than it already is.

I wish to register my objection to the extension of bar opening hours for the Music Hall on Tottenham

- 1) These opening hours are virtually the same as those proposed by the hall when trading as Bar Rocca - and were rejected.
- 2) Local conditions are totally unchanged with one important exception give at 3) below.
- 3) Somerfields have opened a mini market across the road, which is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. I have inspected the new shop and noted that it devotes nearly a fifth of its shelving to booze of one sort or another. With a chucking out time of 3am and with with a yobbish clientele which this place attracts like a magnet, it all too easy to visualize the drunken hoards descending on Somerfields to buy (or, more plausibly, steal) the drink on sale there. Needless to say Somerfields have no way of shutting off the alcoholic section of the store.

I strongly suggest that you stick to the present trading hours which are anti-social enough for those forced to live within earshot of this place.

We wish to object to the application for the extention of opening hours at The Music Palace on Tottenham Lane N8.

The noise of the people leaving this establishment would cause great disturbance to residents, who live nearby, as many cars are parked along the roads and already this is a problem. Due to the no smoking ban, many customers have their drinks outside and often broken glass is left on pavements and roads. This causes a public nuisance and is not safe.

We do not hear the music unless the front doors are open. This was a problem during the hot weather.

As residents of Elmfield Avenue we wish to **object most strongly** to the proposed variation to opening hours for the above site.

Under the current licensing arrangements, we are already subjected to noise and disturbance from this venue.

At the moment this property provides live music on a number of evenings per week. This can be heard in our houses late at night, when many people in this residential family neighbourhood are attempting to sleep. An extension to the opening hours will mean that his will continue until well after midnight in the middle of the week when many people have to get up early for work the next day. This is clearly a public nuisance.

The venue also attracts people from a wide area who travel by car and park in local residential streets. Not only does this make parking very difficult for residents; it also creates further disruption as people return to their parked vehicles late at night to return home. We will then be subjected to car doors banging, engines being switched on and the noise of departing vehicles. It is unreasonable for residents who have to work the next day to be subjected to this as late as 2.30 a.m.

As this establishment serves alcohol, we will also be subjected to noise and disturbance created by patrons who leave the venue on foot and walk down Elmfield Avenue behaving in a rowdy manner. It is unreasonable to subject local residents to this nuisance, disorder and disruption in the early hours of the morning on a regular basis.

I am writing to oppose the application to extend the bar and music licenses of the Music Palace on Tottenham Lane, London N8. I live at 20 Elmfield Avenue N8 and believe that any extension to the license can only exacerbate the problems experienced by local residents because of the presence of this late-night venue in a mainly residential area. We already regularly have to put up with noisy groups of night-clubbers making their way along the street late into the night after the Music Palace closes, often over a prolonged period, interrupting our sleep. Opening as proposed till 2.00 on weekdays, when many have to work in the morning, and till 3.00 at weekends, would clearly make the situation worse. People leaving the club frequently leave bottles and cans lying in the street or in front gardens or forecourts, which is not only unsightly but potentially hazardous. I have just found out that the Music Bar on Tottenham Lane wants to estend its licence till 2 am Monday to Thursday, 3 am Friday and Saturday and 1 am Sunday. I am a little surprised we received no formal notice of this - I only found out because a neighbour alerted me to it this evening. Why were we not told formally - we only have a week until the deadline for objection expires! This is simply not fair.

Such a move would be disastrous for the local area and must be resisted.

When Bar Rocca/Cheekee Monkeez was based at the same property and had a late licence, our lives were made a misery. We had people revving engines at kicking out time, walking over cars, urinating in our front gardens, peering through our letterboxes and shouting, trying to break into our cars in the early hours - you name it, we had it. The police were being called to the premises all the time to deal up fights, disorder and vandalism. The noise was terrible, even though the place was supposed to be soundproofed. There were gangs of kids queueing to get in and hanging around the streets four hours afterwards - many of them did not look 18 - a significant number did not even look 16!

I know that the Music Bar appeals to an older crowd but what it if is sold on to another manager who turns it into a Bar Rocca style venue once again, aimed at (mostly underage) teenagers with no respect for property, people's need to sleep or the public nuisance they are causing with their loud and disruptive behaviour? Our bedroom is at the back of the house but when they do have live bands I can always hear it (very loud) but don't mind too much as it's usually over by midnight and tends to be just at the weekend. If it was every night me, my partner and kids would be so sleep deprived we would be psychotic within days.

PLEASE do not put us through this again. This is a predominantly residential area near a school. Our kids go to Rokesly School and if they are kept up by late music every single night of the week they will be too tired to get up in the morning and their education and health will suffer terribly. I will be too tired to go to work. Our neighbours have a new baby and are sleep deprived enough as it is, without this happening.

Please turn this application down, I implore you.



I am writing to object strongly to the above application on these grounds:

- 1. PUBLIC NUISANCE. The noise made by this club is a public nuisance to people living in the surrounding area in terms of noise pollution fro the so-called music, and shouting and screaming of the clubbers when they come out at night. The idea that this nuisance could be extended until the early hours is frankly horrific.
- 2. PUBLIC SAFETY. People emerge from this club drunk late at night and have been known to be aggressive and threatening to the public. If they drink for longer, this problem can only get worse.
- 3. PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER. People emerging from this club have been known to damage cars in the surrounding roads, and to generally create a feeling of aggression which can be frightening for people passing by late at night. Later licensing hours can only exacerbate the problem.
- 4. CHILD PROTECTION. There are a number of children living in Fairfield Road whose sleep will be badly affected by the noise from this club going on even longer than it is already. Sleep deprivation will be harmful to their health.

I regard 2am on weekdays, 3am at weekends and 1am on Sundays as unacceptably late for any establishment to be allowed to promote drinking alcohol, playing loud music, and generally encouraging bad behaviour on the streets, which are residential. This club is not soundproofed, and was never meant to have electronic music played in it. I hope that the Licensing Team will refuse this application entirely. I would like to strongly object to the application by The Music Palace on Tottenham Lane for extended licensing hours.

I have had to call the Council's noise enforcement team on a number of occasions in the past few months as the establishment already flaunts acceptable noise level restrictions and therefore has continually acted irresponsibly. Its patrons park their cars in Hermiston Avenue and we have had to endure their drunken outbursts and threatening behaviour in the early hours of the morning as they return to their vehicles. Many of them drive erratically away. This repeated antisocial behaviour has woken my family and me.

I have two babies under the age of two and many of my neighbours are either elderly or have very young children. Extending the opening and licensing hours of The Music Palace would have a detrimental affect on the neighbourhood's lifestyle. The club is located opposite a primary and junior school. The council must respect that the people who live close to the school have young children and have not chosen to live in the West End. Many of my neighbours are professionals and have to go to work each day. If we are kept awake until 2am on weekdays, it will make it impossible to work. The children will also lose sleep on school days and this will have a harrowing affect on their performance at school.

Mr Karatas, who runs The Music Palace, claimed in The Ham and High (September 20) that the older patrons posed less of a threat than the younger crowd who frequented Bar Rocca. This is not true. Our property has been threatened on a number of occasions by his patrons. Also, what guarantee is there that if The Music Palace is granted extended opening and licensing hours that Mr Karatas will not sell the club to someone who will want to attract a younger audience?

All through the summer The Music Palace opened its doors and windows making it impossible for me and my children to sleep. It also made it impossible for us to open our

windows.

Mr Karatas also claims in the Ham and High that he will soundproof the building and keep the doors closed. If he was genuine and cared about the neighbourhood, he would have already carried out this work. However, a bit of soundproofing will not solve the problem of drunken patrons threatening my property and my family. Mr Karatas has closed the doors in the past week, but this is an anomaly, not standard practice.

On hearing of The Music Palace's application, I went to read the notice in its window. I could not read the two notices as they were both well above my eye level. I believe that this was a deliberate tactic to ensure fewer people were aware of the application, and shows a level of deception that the Council should find unacceptable.

The need for residents to continually protest and complain about the establishment now known as The Music Palace should be of the gravest concern to the Council. It needs to ask if Crouch End really needs a nightclub in what should be a highly desirable, family-oriented neighbourhood.

In respect of the above, I wish to lodge my objection to extended opening hours, on the grounds of noise nuisance. Sound (music) from The Music Palace is clearly audible from Ferme Park Road especially when live bands are playing. The residents in houses in Fairfield Road that back onto the premises must need their windows shut most nights if they are to get any sleep.

As far as I can see there is no sound proofing in The Music Palace, which has large glass windows in the roof, glass not being a usual sound dampening material. I would expect a music venue such as this in a residential area to have to comply with the same decibel levels as every other venue but there does not appear to be any form of metering within the premises.

In addition, there are doors to a separate side alley outside the premises, and the front doors to the pavement area, that are open for long periods of time as smokers go in and out. This again allows sound out from the venue.

I think that if the extended licensing hours are granted then it should be on condition that adequate sound proofing be installed. The excessive noise in the early hours coming from this venue should not be allowed to continue unchecked.

(I have been in The Music Palace on occasion and think that it is a well run and friendly venue. I hope that it will continue to provide an interesting music venue for Crouch End. Just quieter from the outside.)

There seems to be no sound proofing in the premises. I am surprised that in the years that the venue (under different management) has run as a club that the council has not been able to curb the noise.

The new restrictions on smoking in premises has led to doors to a separate side alley, and the front doors to the pavement area, being left open so that smokers can go in and out; allowing sound out from the venue.

I would prefer the extension not to be granted as I think that this extension would also encourage more rowdy behaviour and damage to property, which then has to be cleared up by residents.

I have visited the premises and feel that it is a well run and friendly venue. I do not feel that it needs this extension to continue as a successful business

We have become aware of the music palace on Totenham Lane, N8 having applied to extent their licensing hours to 2 am Mondays to Thursdays, till 3 am on Fridays and Saturdays; and till 1 am on Sundays.

My Family and I live at number 13 Elmfield Avenue which is directly opposite this bar and we **highly** and **strongly** object to this licence being given.

We have many reasons to object to this licence being agreed, and we ask that you take into consideration the feelings of the community living around this bar.

Firstly, we have noticed that crime and disorder has improved and been better in the street and local area since the bar hours had decreased and changed its name from Bar Rocca to The Music Palace. People leaving the bar previously were mostly young and extremely noisy and violent when previously leaving the bar; and our road was where they parked. So it was not safe for us late into the night and early hours of the morning, especially at weekends.

In fact a stone was thrown through our window by young people in the street, which smashed our window one night about 4 years ago when bar rocca was at its busiest and noisiest.

We could not even look out of the window in the hope that they would keep their noise down in fear of reprisals. We were more than happy that the bar had changed ownership and policy and seemed to be closing earlier.

These above points also refer to public safety in the area.

Our child is 7 and my wife is expecting our second child, the majority of the families that live on our road have small children. We can better protect or children from harm, by not having the return of a higher volume of people and a younger clientele, which is i assume what the Bar is hoping to attract; and causing a public nuisance in this residential area.





It is already unpleasant for local residents - loud music until the early hours, doors wide open and kids hanging around outside smoking and the nuisance when they eventually turn out with glasses, bottles, vomit left on the pavement and car doors banging and final farewells being shouted, etc. Also, on Sunday afternoons the doors are on occasions left open and loud music played.
