- 3.2 The application has determined that there are no further conditions that need to be added to the licence in order to ensure that the licensing objectoves are met for a 24 hour alcohol licence. Appendix 1
- 4. Objections Received (Responsible Authorities)
- 4.1 Objections were received from the Responsible Authorities, namely the Public Health Team. Appendix 2
- 5 Options for Consideration
- 5.1 The options available to the Licensing Sub-Committee having considered all the relevant information are as follows:
 - To refuse to grant the licence
 - To grant the licence with conditions
 - To grant the licence but restrict the licensable activities
 - To grant the licence with restricted times
- 5.2 Additional conditions or restrictions to licensable activities and/or times should only be imposed if considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. If other law already places certain statutory responsibilities on a premises, it would not be appropriate to impose similar duties.
- 5.3 Members of the Sub-Committee should be advised that the applicant or any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the application may appeal against the decision made to the Magistrates' Court within 21 days of the date on which they were notified.
- 6. Standard of Decision Making
- 6.1 In accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's scheme of delegation, all applications where a relevant representation has been made need to be determined by this Sub-Committee.
- 6.2 When determining the application, the Sub-Committee should only consider



issues, which relate to the four licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:

- The prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- The prevention of a Public Nuisance
- The protection of Children from Harm
- 6.3 Members of the Sub-Committee must have regard to the statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy. Members of the Sub-Committee may deviate from the statutory guidance and licensing policy only if they deem that there is good reason to do so.
- 6.4 Members of the Sub-Committee should not allow themselves to predetermine the application or to be prejudiced in favour or opposed to the licence and shall only determine the application having had an opportunity to consider all relevant facts.

7 Licensing Policy

The committee will also wish to be aware of the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. Licensing is about regulating the provision of licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The terms and conditions attached to various permissions are focused on matters which are within the control of individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. Accordingly, these matters will centre on the premises and places being used for licensable activities and the vicinity of those premises and places.

The objective of the licensing process is to allow for the carrying on of retail sales of alcohol and the prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. It is the Licensing Authority's wish to facilitate well run and managed premises with licence holders displaying sensitivity to the impact of the premises on local residents.

Where relevant representations are made, this authority will demand stricter conditions with regard to noise control in areas that have denser residential accommodation, but this will not limit opening hours without regard for the individual merits of any application. This authority will consider each application and work with the parties concerned to ensure that adequate noise control measures are in place.

8. Licensing hours

Where relevant representations are made, the Council will consider the proposed hours on their individual merits. Notwithstanding this, the Council may require stricter conditions in areas that have denser residential accommodation to prevent public nuisance. The Council will endeavour to work with all parties concerned in such instances to ensure that adequate conditions are in place. The Council may restrict the hours that certain premises can offer alcohol for sale for consumption off the premises for preventing crime, disorder and nuisance.

9. Other considerations

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states:



"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area".






Background:

Haringey experiences some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London and the harm due to alcohol is a growing concern. In the five year period of 2009/10 – 2014/15, alcohol related hospital admissions increased by 38% with the local cost of these admissions now estimated to be £7.5 million annually. Across the borough, there are currently over 800 licensed premises for the sale and supply of alcohol and this figure continues to rise, with some areas of high level clustering, one of those areas being Green Lanes on which the premises is located. Increasingly, evidence shows us that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in both alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, including injury, violence and medical harm. Many factors are known to influence this including density of licensed premises and trading hours.

Antisocial behaviour associated with street drinking has been recognised as a concern in Haringey. Problems identified include; litter, noise, urination and intimidation all of which have a detrimental impact to the quality of life for residents. As a result, Haringey Council's Street

Enforcement Team has designated a number of areas within the borough as Alcohol Control Zones (ACZ). Tackling alcohol misuse is therefore key to achieving the outcomes in Haringey's Health and Wellbeing Strategy. We want to create a culture that prevents problem drinking from starting and provides help for people early on should they be struggling.

The off license is located on Green Lanes (Harringay ward), a busy residential area with a high density of eating / drinking establishments. There is a clear correlation between excessive availability of alcohol and crime in this area. Public Health have concerns that these issues may be further compounded by the increased availability of alcohol in the early hours of the morning which could further contribute to public disorder, crime and nuisance.



In 2015, Harringay, the ward in which the premises in located, ranked 4th out of 19 wards for night time violence with 52 incidents reported and 3rd out of 19 wards for alcohol related incidents reported by British Transport Police. More alarmingly, the Harringay ward ranked 2nd out of 19 wards in the same year for ambulance callouts to alcohol-related illnesses in children and young people aged 8-17 years old. This highlights a real issue in the Harringay ward around underage sales and drinking in children and young people.

This trend has continued and more recent data shows that the LSOA (small geographic area) in which the premises is located had 12 alcohol related ambulance call outs in the fiscal year 2016-17, ranking 17th out of the 144 LSOAs in Haringey.

Recommendations:

After reviewing the application, we believe that the applicant needs to give more careful consideration as to how they will uphold and promote the licensing objectives, particularly relating to public nuisance and the prevention of crime and disorder. The application is limited in content and fails to address / state how it will deal with various issues that prevail in the area and may arise in the early hours of the morning if operating on a 24-hour licence.

Public Health therefore recommends that this application be refused at this stage. If this licence is to be granted, we recommend that the following conditions are to be attached to minimise any potential harm to our local residents:

and disorder & public safety	- All staff shall be trained in recognising signs of drunkenness, how to refuse service and the premises duty of care. Documented records of training completed shall be kept for each member of staff. Training shall be regularly refreshed and at no greater than 6 monthly intervals. Training records shall be made available for inspection upon request by a police officer or an authorised officer of the Council.
	- The premises shall display prominent signage indicating that it is an offence to sell alcohol to anyone who is drunk.
	- There shall be no self-service of spirits on the premises.
	- There shall be no promotional sales of alcohol at the premises where alcohol is sold at a price lower than that at which the same or similar alcoholic drinks are sold, or usually sold, on the premises.
Protecting children from harm	- Challenge 25 policy to be enforced.
	- Challenge 25 posters are also displayed in areas of high visibility to customers throughout the premise.
	- Only a passport, photo-card driving licence, Armed Forces ID cards or a proof of age card bearing the official "PASS" accreditation hologram should to be accepted as proof of age.
	-The licensee shall require staff to note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards.
	- The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained on relevant matters including the conditions on the premises licence; age restricted products; and (if they are ever left in charge of the shop) the operation of the CCTV system and how to deal with visits from authorised officers. Staff shall sign to confirm that they have received and understood the training.

	- Age-restricted products training shall cover the following steps: the assessment of age; how and when to challenge for proof of age; acceptable proof of age and how to check it; and recording refusals.
Public nuisance	Alcohol sales are to remain the same as those currently stated on the existing premises licence (Monday to Saturday 0700 to 0000, Sunday 0800 to 0000). This is in line with Haringey's Statement of Alcohol Licensing Policy 2016 – 2021 which states the following: 'While the Council will treat each case on its individual merits there will be a presumption that permitted hours for the sale of alcohol will be restricted to between 8am and 11.30pm on Sunday to Thursday and 8am to midnight on Friday and Saturday in respect of premises in residential areas and areas being adversely affected by street drinking issues'.

Crime and disorder:

The above findings above are of significant concern from a public health perspective in terms of the prevention of crime and disorder. There is an increasing amount of evidence which shows that those under the influence of alcohol are more likely to commit crimes and engage in anti-social behaviour (ASB). They are also more likely to be the victim of crimes such as common assault and robbery which are significant issues in Haringey (GLA datastore, 2016).

Furthermore, the impact of the sale of high strength beers, lagers and ciders is having an adverse effect across Haringey, particularly the more deprived wards in the east of the borough. These wards have seen an increase in street drinking and ASB as a result of the increase and easy availability of high strength cheap alcohol. Super strength ciders, larger and beer which are 6.5% Alcohol by Volume (ABV) and above are one of the most harmful forms of alcohol and this is a real concern from a public safety perspective.

Public Safety:

The impact of alcohol on health in Haringey is particularly severe. The levels of ambulance related callouts in this ward (Harringay) reflects the increased pressure and costs to the NHS as a result of alcohol in Haringey. These impacts are also felt across a range of groups including the council, policing and the community as a whole.

Public Nuisance:

As stated in Haringey's Statement of Licensing Policy 2016-2021 "licensed premises, especially those that operate late at night or in the early hours of the morning, can give rise to a range of nuisances that may potentially impact on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. Principal concerns relate to noise nuisance, light pollution and noxious smells."

The Licensing Authority's expectations of license holders are set out in the policy where it states that "licensees have a responsibility for the conduct of their customers while they are in and around their premises. If provision is made for customers to congregate or smoke outside of premises, then sufficient management controls must be put into place to ensure that no nuisance or disturbance is caused to local residents. Failure to control customers outside of premises can result in licence reviews being submitted and impact upon the premises licence".

We have specific concerns about the impact of operating late in the night / early hours of the morning on every day of the week on local families living in this mainly residential area. The application to sell alcohol and be open 24 hours (Monday - Sunday goes against recommendations made in Haringey's Statement of Licensing policy, especially in an area that is plagued by high levels of street drinking, ASB and violence. Furthermore, Mr Degirmenci has not stated in the application how he plans to address problems that may arise from street drinking, customers with alcohol dependency / those who are visibly drunk, proxy sales and ASB.

Protecting Children from Harm:

There are 3 schools within 500m of the premises (SafeStats London, 2016) so it is vital that any license holder is responsible and clear on operating the Challenge 25 policy. Beyond contributing to the normalisation of alcohol for school children visiting the off license, the applicant has not satisfactorily addressed how they intend to safeguard children and prevent underage sales in their application.
