<p>Cllr Peter Mitchell</p>	<p>In response to the current consultation on the Council's Statement of Gambling Policy, I would like to comment on the Local Area Profile.</p> <p>The map on page 13 shows crime related to betting shops and concludes with a list of wards where additional considerations will be required from operators wishing to operate in those wards. I was surprised and disappointed that Woodside is not included in that list. There are five betting shops in Woodside (see figures on page 18) and all of them are in Lordship Lane N22. This road is the boundary between Woodside and Noel Park, with the northern side being in Woodside ward. The map shows that there is crime in Lordship Lane related to betting shops but it is not clear whether this is on the northern or southern side, or both. As a ward Councillor I get complaints from residents about drinking, smoking, drugs and anti-social behaviour outside the betting shops on the northern side of Lordship Lane. There are often large groups of men congregating outside the betting shops and residents, particularly women, feel intimidated walking past.</p>	<p>The betting shops on Lordship Lane are included in the overall crime stats and those falling into Woodside Ward should also be included as one of the special areas for more in depth consideration by betting operators.</p> <p>This will be reflected in the Supplementary document.</p>

	<p>This problem is especially a concern in the 100 yard stretch of Lordship Lane between Winkfield Road and Perth Road where three of the five betting shops in the ward are located. This short stretch of Lordship Lane with the concentration of betting shops is adjacent to the part of Woodside ward that is amongst the 5-10% most deprived areas (see data on page 21).</p> <p>White Hart Lane ward is one of those where additional considerations will be required from operators due to crime related to betting shops (page 13), yet according to the figures on page 18 there are no betting shops in the ward. This does not seem right.</p> <p>Only three wards in Haringey have more betting shops than Woodside, so I would ask you to look again at crime figures and whether the ward should be added to the list on page 13 of those requiring additional considerations from operators. The maps on pages 16 and 17 are difficult to read online but they would appear to include parts of Woodside as areas of concern in relation to betting shops.</p>	
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
