The proposal

Linden House is currently a vacant premise formerly used as an 8-bedded residential unit for people with profound learning disabilities. The decision to close the residential home that was formerly on this site was taken by Cabinet in November 2015, and a full EqIA was conducted at that time.

The current proposal is to convert Linden House (previously open as an 8-bedded residential care home) into a supported living scheme with 4 self-contained flats for Transforming Care inpatients. This is driven by the following:

- The Transforming Care programme: Haringey Council and Haringey CCG, as required by NHSE, are keen to improve resident outcomes to facilitate the discharge of Haringey patients with autism, challenging behaviour and/or mental health conditions currently living in acute settings. NHSE have offered capital grants to Councils and CCGs to support the development of properties to support the discharge of these patients.
- Haringey's supported living accommodation profile: The main challenge to facilitating discharge of Transforming Care patients, and indeed supporting adults with autism and/or challenging behaviour and complex needs is the availability of suitably adapted accommodation. The Council and CCG often have to purchase stand-alone properties and commission 'wrap-around' support at high cost due to the absence of appropriately adapted shared accommodation in Haringey.

What will this mean:

The change will provide the opportunity for vulnerable people to live independently in their own homes and assist them to achieve their goals in independent living and give people real supported living options through supporting their choices and enabling them to have control over their lives.

4 service users that will be moving into to Linden House have a learning disability and autism, which is a protected characteristic.

1. Sex

Although there are no females being allocated to the Linden House units, this is a reflection of there being more males than females in the Transforming Care cohort, and the need to match those living in Linden House according to their needs and profiles. This matching process helps to provide the best possible environment and support for people

living there.

The process of allocation is done through a comprehensive needs assessment, which ensures that selection is fair and equal. While in this accommodation the cohort is all male, this is not the case across those living in supported living in Haringey more widely.

2. Gender reassignment

Data for adults with learning disabilities, autism does not break down by gender reassignment. There is no data to suggest that this protected characteristic group would be disproportionately negatively impacted by this proposal, however if this changes we will investigate further to address any negative impact.

3. Age

The service is targeted at working age adults who will most benefit from the supported living model. At Linden House, all residents will be aged 25-39. The needs assessment is the principal route to determining take up of the service, ensuring that allocation is fair and equal. While in this accommodation the cohort is younger, this is not the case across those living in supported living in Haringey more widely.

4. Disability

All of those being offered a home at Linden House have a learning disability with autism and behaviours that can be challenging, and are part of the Transforming Care cohort. This proposal will therefore have a significantly positive impact on this protected characteristic group.

5. Race and ethnicity

The profile of the users to take up a placement at Linden Road is disproportionately in favour of BAME users compared with both the wider user and population ethnic mix, meaning that this group will benefit most from this proposal.

6. Sexual orientation

The data on the wider Transforming Care cohort does not break down by sexual orientation. There is no data to suggest that this protected characteristic group would be disproportionately negatively impacted by this proposal, however if this changes we will investigate further to address any negative impact.

7. Religion or belief (or no belief)

The profile of the users to take up a placement at Linden Road is disproportionately in favour of Christian users compared with the wider religious groups. The needs assessment is the principal route to determining take up of the service, ensuring that allocation is fair and equal. While in this accommodation those of Christian belief make up all of the service users, this is not the case across those living in supported living in Haringey more widely.

8. Pregnancy and maternity

Current data on service users in the Transforming Care cohort does not breakdown by pregnancy and maternity. There is no data to suggest that this protected characteristic group would be disproportionately negatively impacted by this proposal, however if this changes we will investigate further to address any negative impact.

9. Marriage and Civil Partnership

Data on marriage and civil partnership status among people with a learning disability with autism and behaviours that may be challenging is not available. There is no data to suggest that this protected characteristic group would be disproportionately negatively impacted by this proposal, however if this changes we will investigate further to address any negative impact.

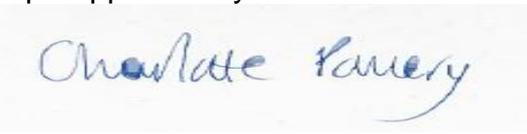
